## Commissioners Accept Resignations From Library Board Members

Commissioners Court met Monday, December 12, 1988 with Judge Billy J. Whitaker, Commissioners, John M. Russell, Bill D. Washington, Joseph "Gid" Simpson, Fraiser Watson and also attending Franklin Jameson.

Clerk Lucretia Campbell read the minutes and were approved.

The bills were received as read and approved to be paid with the Court noting the cost of the new bridge in Precinct I is \$5,926, to date.

Judge Whitaker read a letter of resignation from Earlyne Jameson, member of the Motley County Library Board, with a suggestion of Darla Gwinn to replace her on the board. He also read a resignation of the same board by J.E. Edwards and his suggestion of Forrest Campbell as his replacement. The court elected to regretfully accept these resignations and gladly accept the replacements.

Judge Whitaker read a letter from the Texas Highway Department, that they would conduct a off road bridge inspection in January of 1989.

The Judge read bonds to be approved for elected county officials new and old for January 1, 1989. Court approved.

Jacky Hill of Business Records of Dallas explained he had the exact count of Oil and Gas Record Books and Deed Record Books that needed to be micro-filmed and reproduced, twenty-eight Oil and Gas Books and two deed books. He also explained in reproduction they made the books smaller and put two of the present books into one book for added

shelf space. Hill said an offer of \$4,650.00 for the 30 books was only good until Dec. 31, 1988. The Court asked Clerk Campbell if this was needed. Campbell stated these Oil and Gas books were used alot and were large and hard to handle and that all the shelf space was used up and they needed to do something but it wasn't urgent yet.

After discussion the court elected to accept this bid if Mr. Hill would send a letter stating the company policy on ownership of these records as follows: The micro-film and all copies of these records are the property of Motley County only and only the officials of the Motley County Courthouse have access to these records in the Business Records of the Dallas Office.

Charlie Long, a partner with Russell-Deaton Insurance of Paducah wanted to know if their company could get on the bid list for the county insurance coverage and bond insurance.

Russell and Clerk Campbell explained that in recent years the Texas Association of Counties had gotten the bids. The court said they would send him bid requests in the future. In years past the local agencies received all the bids but the TAC had most of the coverage now along with Pipkin Insurance Agency, a local agency who got the courthouse and contents insurance bid. Long stated he just wanted a chance to have a slice of the action in the future.

Roger Hoffman of the Springs Ranch Estates had a request of the court's to

review the new survey plot map and a petition to approve the corrected boundaries for the Estates. Hoffman explained they were getting everything in order to start selling lots after the first of the year. The Court approved this request.

The reports were read after the lunch break with the J.P. collecting for November \$4,011.00.

Gary Smith of McLarty, Smith Meyer Architects AIA, opened the following bids for the construction of the handicap elevator, restrooms and parking; All Texas Builders, interior bid \$145,186.00, exterior bid \$9,560.00 and alternate work \$700.00; LDC Construction interior bid

\$104,309.00, exterior bid \$5,755.00, alternate work \$1,300; Pharr Construction, interior \$109,600.00, exterior \$6,320.00, alternate work \$1,140.00; Wardrop and Associates, interior \$116,377.00, exterior \$11,980.00, alternate work \$1,000.

Smith explained to the Court they would take all the bids and requirement papers and go over them and let the court know of the contractor selection.

Smith also informed the court that the contractor would order the custom made elevator and then come to do the work, this could be 3-4 more months.

Bill Washington had received a letter from Dr. Carpenter of the Extension Service of Bryan stating the only price requirement for an agents salary was \$5,000 and other experiences required were to the discretion of the County.

Meeting adjourned.

## Lady Matadors Down Valley And Win Jackrabbit Classic In A Great Week of Basketball

Last week was very productive for the Lady Matadors. They journeyed to Valley to take on the Patriots last Tuesday. The Lady Mats outscored the Lady Patriots 53-23. Kathy Mangram was the leading scorer with 19 points. She was followed by Joely Ewings 10; Chandra Brown, 8 Yulanda Campbell, 8; Leigh Barton, 2; Brandi Barton, 2; and Paige Williams with 2. Leigh Barton led the team in rebounds with 9. Chandra Brown had a brilliant game at point guard, gathering 5 assists to lead the team in that category. The entire team played excellent defense with Paka Barton, Cindy Shorter and Regina Cruse contributing outstanding hustle.

