Write-In Candidates Upset Roaring Springs Election

The City of Matador had one upset of an incumbent Saturday with L.J. Barkley Jr., won over John Briscoe, 117-115. Doyle Rose held his position on the council with 118 votes and the unopposed Mayor Gary L. Lancaster had 161 votes out of the 188 ballots counted.

Roaring Springs had two surprises in their election results with Devonne Dillard and Bill Moose both write-ins, winning seats on the City Council. Dillard with 60 votes,

and Moose with 46. Incumbent Anne Sands received 24, Harold Brantley 27, and Stacy Reid 24. The unopposed Mayor Eugene Watson received 63 votes out of 100 ballots



Roaring Springs To Receive Money For Water Line

The Roaring Springs City Council met Tuesday, May 3 at 7:30 p.m. in the City Hall with Mayor Eugene Watson, Councilmen Joey Thacker, Brannon and Charlie Long, City Secretary Anna Wilson and City Water Superintendent Regan Holley, attending.

First on the agenda was Karen King representing SPAG to explain Marginal Money of \$90,215.00 from the Texas Department of Commerce plus a 25% match of \$22,554.00 for a total of \$112,769.00. This grant will cover part of the grant application the City applied for last year to lay new

4" and 6" water lines.

Jamie Johnson of Ober J. Engineering explained that with this grant they could do more than half of the original grant applied for. The Council voted to accept this money. The 25% will be raised through revenue bonds.



MOLD ON WALLS

In the more humid parts of Texas, mold can be a real problem - even

Mold grows because conden sation is occuring as a result of high humidity and low surface temperatures. Furniture, pictures cabinets and other objects mounted exterior walls can act as insulation. This causes the surfaces behind these objects to be cooler than exposed surfaces.

If the humidity is high enough,

the temperature of the walls behin point, resulting in condensatior Mold grows when enough moistur is available to germinate bacteri

on these surfaces.
The immediate solution is to move furniture away from outside walls remove pictures, and open cabine doors. You may also want to use a small fan to circulate air behind furniture or through closets.

Another tactic is to reduce humidity by increasing ventilation Operate the kitchen and bathroon exhaust fans whenever moisture is being produced. After a shower the bathroom exhaust fan shoulc

run for 30 minutes.

The long term solution to mole buildup is to improve the insulation in your exterior walls. If this isn't feasible, humidity control and good air circulation should keep the problem from recurring.

The Way It Was

I remember the barn red board fence around the Court House. There were stiles, so people could go over the fence. On the north side of the Court House was a windmill and a concrete trough where the stock watered. Also there were hitching racks in several places.

On the west side of the square

on the west side of the square the Hutto's operated a cafe. They served family style meals. There was a dinner bell, mounted out front, which was rung when the meal was ready to serve. Jim Orr had a cafe on the south side of the square. One day Mr. Hutto was ringing the bell, when a dog began ringing the bell, when a and began to howl. Jim came to the door and yelled "Shut up you so and so, you don't have to eat it."

When we started attending school in the old red brick school, in east Matador, I would look through the window on the couth and watch

the window on the south and watch Mr. Wheeler driving his gray horses, going and coming from the Depot. Also I watched Gordon Hodges driving his Model T truck filled with fifty gallon drums of gasoline which he loaded and unloaded by hand. People marveled that he was so strong.

My dad bought the last buggy that was sold in Motley County, which Sadie, Mary and I drove to school. In extremely cold weather, our mother would heat bricks and wrap them to put to our feet.

In 1914 the railroad was completed and the train came to Matador. Along with it came the Molly Bailey Circus and Carnival. There was a picnic that lasted three days with free barbecue. There were political speeches. Ed Russell Sr. and Newt Gaines were running for Sheriff. Mr. Russell made one of the shortest speeches I ever heard. He said, "If you will elect me Sheriff I wil do like I have 'allus' done." Then he sat down. He brought the house down. Also he won the election.

There was a Prize Fight by Lon (Chick) Russell and Cliff Sluder. They put on a good show. Cliff Sluder was the winner. Everyone took in the Circus, and

we all enjoyed the Trapeze acts.

We rode the first train out of Matador to Roaring Springs and

When I was ten years of age I got my first Barber Shop haircut from Henry Pipkin. When he was through I looked in the mirror and was proud of my haircut. I walked down the street, looking back to see if the girls

ere looking back at me. Our grandad Edmondson came to Motley County in 1891 in a covered wagon with his family. He also brought a herd of cattle and horses. There was a blizzard and the cattle drifted south with the wind. They were scattered all over the country, as there were no fences. They drifted as far south as Anson and the double mountains. Very few of them were found.

1892 grandad Edmondson and family were in the group that organized the Church. They met

under a cottonwood tree at the Ballard Creek site, on land now belonging to Mrs. Ed Lee (Winifred), which is located northeast of Matador. He supervised the erection of the first Mathedist. Church building in Methodist Church building in

Grandad's family was a singing family and they were in the group when the Motley County Singing Convention was organized. He was one of the early song leaders for the church. He was quite a character. He enjoyed wearing good clothes. He would dress and go to town. He drove a Hines Buggy (it was the Cadillac of buggies) and a pair of high stepping Bay Trotters. He would go to town every morning to visit around town, argue the Bible and spend the day. A little before sundown he would start home. Those horses were wanting to go home. They could trot so fast it would make the buggy tires sing. He would drive up to the gate when he got home and would take out his pocket watch that he carried on a gold chain and say "twelve minutes flat." Then he would call to his son Jim and say "come put up the

One afternoon there was a family gathering in the back yard at grandad's house. There was a bucket of water with a dipper, under the shade of a tree. I was thirsty and I filled the dipper with water and I held it over the bucket letting the water drip off my chin into the bucket. I thought that was the proper thing to do. Grandad saw me and yelled "get away from that bucket or I'll jerk a knot in your tail." I wondered how he could do it, but I did not doubt that he could. I was scared half to death.

