## Public Health Clinics To Be Held At Hospital

The Texas State Department of Health will hold Public Health Clinics at the Motley General Hospital on the 4th Tuesday of every month. The first clinic will be held April 22,

from 10:00 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. It was announced here by Perry L. Williams, M.P.H. Health Program Specialist.

Preventative health services made available at this clinic will be provided without cost by a Public Health Nurse from the Region 2 office in Lubbock. Services to be offered will include: (1) Diabetic Screening Test; (2) Blood Pressure Check; (3) Tuberculin Skin Test, and (4) Immunizations.

"If you have records on immunizations you have received in the past, these should be brought to the clinic with you," Mr. Williams said.

"The Texas State Department of Health is making this service available in a cooperative effort with your community. You are encouraged to make use of this opportunity to provide additional safeguards for your health," he stressed.

## Two Amendments On April 22 Ballot

On April 22, Texas voters will be asked their opinions on two proposed constitutional amendments.

The proposed Constitutional Amendment Number 1 on the ballot concerns consolidating virtually all constitutional provisions about state and local retirement systems in one section of our state charter, according to Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby.

The amendment also would lift the ceiling on the amount the state can contribute to retirement systems from six per cent to 10 per cent of the employee's total compensation.

Should an emergency exist, the legislature could appropriate additional money to these retirement systems should it be deemed necessary.

In conjunction with this amendment, Senate Bill 56 has been passed by the legislature providing a 12 per cent increase in retirement benefits for government workers already retired.

This increase would become effective permanently only if Amendment 1 is approved on April 22.

The bill also appropriates \$21.8 million to the retirement Annuity Reserve Fund to cover the benefit increases. It, too, is contingent upon approval of the amendment.

Under this amendment, the boards of trustees of each retirement system would be given broader investment authority. However, the legislature could restrict this discretion.

Under proposed Amendment Number 2, members of the legislature would get a pay raise from \$400 a month to \$600 a month. The amendment also provides for an increase in the per diem allowance from \$12 a day for the first 120 days of each regular session and 30 days of each special session to \$30 for each day of each regular and special session. State representatives and

senators are currently limited to \$2.50 for every 25 miles they travel from their homes to Austin. The proposed amendment would change this to reimburse legislators at the same mileage rate as all other state employees as set by law.

"I hope all Texas voters will take the time to familiarize themselves with these proposed amendments and express their opinions at the polls on April 22," Hobby said.

Matador precincts will be combined for this election, and voting will be at the Motley County School, from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

## City Development Explored at Lions

In a talk to the Lions Club Tuesday, city councilman Bundy Campbell outlined Matador's efforts to find a new water source for the city.

Campbell said the Matador Water District was created in January by the state legislature. The city limits are also also the water district boundaries.

In February, the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) was allotted funds for community development. Of 15 applications for grants, Matador's application was one of only two that were selected.

In March it was learned that a second application must be made for the \$100,000 grant.

Before Matador can submit their second application, a housing survey must be completed, Campbell said.

Total proposed cost of the new water supply system is \$384,000 according to engineers studying the system.

If Matador receives the HUD grant, it is probable that the Water Development Board in Austin would help finance the remaining cost of the project through bonds. Interest on the loan would probably be around 4 per cent according to Campbell.

The bonds, to be voted on by the citizens of Matador, would be set at the highest conceivable cost of the water project so that any additional costs would be covered.

Anticipated cost to the Matador Water District for the new water system is about \$200,000 according to Campbell.

But he cited small quantities of water and the low quality of the water here as reasons which substantiate

New water supply source was "initiated because the quality of our water has decreased... and there is no other supply in the city for any improvement," Councilman Joe Smith explained. In order for Matador to receive federal assistance under the Community Development Block Grant, the funds must be voted on in a bond election and approved before May 15.

The bond election was set for May 13. Amount of bonds to be voted on will be determined by an engineer who will conduct a survey on the matter. Voters in the bond election must reside within the city limits.

To obtain assistance in securing a new water source, a housing survey must also be included in the application submitted to the federal agencies.

According to Mayor Kirby Campbell, in peak seasons the city of Matador uses 500 gallons of water a minute, but only 490 gallons are pumped per minute. The only way the supply catches up is at night when the use of water decreases.

Main problems concerning water supply arise during the summer months. Billy Watson, a member of the Water Board for Matador summed up the situation when he said, "Last summer if we had had a big fire, we wouldn't have had the water to fight it."

In addition to the dwindling water supply, chemical analyses of the water used in the city have revealed nitrate levels which could become dangerous.

Application for federal assistance will be reviewed by the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG). SPAG reviews applications, such as the one submitted by Matador, and then submits the applications to the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) with either a favorable or unfavorable recommendation.

