It may not always be feasible to be ridden of a bore by ignoring what he is saying but under certain conditions he will change the subject.

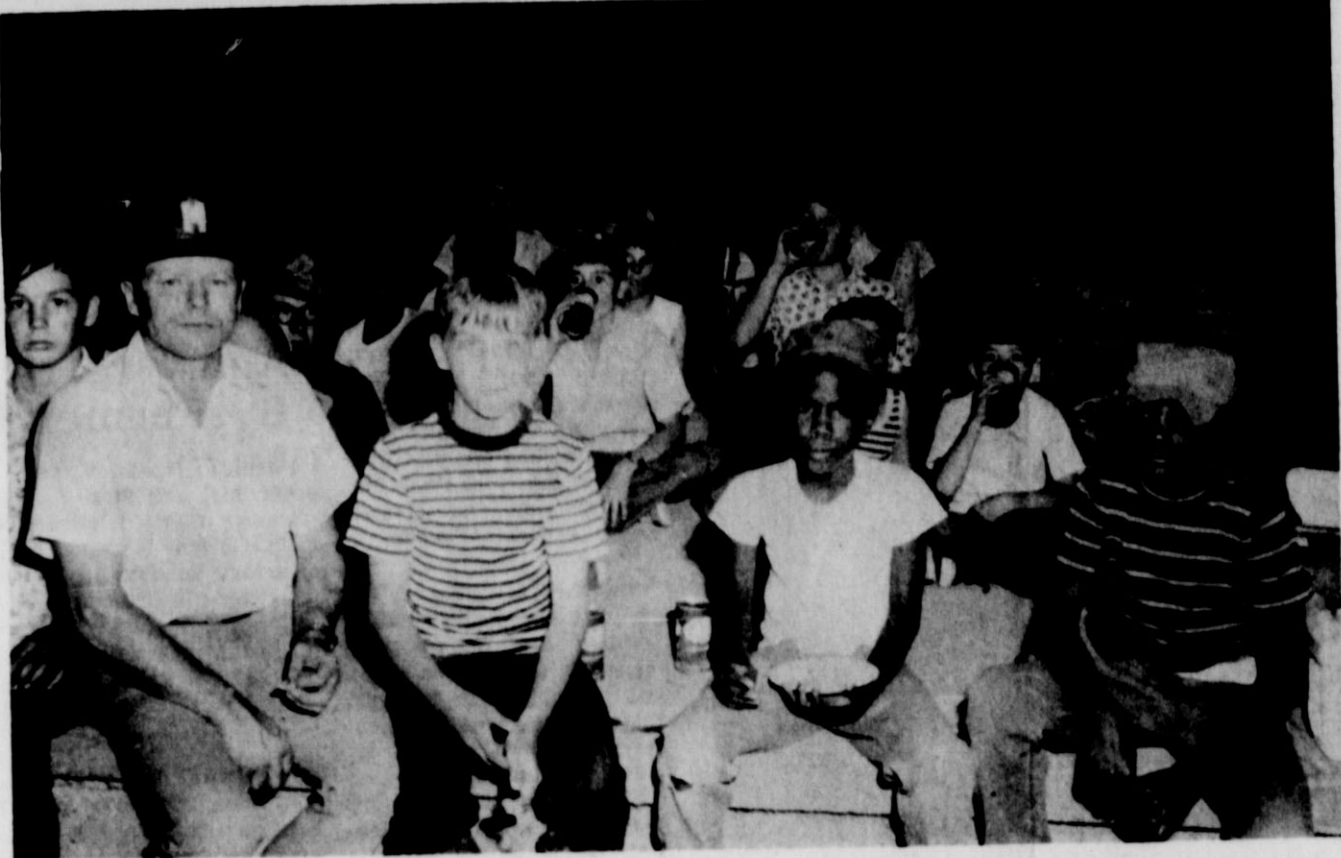
Hunting Lease Survey Is Made

Burial was in Northfield Cemetery, under the direction of Seigler Funeral Home.

Mr. Ashford died early Friday morning, July 26 in the Brownfield Hospital, after becoming ill Thursday night, following an apparent heart attack. He had lived in Brownfield the past year.

He was born in Parker County, and at an early age came to Motley County with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Ashford, who settled at Northfield. He grew to manhood there, and was married to Irene Knipe Byrd in January of 1926, at Childress, Texas. They continued to live at Northfield for a number of years and later moved to Parnell, then to Turkey, where they were living at the time of Mrs. Ashford's death Feb. 25, 1952.