On Friday the Lady Mats traveled to Ralls for the first round of the Jackrabbit

Classic. The young ladies played extremely well throughout the tournament and earned the championship trophy by defeating Crosbyton 58 to 47 in the first game, Lorenzo 64-48 in the Semi-final game, and Shallowater 60-42 in the Championship game. The Lady Mats played outstanding team defense throughout the tournament. Chandra Brown led the team with 9 steals in the 3 games. Joely Ewing had 8 steals during the tournament. Kathy Mangram put on a magnificent offensive performance by scoring a total

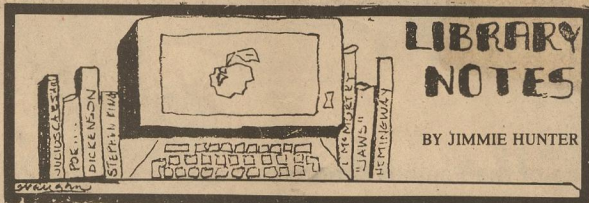

In last week's column, I inadvertently omitted the donation in memory of Mrs. Ben Keltz made by Mrs. Beulah Jameson, Mr. and Mrs. Jodie Jameson, and Mr. and Mrs. H.R. Jameson. I apologize for this omission.

Would you believe that on cold, snowy Thursday we had a visitor to the library from Pearl City, Hawaii? It was Thomas E. Walton, IV. I was out on business at the time, so I didn't get to visit with him or N. Scott Pipkin of Dallas, Texas.

Last month 198 adult books, 3 young adult, 125 children's books, 120 paperbacks, 3 periodicals, and 7 Spanish books equaled the 424 pieces of circulated material. There were 11 Interlibrary Loan Requests, 4 films shown to 68 people, 17 computer users for 10 hours of computer use, 2 videos shown at school to 59 people, 8 reference questions asked, 8 reference questions filled, 49 overdue books, and \$144.35 collected for book fines and copies, and 17 new books put into circulation.

Approximately 16 people enjoyed the films about Austria, and picked up some of the nice, colorful brochures about the country that Mrs. L.J. Barkley furnished for our information and entertainment Friday night. It would be hard to pick a favorite from the three films, AUSTRIA, SPANISH RIDING SCHOON AND SYMPHONIC AUSTRIA. Some of the comments I heard as people left were, "Austria must be the most beautiful place in the world." "I certainly appreciate her doing this for us." "That was so interesting!" We appreciated the additional information that Mrs. Barkley could add and

the answers to our questions between films as much as during the films. Thank you, Eva, for a delightful evening at the Library.

The two latest books to be added to our collection from WTLS funds are The Rough Rider, by Jack Cummings, and A Different Kind of Christmas, by Alex Haley.

I hope all the children have recovered from the Chicken Pox in time to bring their parents or baby-sitters to our Library School Christmas party on December 20th.

## PARENTING FOR AN ENJOYABLE CHRISTMAS

COLLEGE STATION - This time of year the magazines are filled with pictures of clean, beautifully dressed, calm, smiling children happily playing with their Christmas toys.

That may be one reason why parents become frustrated or even angry when their children fuss, whine or misbehave during holiday celebrations.

"Young children will respond differently to Christmas activities depending on their age," said Dr. Sarah Anderson, a child development expert and mother of three.

"Parents can save themselves a lot of grief by knowing what is normal and predictable behavior from young children and planning their family activities accordingly," she said.

Anderson, who is a family life specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University, suggested parents consider the following:

\* Babies under 12 months can easily feel overwhelmed by too many toys, relatives or foods. Give the baby plenty of rest and time alone with you.

\* Toddlers will be loveable and cute, but not too involved in Christmas. Some toddlers will be fearful of strangers, including visiting relatives. Child-proof your Christmas decorations, since toddlers will want to touch hot lights, pull on electrical cords and handle decorations that arouse their curiosity.

\* Two-year-olds will be excited about the lights and decorations. They can't anticipate, so they can't wait to open gifts or eat the cookies and they may throw tantrums to prove it. Two-year-olds are just likely to play with the box as the toy inside and since they don't share well yet will often hit and grab toys.

