The Tribune office was notified last week about the rash of dog deaths in Matador. Thanksgiving night it seems approximately 10 dogs died from apparent poisoning. Last week there were other deaths reported.

Children have stood by with their parents helpless to save their favorite pet from a cruel and painful death.

The Sheriff stated his hands were tied unless someone had an autopsy done and

lab reports showing reason of death and then they would know what to look for. If someone is caught giving poison to animals, it is a felony.

James Glasson DVM of Lockney said that if the animals were rushed to a vet they could remove the stomach and send it off to the lab for tests. He also stated the description of this type of death could possibly be from strychnine.

## Brian says Election Fair, Proper and No Fraud

EDITOR'S NOTE: This article was copied from the Crosby County News.

Crosbyton Attorney and write-in victor over incumbent County Attorney John Barnhill in the November 8 general election, this week filed a response to Barnhill's petition seeking a new election.

Barnhill charged numerous election code violations and irregularities in his petition filed in the 72nd District Court requesting that the results of the balloting be declared void and a new election be called.

Brian defeated Barnhill by a vote of 1,450 to 899.

In responding to questions concerning Barnhill's seven-count allegation of irregularities and illegal acts by election officials and others involved in the administration of the election, Brian said he was not aware of any improper conduct at the time of the election. Although there were some minor violations, he does not feel they were done intentionally.

In the response to Barnhill's allegations which Brian was required to file within 10 days of being served with a continued on page 3

## Roaring Springs City Council Report

The Roaring Springs City Council met Tuesday night at 7:00 p.m., December 6 with Mayor Eugene Watson and Council Members, Charlie Long, Gene Brannon, Bill Moose, Joey Thacker and Devonne Dillard; City Secretary Anna Wilson and City Water Superintendent, James May.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as read.

First order of business was Bill Adams of New Shield Roofing Systems. He explained in length the quality of roofing his company did on the old school buildings and that the city had only agreed for a new roof on the old gymnasium and high school building roofs and they only agreed to a patch job on the roof of the Confection Technology building. He also explained he was very willing to fix any problem in his guarantee, but he did not appreciate the verbal harassment he had received and had not received any payments since August. He and his crew were in the process of repairing the two

roofs now.

The Council assured Mr. Adams they were sorry for any misunderstanding and harassment and that it would not happen again. They know the good quality of his roofs and appreciated him coming to get everything straightened out.

The Council instructed Anna to get the payments current with New Shield.

The Council discussed the dog problem in the city. After discussion, the Council instructed Anna Wilson to tell the people who complained that there is nothing the city could do without a pound, etc.

Anna explained that the Masonic Lodge and Carolyn's Corner were on the same meter and according to the City ordinance, that both parties pay minimum water charges, and that the Lodge had not ever paid for water for their once a month meeting and did not want to pay now. After a discussion, Bill Moose made a motion not to charge the Lodge, the Churches or the Senior Citizens. Motion died for lack of second. All Meters turned on will be charged the minimum rate.

Anna reported that they had 24 responses to the sewing factory ads. Long suggested they forward this information to Jim Vinyard and let him have them for his files and future reference.

The Council reviewed the bills and elected to pay them. Long brought up that the house next door to Joe Meredith, owned by Charlie Neff, needed to be torn down. It is full of pack rats and skunks. The Council elected to look into the proceedings to condemn four houses in the City, owned by Vicente Saenz, Ruby Myles, Charlie Neff and the Harmon Estate house. This passed.

The Council went into closed session to meet with Warner Sailsbury.

The new Indigent Health Care Rules were read and Hoyle reported two calls for claims.

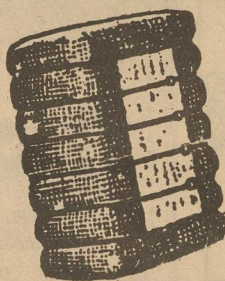
The Ambulance was reported repaired.

