## Doctor Do Will Start Practice In January

Dr. Do Danh Thuy and his family arrived Saturday from Gunterville, Alabama and are in residence in the Bob Stanley property on South Eubank Street formerly used by the late Dr. J. S. Stanley as a clinic.

Since Do is the family surname, the new doctor and his family will use that name, although in his native Vietnam, as well as many other foreign countries, it is customary to place the family name before the given name.

It will be sometime in January, however, before Dr. Do will begin his practice of medicine here, as he will be required to pass the American Medical examination first.

Dr. Do Hoang Y, who is expected to arrive Monday from Fresno, California, has passed his American Medical examination, but will need a State license to practice in Texas. This examination will be taken in December. Plans are underway to establish a clinic for the

doctors, according to a spokesman for the Motley County Hospital Board. Long range planning will be necessary before the Motley County General Hospital is opened for bed patients, it was pointed out.

Dr. Do's wife, Simone is a registered nurse. They have three children in school, a boy, Khanh (Cain), 9 years old in the 4th grade; a girl, Loan (Lawn), 8, in the 2nd grade and another girl, Dung, (Zone) 6 years old in the 1st grade. They also have two boys, Tung (Tone), 4 years old and Minh, 2.

In Vietnamese, Mrs. Do's name is Kieu Thanh Nzuuyen, but since she speaks French, she is known as Simone.

## Vandalism Is Reported

Several acts of vandalism were reported following Halloween, the most costly being flower boxes which the Matador Garden Club had installed in the business area.

One of the boxes, located at the corner of the Matador Variety, was completely destroyed, and another, at the rear of the First State Bank building was badly damaged.

Since Halloween, vandals have destroyed the shrubs and flowers in two other flower boxes on Main Street, it has been reported.

The usual egg throwing, watermelon debris and other acts of destruction were reported in various areas of town.

The culprits have not been apprehended, and there are no clues as to the identity of those responsible, according to Sheriff Jinks Wilson.

## Premium Received For Bale

A premium of \$110.00 was received by Jerry Jones for the first bale of 1975 cotton, by contributions from local merchants, according to Rex Johnson, owner of the Caprock Gin, Flomot, where the cotton was ginned.

Donors of the premium were Matador Motor & Implement Co., Billy's Grocery, Cooper Butane, First State Bank, Bob Stanley Pharmacy, Higginbotham-Bartlett Co., Rancher's and Farmers Supply, and Christian Dry Goods Co.

The 2360 pounds of bolls produced 532 pounds of lint for which the gin paid 65 cents per pound for a total of \$345.80. The cotton produced 960 lbs. of seed for which the gin paid \$48.00 at the rate of \$100 per ton, Johnson said.

The market price is .4750 per lb, according to Johnson, and not 65 cents as erroneously reported in the Tribune's account of the first bale's ginning.

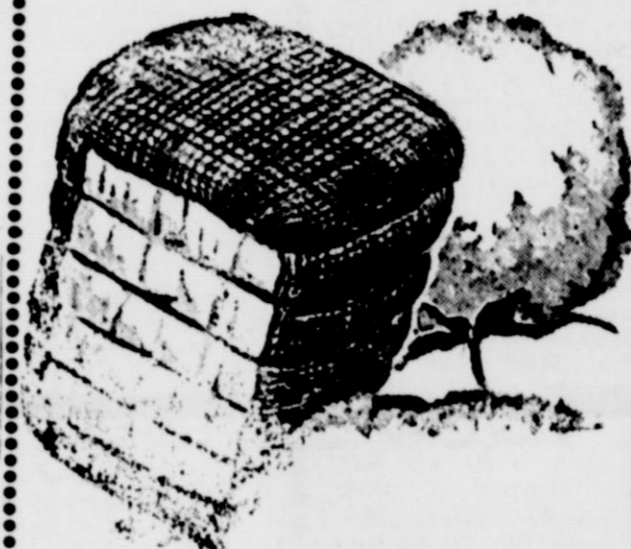
