Roots of mesquites are feeding on the soil that was once a field and all signs of the last furrows have vanished beneath a carpet of native grass. The hills are the same and a view of the turn in the river is unchanged after three score years. All evidence of the clumps of Johnson grass has been lost to time but memories of that long ago spring are sharp. My father plowed with a walking middle buster and my mother, with the aid of my brother and myself picked the upturned Johnson grass roots and placed them in a wash tub. It was back-breaking work but the grass must be eliminated from our newly acquired farm. We worked diligently until sundown, plowing and replowing the earth as we gathered the thick, jointed roots. We fed them to the hogs, unharnessed the team, fed the cows and horses, gathered up the eggs, milked four cows and went to the house for supper of cornbread and milk, butter and a few slices of home-cured bacon that had been left over from dinner.

A problem of self-appraisal is placing the proper value on weaknesses and again in keeping the scattering virtues in an honest perspective. We know too much about ourselves to avoid discouragement after looking at the assembled evidence.

Life is like a mountain stream that flows between the rocks, heedless of its course, but always moving. We are unable to slow its pace or stop a pleasant hour to keep for our own. Most of us merely dangle our fingers in the crystal water and allow it to flow onward.

To one with a natural talent for procrastination, the years with the shadows behind me present an extra problem. The urgency of youth is gone, dragging up the roots of ambition, and increasing the attitude of letting each day take care of its own situations.

Each life must experience intervals where darkness prevails and there are no stars to point the way. The footing is unsure and fears seep out of the dikes of confidence. Then someone speaks a word of encouragement and suddenly it is like a light at the end of a tunnel. The sunlight is ahead with its warmth and the good world with its flacons of courage and laughter.

Television Store Is Opening Today

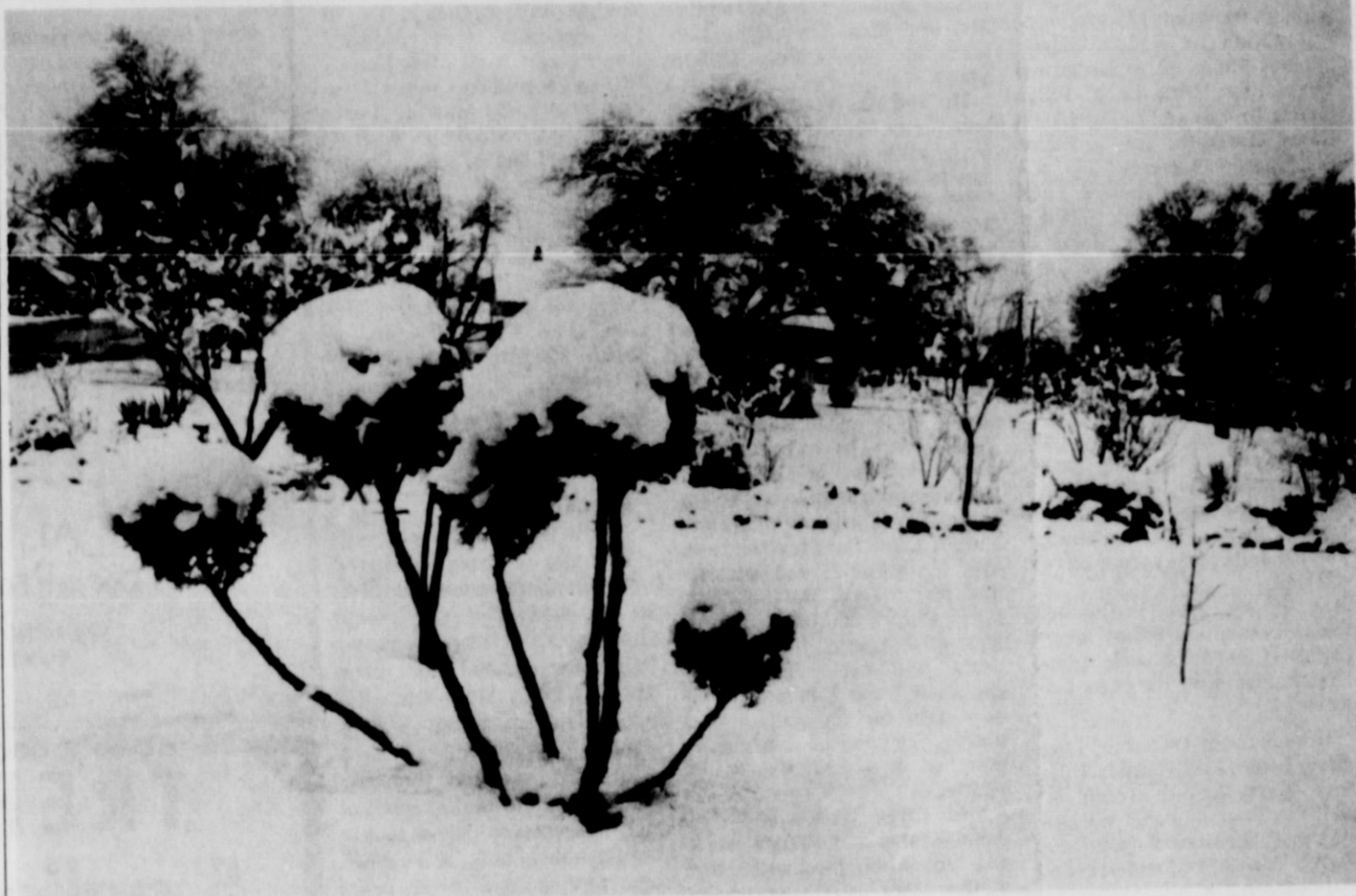
NEWEST business in Matador is opening its doors today. The formal opening of Wayne's TV sales and service is announced in this issue of the Tribune.