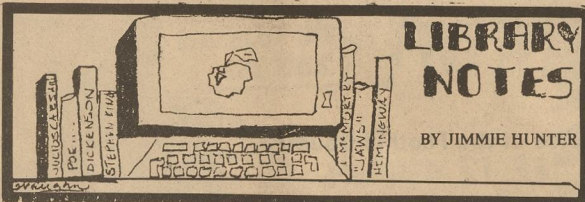

## Home Economically Speaking

### UPDATE: STORING GARMENTS IN PLASTIC BAGS

The plastic bag the drycleaner uses is mainly for the purpose of keeping the garments clean while being transported from the dry-cleaning plant to the consumer's home.

However, occasionally consumers will store the garments while still in the bag. In some cases, the garments may be stored in the plastic bag for an extended period of time, possibly weeks, months, or seasons.

Occasionally, we hear complaints that

the ink from the lettering on the bag has stained the garments inside the bag or possibly the garments that were stored next to the bag. This has been seen mostly on leathers, suedes, vinyls, and synthetic materials, but it could happen to a variety of fabrics.

Considerable research has been done by various individuals in the industry to find inks that would not cause this problem. Unfortunately it has not been possible to find an ink that would be suitable for the specific purpose of the bag and yet not cause dye transfer on some materials.

For this reason, consumers should not store garments in the plastic bags. Also, air needs to circulate around garments and the plastic bag restricts air flow.

Some bag manufacturers are putting a warning regarding storage on the bag. Consumers should heed warnings to prevent any dye transfer problems.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are for people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

Jim is married to the former Donna Schudor and they have one child. They are both formerly of Matador.

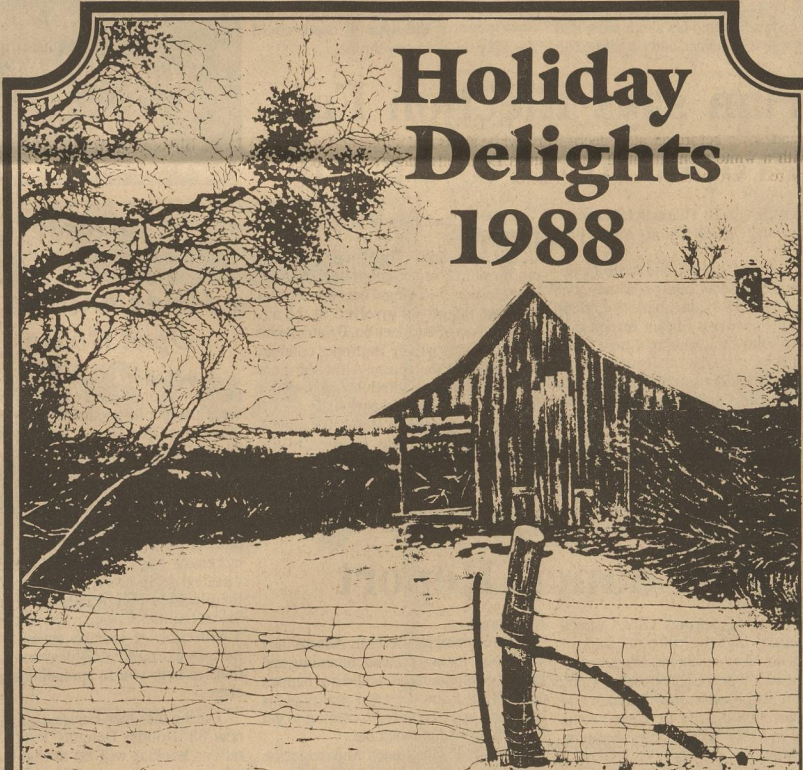

copy of Barnhill's petition, Brian and his attorney, Carroll Cobb of Lubbock, said Monday:

- Brian admits the allegations concerning the lack of enforcement of provisions of the election code prohibiting loitering or electioneering within 100 feet of the polling place, and that election officials did not properly mark or define the boundaries beyond which no loitering or electioneering could occur.

- Otherwise, Brian "denies each and every, all and singular the allegations contained in the Contestant's original petition and demands proof thereof."

