Motley Matadors Stand 4-0 In District School Teams Win Two Championships

The Motley County Matadors dumped the Jayton Jaybirds in varsity action Friday at Jayton to conclude the first half of District play with perfect 4-0 records.

In the girls game Motley beat the Lady Jays 32-29, to capture the first crown in district play, and will enter into second half play Friday against Patton Springs. Audrey Campbell put in 12 points, with Laura Grundy putting 10 points, with Stefanie Wilson score, the Matadors remained in charge most of the game.

In charge most of the game. The Motley boys won a 76-59 victory over the Jaybirds, with 4 more district games plus the District Tournament left on the district schedule.

In the Jayton game the lead was seesawing, changing hands several times. At halftime the Matadors were down by 4, and at the end of the third quarter were tied. In the fourth quarter a Motley surge opened up the largest lead of the game for the Matadors. Joe Campbell put in 22 points along with Charles Giesecke's 17, Frank Wellings' 14, and Steve Stevens' 13.

The Motley Matadors upped their district marks to 3-0 in a game Tuesday, Jan. 21 when they won two games from the Guthrie Jaguars.

In the girls game Motley won very handily 79-25. The Matadors had a big night scoring, never trailing in the game. Every girl on the team scored with the exception of 2. Leading the scorers were Audrey Campbell with 23, Laura Grundy with 22, and Dana Dillard with 10.

In the boys game Motley scored a season high in the 113-32 stomp of Guthrie. The Matadors were in command from the beginning. The Matadors had an excellent night from the field hitting over 50 per cent of their shots. Charles Giesecke put in 18 for the Matadors, Joe Campbell and Roy Hernandez each adding 11, and Craig Christian 10.

CHANGE VOTED ON VET'S DAY

AUSTIN, Tex. — Can 76,000 veterans be wrong?

Apparently not, the Senate State Affairs Committee decided Wednesday in voting to change Veteran's Day from the fourth Monday in October to Nov. 11.

Nov. 11 was Armistice Day in honor of the end of World War I but was later changed to Veteran's Day to honor veterans of World War II and the Korean War.

But Congress voted in 1971 to switch the holiday to the fourth Monday to allow a three-day week end.

Forty-two states have now acted to restore the original holiday.

Dr. James White of Houston, department commander of the 76,000-member American Legion in Texas, said that organization supported the restoration of Nov. 11 as Veteran's Day. "The biggest thing (World War I) veterans remember is Armistice Day," said White, and "others have caught the spirit of the men of World War I."

The measure, which now goes to the Senate floor, was co-sponsored by Sens. Lindon Williams, D-Houston, and Mike McKinnon, D-Corpus Christi.

GROUND HOG TO LOOK FOR SHADOW SUNDAY

Everyone should be watching for our friendly fellow the ground hog -- this Sunday. It will be ground-hog day.

Legend has it that the furry creature comes out every February 2 to look for its shadow. If it sees it, the ground hog goes back to sleep for six weeks; but if the day is cloudy and shadowless, it stays outside, anticipating an early spring.

The idea stems from an old European belief that a sunny Candlemas Day (February 2) means six more weeks of winter weather.

Graveside services for Mrs. Mary Ella Freeman, 99, of Grand Prairie, pioneer of Motley County, were held at 3:00 p.m. Monday in East Mound Cemetery. Rev. Lloyd Hearn, pastor of First United Methodist Church officiated. Seigler Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements here.

Mrs. Freeman died Saturday afternoon, January 25 in a Grand Prairie hospital and services were held at 4 p.m. Sunday in First Methodist Church there.

Mrs. Freeman was born Mary Ella Hamilton, October 7, 1875 at Subigna, Georgia. Her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Hamilton, early settlers of Motley County, came to Texas in 1895 and settled at McGregor in McClelland County, and to Matador in 1899. "Miss Ella," as she was known was teaching a school at Lorena, and joined her parents and other family members in 1900. That fall she began a 7-year teaching career in the Matador school, as primary teacher.

She was married at her parents' home, June 19, 1907 to Antone Freeman and they operated a drug store here and later one at Roaring Springs. In the interval they moved to Arkansas, living at Berryville for five years.

