## FFA Boys Win Dairy Judging

IT IS NATURAL to think of the Foothill Country as cattle country, but the assumption should also include dairy cattle. Four F.F.A. students from Matador chapter entered the Texas Tech Dairy Judging contest in Lubbock, Saturday, April 21, and won outstanding honors. The team, composed of Billy Campbell, Kelly Keltz, Bucky Marvel and Jim Barnhill will now go to A&M to represent Area I in the State Dairy Cattle judging contest.

Accompanied by Ag instructor and sponsor Bill Moss, the team will go to A&M Saturday, April 28.

With approximately 100 teams competing last Saturday in the Dairy Cattle Contest from Area I and Area II, comprising the western third of Texas, the Matador team won first in Plainview District.

The boys also won first in Area I, third in the entire contest and first in Holstein judging in the entire contest.

Kelly Keltz was second high individual in the Holstein judging. Four classes of Holsteins and two classes of Jerseys were placed.

### Emergency Loans Now Available

Farmers and ranchers in Floyd and Motley Counties who had suffered crop or property losses because of the drought and other natural disasters from January 1, 1972 through June 19, 1972 and who have not received an emergency loan to assist them in recovering their losses may apply for an emergency loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office, 107 W. California Street, Floydada, and on Wednesday from 9:00 to 12:00 at the Matador Courthouse on or before May 8, 1973. Applicants who apply by the deadline will be considered for emergency loans at 1 percent interest.

In addition, those who qualify will receive a forgiveness benefit on their loan of not to exceed \$5,000 based on losses that are uncompensated by insurance or otherwise.

Dedication of a historical marker honoring Sion Record Bostick, Saturday, April 21, at San Saba, was attended by G. B. (Green) Bostick of Matador and members of his family.

The local resident is the oldest descendant and grandson still living, of S. R. Bostick, who was one of three men who captured Santa Anna following the historic Battle of San Jacinto, 137 years ago.

The marker inscription was read at the ceremony at 2 p.m. Saturday, by Lewis Bostick, son of Mr. and Mrs. Green Bostick, as the marker was unveiled, and is as follows:

"About 276 yards to the West is the grave of Sion Record Bostick, (December 7, 1819 - October 15, 1902)

The former Mary Jane Hagood, Mrs. Farris was born May 14, 1900 at Hughes Springs, Texas. She was married to John Loy Farris, Sept. 4, 1921, at Plainview. They moved to the Roaring Springs community in 1927 and made their home there until ill health forced their move to the nursing home. Mrs. Farris was converted at an early age, and has been a member of the United Methodist Church of Roaring Springs for many years. She was 72 years, 11 months and 5 days old at the time of her death.

She was preceded in death by an infant daughter, Joyce Marie, in 1928.

Besides her husband, she is survived by two sons, Charles Farris of Albuquerque, New Mexico and John Lewis Farris of Hartley, Tex.; two daughters, Mrs. B. J. McMurry (Ida Lois) of Dalhart and Mrs. Jessie Joe Powell, (Bertha) of Spur; one sister, Mrs. Ethel Moore of Fort Worth; six grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

young Texans who captured the escaping Mexican General Santa Anna after the Battle of San Jacinto, during the Texas War for Independence.

"Migrated from Alabama in 1828. Served in Texas Army at Gonzales and Bexar (San Antonio), 1835; at San Jacinto, 1836; and 1840 Stand Against Comanches at Plum Creek.

"An American Soldier in Mexican War, 1846; A Confederate in Hood's Brigade in the Civil War, 1860's.

"Married Susan Townsend; after her death, Mary Indiana Rhodes. Had several children. Became a leader in Veterans' Reunions. He is buried in San Saba Cemetery. Recorded 1973."

The dedication was sponsored by the San Saba County Historical Survey Committee. Mrs. Paul Roberts and Mrs. Ray Timberlake recounted the history of the war hero's life.

Jim Rainey, chairman of the San Saba Historical Committee presided at the dedication which introduced G. B. Bostick as the oldest descendant and grandson living. His grandson, Larry Bostick of Madill, Okla., gave "A Tribute to My Ancestor," followed by the reading of the inscription by Lewis Bostick.

Other members of the family present included Mrs. G. B. Bostick, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Smallwood and daughter, Thanie, Mrs. Lewis Bostick and Berry of Lubbock; Steve Bostick of Matador and Mrs. Larry Bostick of Madill.

A high point of the week end trip for Mr. Bostick, was a visit to the grave of his mother, who died when he was only two years old. The grave is in a cemetery near Mason, and it was the first time Mr. Bostick had ever been to the site, which was located for him by relatives living in that area.

Born in Alabama

S. R. Bostick was born in Alabama in 1819 and moved to Texas in 1828. At the age of 15 he joined Capt. Splann's Company. He helped defend Gonzales and on to fight at San Antonio. He enlisted in 1836 under Capt. Baker and his band stayed near San Felipe after the town was burned and deserted.

Bostick's account of the capture of the Mexican General, from the San Saba News-Star, relates that "two other scouts named Jack Robinson and James Sylvester and Bostick were about eight miles from the battlefield when they saw the head and shoulders of a man squatted in the grass. Quoting Bostick: 'We rode up and aimed our guns at him and

Those who observe writings of today are aware of how divided the authors are on all subjects from education to politics, morals to religion, etc. This is the Human element on its own. This is because secular writers each writes from his own experiences and does not have at hand all knowledge about his subject. The truths of the Bible, though written by many, came from just one mind - God's. One central headquarters, but using several scribes.

The Book of all books is from the true and living God.

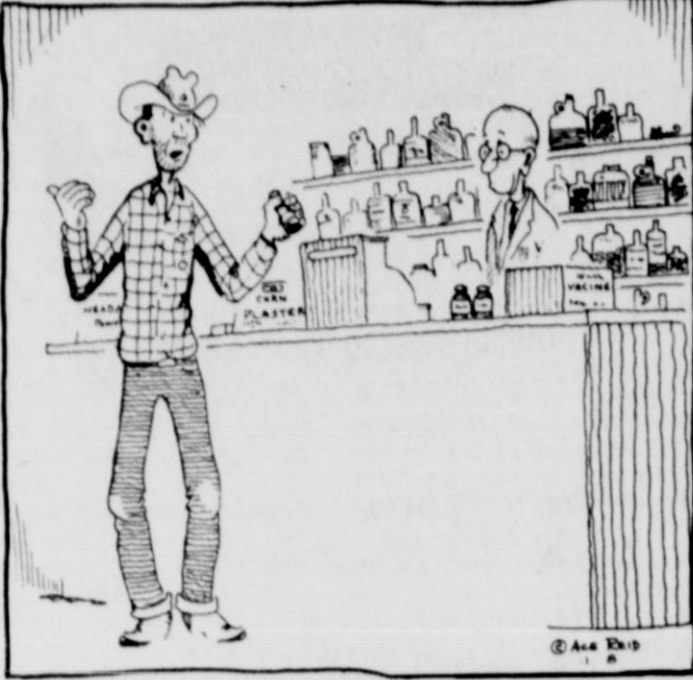