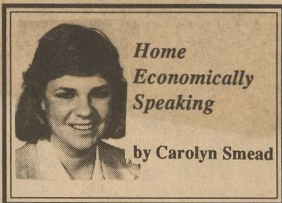
\* Three-year-olds will love gifts, both the box and the gift inside. They're more likely to have a sunny disposition on Christmas and be able to play with other

children. So getting together with relatives may be easier. However, parents will still want to limit the extent of activities. Any three-year-old who has been too excited for too long is capable of fighting and acting out.

\* Four-year-olds can remember well and anticipate activities. They love the holidays, including parties and events, especially if they're not too long. They can participate in decorating and other simple projects in advance of Christmas. In general they should get along with visiting relatives, but may sometimes be rude and uncooperative when tired or overextended.

\* Five-year-olds will show marked improvement in behavior because they are beginning to set their own limits. This is an ideal year to read about Christmas to them. Since they like to help and do things alone, it's also a good year for projects. This may also be the first year for really liking Santa.

Anderson said that wherever a child is developmentally, parents should try to enjoy that stage and let it help determine family activities at holiday time.

### GIFT GIVING FROM THE HEART

This year why not include some thoughtful gifts from your kitchen for the people on your shopping list. There are plenty of delicious and nutritious holiday food ideas; here are a few:

Homemade bread is a welcome gift at any time of the year. Make mini loaves and experiment with varieties of whole wheat and other grains such as rye and graham. Small loaves of quick breads such as banana and cranberry are another good gift idea.

Make your own gourmet vinegars by adding herbs to plain vinegar. Put in a big sprig of dill or tarragon and then seal into bottles. This is an easy but unique gift that

other cooks will enjoy.

Colorful jars of reduced sugar jams, jellies, and applesauce are also gift possibilities for those who enjoy canning. Try experimenting with chutneys (fruit and nut combinations) or pepper jelly to add to your standard repertoire of preserves.

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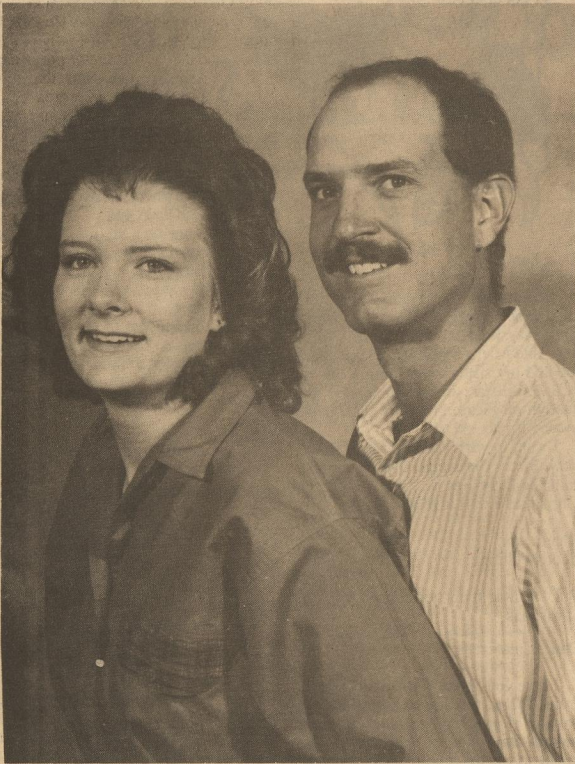
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## Engagement Announced

# Society News

## El Progreso Club Holds Annual Christmas Tea

El Progreso Club met Thursday afternoon, Dec. 8, 1988 in the beautifully holiday decorated home of Mrs. W.F. (Judine) McCaghren. This is one day in particular the group enjoys the meeting and delicious, fancy refreshments provided by the hostess and tea committee, this year composed of Mrs. J.E. (Marge) Edwards, Mrs. E.A. (Dorothy) Day and Mrs. Harold (Grace) Campbell.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. Joe (Loys) Campbell, who, after the business had been taken care of, presented Mrs. John (Josephine) Hamilton, leader for the day. Mrs. Hamilton read the caption at the heading of the printed program as follows: "Now gay trees rise before your eyes, Abloom with tempting cheer; Blithe voices sing-sing, and Blithe bells ring for Christmastide is here!!! from an Old Carol. Mrs. Hamilton then introduced Mrs. Furman (Beverly) Vinson who presented variations of Twas the Night Before Christmas. She read the original tale as first read to the family of Clement Clarke Moore in December 1823. In a biographical sketch of Mr. Moore, Mrs. Vinson told of his birth in 1779 in New York City. He was the son of Benjamin Moore, a minister, and Charity Clarke Moore. He was a poet, scholar, educator, professor or Biblical

