

SEE-LOVER LEFT INDELIBLE MARK WEST TEXAS - THE CHINESE ELM

It was only a matter of about three years before Hunter was able to "scatter them promiscuously." He planted the first Chinese elms in Armstrong County on farms owned by his brothers, C. R. and R. M. Hunter, southwest of Claude.

The first in Amarillo were introduced in 1927 by Hunter, who planted them in the yard of his brother, E. L., who lived at that time at 1201 N. Buchanan. The original trees have since been uprooted by the expressway, but E. L. Hunter can point to other elms that grew directly from sprouts obtained from the original trees.

E. L. Hunter recalls that his brother living in Bowie had always been curious about different types of plants. He jokingly says his interest in trees may have stemmed from the long, hot cotton rows and that welcome shade tree at the end of the furrow.

The Chinese elm is horticulturally known as the Siberian elm. Although Luther Hunter is credited with introducing the Chinese elm to the Panhandle, other shade trees such as cottonwoods, the green ash and black locust were planted by early residents in abundance. The black locust was especially unsightly because of borer damage.

Hunter left Childress in 1928, but not before thoroughly planting the area with his beloved trees. He settled in Quanah until 1933 and then moved to Stinnett where he served with the Extension Service until retiring in 1936.

Then he joined the Farmers Home Administration at Lamesa where he worked two years before settling on his farm west of Bowie. In 1961 he moved into town.

But Hunter is not retired. He is still planting trees and remains active as a traveling man, selling tombstones.

"I get around well enough to still mix concrete," Hunter said in explaining that he lays the foundations for some of the monuments which he sells.

Of his many achievements, which include running some of the first terrace lines in West Texas and work with the World War I emergency wheat planting program, he is most proud of his tree plantings.

"Everyone should plan and plant for the coming generation," Hunter said. "Our land and our soil are our most valuable assets and I just hope I have left the land in a little better condition than I found it."

He said he has planted trees ever since he was big enough to handle a shovel and that during his 60 years of married life with his wife Jane, "we never failed any year to plant a tree."

Mrs. Hunter died in 1962. Hunter foresees more tree-planting in the years ahead.

"Never a year has passed that I've not planted trees," he said. "I'm 88 and still planted some this year. I'll plant all kinds of

trees - any kind - a shade tree or a fruit tree and I'm not through yet."

Hunter inquired from his Bowie home if people in Amarillo "know what Chinese elm seed look like."

They know and will agree when relaxing beneath the shade of an elm that Luther Hunter left an indelible mark on the Plains.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

If you apply herbicides and insecticides, it is a good idea to have two spraying rigs. Without careful decontamination, there will always be herbicide traces left in the sprayer which can retard or kill your crops. Many is the time that a person has "got by" by using the same spray rig, but nearly always, and at the most critical time, trouble appears. I know of one person who didn't use the same tank, but borrowed a pump that had been used for herbicides, and damage was the result.

I know that it is not always possible to have two separate rigs, so if you must use the same rig for both applications, follow the following rules: Rinse sprayer system with either 2 to 4 lbs. of washing soda or 2 qts. of household ammonia in 30 gallons of water. Circulate mixture through sprayer and allow to stand several minutes before draining. Repeat above step. Remove all rubber hose connections. Repeat step one, and allow mixture to remain in sprayer for several hours. Drain and rinse with clear water. Use another tank full of strong ammonia water, circulate in tank and allow to stand overnight. Recirculate, then drain. Fill tank with clear water and

spray a tomato plant. If the tomato plant does not wilt, you can be relatively sure the herbicide effect is gone from the sprayer - for the present time. If the sprayer is rusted, the herbicide will show up each time rust is flaked off the sprayer tank.

Yes, it's a lot of work to clean the sprayer after a herbicide, but it can be well worth the time.

Some think this subject is out of my line of work, but as it concerns our youth, is it?

From time to time we see articles on the percentage of adults that vote, and as you know, in many instances it is close to 50%. In the primary election, 981 people voted in Motley County; 804 either registered or paid a poll tax, and it is estimated that about 566 are past the age of 60, thus giving the county a voting strength of 1370. This represented a voting percentage of 71%, which was far above the state average, but by comparing this with a recent election of officers for the Junior Rifle Club, I wonder if a trend is starting that we don't want. Only 25 of the 49 members voted, or 51%. This group did not have to go to the polls, but only to return a ballot in a postage paid envelope. Where are we falling down on the training of our youth? Is it because we are not stressing the importance of selecting our leaders; the "Let George do it" attitude; or just plain lack of interest?

I will hear grumbling about the ones that were elected, and you will hear the same thing about the election of our county, state and federal officials. If you will check the returns, you will discover that enough people "stayed away" from the polls to change the results of every election we have had. Is this the way we want things to be in our country? Or had we rather have a chance to express our choice and do so in a free election?

Silverfish are small insects that live on materials with a high starch or sugar content found in the home. Book bind-

Silverfish are soft-bodied insects about a half inch long, with three long tail-like appendages at the apex of the abdomen, and are covered with scales which give them a silvery or gray color. DDT or chlordane sprays and dusts are effective, and should be applied on baseboards, in closets, bookcases and other places where the insects can hide or will be forced to crawl.

L-311, Tex. Guide for Controlling Household Insects covers this insect, along with other insects that may be found in the home. Copies are free for the asking.

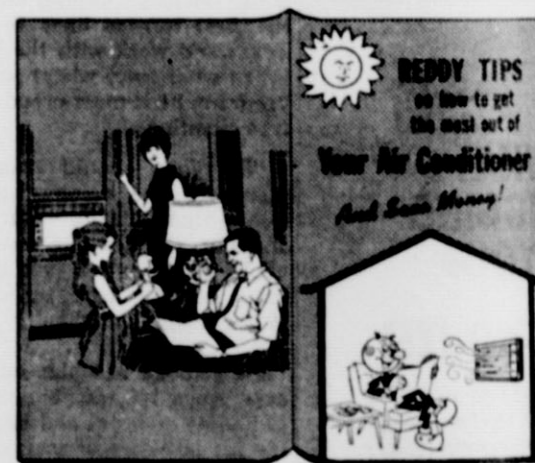
