## Emergency Loans Available At Farmers Home Administration

FARMERS AND RANCHERS in Motley County, who sustained production losses and physical losses during last year may be eligible to receive emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration.

Notice was received here this week by Judge Forrest Campbell, from Alfred A. Harrison of the FHA office in Floydada. Eligible for loans are those who sustained production losses and physical losses as a result of drought October 1, 1973 to April 30, 1974; excessive

rainfall May 1 to July 1, 1974 with intermittent hailstorms and excessive rainfall August 1 to December 1, 1974 with cool temperatures.

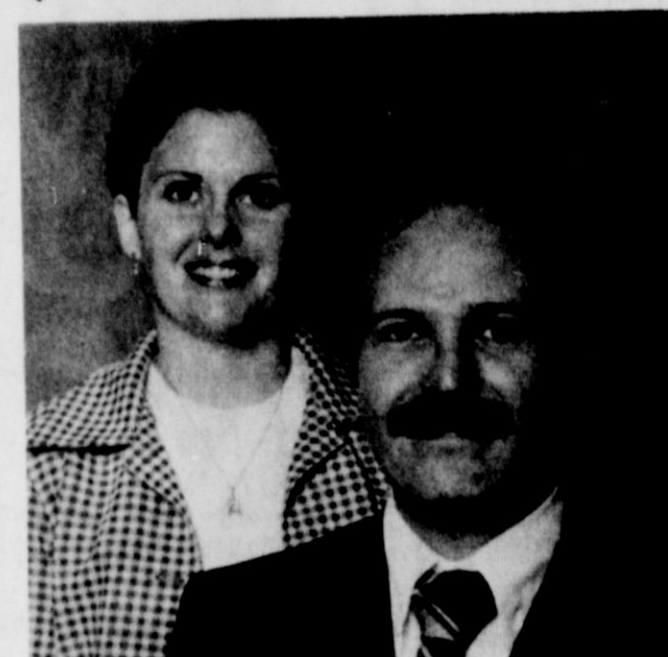
Those who have not received an emergency loan to assist them in recovering from their loss may apply for such a loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office at 107 West California, in Floydada before close of business May 19, 1975 for physical losses and December 19, 1975 for production losses.

These loan applications will be taken under the terms of a new law (P.L. 93-237) enacted January 2, 1974. Individual examination will be made of each application to determine date of the disaster occurrence and emergency loan benefits for which the applicant is eligible, Harrison stated.

Loans based on qualifying production losses may include funds to reimburse applicants for production expenses which went into damaged or destroyed crop

and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1975, he explained.

"Payment terms depend on the purposes for which the loan is used and the applicant's payment ability. No loan may exceed the actual loss sustained. The interest rate for these loans is 5 per cent and there will be no principal cancellation. These loans must be secured by crops, livestock, farm machinery, or real estate," said Harrison.

## Recent Livestock Judging Winners

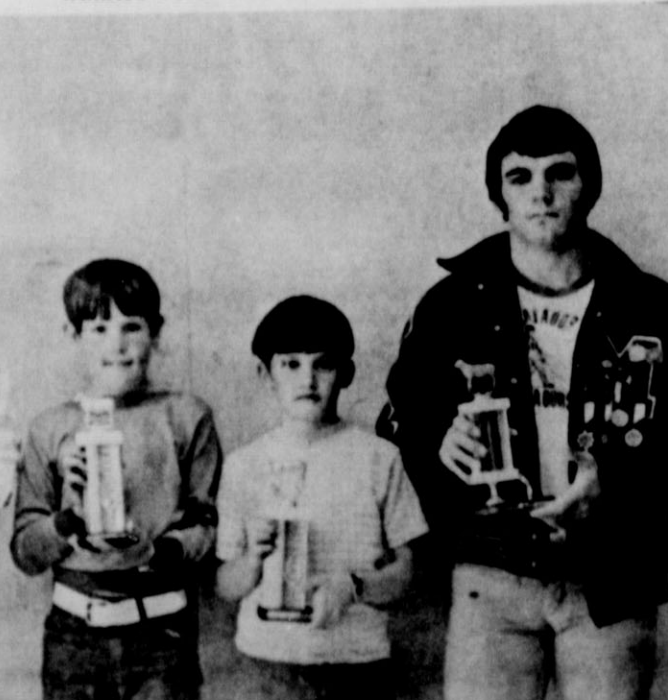

## Involvement Urged In Assisting Aged

INVOLVEMENT on the part of younger adults in the program of activities for older Texans will be necessary if a successful organization is formed in the county.

This was the consensus of opinion of the few interested citizens who attended a meeting Thursday evening at the school building to consider the problems of senior citizens in the county.

