Matador Housing Study Underway

being planned here.

A survey of the people of Matador is now being taken to determine the need for moderate income housing in Matador according to Joe Smith, president of the Lions Club. Everyone is urged to complete a survey form.

If you have not received a survey form and would like to have one, they are available at City Hall, the courthouse, and the West Texas Utilities office.

Plans for the survey were finalized last Thursday at the meeting to discuss moderate income housing for Matador. The program was presented by John F. Gildersleeve, consultant-planner for the West Texas Housing Management and Development Corporation.

Here are the highlights of the rural rental housing program for Matador as outlined by Gildersleeve --

"As part of the Housing Act of 1949, Congress authorized Farmers Home Administration (FhMA) to make rural housing loans for new construction and home repair loans. In 1965, this legislation was expanded to finance rental housing units in rural communities such as

This housing program realizes that many young people, persons who do not wish to own a home, or senior citizens would prefer to rent a housing unit within their means, if such a unit was available. With this thought in mind, the Farmer's Home Administration will make loans to Non-profit Organizations of from twenty to fifty members, depending upon the size of the proposed project, to develop housing of this nature in their community.

These loans can be as long as fifty years and at an interest rate determined as equitable by FhMA i.e. 9 1/2 per cent at this time. The corporation must raise two per cent of the total project costs to cover first year operating expenses i.e. maintenance, taxes, insurance, equipment, etc.

This money can be included in the loan to eligible Non-profit Organizations. The interest rate can upon approval from FhMA be reduced to three per cent or even to one per cent, depending upon the plan of operation a corporation selects.

Basically, income limits can range anywhere from an adjusted income of \$4600 to \$11,400. Total income is taken into consideration and an exemption of five per cent Social Security, and \$300 per child is taken from gross income, to obtain adjusted income for eligibility.

Based upon this figure and needs of the family, and the number in the family, a young couple or senior citizens 62 years or over could apply for a one, two, or possibly a three bedroom unit. The corporation must conduct a housing survey to determine need (which it is now doing), organize itself using model by laws preferably obtained through FhMA, hire an architect, select a site, prepare an application for a loan and once it is approved, be responsible for having a plan of management for the project, once it is built.

Each member of the corporation has one vote in its affairs and a Board of Directors is elected of at least five members and not more than fifteen members.

The housing will not be elaborate in cost or design, but will be of such a quality as to provide many of the pleasures found in apartments in larger cities. Usually the first project is from ten to fifteen units in rural communities and, as the need increases, additional units can be applied for.

Besides allowing for moderate income housing, a project of this nature creates a natural cash flow and increases goods and services in rural areas. It can also serve as a vehicle for young families to eventually move up to purchase a home of their own, once they are financially able.

This is a loan program as opposed to a grant program and must be operated as a business venture, though no member of the corporation will be held financially responsible as an individual. Keeping these basic thoughts in mind, a project of this nature can be a profitable venture for a forwards looking rural community attempting to provide needed housing, create cash flows and have available one of the resources necessary to attract industry and provide a balanced program of community improvement."

"The experience of the whole thing is worth more than I'll ever be able to repay," Marilee said in thanking the Lions Club for their help. "It was a very thrilling experience for me."

San Marcos Rites For Mrs. Willett

Funeral services for Mrs. Harry Willett, 78, longtime resident of Matador, were held at 10:00 a.m. Monday in Pennington Funeral Chapel in San Marcos. Burial was in the cemetery there.

Mrs. Willett died about noon Friday, January 17, in Hays County Memorial Hospital, San Marcos, after a lengthy illness. She was born Mary Harris, April 13, 1896, in Austin, Texas, but grew up in San Marcos, where her father was the first president of Southwest Texas State Teachers College, now Southwest Texas State University.

The former Miss Harris came to Matador in 1916 as Home Economics teacher in Matador High School. On December 30, 1917, she was married in San Marcos to Harry H. Willett, a young Matador dry goods merchant. They continued to make their home here until the early 1930's when they moved to Brady, Texas. They returned to Matador in 1936 and again engaged in the dry goods business. Mr. Willett closed out the Willett Dry Goods Company in December, 1953 after operating it for 33 years.

Mrs. Willett was preceded in death by her husband, who suffered a heart attack and passed away August 27, 1957 while they were on a vacation trip at Del Norte, Colorado.

Mrs. Willett was a charter member of El Progreso Study Club. She was a member of United Methodist Church and active in the Women's Missionary organization and other phases of church activities.

She had been in San Marcos and Austin the past two years, after undergoing surgery in August, 1973. She is survived by two sons, Boyd Willett and Harry L. Willett, both of Denver, Colorado; a daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Rogers of San Antonio; two grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Vehicle Tags Soon To Go On Sale

1975 License plates will go on sale at the Sheriff's office February 3 and can be purchased through March according to Jinks Wilson, County Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector. They must be on vehicles by midnight, April 1, 1975.

To purchase plates you must have your 1975 renewal card or your vehicle title and

1974 registration receipt. This year, the majority of motor vehicles operating in Texas may be eligible to use the new "multi-year" license plate, renewable annually for five years of driving.

Instead of the usual metal plate, a heavier, non-corrosive steel will be used for greater endurance. Also, the plate will be reflectorized and will feature black letters and numerals on a white field, considered by experts to be the most easily readable color combination.

"The real change in registration procedure will come in 1976," explained Bob Townsley, Director of the Highway Department's Motor Vehicle Division. Next year, instead of buying a new license plate, owners will purchase a 1-by 2-inch adhesive-type validation tag that will be placed in the debossed upper left corner of the plate.

According to Townsley, the state will realize an \$8.5 million savings in additional revenue from using the semi-permanent plates for the five-year period.

The beginning numbers for Motley County license plates this year are: for cars, APJ 925 and, for trucks, AJ 6225.


