COLLISION of two large transport trucks about 4:20 a. m. Thursday, west of town demolished the cabs of the vehicles and sent three drivers to the hospital. Robert Engle, driver for Southwestern Canneries Company of Portales, N.M., and a relief driver, Ted Chavez, who was asleep, and Pedro Martinez of Waxahachie, driver of a Royal Couch and Bedding transport from Fort Worth, were treated at Richard's Memorial Hospital, Paducah. Martinez was released and the other two were sent to a Lubbock hospital for observation. The Southwestern Canneries east-bound truck was carrying a

shipment of 52,000 canned Cokes, which were scattered over a wide area when the driver failed to negotiate a curve at the edge of town. The vehicle skidded, turned on its side and slid 120 yards before striking the westbound Royal Couch and Bedding truck, whose driver saw the oncoming vehicle, and pulled over into the barrow ditch in an effort to avoid being struck. The bedding merchandise was virtually undamaged, and approximately half of the Coke shipment was salvaged, according to Highway Patrolman Neal Haralson, who investigated the accident.

Justice of the Peace F. H. Bolen ruled the death a homicide and a suspect in the murder turned himself in to Lubbock police at 6:30 p. m. The suspect was released on \$15,000 bail.

Funeral services for Harris were held at 3 p. m. Saturday at the First Baptist Church, Matador. Officiating was Rev. L. F. Phillips, pastor of the Macedonia Baptist Church. Burial was

in East Mound Cemetery, with Seigler Funeral Home in Charge of arrangements.

Harris was born December 28, 1931, in Matador. He had resided in Lubbock since 1956, and was employed as a truck driver for Kimbell Grocery Company in Lubbock.

There were six entries in the show.

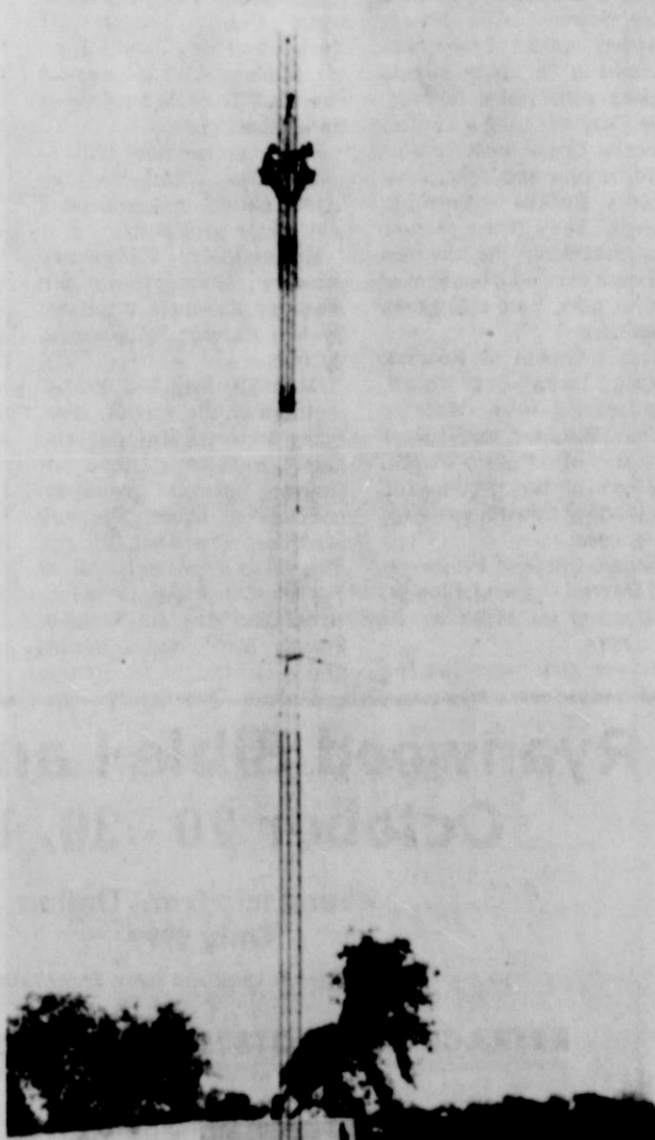

SKY HIGH - Two workmen are shown during the erection of a new tower just east of the Motley County jail, which will be part of a network of radio stations for use by law enforcement agencies from 27 communities in 15 South Plains counties. Construction of the tower, 270 ft. high with a 20-ft. antenna above that, was completed last week. However it was estimated that it will be several weeks before the network can be put into operation. The \$1,070,788 contract for the radio communications equipment was signed in October by representatives of the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG), an official representing the Texas Criminal Justice Division (CJD) and General Electric. The new radio system will have four channels which will enable law enforcement officers to receive, send and monitor conversations between each other for a distance of approximately 200 miles. Twenty-five percent of the cost will be paid by the participating cities and counties, according to County Judge Forrest Campbell. The old system, in use Sheriff's office, covered a distance of not more than 100 miles and seldom reached that far.

let Us Honor America by pledging allegiance to the Flag...

Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag

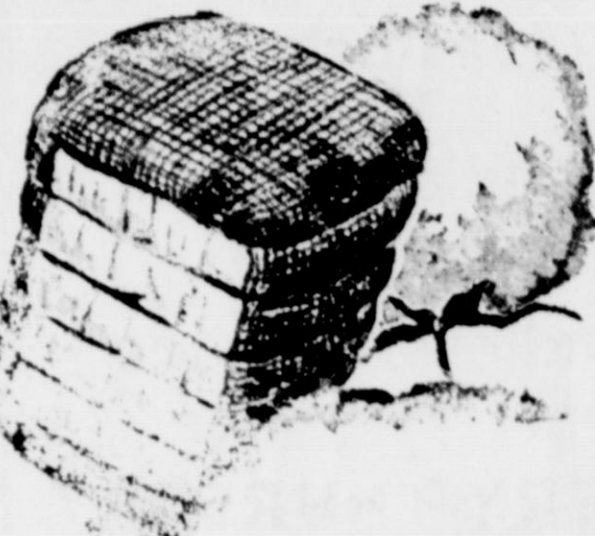
I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation *under God*, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

THE original author of the pledge was Francis Bellamy, who was born at Mount Morris, New York, May 18, 1855, and died August 28, 1931. He was ordained in 1879 at the Baptist Church in Little Falls, New York. The pledge he wrote was first used at the dedication of the World's Fair Grounds in Chicago on October 21, 1892, the four hundredth anniversary of the discovery of America, and has been recited from that day to this, with some changes, by school children throughout our land. Reverend Bellamy's original wording was altered slightly by the First and Second National Flag Conferences in 1923 and 1924 and his work was officially designated as the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag by Public Law 287, Seventy-ninth Congress, approved December 28, 1945. On June 14, 1954, Flag Day, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed into law House Joint Resolution 243, introduced by Representative Louis C. Rabaut of Michigan, which added to the Pledge of Allegiance the compelling and meaningful words "under God"

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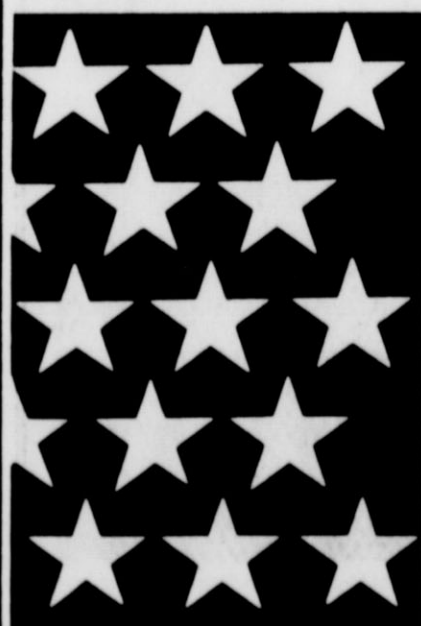

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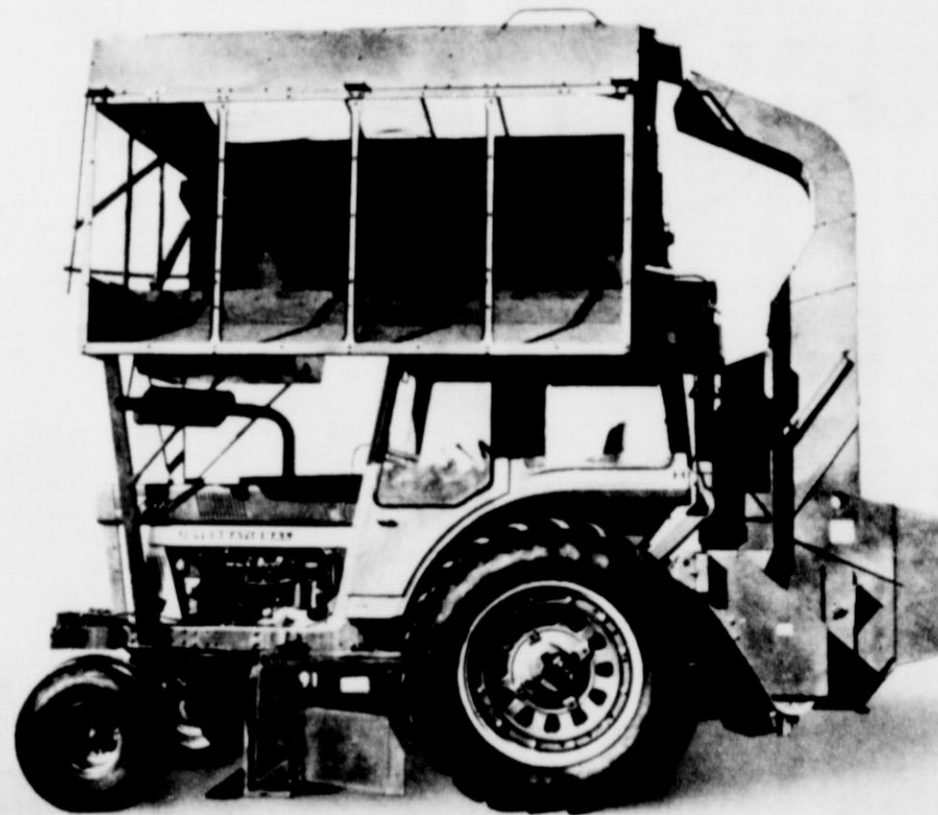

