The 1973 crop for the county was 25,600 bales.

"Top cotton this year is around 30 cents a pound. We've got a little, but most is bringing around 20 cents a pound," said Pallmeyer. The price of cotton in Motley County for 1973 was 45-70 cents a pound. Farmers planted 34,400

acres of cotton in 1973 in Motley County and harvested all but 900 acres of that according to Pallmever. 44,500 acres were planted in 1974 with no figure yet on the amount harvested.

North of Santa Fe at the Santa Clara pueblo good friends Joe and Barbarita Narjano have been guiding Lynn in their totally handmade methods of clay potting which begins with making

one's own clay. The Lynus gather red and gray clay rock from the Canadian river bed which Alvin grinds, mixes with water, shapes in a ball, and stores in a plastic bag. Then he rolls the clay for coiling into pots. Smoothing it out comes next. After drying, a thin wet clay called a slip is wiped on the dry pots and polished with a very smooth stone

Although Alvin fires his work in a kiln at present he intends to do some outside firing much like his friends. the Narjanos. The objects being fired are protected with metal or some other suitable material and completely encased in fire. The black pottery created

by the famous Maria of the San Ildefonso pueblo north of Santa Fe is colored in the firing process by adding manure to smother the fire, thus reducing the flame which emits a black carbon.





AUSTIN -- State Representative Phil Cates of Pampa today was named Vice Chairman of the Business and Industry Committee in the Texas House of Representatives by House Speaker Bill Claton.

The choice committee post was given to the third term House veteran along with an assignment to the seven member House Administration Committee.

Rep. Cates also captured a seat on the Environmental Affairs Committee by virtue of his seniority.

"I am especially looking forward to serving on the Business and Industry Committee and actively seeking new areas of industrial growth for Texas, especially the Panhandle area," Rep. Cates stated at the Capitol. "I am concerned that Texas showed a 17 per cent drop from 1973 to 1974 in the number of new Texas factories. This is, of course, mainly due to stresses on our national economy. The number of expansions also declined by 7 per cent over the same period.' "I am also concerned that

nearly three-quarters of the state's total industrial growth stayed within the metro-plex areas. Research studies show that in 1974 more than 72 per cent of the total industrial growth went to the Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas. Big cities are ballooning while small towns and rural areas that vitally need new growth, continue to shrink," Rep. Cates reported. "I hope to shift a sizeable

amount of the expansion and growth interest to small towns and rural areas," Cates stated. "This would give Texas a more equitable industrial balance and help stabilize our economy. "The East Texas city of

Longview is a good example of an agressive program for industrial growth among the smaller cities. Longview led the state in new plants from the non-metro area with a reported 37-an increase of 16 per cent over 1973. "I see no reason why other