Following her husband's death in 1947, Mrs. Freeman made her home in Grand Prairie, near her children. She was a longtime member of the Methodist Church and had been a member of the Order of the Eastern Star.

Survivors include two sons, Antone H. Freeman of Richardson and Harold H. Freeman of Grand Prairie; a sister, Mrs. Fred Bourland (Katherine) of Matador, three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Nephews served as pallbearers and were, Varner McWilliams, Ernest McWilliams, Bob Cooper, Billy Joe Cooper, Jay Browning and Thomas Bourland.

Briscoe County Gets State Park

The creation of a new state park in Briscoe county of the Texas panhandle was announced jointly today by Congressman Jack Hightower of Vernon, State Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, and Representative Phil Cates of Pampa. Located approximately 95 miles from both Lubbock and Amarillo, the site will be known as Lake Theo State Park.

Instrumental in acquiring designation of the site as a state park was former Senator Jack Hightower who is now serving his first term in Congress.

The state legislative delegation from the area expressed pleasure with the creation of the park. Senator Ray Farabee stated that he felt the park would be a tremendous asset to the

area. Representative Phil Cates noted that the park would provide "an economic boost" to the surrounding area while preserving some of the "rugged beauty of the caprock."

The park, more properly known as the Geisler Ranch, is accessible via FM 1065 and a county road north of Quitaque. The park contains in excess of 13,500 acres including two scenic caprock canyons, several thousand acres of roughland below the escarpment, the 130 acre Lake Theo impoundment, and several smaller lakes and tanks. The scenic features of the Lake Theo site are somewhat similar to Palo Duro Canyon, but enhanced by the existence of a small fishing lake and the potential for creating other water features.

Former Resident Tells Of Guatemalan Crusade

Larry Keltz of Plainview, Friday night showed colorful slides made in Guatemala as he related in glowing terms, results of a revival meeting held in a small mountain village, Santa Catherina, Barahona, about 60 miles northwest of Guatemala City.

"People were on fire for Jesus Christ, as we gave our witness on the streets, in the homes, and the small Templo Bautista Bethlehem," he told a group of friends gathered here at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bennie Keltz.

Larry was in a group of 175 persons taking part in International Crusades Inc., who spent ten days in Guatemala during the holidays, leaving from Lubbock on December 26.

Also in the Crusade, were two former Matador Baptist pastors, Rev. Larry Heard of Bovina and Rev. Gene Hawkins of Topeka, Kansas.

The Crusade members were divided into small groups, each working in a different locality. Larry worked in a group composed of Rev. Clifton Igo, pastor of University Baptist Church, Lubbock, G. T. Doggett, Baptist layman from Shallowater, and Richard Escamella, a 15-year-old member of the University Baptist Church, who served as interpreter. They joined a missionary group from Chihuahua, Mexico, led by Efrén Gomez, in conducting the revival at Santa Catherina, which has a population of 1,500.

"The people here are Cachatian Indians, and Templo Bautista Bethlehem boasts 70 members. Seventeen new converts were baptized during the revival here, and a total of 800 persons gave their hearts to Christ, during the Crusade," Larry said. Ben Meith of Calvary Baptist Church, Lubbock, is coordinator for International Crusades Inc.

State Store Licenses Abolished

Austin - Comptroller Bob Bullock reminded Texas business operators Saturday that the state store license requirement has been abolished.

Bullock said his office has been besieged with calls and letters this month by businesses which were unaware that the license requirement was repealed as of Dec. 31, 1974.

"Obviously, the past administration didn't get the message out," Bullock said. "I consider it good news that we've been able to do away with the store license."

The store license, which started at \$5 for a single store, was a minor revenue source. Its repeal by phases was ordered by the Legislature in 1971.

Bullock said that some 240,000 stores in Texas had previously been covered by the license act.

He said his office is returning license money still being sent in by businesses unaware of the repeal.

"It's gratifying to see businesses voluntarily trying to do right and pay their taxes, but in this case we are saying 'thanks, but no thanks,'" Bullock said.