According to Mike Lumsden, SPAG representative, Matador is in a favorable position to receive the federal assistance if the bond issue passes.

The next public meeting will be held on Monday, April 21 at 8 p.m. instead of April 24 as previously announced.

He descended from generations of artisans, who designed, forged and tempered steel hand tools, implements and other items which were shipped to old and newly developed lands around the globe. One of his greatest designs was the streamlining of the locomotive. He later became an artist and sketched many locomotives.

Among his many outstanding achievements was a mural which he painted, of Central City, Colo., as it was in 1900 when it was the mining capitol of the Rocky Mountains "Empire."

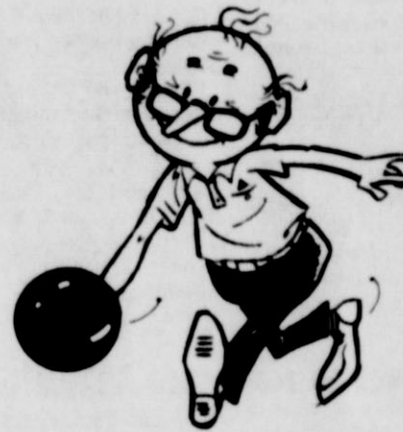

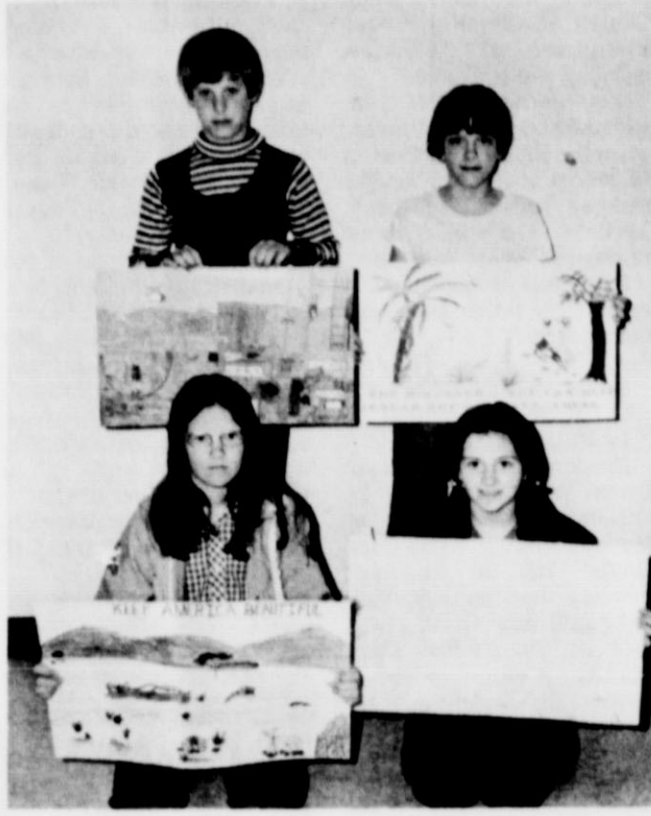

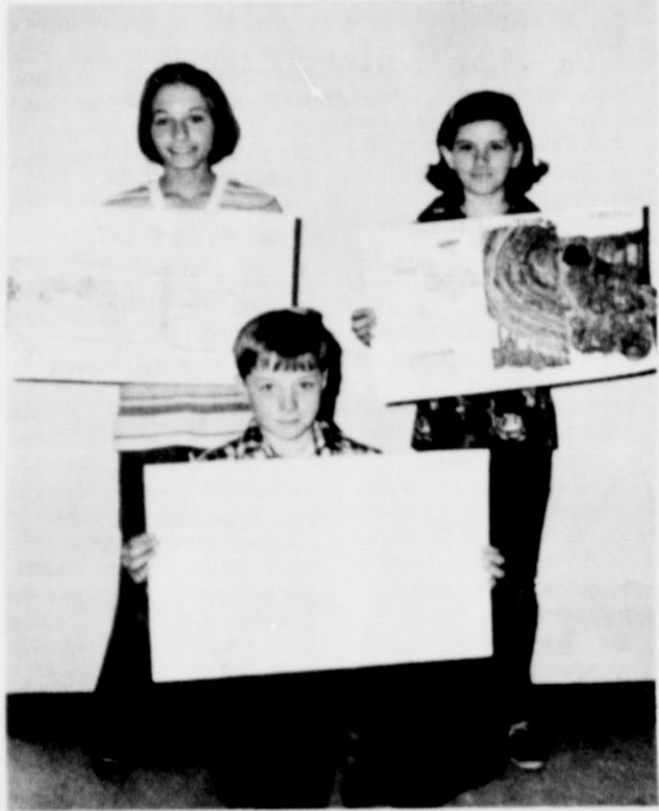

## Erosion Control Information

A good stand of grass is one of nature's best tools for erosion control. Many fields on steep slopes or deep sandy soils could serve a much better purpose under a productive grass cover than under a plow.

