Notice To Farmers From County ASCS

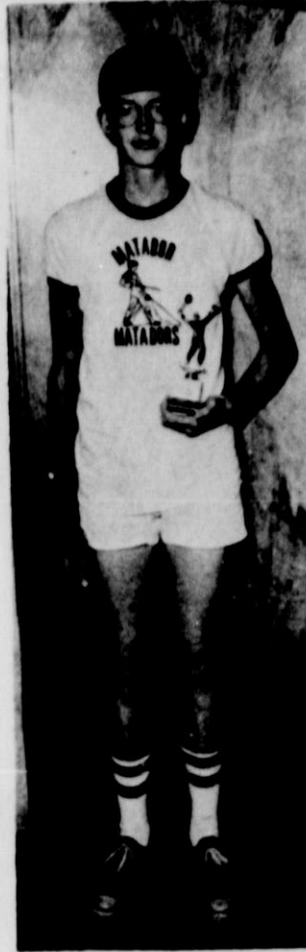
All county farmers who have not reported their crop acreages to the ASCS office, are urged to do so by Emilio F. Aguilar, office manager, who issues the following information:

1. July 15, 1974 is the final day to apply for prevented planting on feed grain.

2. July 15, 1974 is the final day to come to the ASCS office and certify your crop acreages.

"We ask that you measure your crop acreages correctly," Aguilar said. "If you guess at them, and guess wrong, you may lose a disaster payment, plus part or all of your allotment."

"We hope that all of you will come in as soon as possible, and not wait until the last day."

Ralph Emerson Bennett was born July 12, 1911 at Jayton, Texas. He had been a resident of Dickens County most of his life. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Bennett.

He was married to Miss Faye Robinson in 1942 at Muskogee, Oklahoma. He served with the army in World War II, and after his discharge returned to the Bennett farm eight miles southwest of Afton, where he had since made his home.

He is survived by his wife, Faye; two sons, Jimmy Bennett of Afton and Jack Bennett of Chicago, Ill.; one daughter, Mrs. Craig Brummett (Cheryl) of Lubbock; and two grandchildren.

Holiday Caution Is Urged

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that traffic accidents during the 102-hour July 4th holiday week end would claim 42 lives in Texas.

Speir, who did not make an estimate for the Christmas-New Year period because of rapidly changing conditions brought on by the energy crisis, said the traffic situation has become more stable in recent months. He noted that gasoline is readily available in most sections of the state, and pointed out that this would probably bring additional traffic to the highways during the approaching holiday.

The July 4th holiday last year, which was only 30 hours in length, resulted in 13 traffic deaths in Texas. The 1972 holiday, which was 102-hours long — the same as the upcoming period — was marred by 80 deaths.

The DPS director pointed out that excessive speed and drinking drivers would make the largest contribution to the fatal accident toll, and he warned that all available DPS troopers and department facilities will be utilized to watch for unsafe and reckless motorists.

"We urge every Texas driver to join with us in this all-out effort to make the July 4th holiday period as safe as possible," he added.

