Small Turnout For Election

VOTER interest was smaller than expected in Saturday's election. Only 220 votes were cast in the city, as compared with 324 in last year's election. The county polled 749 votes from a potential of 1369 registered voters.

Incumbent James Taylor received 291 votes and Vann

Francis got 200 to take two vacancies on the Motley County Independent School District board of trustees. Donna Sue Thompson received 179, and Joe Smith, 79 in the race.

In the race for two places on the Motley County Hospital District Board, John M. Russell and Johnny Turner

received 240 votes and Algie Groves won a place on the board with 246 votes. A canvass of votes will be taken Monday, it was announced following the election.

Three council members on the Matador City Council, L. B. Campbell, Lewis Bostock and Joe P. Smith were returned to office by voters

Saturday. They faced no opposition. Of the 220 votes cast, Bostock received 194, Campbell, 181 and Smith 148. Incumbents on the county school board of trustees received the following number of votes: Raby Webb for member-at-large, 347; Glenn Woodruff, Precinct 1, 122; and Wayne Hunter, Precinct 2, Flomot, 41.

Sunrise Easter Service Set By Flomot Baptists

The third annual Easter Sunrise Service will be observed by the First Baptist Church, Flomot, and will be held at 7:30 a.m. April 10, on the caprock on Highway 97. The Easter message will be delivered by Rev. Raymond Crowder, with Wayne Hunt-

er, music director, leading the singing.

"This will be a short, stand-up service with chairs being furnished by the worshippers," said the pastor.

Physician Leaves

Due to unforeseen circumstances, Motley County has lost one of its three physicians.

Dr. Su Thanh Mai, who joined Dr. Y Hoang Do at Motley County Clinic, in February, left Thursday to assume a residency in keeping with the Matching Program contract which he had previously entered into and which could not be terminated, as had been anticipated.

Before his departure, Dr. Mai left the following message with the Tribune, addressed to "Ladies and gentlemen in Motley County":

"In February, 1977, I accepted your invitation to come and set up the practice here.

"In March, 1977 I was notified that I had been matched, through the Matching Program, with a residency program. I am very sorry that even though I really intended to stay here to set up my practice, after many efforts I could not cancel that appointment.

"I recognize that during the time staying in Matador I have been receiving your moral support and \$1,400, including travel expenses and financial support. On leaving Matador, I think that I would like to share these expenses with you.

"I appreciate your help so far and do hope that I will have another chance to work with your nice community.

Dr. Su Thanh Mai and Family."

Dr. Mai explained that he would have liked to remain here until late in June, but that under the circumstances it was better for him to go at this time since his stay could not be permanent. He will be in residency for at least two years under the terms of his former commitments.

Whiteflat "Roots" Deep In Memories

The roots at Whiteflat were deep, and people who lived and grew up in the pioneer community which once boasted two gins, four grocery stores, a postoffice, two churches and the largest school in the county, returned Saturday to bask in memories. The buildings at Whiteflat have been abandoned for a number of years, and the reunion was held at the V.F.W. building in Matador.

Oldest person to attend was Mrs. Ada Wilkinson Eads of Lubbock. She came to Motley County in 1901 with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. S. A. Wilkinson, who settled "on the flat." She attended the Whiteflat school

and later taught there. "Miss Ada" is 88, but appears much younger. She has excellent recall as she tells of

experiences during the early days at Whiteflat, and how the community got its name from the tall, white grass and flat terrain.

Two couples flew from California and one couple drove from Arizona especially to attend the event. Shands Harcrow and his sister, Lula Kate (Mrs. Jason Sauls) with their spouses made the plane trip, the Harcrows from Hughson, Calif., and the Sauls from Richmond. Although not a former Whiteflat resident, Mrs. Harcrow felt at home. She is the former Jo Eda (Nancy) Berryman, and a native of Matador. Coming from Camp Verde, Arizona were Mr. and Mrs. Ralph White.

Although not every one present registered attendance was believed in the neighborhood of 250. Approximately 115 from out of the county registered and the list appears elsewhere in the Tribune.

During a short business session, the visitors voted to meet again next year, the first Saturday in April, and elected Bill Dunning as president, Jack Spray, vice-president and Mrs. Dunning (Nora Belle) secretary for the 1978 reunion.

Announcement was made this week by Commander

Roger F. Vinson of Fleming Post No. 337.

The 1977 Texas American Legion Boys State will be in session from June 8 to June 14, at the University of Texas, Austin, Commander Vinson said.

Departments (state and territorial organizations) of The American Legion will sponsor 51 of these Boys States this summer. Two outstanding youths from each of the American Legion "states" will go to American Legion Boys State in July in Washington, D.C., where they will study federal government organization and operation in much the same manner as the Boys State delegates participate in training in state government. During their Boys State sessions, the Motley County youth will participate in the organization of political parties, campaigns, election, and the enactment and enforcement of their own laws within a mythical state.

"As one of the Legion's outstanding youth-training programs, Boys State affords these youngsters an opportunity to learn the functions of government," Commander Vinson said. "Also, they will see the importance of the role a good citizen has in discharging his citizenship responsibilities. They soon discover how good government depends upon the active interests of every citizen."

W. P. Graves Rites Held

Funeral services for Willis Phillip Graves, 77, of Deming, N.M. formerly of Matador, were held Thursday, March 31 at 10:00 a.m. at the Wheeler Chapel of Deming, with Shelton Ruebush and Jerry Leatherman of the Church of Christ, officiating.

Mr. Graves passed away Monday, March 28 at Mimbres Memorial Hospital, Deming, after a lengthy illness.

Graveside services with full military honors accorded by Ft. Bliss were held at Mountain View Cemetery. Wheeler Mortuary was in charge of arrangements.

A veteran of World War II, Mr. Graves was a member of the 290th Coast Artillery and was the oldest enlisted man in the organization. He participated in the Bataan death march and became a prisoner of war for three years and 65 days. Eight fellow prisoners with him in the Bataan march attended the funeral and participated in the graveside rites.

Mr. Graves was born Mary 13, 1899 in Cumby, Hopkins County, Texas. He came to this area in 1916 with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Graves, living first at Plainview and later moving to Flomot.

He moved to Matador in the early 1920's and operated a service station for a number of years. He had been a resident of Deming for the past 40 years.

Integrity Is Key To Success Banquet Speaker Tells Seniors

The key to success lies within one word, integrity, members of Motley County High School senior class were told Monday night at a banquet sponsored by the American Legion Fleming Post 337, and Women's Auxiliary. Speaker was Jimmy Willson of Floydada, outstanding community leader.

"Success is going to depend on what you want to do, and whether you are willing to pay the price," Mr. Willson told his listeners. "Integrity is the key to the formula for success... you've got to have a 'plus' factor besides brains and know-how."

An honorable man, he said, is "true to his individual standards. Integrity is having the courage of your convictions and to speak out when you know something is wrong." Self discipline is important, he added. "People are going to test you. Some will be wrong, and it is important that you school yourself in honesty in small things."

The speaker cited personalities such as Winston Churchill, Abraham Lincoln, Walt Garrison and others as having the qualities embodied in integrity. Mr. Willson is well-known in this area, having lived in

Floydada most of his life. He is a graduate of Floydada High School and Southern Methodist University. He is a leader in Boy Scout work, a former mayor of Floydada, and has served as Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Texas Masonic Lodge. He is active in church affairs and is currently treasurer of the Methodist Home in Waco.