- Brian said he would show the court that the actions complained of by Barnhill -- "if, in fact, such actions did occur" -- would not affect the true outcome of the election due to the overwhelming margin of votes between the parties."

Brian also maintains that the election

was conducted "fairly and properly and that there was no fraud or illegal conduct on the part of the election officials." And, he says in his response, if election officials did make mistakes in the conduct of the election, those mistakes were minimal and would not effect the outcome of the election.

His response requests the court to dismiss Barnhill's challenge and declare the outcome of the election to be "in accordance with the canvass of votes by the Commissioners Court."

With the filing of Brian's response, sources say, the court must hear the case within five days.

According to Ben Gillespie, Editor of the Crosby County News, the Court has set a hearing date of December 21 in the 72nd District Court in Crosby County.

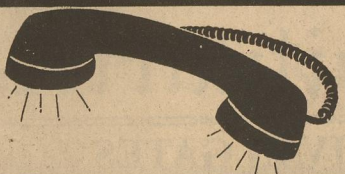

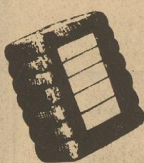


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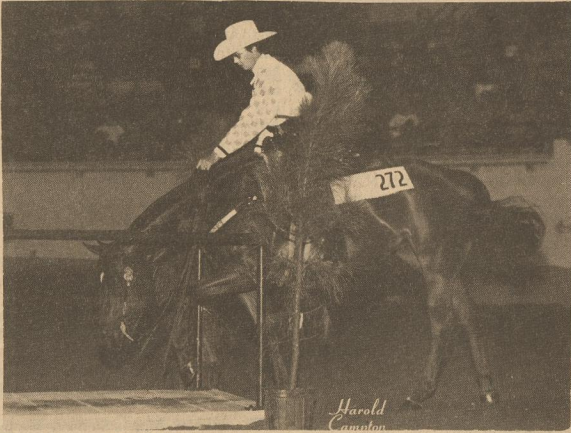

## Flomot Duo Captures 8th At World Championship Quarter Horse Show

Wayde Clay and her sorrel quarter horse, Jackie Little Star, are a team. A close relationship, born of daily workouts and competition in 65 horse shows over the last two years, bonds the Flomot duo. In their best performance to date, the team placed eighth in the Trail Class competition of the World Championship Quarter Horse Show at the Oklahoma State Fair Grounds, November 10-13.

Over 2,148 equestrians from Canada, Great Britain, West Germany, Australia, and the U.S. competed for honors and awards in nineteen different arena classes set up by the American Quarter Horse Association.

All categories of competition are aimed at showcasing the athletic ability, the good disposition, the intelligence, and the speed of the quarter horse, at work or play.

The Trail class involves the ability to handle obstacles that might be encountered on a trail, including a gate to be opened, passed through, and closed from horseback, at least four logs ridden over, and an "ell" course backed through. The rider provides cues to the horse by rein, leg pressure, or hand cues.

Besides bringing home an 8th in Trail, the equestrienne and her mount captured thirteenth in Western Riding, a class designed to measure a horse's ability to carry a rider through usual ranch chores, on trails and in open country. A swinging gate, a log, and a complicated course marked by plastic cones provides an opportunity to judge the horse in three

gaits, changes of leads, and responses to the rider.

Though in the arena it is one on one, as Wayde in her modest but candid manner will tell you, the road to the World Show began long ago and has included the support of many people along the way. Perhaps the beginning was her father, Wade Martin, who believed his baby girl tomboy "sat a horse the best I ever saw" and sent her off on "Old Dutch" to do chores.

The interest in showing was honed during daughter Debbie's high school years when mother and daughter hit the quarter horse shows hard, and very successfully too, as a den full of trophies testifies. Wayde, never competing then, served as backup support. Today her husband Ronald fills that role, keeping the road equipment in good repair, taking over the driving when Wayde "burns out," giving the encouragement that "You can do it!" and even orchestrating applause in the stands at the finals.