Many grasses are adapted to this area. Grasses for sandy soils would include Indiangrass, bluestems, switchgrass, and weeping lovegrass. Grasses for tighter soils include sideoats grama and kleingrass.

The recommended last day for dryland seeding of

summer grasses is June 1. A grass drill is available through the Vo Ag Department at Motley County School.

For recommended seeding rates and other information contact the Soil Conservation Service.

# Murder Suspects Charged

DALLAS — Police Sunday charged three men with clubbing a Texas Tech engineering student to death with the butt of a shotgun and shooting his date in the Trinity River bottoms.

Police traced the suspects through the victim's car, abandoned near Calvert, Tex. Two suspects rode a bus to Dallas from Calvert and police arrested them at the station. Police found the other suspect hiding in an apartment.

Charged with murder were Donald Curtis Chambers, 20, Clarence Ray William Jr., 23, and Doyce Wayne Rogers, 22, all of Dallas. Another suspect was questioned and police sought another.

"There was no reason on earth for this other than these people were just kill crazy," police Capt. Jack Davis said.

Michael McMahan, 22, of Kennewick, Wash., and a student at Tech, was beaten and killed Friday night. Police said the killers shot his date, Deia Sutton, 22, in the back of the head and attempted to drown her in a puddle.

## Stopped At Gunpoint

Police said the suspects stopped the couple at gunpoint on the club parking lot and drove around debating what to do. They drove to a remote levee on the Trinity River and ordered the couple to walk to the edge of the water.

"They fired two shots," Miss Sutton told police. "Michael screamed and fell down."

Two more shots were fired and Miss Sutton fell. The suspects walked up the levee and stepped into their cars.

"Michael asked if I was all right," she said, alerting the suspects. "They heard him and came back. I could hear him scream as they beat him."

Miss Sutton was beaten and lost consciousness. She later stumbled to a nearby hotel and called police.

Police said one of the suspects drove McMahan's car to Houston with a companion in an attempt to sell the vehicle. They heard a news report the

car was stolen and drove it to Calvert, midway to Dallas, and set it on fire. They asked a youth to drive them to the bus station where they bought a ticket for Dallas.

## Vehicle Traced

Police traced the burning vehicle and talked to the youth. Dallas police were alerted and met the bus in Dallas.

McMahan was a mechanical engineering student and was in Dallas for a conference and date with Miss Sutton, whom he had known for a year. Police said he was robbed of \$5 and Miss Sutton \$20, her purse and coat.

"He was always trying to help in whatever way he could," a fellow student said. "He was a practical guy who worried about people."

## Father Tech Grad

McMahan was one of 29 Tech students attending a mechanical engineering conference at the University of Texas at Arlington. The group left Lubbock Tuesday and was scheduled to return late Friday.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mabry E. McMahan of Kennewick, Wash. His father received his mechanical engineering degree from Tech in 1956.

Miss Sutton, the bullet still lodged in her head, was released from Parkland Hospital after treatment. After her release, she was secluded with police.

Miss Sutton, who attended Tech in the fall of 1972 and the spring of 1973, transferred to UTA. She met McMahan while attending Tech.

## TO LOCAL CATTLEMEN

Below is a list of changes Dr. H. Q. Sibley suggested to the Texas Animal Health Commission for their consideration to "strengthen" the present Brucellosis program.

These proposals will be taken into consideration at the next

Texas Animal Health Commission meeting.

1. Test all eligible cattle at the first point of concentration.
2. All quarantines would be for 120 days.
3. Extend the quarantine to include all of a man's herd, rather than just the pasture where the reactor was found.
4. Extend the quarantine to all adjacent pastures where the reactor was found.
5. Place a fire-brand of "S" on exposed cattle.

We think everyone should realize where these proposals begin. In addition to dry weather in the southwest part of the state and bad markets, we feel this is a sure way to ruin almost everybody connected with the cattle industry.