In 1929 there was a theater building (where Bill Durham's Barber Shop is), owned and operated by Tom Kennedy. One night Bill Pipkin, Opal Estes, Vera Sheppard and myself were Sheppard and myself were attending the movie. While we were there a fire broke out in the projection room. The acrid odor from the burning film was almost unbearable, we were coughing, eyes watering. Everyone made a break for the front entrance as there was a full house. We feared we could not get out. So we four made a run for the back door to find it chained and locked. There was a 20x24 inch glass in the top part of the door, which I knocked out with my fist. Bill was the smallest so he got out first. The women came next with Bill pulling and I was pushing. We finally got them out. By that time my eyes were watering so badly. So I barely made it through the small opening.

After we had gotten out of the building we could hear "Carolina

Moon" being played.

There was one man in Matador for whom I held in "highest regard."
His name was Mitchel Glen. He had a profound influence on my life. He established the first Ford Dealership in the county in 1913. He told me this story: As in the Great Depression, almost every bank in the country





SPEAK OUT AGAINST **BACK-ROOM POLITICS**

In a decision that brings the make-filled room back to Texas politics, the Democratic county chairmen in the 30th Senatorial District have decided to name a nominee for the November General Election next week instead of waiting to see who the voters want.

The county chairmen will name the nominee for the seat of former Sen. Ray Farabee, D-Wichita Falls, who resigned in February to take a job with the University of Texas System. State law gives the county chairmen the right and responsibility to do it.

Part of the problem is the timing of a special election Gov. Bill Clements set for Aug. 13 to elect a senator to serve until Jan. 1. Clements, a Republican, obviously set the special election so late to allow the Republican candidate, Bobby Albert of Wichita Falls, to some name recognition. Democratic county chairmen say they would be pressed for time to make their selection if they waited that long.

Democrats seeking the senatorial seat are Helen Farabee (Sen. Farabee's wife) of Wichita Falls; Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday, Texas; and Rep. Steve Carriker of Roby, Texas. Because Mrs. Farabee is from the only urban county in the district and her opponents are from rural areas, she has little chance of winning the nomination unless county chairmen decide to vote for the candidate getting the most votes in the special election.

We are dismayed at the county chairmen's decision not to wait, but we are not surprised.

We are not surprised because - in this case - the election code gave rural county chairmen the advantage and they chose to use it. They have the advantage because every county has only one chairman and one vote regardless of its population. The 400 residents of King County get just as much say in who the nominee will be as the 125,000 residents of Wichita

Rural county chairmen, who are accustomed to seeing Wichita County delegates dominate senatorial district caucuses when delegates are apportioned according to number of Democratic voters, naturally want to have the upper hand when they can get it. But is it in the best interest of the

people of the 30th District and the Democratic Party?

No it is not. The chairmen will

make their choice for the November ballot next week without knowing and apparently without caring -who the majority of Democratic

Though it is entirely legal, it is an

But it is not too late. The county chairmen plan to vote May 14/We urge Democrats who want to have voice in the selection of the November nominee to contact their county chairmen and let them know about it. Perhaps they will see reason and make the right decision.

SMALL GRAINS HOLD SPOTLIGHT AT CHILLICOTHE FIELD DAY

The importance of wheat and other small grains to the livestock producer, the American consumer and the economy of the Rolling Plains will be highlighted here Thursday, May 19, at the field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Field tours of the station's research projects and a variety of exhibits and demonstrations of interest to both producers and homemakers will be on the program, said Dr. Earl C. Gilmore resident director of research. The station is reached by turning south on FM 91 at Chillicothe, following FM 91 until it intersects with FM 392 and continuing south on FM 392 for

The day will begin with registration at 9 a.m. At 9:30 a.m., Gilmore and Ed Garnett, district director with the Texas Agricultural Experiment

Station, will introduce guests.
Keynote speaker Dr. Neville P.
Clarke, director of the Texas
Agricultural Experiment Station, will discuss that agency's role in the changing agricultural environment

Dr. Bill Pinchak, assistant professor of range animal nutrition with the experiment Station, will report on wheat grazing management research being conducted on the W.T. Waggoner ranch.

Visitors then will be taken on trailer tours of the research plots. At the first of three major stops on the tour, Extension Service agronomist U.U. Alexander will evaluate small grain varieties being tested.

At the next stop, Stephen Caldwell, research associate in the wheat breeding program, will discuss a study of seeding rates of wheat varieties. Research on fertilization and cropping systems involving small grains will be presented by Dr. Ed Clark, Experiment Station agronomist and station coordinator.

Exhibits and displays will focus upon nutritional uses of wheat; wheat weaving; and Extension computer program which analyzes the nutritional value of a person's menu, and a video presentation by the Oklahoma Wheat Commission.

Following a catered lunch, new research and shop facilities at the station will be toured during an open house.