Learning and professor emeritus in 1850 after having taught Oriental and Greek Literature from 1823 until 1850. He was also a member of the Knickerbocker School which was made up of writers such as James Fenimore Cooper, Washington Irving and William Cullen Bryant. He was quite a writer and teacher. The Visit From St. Nicholas was first printed in 1848 but appeared anonymously in the Troy N.Y. Sentinel in Dec. 1823. It has been adapted many times in the motion picture and television industry. It was set to music by Ken Darby in 1942 and later a very popular version was recorded by Fred Waring. At this time Mrs. Vinson played a part of this recording to show the audience how tuneful it was.

Clement Moore was an only child and spent days with all the advantages that the position and wealth of his parents could afford. He was tutored by his father in the ancestral home of Chelsea House. In 1798 he graduated at the head of his class as master of Oriental and Classic Literature, at nineteen was fluent in French, Hebrew, Italian, Greek and Latin. He was a skilled violinist and organist, a published poet and had displayed considerable architectural talent. Clement Moore died July 10, 1863 and with the rest of the family was reinterred in Trinity Church Cemetery on Upper Broadway, Manhat-

tan. There is an annual pilgrimage made by children on Christmas Eve to leave gifts for the under-privileged on Clement Moore's grave and to listen to the minister read aloud. A Visit from St. Nicholas. Over 40 editions of The Night Before Christmas are on record in the Library of Congress, many decorated by world famous illustrators.

After the biographical information of the author Mrs. Vinson read three other variations of the tale; Merry Christmas, Amigos: another by Leon A. Harris, Jr. adding a note of humor to the season and found in a children's book; the final one called a new version, 'Twas the Night Before Jesus Came...

Mrs. Hamilton read the Inspirational Thought for the day, "I Sought The Path To Christmas," "I journeyed once on a wintry way to seek the path where Christmas lay. I say the glow of a distant star, heard temple bells, both near and far. I followed the mirthful song of laughter, when beauty fled, I hurried after. I trudged, foot-sore, up a rocky hill - the night was long, the air was still. I knelt to warm a frozen bird; I shared my bread where hunger stirred. I gave loves' gift, saw hope's dream start, and I found Christmas in my heart." She then read the Christmas recess with audience participation, The Psalms 117.

The President then asked all to read the New Year's Punch Recipe from the yearbook in unison. It was a heart-warming way to end the year's work with thoughts of looking forward to the coming year.

Mrs. Harold Campbell presided at the coffee service serving hot spiced tea or coffee with guests helping themselves to the many fancy and delicious sweets and "goodies" from the table which had been spread with a Christmas tablecloth made by Mrs. McCaghren. ## The Hidden Costs Of The Holidays

COLLEGE STATION -- Keeping track of the money you spend on the holidays this year may be one of the best gifts you can give yourself for 1989.

"Many people never get a handle on what the holidays really cost them," said Nancy Granovsky, an expert on family budgeting.

"Every year they have trouble stretching the paycheck to the end of December and wind up with credit card bills they can't pay off in January."

"Even in families where they plan ahead for major gift expenses, it's easy to get caught short by the other hidden costs," she said.

According to Granovsky, who is a family economics specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, getting a grip on holiday expenses involves knowing how much you spend for the following:

- \* Gifts you buy and the cost of materials or ingredients for gifts you make.
- \* The cost of food and liquor for parties at home; feeding visiting relatives or friends; taking foods to parties or pot-lucks; the cost of ingredients for Christmas baking.
- \* Tickets to events; hair styling and new clothes to attend events.
- \* Special contributions made at church

or to charities.

- \* Indoor or outdoor decorations; replacement bulbs; Christmas tree.
- \* Wrapping, cards and postage.

\* Gasoline and food away from home for shopping trips; travel expenses of visiting friends and relatives.

Many holiday expenses don't seem extraordinary, especially when they're mixed in with other items, such as normal grocery shopping. But they do add up to significant amounts of money, said the specialist.

"By keeping receipts or making a list of all holiday expenses you can get an idea of actual costs and plan ahead for next year," she said.