VALLEY FEMS LOSE 39-37

Grandview claimed the Class A girls state basketball title in Austin Saturday with a thrilling 39-37 win over Valley on a 10-foot jump shot by Sarah Williams with three seconds remaining in the game.

The game was played before the largest crowd ever to witness a girls contest in Gregory gym. It also was the lowest winning score in the 23-year history of the Class A girls state playoffs.

Valley had a six-point lead with 2:34 remaining but a Williams layin with 48 seconds left tied the score at 37-37. Valley missed two chances at a one-and-one free shot before Grandview got the ball with 23 seconds remaining and immediately called time out.

Grandview then held the ball until Williams, playing the final six minutes with four fouls, drove home the game winning bucket.

The Valley Patriots downed Cooper 29-23 in the semifinals Friday morning, to advance to final. This was the first trip to the state meet for Valley and the fourth for Cooper.

Local fans followed the games in broadcasts Friday and Saturday from KCTX Childress.

SEVEN BOYS, Lance Jameson, Douglas Campbell, Craig Christian, Billy Campbell, Mark Wason, Tony Rose and Brent Whitaker, were in charge of the annual Youth Night Union Service, held Sunday at the Matador Church of Christ.

Rev. Douglas Gossett introduced Minister Loyd Hall who said in his message "If there is no right in this world, then there is no wrong... a man's life testifies to his faith."

Minister Hall said there is change in every field and that we live in an isolated and insulated community. "But I am concerned about our homes, and the divorce rate in America, though the break down of the home is a symptom and not the cause of the problem."

Glen D. Tiffin of Silvertown, who farms peanuts at Flomot in Motley County has been named champion of the 1972 Peanut Quality Contest in Texas. Tiffin marketed the highest dollar value load of peanuts in Texas and Oklahoma which met the quality stipulations. This lot of 15,559 net pounds was sold on Nov. 16 and were purchased by

De Leon Peanut Co., Durant, Okla. Price was \$315.67 per ton. Tiffin's peanuts produced under irrigation graded 78 percent SMK, 1 percent sound splits; 1 percent other kernels with 0 percent damaged kernels and 1 percent each LSK and foreign material.

Tiffin and his wife, accompanied by County Agent and Mrs. Bill Pallmeyer, attended the 3rd annual peanut seminar held at Marco Island, Florida Feb. 26 - March 1, courtesy the sponsor of the seminar, Elanco Products Company, Indianapolis, Indiana.

The Motley County group flew from Lubbock to Miami, and traveled by bus across Florida to Marco Island. Business meetings were held on the 27th and 28th of Feb., with a sightseeing trip the afternoon of the 28th. They will return home today.

Direct Dialing Set This Month

General Telephone customers at Matador may dial their own long distance calls on Wednesday, March 28, according to J. H. Davis, Division Manager. Technicians began installing equipment months ago and will complete the installation well ahead to allow complete testing.

The new service is called "One Plus Dialing" and it is only necessary to dial "1" plus the area code (if different from your own) and the seven digit number to speed the call through.

The timing and billing information will be automatically recorded.

With the advent of Direct Distance Dialing, operator assistance and special calls (such as person-to-person, credit card and collect calls) will be handled by Lubbock operators.

Just prior to the establishment of this new service, One Plus Direct Distance Dial folders will be distributed to all customers, giving complete information.

Reagan Brown of College Station, who becomes special assistant to Governor Dolph Briscoe today, received a standing ovation when he had completed his address.

It was one of the most dynamic and outstanding addresses ever delivered at the annual get-together of fathers and sons. The speaker was introduced by Will Pallmeyer.

"It is a fast world and it is tough to keep up," the Purple Heart veteran of World War II, declared, as he laced his spell-binding talk with anecdotes. He frequently quoted poetry, some of it his own composition.

"This world needs love," he said. "But love is not love until we give it away." He added, "learn to love those around you."

"If you know someone with problems," Mr. Brown said, "tell him to find someone who needs him, then help him."

As an example of his humor, the speaker said "we have too many people who want to work eight hours and sleep eight hours, but at the same time."

An example of his advice was "Only your own efforts will limit your opportunities."

opportunities are everywhere and in this room may be the first black President of the United States... within the sound of my voice may be the future scientist who will find a cure for cancer, or the first man to put a foot on Mars." Again he said "Try to make the world pretty where you are."

He quoted frequently from Jesus Christ and admonished his listeners to follow the teachings of the Carpenter from Galilee.

Boss Lion Pat Seigler presented Mr. Brown with a gift from the club at the conclusion of the address.
