Saturday's activities include Old Timers roping and Horse show and Youth activities starting at 9 a.m.



Matador Water District Passed By House, Senate

AUSTIN - (Special) - A bill creating the Matador Water District has passed the Texas House and Senate. The bill's sponsors, Senator Ray Farabee and Representative Phil

Cates, explained that the measure will aid the City of Matador in providing an adequate supply of water. Cates further explained, "Matador determined that

the most inexpensive way to provide water in the future is through the creation and operation of the Matador Water District." The boun-



The bill provides that the District can levee a tax not to exceed twenty-five cents per one hundred dollar valuation for maintenance purposes. "This tax can not be levied," Farabee stressed, "until approved by a majority of the voters."

Both legislators expressed their pleasure at the bill's passage saying they hoped the measure would be beneficial to the Citizens of Matador in their efforts to provide for future water

The bill has passed both the House and Senate and now awaits the signature of the Governor.

And corresponding to that, baptism now saves you-not the removal of dirt from the flesh, but an appeal to God for a good conscience-through the resurrection of Jesus Christ. . . . 1 Pet. 3:21.

Take advantage of sales: Avoid overstocking with commercially frozen food that's always available use your freezer as your own bargain counter and store foods you can buy on sale. But do allow space for short-time baked goods, leftovers and special party foods.

INDIGENOUS cation of plants which indicates they are native to the geographic area in which they are

EXOTIC - opposite of indigenous, plants being grown in areas where they were not previously found. Most crops in the United States are exotic.

FORAGE - fresh or preserved plant material used as feed for animals.

SILAGE — forage preserved by partial fermentation. Usually in a container such as a

HAYLAGE - dry silage.

SOILAGE - sometimes called "green chop", it is a crop grown and then fed to animals
