# Senator Sees Future Hopes

LOOKING to the future, Senator Jack Hightower, Thursday reminded pioneers of two counties that in 1976 the nation will hold a Bi-Centennial celebration commemorating the 200th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

Senator Hightower addressed the Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association, gathered for their 51st reunion at Pioneer Pavilion in Roaring Springs. He was introduced by Sam Ross, president of the association, following the Memorial service conducted by Rev. Con Davis of Lubbock.

Senator Hightower reminded his listeners of the many achievements in the nation during the past 200 years and charged the present generation with the preservation of the freedoms and principles for which the early colonists fought.

Cities and towns are urged to plan their own Bi-Centennial celebrations in 1976. The afternoon program was presented by the Afton Youth Choir, directed by Jimmy Bennett, and included a variety of enjoyable music, with instrumental accompaniment.

In a business session, the present slate of officers was re-elected. In addition to President Ross, others are C. L. (Corky) Marshall, Secretary-Manager; Bill Hand, Parade Chairman and Boyce Hart, Rodeo Manager.

The Patton Springs Band, directed by Mrs. Ralph Marshall presented an enjoyable concert and led the western parade. The band received first place ribbon for its performance.

## Old Settlers Rodeo Tops Past Records

There was no way to number the people, but it was estimated that the largest crowd to attend Old Settlers in recent years, was present Thursday, Friday and Saturday, despite a heavy downpour that could have "rained out" the Friday night rodeo performance and the two dances in progress at Roaring Springs.

In the opinion of Boyce Hart, Rodeo Manager, the gate for the three nights broke all previous records.

A surprise visitor was Miss Paula Davis of Seymour, "Miss Rodeo Texas" making her final rodeo appearance before going to Stephenville, where her successor was named for the coming year. Miss Davis rode with Sandy Lankford, "Miss Ford Country," in the grand entry.

Miss Pennie Marshall, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. (Corky) Marshall was declared Rodeo Queen, having sold a total of 1337 tickets on an Alvin Durham saddle. First runner-up was Becky Drennan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billy George Drennan of the Pitchfork Ranch, who sold 836 tickets. The saddle was won by John Barnhill.

Miss Marshall received a handsome engraved tray and a belt buckle, and Miss Drennan received a belt buckle. The queen contestants sold a total of 2799 tickets and each girl received 10 percent of her sales.

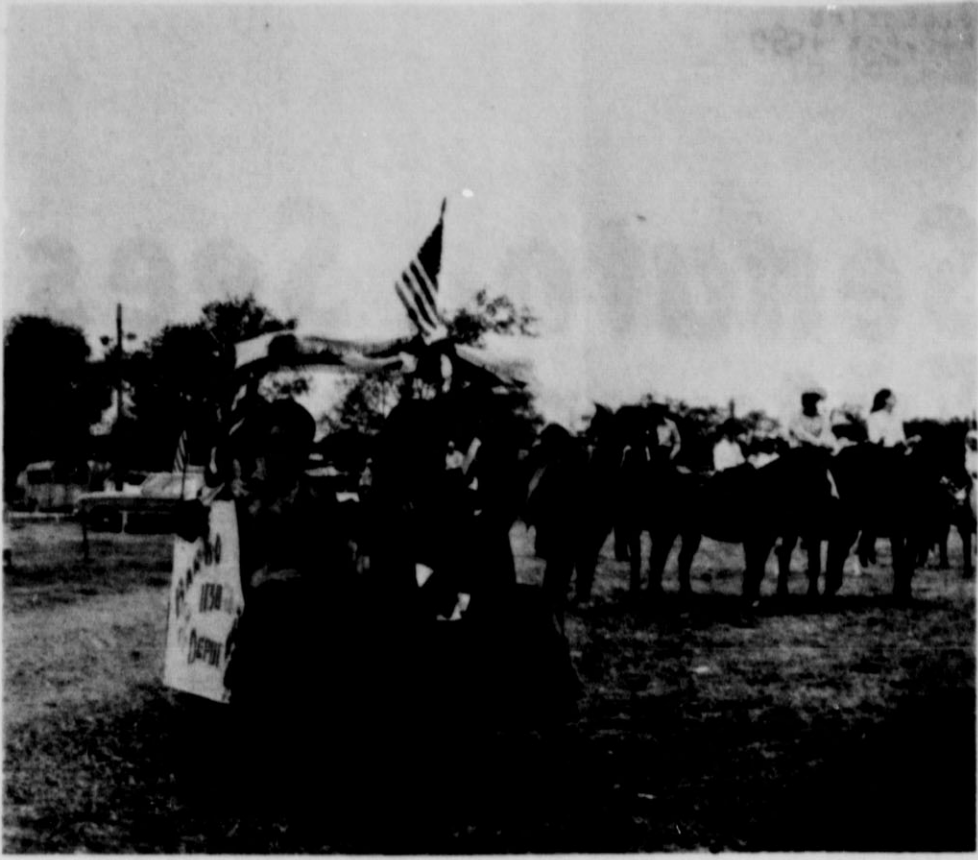

## Public Warned For Labor Day Holiday

"It is indeed tragic that so many men, women and children will become victims of Motor vehicle accidents this last holiday weekend of the summer when thousands of motorists traditionally take to the highways for an outing," Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said.

Bell said the DPS will use all facilities and personnel at its disposal in an effort to reduce the predicted death toll. A special "Operation Motorcade" will be activated at 6:00 p.m. Friday, August 30, and continue through midnight Monday, September 2. During this period, all uniformed DPS officers and equipment will be used on the highways to enforce traffic laws.

During the holiday period the DPS will tabulate each traffic death, and the totals will be announced three times daily in order to call public attention to the highway dangers.

Psychologists say that one reason the general public fails to take positive action in matters of traffic safety is due to a lack of personal identification with the problem. It might behoove all drivers in our state to stop and consider that they have less than a 50-50 chance to go through their driving career without being involved in a traffic mishap, or without incurring injury to themselves or one of their family. The more than 1,550 persons killed in traffic crashes on Texas streets and highways this year had no idea that they would be involved in an accident either.

"In the final analysis, traffic safety must rest on the shoulders of every person who gets behind the steering wheel of a car. With the proper attitude of alertness and with the acceptance of responsibility, we can see positive results in our attempts to halt the increases in the number of traffic mishaps," Major Bell concluded.

**Social Security Representative Here Next Week**

Q. I understand that changes in the law provide for a delayed retirement credit of 1 percent a year for each year after age 65 for which a worker does not get benefits. Is there any provision for only part of a year?

A. Actually, the delayed retirement credit is figured on a monthly basis. For each month from age 65 through age 72 that you do not get any benefit payment, you are entitled to the special credit of 1-12 of one percent. This is

true only if you receive no social security payments before you reach 65.

**Rye Considered Good Cover Crop**

Blowing dust carried by winter and early spring winds is often a problem in Motley County. Low residue crops like cotton and peanuts just don't leave enough cover on the ground to control wind erosion.

By seeding cotton and peanut fields to a cover crop of rye, much of the blowing soil can be held in place, according to Tony E. Dean of the Soil Conservation Service. The added grazing provided by cover crops can be of extra benefit.

Rye can be broadcasted and scratched in during last cultivation on cotton land. Peanut land cover crops can be seeded after harvest.