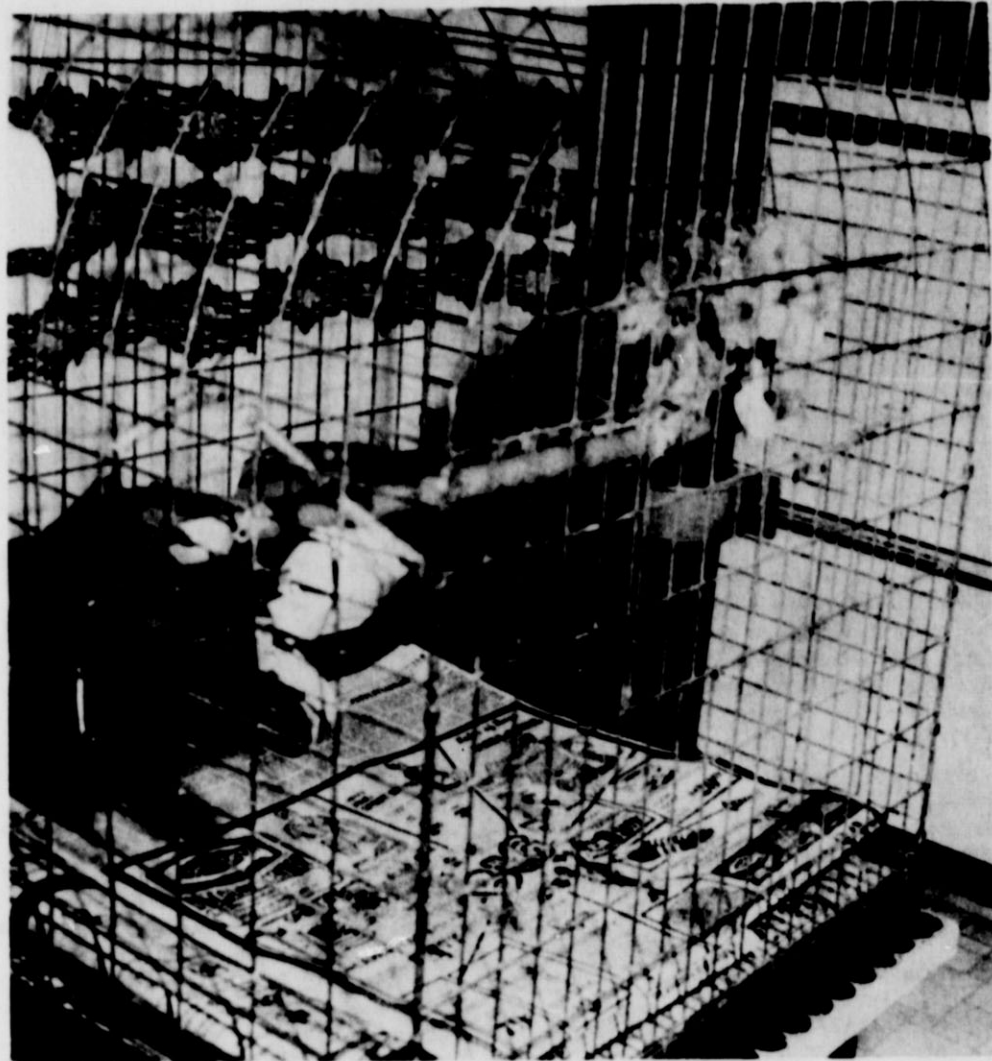

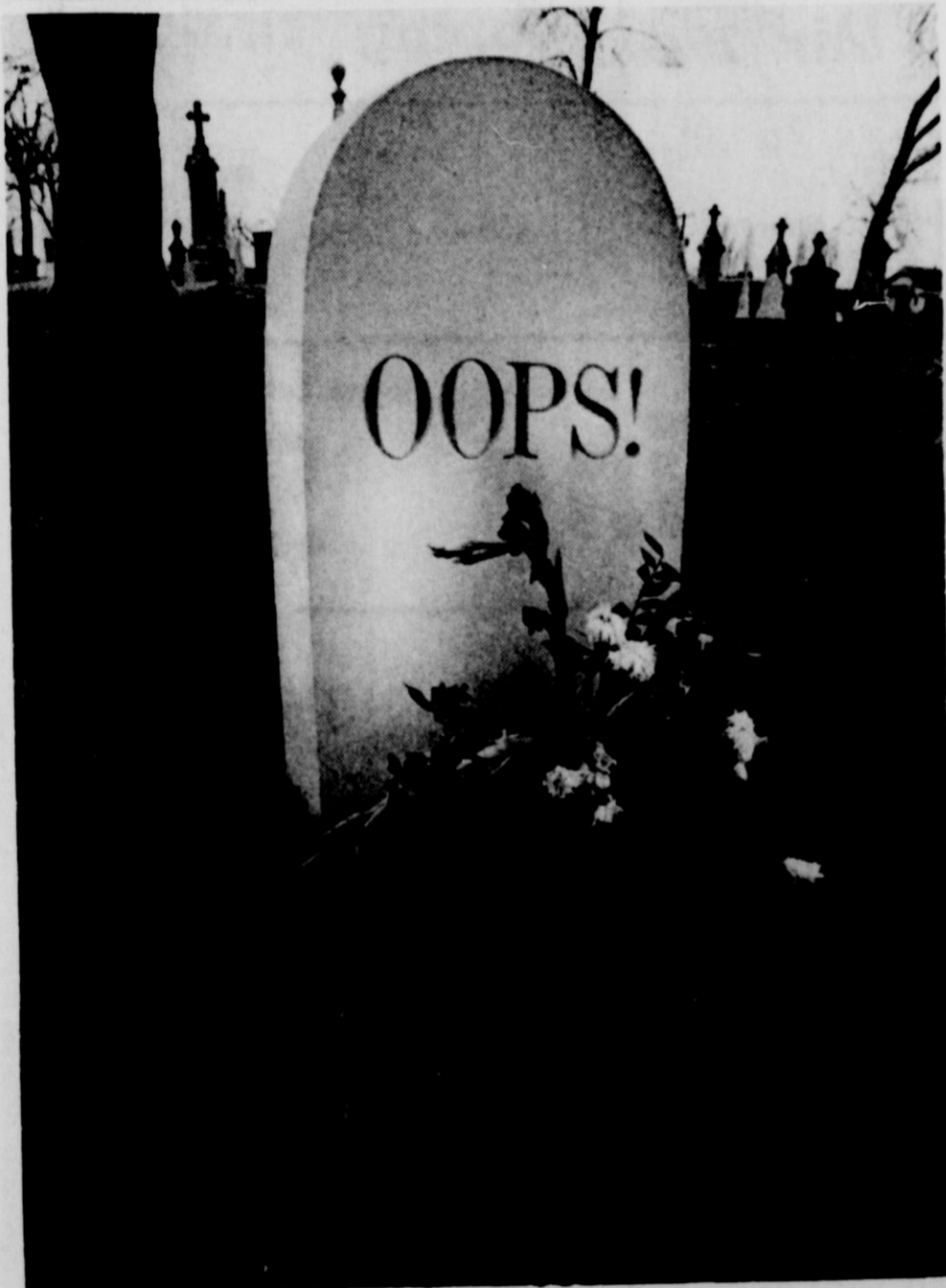

Grain and cotton producers in Texas are eligible this year for a federal program designed to compensate for losses incurred through crop shortfalls. This is the natural disaster provision of the new 1974 farm program.

A farmer who is enrolled in the wheat, feedgrain or cotton programs is eligible for disaster payments if he is prevented from planting or his total actual crop production is reduced to less than two-thirds of his average production. Thousands of Texas wheat producers have already reported damages to their ASCS offices, and other producers who think they may be eligible for some compensation should check with the ASCS before putting the land to other use.

If a farmer qualifies, disaster payments will be based on the difference between the actual amount of the crop harvested and the normal production. If harvesting is not economical, an appraisal by an ASCS official will assess the extent of damage.

Total payment per acre then is determined by multiplying the payment rate for the crop by the difference between the normal production and the actual or appraised yield per acre. Payments will only be made on allotment acres. Payment rates per bushel are corn, 46c, barley, 38c, wheat, 68c. The rate for sorghum is 78c-100 lbs and cotton is 13c-lb.

These rates are still well below current costs of production, but they will help some. Producers who plant another crop on disaster acreage (such as planting sorghum or cotton behind wheat) will not receive any payments if the second crop is near normal production.

Cattle grubs damage the animals in a number of ways. Cattle infested with grubs may produce less milk which in turn results in less weight of calves. The affected animals are more restless and excitable, generally causing a breakdown in the normal health of the animal. Grubs usually reach the back of the animal in late summer, fall or winter, forming breathing holes through the skin and developing a "cyst" just under the skin. This penetration damages the hide and depreciates the value of the animal on the market.

Although cattle grubs can be killed several ways, and after they reach the animal's back, earlier control is best, particularly in beef cattle. Systemic insecticides, which are administered as sprays, dips, pour-ons or feed or mineral additives, are distributed through the animal's body by the circulatory system, destroying the grubs by contact action. Grubicides suggested for control are coumaphos (Co-