TEXAS TALK

Gotham's glamour may be gone. Since the mid 1800's there has been a continual trend for people to move from the farm to town... from town to the city. Scientists now say the trend has not only stopped but has sharply reversed. Reasons for this shocking display of metropolitan common sense are speculated on by Dr. Wilbur Zelinsky, population expert at Pennsylvania State University, as: traumatic happenings in metropolitan areas evidenced by crime statistics, a higher affluence level which enables Americans to live where they really want to and greater ease in the building of homes and industries. Whatever the reason, statistics presented by Dr. Zelinsky, show a current migration rate of 3% of the population shifting to rural areas. PUBLIC NOTICE
ORDINANCE NUMBER TWENTY THREE (23)

An ordinance pertaining to the control of dogs running loose within the city limits of The City of Roaring Springs and providing for authorization to impound said animals and providing a penalty for violation of this ordinance.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROARING SPRINGS, MOTLEY CO., TEXAS:

Section 1: That all dogs (male or female) shall be contained within an enclosure on the owners property or said animal shall be chained to stake, building or otherwise unmovable object so situated in order to prevent the dog(s) from crossing owner's property line unless owner or someone authorized to maintain a leash hold on same dog, does have dog on a leash in order that dog may be controlled.

Section 2: That all dogs within the city limits of The City of Roaring Springs shall have a current vaccination tag on. Current within this meaning is no more than 365 days old.

Section 3: That all stray, unowned or unclaimed dogs running loose within the city limits of The City of Roaring Springs shall be apprehended and impounded for a period of 72 hours. After the 72 hours shall elapse and no claim has been made for the dog, the dog shall be disposed of.

Section 4: That if any dog shall be impounded, cost for impoundment shall be a minimum of \$5.00 with normal cost reaching \$5.00 per 24 hours of impoundment, or partial period thereof.

Section 5: That provided an impounded dog shall be claimed without the necessary current vaccination tag or certificate, 24 hours shall be allowed to elapse before complaint shall be filed on person claiming dog necessitating a fine of not less than \$100 plus court cost.

Section 6: That anyone person or group of persons found guilty of releasing at large a dog to run stray in the city limits of The City of Roaring Springs shall be fined not less than \$100 plus court costs.

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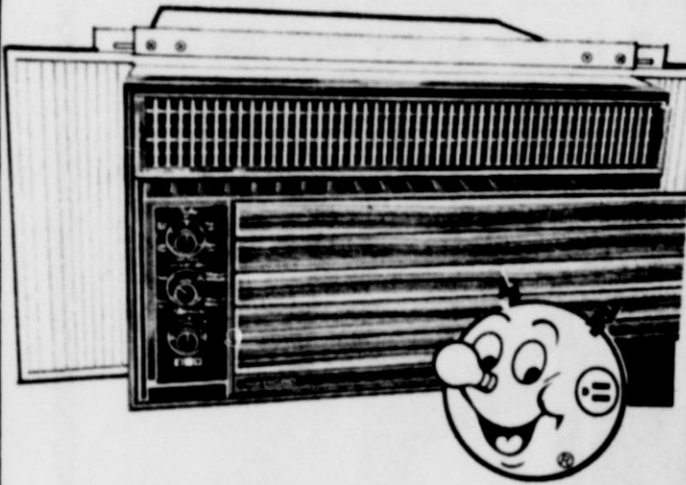
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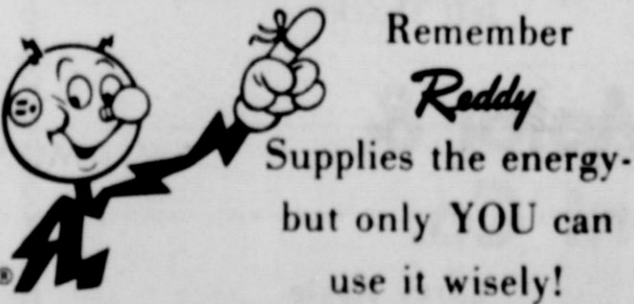