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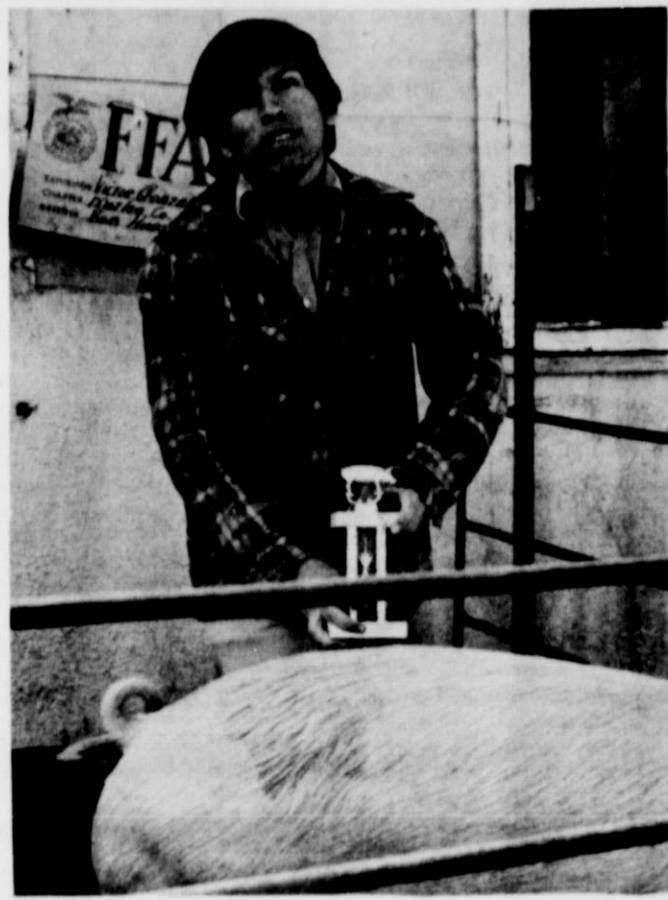

## Public Forum Scheduled For Study of Arthritis

Arthritis, the nation's number one crippler, will be the subject of a Public Forum to be held at 7:30 p.m. in the high school auditorium at Floydada on Thursday, May 1. The forum is being sponsored by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and the Plains Division, West Texas Chapter, of the Arthritis Foundation, according to Mrs. Sharon Hillis, extension agent. Statistics released by The Arthritis Foundation indicate that one out of 10 Americans has arthritis in some form and that 250,000 children are stricken each year.

Arthritis is not just an "old folks" disease, but strikes at any age, from birth to age 30 or 40. Almost 2 million Texans suffer from the more than 100 forms of arthritis. Dr. Charles Seward of Amarillo, associate professor, Department of Rheumatology Texas Tech University School of Medicine, will discuss the various kinds of arthritis and its symptoms, diagnosis and treatment. A native Oklahoman, Dr. Seward is a graduate of Central State University and the University of Oklahoma School of Medicine. He is a member of Potter-Randall County Medical Society, Texas Medical Association, American Medical Association and the Texas Rheumatism Association. The author of numerous papers on internal medicine, he is currently

chairman of the Medical Board of the West Texas Chapter.

Also participating on the panel will be Dr. Lester Wolcott, chairman of the Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation at TTUSM. Dr. Wolcott is a physiatrist, and will speak on the importance of physical therapy in the treatment of arthritis.

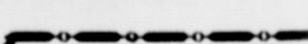
The public is urged to attend this free meeting and to take advantage of the information about arthritis.

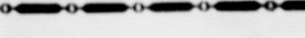

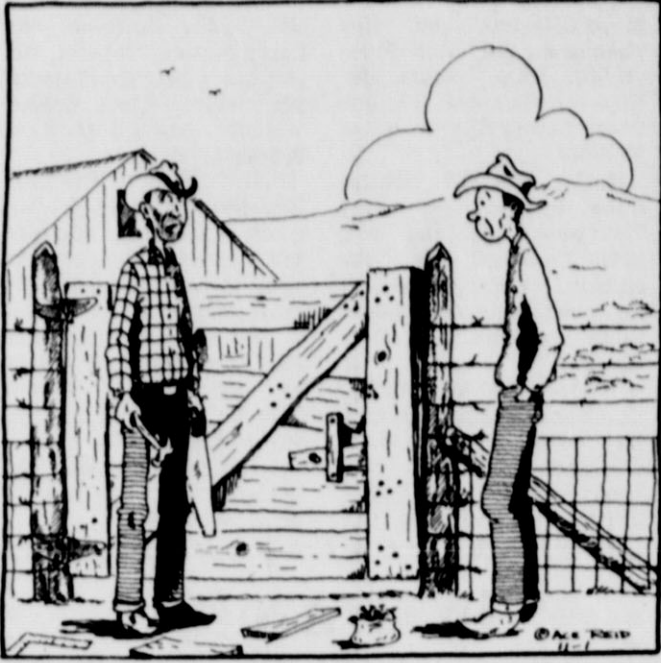