It is estimated that there are between 600 and 700 persons in the county over the age of 60. The greater percentage of these are active and could be of assistance to those who are older.

In order to get data together for further study, Judge Forrest Campbell handed out questionnaires for senior citizens and a list of suggested activities for older Texans. These will be distributed through the churches of the county communities - Roaring Springs, Flomot and Matador.

The questionnaires include questions pertaining to the health and attitude of elderly persons, and those who might be able to participate in the program by volunteering for community services.

"The services of the more active adults, and even

young people will be necessary if we succeed in an organization of assistance to the shut-ins, home-bound and even those who are active, but are in need of transportation," Judge Campbell and others present at the meeting, agreed.

Among suggested activities for older persons are group meals, served at congregated sites, volunteers needed to provide transportation and escort services, assist with counseling and grocery shopping; home-maker, repairman, chore and companion or sitter service; a club sponsor to assist older persons to attend club meetings and other group sessions.

Questions to be considered by the senior citizen include: Does lack of transportation cause you difficulty in getting to the grocery store, bank, post office, doctor, drug store, church and social activities; Do you feel you need assistance in your home with housekeeping chores, meal preparation, meals on wheels, taking prescription medicine, or other medical assistance; How often does bad health prevent you from doing what you would like to do.

When the questionnaires are returned to Judge Campbell, another meeting will be announced to consider the movement further, he said.

It is stressed that these meetings are not only for senior citizens but for anyone interested in the welfare, both socially and physically of the senior citizens who need assistance.

## To Attend Petroleum Institute

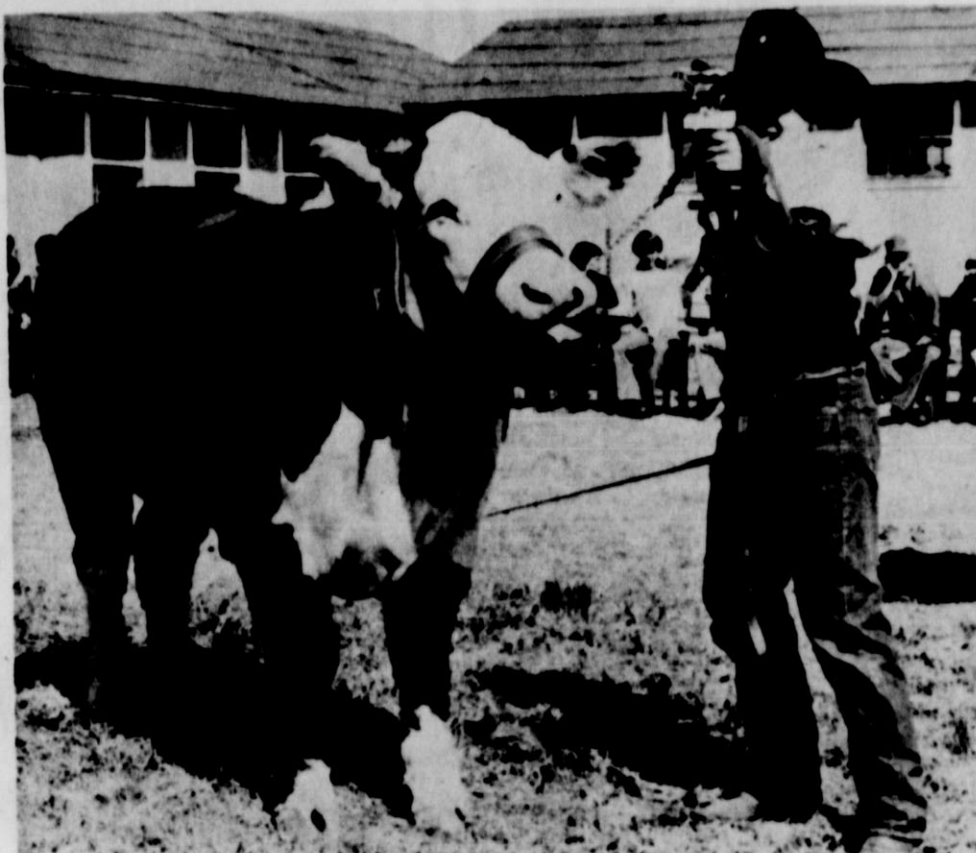

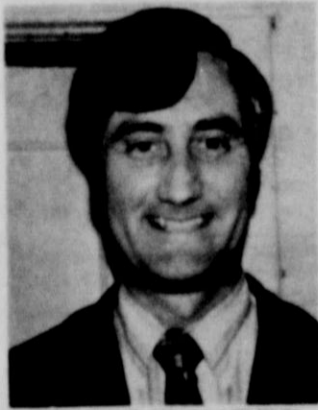

# Meet A Teacher

Gerald Garst is the man who comes to the office of the Matador Tribune every Tuesday to develop photographs and make prints. As a reporter for the Tribune, that's all I knew about Garst — until I had a chance to talk with him about other aspects of his career and life.

