Heaviest Moisture In Area Of Flomot

THE LARGEST shower since October 27, 1973, fell in Matador late Saturday. Bob Stanley registered 36-inch, to bring this year's total to .54-inch. Last year the total including the month of March was 5.34 inches with 1.64 in January and 1.09 in February. The month of March last year registered 2.62 inches. This year we have had 17 in January, .07 in February and .36 Saturday and Sunday morning.

The storm that failed to produce a drought-breaker

over the entire county did relieve the moisture situation in an area surrounding Flomot and all the way to Turkey.

Wilburn Martin and Melvin Spray west of Flomot reported 2 1/2 inches of moisture Saturday and Sunday. Tom Ross registered 1 1/2 inches. Three inches were reported north of Flomot. Wade Martin reported two inches. Sid McFall on the McCandless Ranch recorded 2 1/2 inches. The report on rain in the Flomot area was reported by Mrs. H. R. (Skeet) Jameson. The rainfall was lighter south of here with Roaring Springs reporting .38. The rain in the Northfield area was .80 to 1 inch.

Heavy rains fell on the Plains in the area of Crosbyton, Ralls and to the south and west. Some fields were flooded. A storm early Sunday resulted in high winds in Plainview where \$40,000 in damage was estimated. A funnel was reported on the ground in Crosby County by television Saturday afternoon.

Much benefit has already resulted from the rainfall, including refreshing the outlook of farmers and ranchers. County Agent Bill Palmeyer said that some wheat he thought was dead, is greening.

Blooming Trees

Fruit trees in all areas of Matador and the surrounding country are in full bloom and many believe fruit may have a good chance of production. Old timers shake their heads remembering that late freezes have a habit of destroying or reducing the fruit crop in this section of West Texas.

Mr. Dixon is a native of Cortez, Colorado, and has degrees from the University of Colorado at Boulder and the Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth. He served as Minister of Music and Youth at North Cleburne Baptist Church and Northside Baptist Church, Duncanville before going to Texas City in 1967.

Tribune Observing

FORTY YEARS ago today — March 14, 1934 — a deal was culminated in which the owners of the Matador Tribune purchased the Motley County News from Grover C. Mitchell and became the only publication in Motley County. New owners of the news-

paper were Douglas Meador and Howard Hamilton. The following year Meador purchased his partner's interest.

Since the first known newspaper was started here in December, 1891 by Clarence Nugent, the paper has been under ownership of five partnerships and nine

individual publishers. Through the years the name of the publication changed from time to time, and included Motley County News, Matador Maverick, Motley County Journal, Texas Maverick, Matador Maverick, Matador Messenger, Matador Gusher and Mata-

dor Tribune.

The Tribune includes also the consolidation of the Roaring Springs Reporter, in a transaction with its former publisher, Bascom Nelson during the 1930's.

TRAIL DUST



Streaking is not new except that it has become promiscuous and probably will be classed as a passing fad. When I was a boy it was different when ten to twenty of us would ride fifteen miles to a remote creek. There were no witnesses in the area except the other streakers and our purpose was to swim. None of us had ever owned a swimming suit and we enjoyed the largest hole in the creek. It was here that I learned to swim when some of the oldest boys would pitch me in. After I went down for the second or third time, they would dive in and drag me out on the bank. After a time someone would suggest that we go down the creek to other swimming holes, which would be three to five miles. We would run down the creek, over rocks, limbs and other debris. We then took a slower pace up the creek to our clothes and horses. My mother took a dim view of these trips because our backs and arms would be as red as fire from sunburn. We would take off our shirts and she would rub the affected areas with sweet cream. Often by the second day we could bear the weight of our shirts again.

A friend has come up in defense of West Texas wind. He says he always parks his car pointed west and the wind always closes the door for him. He admits however, that some problems are associated with the arrangement. If the wind is too strong, he may have a problem getting the door open and if he is not quick enough there is the possibility of getting his leg broken before he can get into the car.

It has been many years since I have watched cattle lick red bluffs to obtain salt in the dirt. Some bluffs evidently contained more salt and often the licks were very deep. It was in the days before block salt was available, or before ranchers could buy it. I have seen remote bluffs with deep trenches in their walls which were believed to have been licked by buffalos before the cattlemen came to the area.

