In Matador, the customary union Thanksgiving service will be at the First Baptist Church, with Rev. Lloyd Hearn, pastor of the First United Methodist Church as speaker. Singers from all churches

Special music will be by the Assembly of God Youth Choir, and the program will also include Thanksgiving readings. Participating will be members from the First United Methodist Church, First Baptist, and the Assembly of God.

PLANS for Christmas activities were augmented Tuesday at regular meeting of Matador Lions Club, in the basement of First United Methodist Church.

Lion President Joe Smith distributed committee assignments for the club's annual Christmas activities and reported that the directors had decided not to have the traditional Christmas parade this year.

Instead, activities this year will center around the annual visit of Santa Clause and a concert by the Patton Springs Band.

It was pointed out that for the past several years the Christmas parade has been plagued by inclement weather, and had to be cancelled entirely last year.

Youngsters are assured, however, that Santa will make his appearance, and they will receive the usual sack of fruit and candy and have an opportunity to tell him what they want for Christmas.

Lion Smith also named a committee to handle arrangements for moving the press box from the east side to the west side of Burleson Field. Present plans are to expand the bleachers on the west side of the field and change the "home side" to the west side.

Death Claims John Patton

John Patton, 81, former Matador resident died Nov. 13, at Roseburg, Oregon, following a massive heart attack, relatives here were informed last week.

Funeral services were held Friday at the Chapel of Roses Funeral Home and burial was in Roseburg Garden Memorial Cemetery.

He was born John Robert Patton, June 5, 1893 at Stephenville, Texas and came to Motley County in 1900 with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Patton, pioneers of this area. He was married at Matador to the former Flora Price, and they made their home at Morton for a number of years. During World War II they moved to California and both he and his wife worked in government defense plants. They later made their home in Sacramento, Calif.

They returned to Texas about two years ago, but stayed less than a year, moving to Roseburg where they have since resided.

Mr. Patton was the last of the Patton sons and the fourth to die within the past eight months. He was preceded in death by M. A. (Buck), in March; Tom, in June; and Frank, in August. A nephew, Arnold Patton, died in an accident in May, and a brother-in-law, Alvin Stearns passed away in December of last year.

Motley Matadors Lose Championship

The Motley County Matadors lost the District 2-B Championship game to the Sundown Roughnecks in a tremendous effort 26-20 Friday here on Burleson Field.

The Matadors rushed for 172 yards with Castulo Gonzales leading the rushers with 54 steps. In the air the Matadors went 7 for 15 for 89 yards.

On the opening kickoff the Matadors recovered an on-side kick. Nine plays later Steve Stevens found Frank Welling on a 14 yard pass for 6 points. Stevens kick made the score 7-0.

But following the Matadors' kickoff Sundown scored on a pass, but the extras failed and Motley County led 7-6.

Again the Roughnecks scored and again the extras failed and the Matadors trailed at halftime 12-7.

In the third quarter Sundown was forced to punt and Matador had good field position. A 51 yard Motley County drive resulted in a 5 yard Stevens pass to Craig

Christian and the Matadors regained the lead 14-12 following Stevens PAT.

Sundown came back with a score of their own and a 2 point conversion to recapture the lead 20-14.

But the Matadors never gave up. A 10 play drive was capped off by an 18 yard pass to Jerry Pitts from Stevens for 6 to knot the score at 20-20.

With less than a minute to play the Roughnecks added the final touchdown to slip by the Matadors 26-20.

The Motley County Matadors finished the season with a 9-2 mark, after dropping the season opener and winning 9 in a row to have the longest winning streak on the South Plains for a Class B team. The Matadors won the North Zone in District 2-B winning all 6 zone games.

Over the whole season the Matadors amassed over 2600 yards total yards on offense. They scored 340 points averaging about 31 a game and gave up 165 for about a 15 a game average. They also recorded the first shutout in 22 games for Matador teams.

The Matadors also had 3 players, Steve Stevens, Joe Campbell, and Castulo Gonzales, to be awarded the Globe News Player of the Week in Class B, with the line also being recognized. Campbell was also on the Lubbock Avalanche Journal Honor Roll.

Community Chest Drive Now Underway In Matador

The Matador Community Chest campaign was officially kicked off Monday as Bob Stanley, President of the Matador Community Chest, mailed letters to the residents of Matador.