I found that Garst is an education diagnostician. "I test kids to see what they need to be taught," said Garst. "I work with the teacher and the counselor to make educational plans, and then make suggestions that

might help."

"I test the children and then follow up with the teacher to see that the child is in the right program and is progressing. It's up to the diagnostician to make a professional judgement as to their needs," said Garst.

This is Garst's second year at Motley County School. Actually he works with the Rolling Plains Plan "A" Resource Program. Garst tests kids in Spur, Guthrie, McAdoo, Patton Springs, Paducah, and Motley County with Motley County serving as a home base.

Garst and his wife Theresa live in Roaring Springs. They have two children, Thomas (3rd grade) and Kenneth (kindergarten).

"All my tests are individual tests," said Garst. "I ask them questions and they answer orally. Group tests can be used for certain things but individual tests are more accurate."

Garst tests children from 4 and 5 years old to high school age. When asked about the great variety of ages Garst added, "It's interesting work."

Garst attended Amarillo Junior College two years. He received his bachelors degree from West Texas State University (then West Texas State College.) Garst later received his certification of special education and masters degree from WTSU.

While attending college,

Garst worked as a photographer at the college newspaper, weddings, and fraternity and sorority parties.

"I helped pay my way through college with photography. I got interested while I was in Amarillo. You could take 22 hours of photography classes there," said Garst.

Among his other hobbies are woodcarving and rifling. Garst is a member of the Sharpshooter Rifle Club in Matador.

Before coming to Motley County, Garst had taught one year of elementary school in Dimmit, four years of special education in Dumas, and four years of special education in Amarillo.

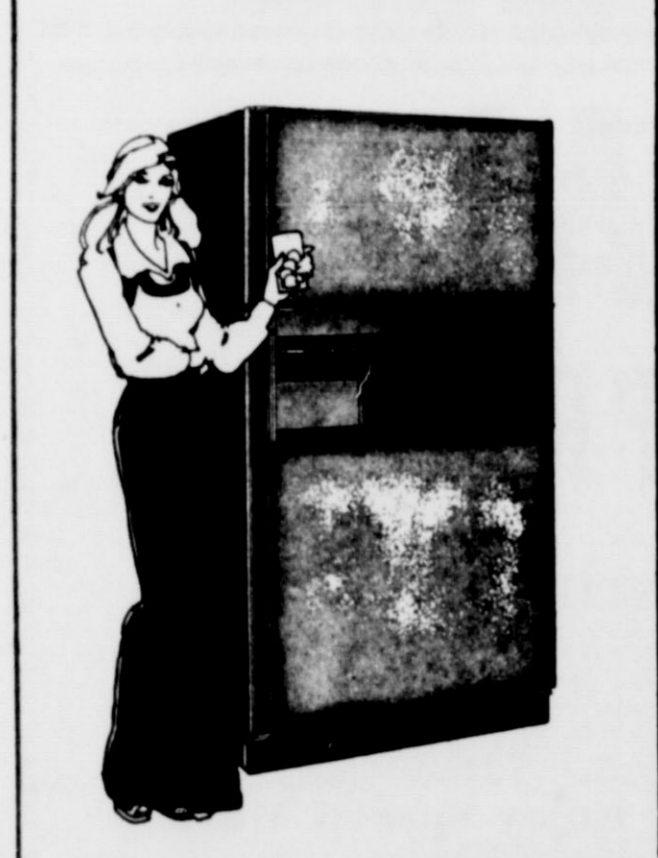

TEXAS TALK

Q: How much water is actually needed for the production of a good cotton crop?

A: In most areas of Texas, with the exception of a couple of times of the year, the most prevalent answer would be "All we can get". More specifically, authorities now estimate the weight of water evaporated from an acre of cotton during a typical summer day to be as much as 68,000 pounds. That's equivalent to more than a quarter of an inch of rainfall a day. Considerably more than we can count on having. Irrigation supplements the rainfall wherever possible to provide an effective 20 inches of moisture during the average growing season. In some areas of the really arid Southwest, farmers sometimes irrigate enough to provide the equivalent of 32 inches of rainfall through the course of a full year. Rainfall can be most harmful just after planting when the water may lower the soil temperature below 58 degrees.
