Lions Club to Serve As Sponsor

Blood Drive Planned For Matador, June 3

A program presented by Blood Services of Lubbock was the highlight of the Matador Lions Club meeting held Tuesday at the First United Methodist Church. Mrs. Darleene Herring, a representative of Blood Services presented a slide presentation and explained some of the basic facts and problems concerning blood donations.

A blood drive for Matador has been scheduled for Tuesday, June 3, from 2 - 6 p.m. at the Motley General Hospital. Fifteen donors per hour can be accommodated during the blood drive. Refreshments for the donors will be served. The Matador Lions Club will serve as sponsors for the drive. Any questions concerning the blood drive can be answered by members of the Lions Club.

Lion Tony Dean introduced Mrs. Herring, and pointed out that the three major threats to a person's life, medically speaking, are severe bleeding, breathing ceasing, and internal poisoning. Severe bleeding was the most threatening of these three, he said.

Blood Services of Lubbock serves a 22 county area, which includes 38 hospitals.

The slide presentation pointed out that blood is one of a doctor's most valuable tools. When a patient needs blood, there is no substitute. Only three per cent of eligible donors presently give blood. When one donates blood he receives six months coverage for him and his immediate family to receive

blood if it becomes necessary. Mrs. Herring pointed out that blood is currently \$40 per pint, but is free if one is covered by some member of the immediate family having donated blood in the last six months.

The high cost of blood is necessary because of the processing, testing and storage necessary before it can be given to another person.

Anyone from 17 years old to 66 years old is eligible to give blood if he is in good health, and is accepted by the Blood Services. Children under 17 can donate blood with the permission of their parents.

People were previously paid for blood donations, but now it is strictly a donation.

According to Lion Bob Stanley it has been over 20 years since Matador has had a blood drive.

Health Clinic Tuesday

The Public Health Clinic, sponsored by the Texas State Department of Health will be held Tuesday, May 27 at the Motley General Hospital, according to arrangements and as announced for the fourth Tuesday each month.

When the first clinic was held in April, more than 60 persons were examined, and a number of others were unable to have an examination due to lack of time.

Preventative health services made available at this clinic will be provided without cost by a Public Health Nurse from the Region 2 office in Lubbock.

Services to be offered will include diabetic screening test, blood pressures check, tuberculosis skin test and immunization - bring any immunization record you might already have.

The clinic is set for 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Lubbock Man Given Award

The Disabled American Veterans organization has named a Lubbock man recipient of its national award for helping handicapped veterans find employment.

Tom Bourland, a veterans' employment representative in the Lubbock office of the Texas Employment Commission, and a native of Matador, was chosen for the honor over 45 others throughout the nation.

Selection of Bourland was based on his record of finding jobs for disabled veterans and of his one-man program to persuade local employers to modify jobs so that they could be performed by the handicapped.

Announcement of the award was made by Ronald W. Drach, DAV national director for employment. Formal presentation of the award will be made at the national DAV convention in Honolulu, Hawaii, late this summer.

Bourland is a World War II veteran. He has been with TEC 26 years and is active in veterans' organizations.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Bourland of Matador, and was graduated from Matador High School in 1940, and from West Texas State College in 1951. While in school here he was active in 4-H work, participating in feeding calves and winning ribbons in each show.

Edwards served as Assistant Coach. From 1948-1967, Mrs. Edwards taught the eighth grade in Matador and in 1967 she began teaching math in Matador High School.

The past year, she has taught in the Adult Basic Education Department in Matador. "It is a rare opportunity to go back and see a high school drop-out get a diploma. And it is so gratifying to see them know the importance of an education," she said.

Mrs. Edwards, daughter of Mrs. Ben Keltz and the late Ben Keltz of Whiteflat, lived in Whiteflat and Tulia, and went to school and graduated from Matador High School.

She received her B.A. degree in Math from Texas Women's University; and her M.A. degree in Education with a minor in Math from West Texas State University. Post graduate work has been done at Texas Tech, West Texas State University and University of Houston. In addition to being certified to teach math, English, history and Spanish, Mrs. Edwards holds Administrators and

Supervisors Certificates.

Mrs. Edwards is married to J. E. Edwards, principal of Motley County Grade School and they have two children, Patty, of Dallas, a factory representative for recreational vehicles, and Thomas, a Houston attorney.

Three grandchildren include Scott, Steve and Grant, sons of Thomas, and his wife Gaylon.

While seeking a law firm in which to practice, Thomas applied to a firm in Houston in which Frank Abraham was a senior law partner. Upon further investigation, the discovery was made that Mr. Abraham had been a student of Mrs. Edwards in Tyler.

Research scientists, journalists, doctors, lawyers, Swiss Alps mountain climbers, mechanics, businessmen, etc. have all passed through Mrs. Edwards' classrooms. Several second generations have also passed through her classes.

