# County Wheat Harvest Good

## Roaring Springs Is Sold to Lubbock Man

A CONTRACT has been signed for approximately 3,500 acres of land, including the historic Roaring Springs, southwest of the city of Roaring Springs.

The proposed buyer, C. L. "Chuck" Siewert, President of the Great Plains Construction Co., in Lubbock, had no comment when contacted Tuesday by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

Although Siewert would make no comment on the proposed sale, John Lincoln, a Matador Cattle Co. vice-president from the Plainview office, said the recreational facility at the Springs would probably remain

open to the public this year.

V. V. Scott, operator of the pool told the Tribune Tuesday that his contract was only for the 1973 swimming season.

The Springs recreational site is located on the South Fork of Pease River.

A man-made pool was built at the Springs in 1939, by the Matador Land & Cattle Company former owners of the syndicate which sold about 12 years ago.

Water gushes from the springs at about 500 gallons per minute and is said to be one of the above-ground outlets of the Panhandle-Plains underground water supply.

A GOOD wheat crop is being harvested in Motley County according to S. J. Braselton of Corpus Christi, owner of Braselton Elevator at Roaring Springs.

Motley County is not known as wheat country but occasionally a good crop of the grain is harvested. Most growers plant wheat for grazing purposes and if conditions are favorable, it is allowed to mature.

Mr. Braselton said his elevator shipped eight cars this week and that he had been assured sufficient railway cars for the crop. He said he believed the county would produce 50,000 bushels, which is small when compared with the Plains' wheat producing areas, but it is good for Motley County. Mr. Braselton said the price of wheat was \$2.40 per bushel Monday.

Last week end County Agent Bill Pallmeyer took a less optimistic view of wheat in the county. He said there was about 5,000 acres in wheat and the yield would be about 10 to 30 bushels per acre. He brought a head of wheat to the Tribune in which there was no grain. He said the wheat had been hit by a late freeze.

Mr. Braselton said he had made a survey of the wheat in the county and that in fields where harvest was in progress, the yield was better than had been expected and better than had been previously estimated.

Mr. Braselton, who is former Mayor of Roaring Springs, with his wife Dorothy, is visiting and looking after business interests.

## Old School Building Razing Is Protested

A PETITION was circulated this week in protest of the demolition of the Matador High School. The petition is the result of a meeting held Tuesday evening at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Traueek.

In addition to the structural soundness of the building, the petition points out that the

auditorium provides the only facility in the community for large crowds.

It also cites the sentimental value of the building to many graduates in the county area. The petition is directed to the school board of the Motley County Independent School District.

Supt. Charles Johnson was contacted by the Tribune after the meeting and he said \$5,000 had been set aside to demolish the building in which the first class was graduated in 1926. He said the fate of the building still rests in the hands of the trustees and the building will probably be used for school purposes until after the first of the year, or later.

Work on the new structure is well under way as trucks continue to haul sand from north Matador to bring to a level the north end of the building site.

Yesterday, after the petition had been circulated, Supt. Johnson made the statement that the school board would be glad to talk to any group and explain the board's position with regard to the old school building.