One strategy for financing the holidays is to save a portion of the total cost

each month. Another method is to shift some of the expenses to other months by, for example, buying gifts throughout the year or stocking the pantry in October and November.

"Any strategy for planning holiday spending can help people avoid over-extending themselves on credit," said Granovsky.

Since finance charges on credit spending are not longer totally tax deductible, the specialist said families will also be money ahead when they finance the holidays on their own.

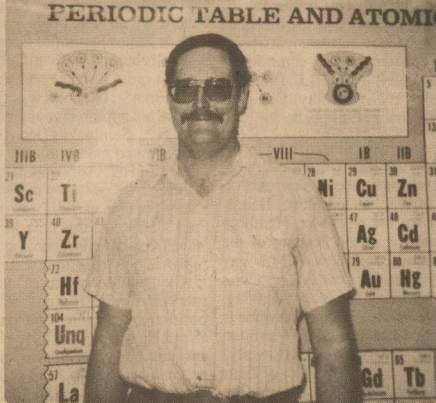

## Social Security Tips

Are you in financial need and age 65 or older? Maybe you are eligible for monthly supplemental security income (SSI) payments. This is a Federal program that makes case payments to persons in financial need who are aged, blind, or disabled. If you are a blind person whose vision is less than 20/200 with the use of correcting lens in the better eye, or you have tunnel vision of 20 degrees or less, you should apply for SSI payments if you don't own much or have much income. There is no minimum or maximum age limit for blind or disabled people. If you are unable to engage in substantial gainful activity because of a physical or mental impairment that can be expected to last at least 12 months, or can result in death, you should apply for SSI payments. This program makes monthly payments to disabled persons regardless of age. A child under age 18 is eligible if he or she suffers from an impairment comparable to one which would prevent an adult from engaging in substantial gainful activity. SSI is administered by the Social Security Administration and is financed from the general funds of the U.S. Treasury, not from the Social Security or Medicare trust funds. Applications for SSI are handled by Social Security offices. There are rules to know if a person or a couple is in "financial need." For example, an eligible individual or couple cannot have countable income in excess of the maximum SSI payment for individuals or couples. In 1988, the payment for an individual is \$354 a month, and for a couple, \$532. Some might get less than the maximum if they have income from other sources, and some might get more if their States add money to the Federal payment. We consider as income a Social Security check, any salary, pensions, or any money received, as well as housing, clothes, and food paid by another person in your behalf. If you are a single person and your income is less than \$354 a month, or if you are married and your income is less than \$532 a month, some SSI money may be paid. In addition to the income limitation, an individual cannot have resources in excess of \$1,900 and a couple cannot have resources of more than \$2,850. These limits rise to \$2,000 for an individual and \$3,000 for a couple in 1989. Resources are mainly savings and checking accounts, bonds, stocks, life insurance, a car in certain situations, real and personal property. Funds set apart to be used for the funeral and burial of an individual and his or her spouse are limited to \$1,500 each. Not all income and resources are counted. There are some exclusions and exemptions that reduce the countable earned or unearned income and resources used to determine both eligibility and the amount of SSI payments. So, if you are a citizen of the United States, or an alien lawfully admitted for permanent residence, and you think you are not eligible for SSI payments because of your income or resources, get in touch with a Social Security office. Ask them to explain the income and resource rules. They will be glad to tell you whether you are eligible for supplemental security income. For more information or to file a claim call 1-800-2345-SSA.

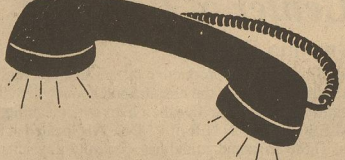

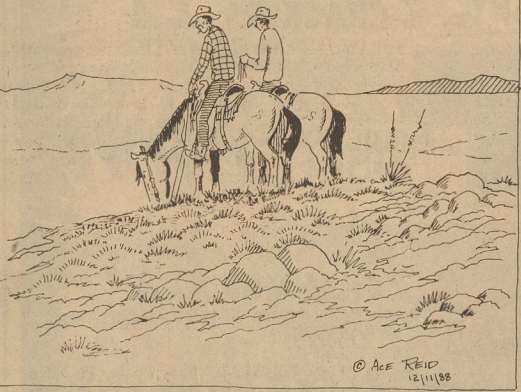

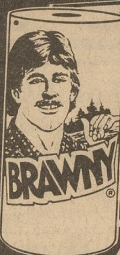