When asked about specific influences in her teaching career, Mrs. Edwards mentioned her aunt, Mrs. A. C. Keltz of Vernon, who influenced her to go to college; Elbert Reeves, her seventh grade teacher who said he thought she had ability to succeed in what she wished and he expected a graduation invitation from her high school and college graduations, both of which he did receive. "Then I had the privilege of teaching with Mr. Reeves," Mrs. Edwards said in recalling the incidents.

E. V. White, head of the Math Department at Texas Women's University, also gave her encouragement and support during the typical trying times of college.

"No one could have been better than Bert Ezzell, former Matador School Superintendent, Charlie Johnson, present superintendent and Principal Wayland Moore who expressed confidence in me."

Mrs. Edwards is a member of the First Baptist Church, Matador; El Progreso Study Club, National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, National Education Association, and Texas State Teacher's Association.

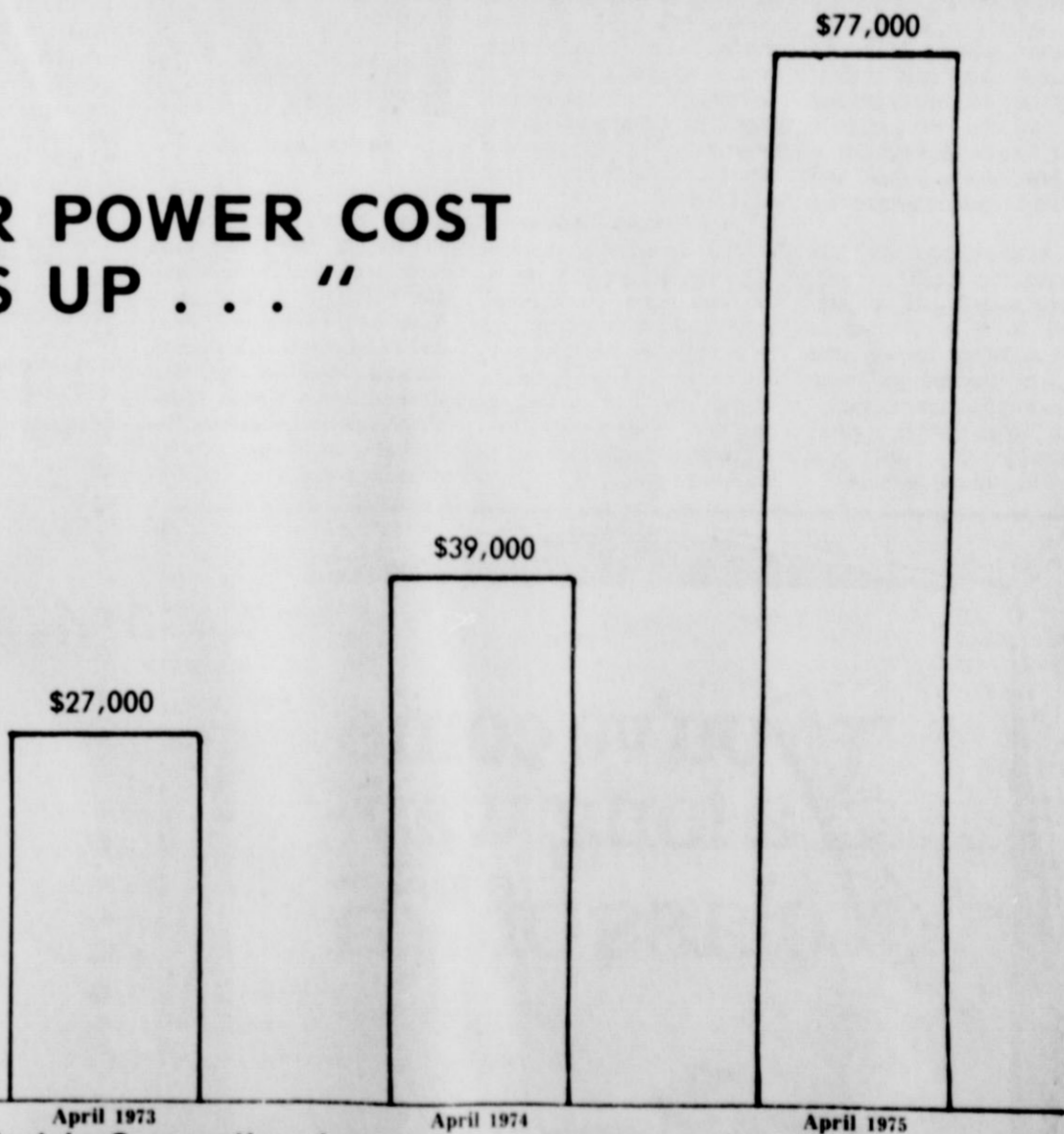

Dickens County Electric Cooperative, Inc. has not had a rate increase, but the "fuel adjustment" continues to push our power bill higher and higher. The "fuel adjustment" is an added expense passed to the Cooperative as a result of increased generation cost.