The challenges of competing and of showing the horse to the very best of her capability while making lasting friendships with people of similar interests are the intangible rewards for the last three years of hard work. But Jackie Little Star has her own story. Raised by Ronnie Welch of Tulsa, she was sold to a geologist in Odessa. Falling on hard times, the owner was unable to provide properly for his horses. The sorrel looked pretty rough and even lacked the energy to trot when

Wayde first saw her. Convinced by a friend, trainer Buddy Fisher of Snyder, that the horse just needed "a few groceries" and was exactly what she was looking for, Wayde bought the horse for a very good price.

The right kind of food (which includes a concoction of wheat bran, oats, corn, and herbs which Wayde cooks on the kitchen stove) with riding and exercise and a good home turned the horse around, now beautiful and sleek. With advice and encouragement from Jackie's original trainer, Susan Bruner of Odessa, Wayde and Jackie began competing.

Last year the mare was named the top Texas Amateur State Champion Trail Horse at the Abilene show out of 400

possibilities; 4th in the nation for Amateur High Point Trail Horse; 6th in the nation for World Champion Sr. Trail Horse; 7th in the nation for High Point Trail; and Amateur Register of Merit by the American Quarter Horse Assn.

Not the type to rest on their laurels, Waydetta Clay and Jackie Little Star, are already looking to the near future, mapping out strategies and shows to attend, possibly including the Ft. Worth Fat Stock Show in January, to build points for next year's World Champion Show. And the distant future? Well, there's this grandkid by the name of Wade Arrington up in Canadian--he just might be ready for a world class horse by the time Wayde retires.

## Farm Program Receives \$500,000 Grant

LUBBOCK -- The U.S. Secretary of Agriculture has designated the Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program at Texas Tech University as their lenders. The program has received a \$500,000 federal grant to partially fund operations in the 1989 fiscal year.

Borrowers and lenders are settling debts as required by the Agricultural Credit Act of 1987. This legislation requires the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), the Federal Land Bank Associations (FLBAs) and the Production Credit Association (PCA) to restructure distressed loans if restructuring is a less costly alternative than foreclosure.

FmHA has sent notices to borrowers who are more than 180 days late on their payments. These notices inform the borrowers that they have 45 days to decide whether they wish to try to restructure their debt and to prepare all necessary paperwork or to prepare for foreclosure.

Officials of the Texas Agricultural

Loan Mediation Program will act as mediators between the borrowers and lenders upon request by either party.

"We're only here to serve as facilitators," said Gary Condra, director of the program and faculty member in the agricultural economics department at Texas Tech. "We're not judges, juries or advocates. We're just a neutral third party trying to make a deal possible."

Condra said the priority of the program is to negotiate a compromise that will bring the lender as much money as possible and keep the farmer on the farm.

After borrowers receive their letters from the FmHA they should call as soon as possible the Texas Agricultural Loan Mediation Program office at (806) 742-1949 or (806) 742-1969. They will then be advised of the paperwork and financial statements necessary for mediation assistant who will help prepare the borrowers' farm and home plan and application for servicing options from FmHA. A \$250 user fee is required for the service.

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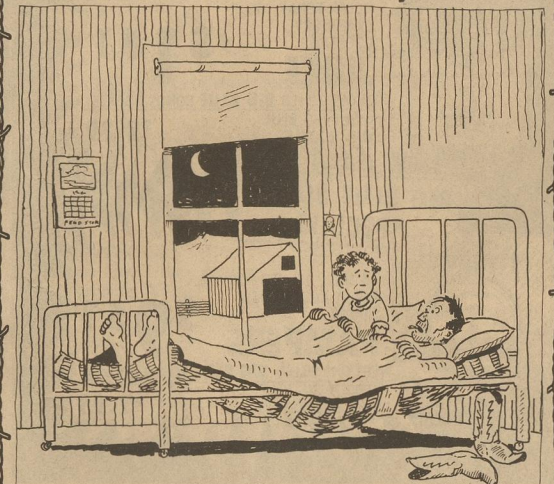