BRANDIED FRUIT

Anna B. Cloyd

Never let contents of this jar get below 3 cups - Every 2 weeks add 1 cup sugar & 1 cup fruit (canned) in this order.

Pineapple tidbits or chunks
Sliced peaches - cut in halves.

Marachino Cherries

Drain juice from fruit - You may delay adding fruit a day or 2 without disastrous results. If you delay you will have to change calendar for adding later. Fruit is good on ice cream, sherbert, pound or plain cake. Never refrigerate. Keep in a warm spot. Close to oven or range. Apothecary jars are just right to put in, stir occasionally to help sugar dissolve.

Dates for adding fruit (example):
Aug. 10 - pineapple
Aug. 24 - peaches
Sept. 7 - Cherries
Continue to add in this order.

STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

Last week we learned from God in Heb. 7:12 that God's priesthood changed from Aaron to Christ. Also, the change in the priesthood necessitated a change in the law or covenant.

Now, Heb. 7:22 - . . . so much the more also Jesus has become the guarantee of a better covenant. The second covenant is a better one than the first.

Here it is said that Christ guarantees the world a better law. When the change was made (v. 12), we, in the Christian age, have a better high priest and a better covenant - the gospel of Christ. The whole world should rejoice; for truly, the Christ has brought us "good news."

Note a reference to the Old Law, Heb. 9:1. Now even the first covenant had regulations of divine worship . . . This same term "first covenant" also appears in verses 15, 16, and 18. The "first covenant" refers to the Old Testament, the law of Moses.

Both Old and New Testaments are mentioned in the next quote, Heb. 10:9 . . . then He said, "Behold, I have come to do Thy will." He takes away the first in order to establish the second. We note here that the two covenants were not in force at the same time. It was God's will to take away the "first" and it was also God's will that Christ replace the "first" with a new one; called here "the second."

The old Testament (first) was taken away. The New Testament (second) was designed - not for Israel alone, but for the whole world. The "first" was sustained by the blood of animals. The "second" is validated by the blood of Christ. The blood of Christ makes a great difference. It is easy to understand why Paul wrote, "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ; for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek." Rom. 1:16 (K.J.V.)

papers and following an account of the various publications in its October 12, 1972 issue, received this information from Jack Robinson Jr., of Arlington, Texas:

"I have a copy of the Texas Maverick, dated Aug. 24, 1901 (Vol. VI, No. 19) by Clyde P. Kendall. In addition, I have five Matador Messengers, all by T. L. Allison, Editor and Proprietor. Vol. 1, No. 28, May 15, 1909; Vol. 1, No. 39, Aug. 14, 1909; Vol. 2, No. 2 Nov. 13, 1909; Vol. 2, No. 15 Feb. 26, 1910 and Vol. 2, No. 16 March 5, 1910.

"In your history you note that between 1902 and 1908 the paper (Texas Maverick) changed hands and H. A. Mullenix was publisher. I have a copy of the Matador Maverick dated May 15, 1908 (Vol. XII, No. 44) with H. A. Mullenix, Editor and Publisher and Mrs. H. A. Mullenix, Asst. Ed.

"There does seem to be some conflict between the statement by T. L. Allison (the Dec. 24, 1910 statement) and the fact that a Matador Maverick was published May 15, 1908 (Vol. XII, No. 44) by H. A. Mullenix."

The first Matador Maverick was published by Lee S. Smith, Prop., and J. N. Smith, Ed. & Pub., followed by the Motley County Journal of R. Moore; Texas Maverick, Clyde P. Kendall; Matador Maverick and Texas Maverick H. A. Mullenix; Matador Messenger, T. L. Allison, followed by Homer

Knowles; Motley County News by Bob Johnson and John Perkins; Matador Gusher by C. A. Lamb and Geo. W. Ellis; Motley County News by W. D. Starcher and C. A. Lamb, followed by H. O. Ward, and later by G. C. Mitchell.

Meador began his publishing career at Roaring Springs in October, 1932 and has continued as publisher of the Matador Tribune since December, 1933.

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Tabo, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced, slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.