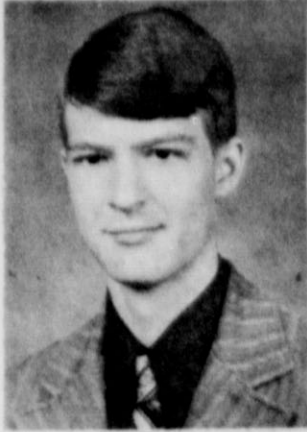
We purchase all of our power from West Texas Utilities Company in Abilene. This company, because of run-away inflation, has passed the added cost of power generation on to Dickens County Electric Cooperative. The Cooperative has in turn, passed only a portion on to you member-owners. Last year, DCEC purchased 18 per cent more power than in 1973 -- but paid more for it by 42 per cent.

The Cooperative makes no profit or margin on this power adjustment. It all goes to pay the increased power costs. We are absorbing as much of the increase as possible and still maintain good business practices.

The graph shows a comparison of the April power bills paid by the Cooperative in 1973, 1974, and 1975.

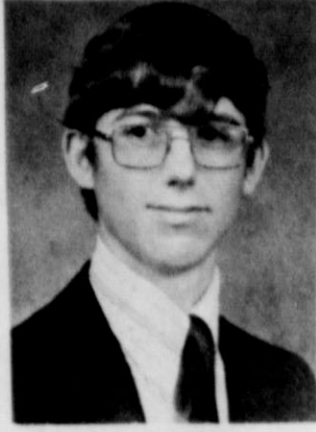

TEXAS TALK

The worst is over... probably. Statements like this have become the most common hedge in the cattle industry in the past few weeks as top executives of the beef business find reason to be cautiously optimistic in the face of rising per capita consumption and a decrease in the industry's number one problem, glut. Caused by a combination of price controls, natural cattle cycle (cattle population reaches a cyclical peak every 10-11 years) and high feed prices, glut (over-supply) seemed for a while to be unending. Consumers are solving the problem by buying more beef and accepting grass-fed meat. Packers buying grass-fed cattle have to use 2 or 3 of the young pasture-fed cattle to produce as much meat as a single grain-fed animal. So the problem seems to be solving itself, but even the optimistic cattlemen (not the easiest thing to find) say it will take at least 18 months before the industry is back to normal.

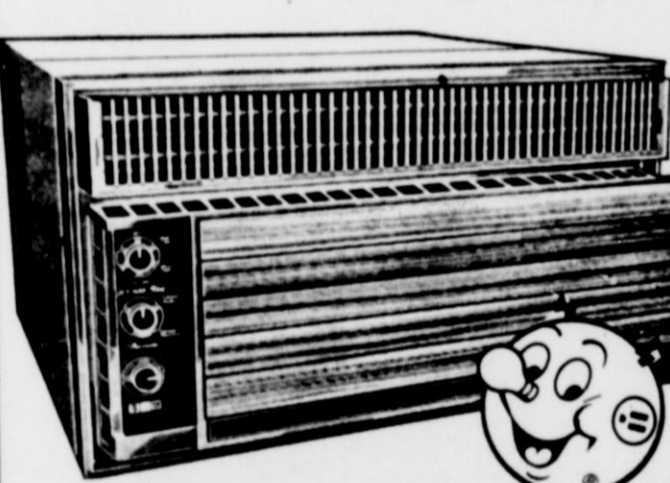

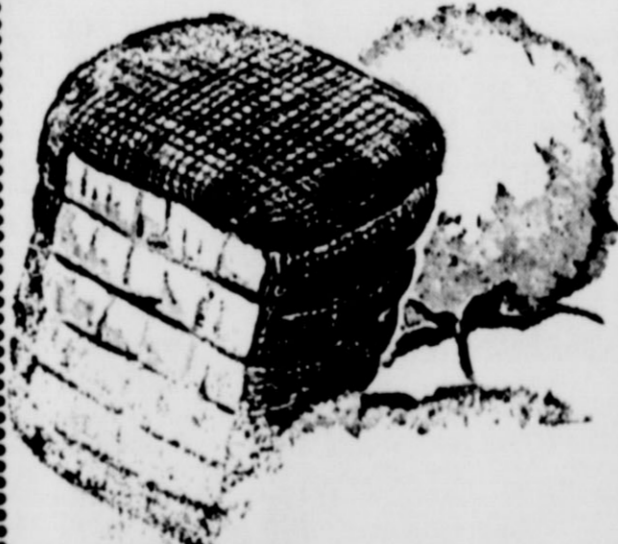