Mr. Ashford is survived by a son, Dale Ashford of Brownfield; a stepson, R. C. Byrd of Socorro, N.M.; a brother, Cecil B. Ashford of Amarillo; a sister, Mrs. J. C. Hoover (the former Earnestine Florence) of Lubbock; and a grandchild.

GIDDINGS, TEXAS -- (Special) A former Matador resident, Tanya Meador, has recently accepted a counseling position at the Giddings State Home and School, a coeducational facility of the Texas Youth Council. The school is designed to serve delinquent youth.

Miss Meador, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James J.

Meador of Waco, is employed as one of three counselors in the Adventure Trails program, an alternate treatment plan being utilized at Giddings State Home and School. Its basic philosophy of treatment is reality therapy and actualized education in an intensive 26-day wilderness experience.

The Adventure Trails group departed on a 26-day adventure July 22. Ten students and three counselors will be traveling to the LBJ Ranch, Palo Duro Canyon, Devil's Slide and will then backpack into the Pecos Wilderness of North-eastern New Mexico. The high point of the trip will be climbing South Trauchos Peak, 13,100 feet above sea level.

The group will also tour Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory, "Home of the Atom Bomb," Carlsbad Caverns, Bandelier National Monument and Monahans State Sandhill Park.

Miss Meador was named to "Who's Who Among American High School Students and was selected Miss Congeniality by the contestants in the State Tech beauty pageant. The coed attended Texas State Technical Institute on the James Connally Campus in Waco in the Recreation Supervision program.

The youth counselor sees her new job as a "great challenge". "I grew up in a rural area where kids had a chance to learn the meaning of work, responsibility and accomplishment. Most of the kids in Texas Youth Council facilities have not been so lucky."

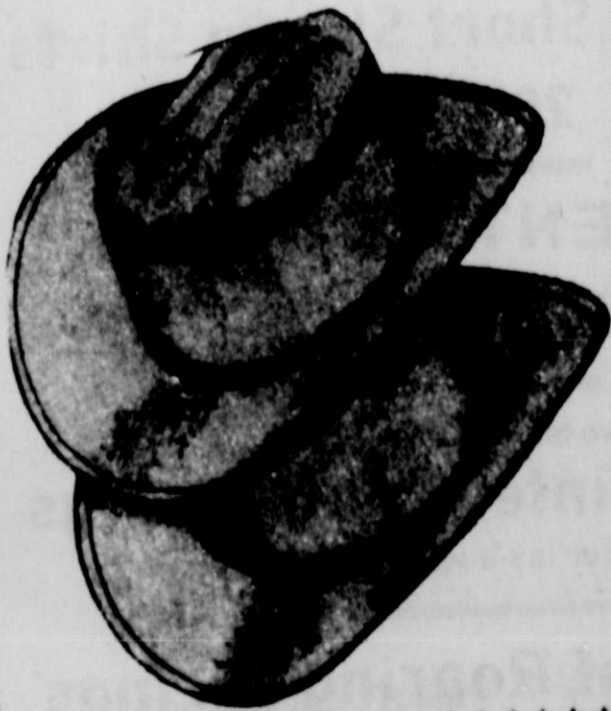

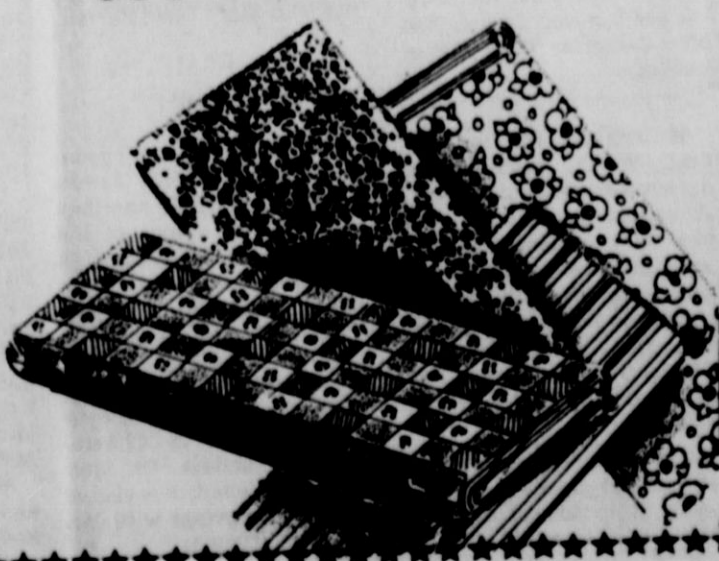