The goal for this year's drive is \$2000 according to Stanley. Most of the funds raised will go to youth programs such as Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts. There is also a fund for local charity cases.

She had also suffered from high blood pressure and a heart ailment. She was recovering satisfactorily from the surgery and had been removed Sunday from intensive care, to a private room.

Overstreet Injured In Accident

R. W. Overstreet, 62-year old Floyd County rancher has been a patient in Methodist Hospital since Nov. 10, when he was seriously injured in an accident in Floydada.

The mishap occurred in front of the office of Dr. Tommy McIntosh as Overstreet was attempting to disengage a stuck accelerator on his 1974 three-quarter ton pickup. His son, Charles, said as his father disengaged the accelerator rod it threw the vehicle in gear, knocking his father down. The front tire of the vehicle passed over his chest, continued traveling across the street, striking a sign, and coming to a halt against a tree in the yard of the First Baptist Church.

Besides a bruised chest area, including lung and heart injuries, he sustained four or five broken ribs and a mangled right hand. Surgery was performed Friday and he is declared in a satisfactory condition. Algie Groves went to Lubbock to be with members of the family during the surgery.

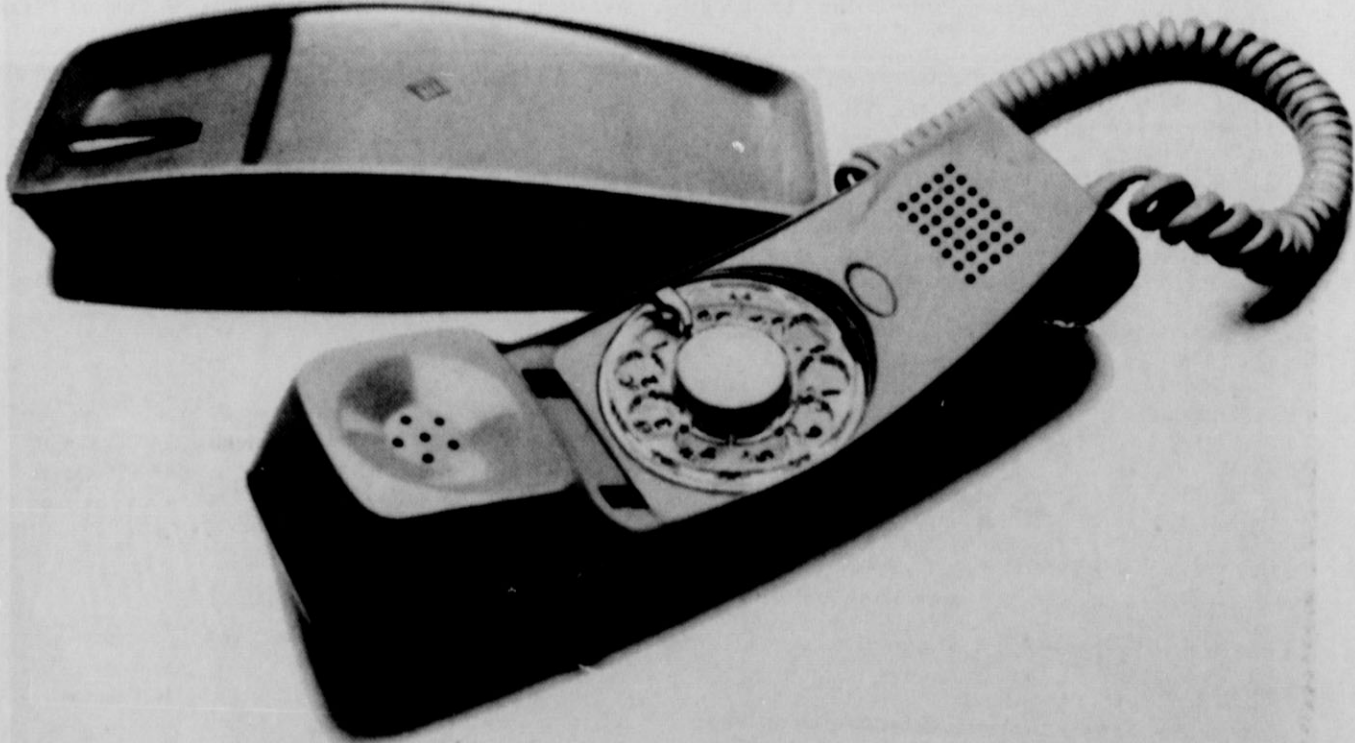

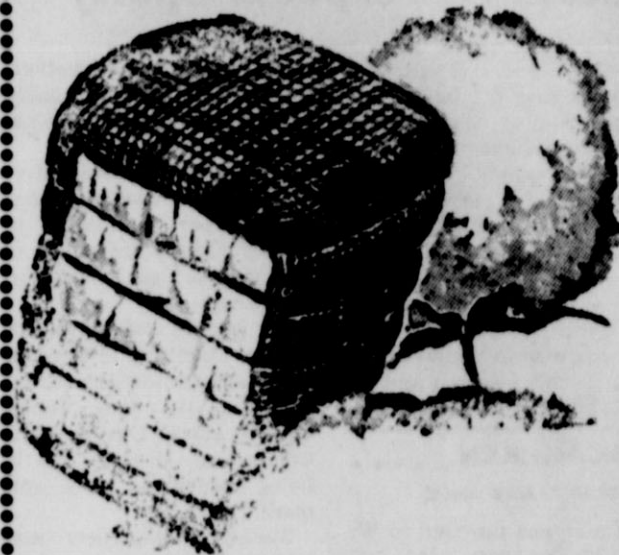

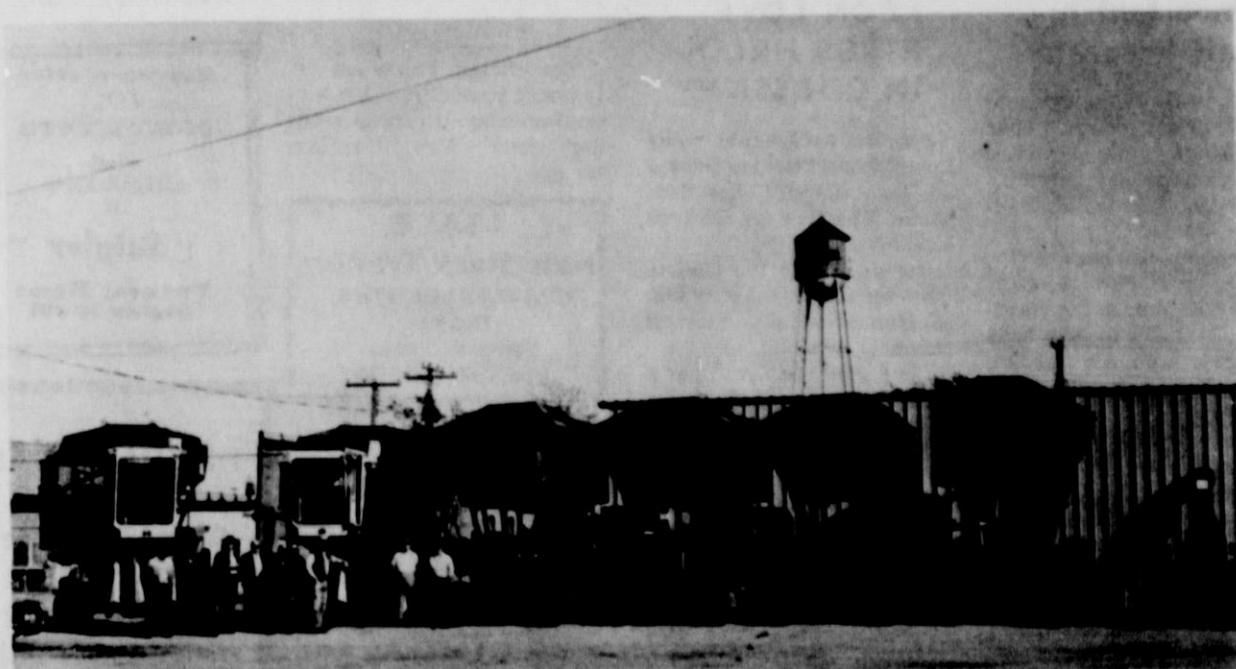
