## Ordination Service for the Pastor held Sunday at First Baptist Church

Services Sunday morning at the First Baptist Church fulfilled a longtime vocational objective to become a pastor in a Southern Baptist Church, when Stacy Conner was ordained as pastor by this church, an office he has been filling for eight months here. He was licensed to the Ministry in January of 1981 by the First Baptist Church at Slaton. The interim years were spent receiving and completing his education to preach.

Participating in the Ordination were members of the Board of Deacons, with special charges of responsibility by Dr. Fred Meeks, Professor of Theology, Wayland Baptist University, Plainview and Dr. Floyd Bradley, also of Plainview, Director of Missions for the Caprock-Plains Baptist Area.

Prayer by Larry Hoyle opened the service, which he followed with announcements and recognitions, including a letter of commendation from Rev. Robert Moore, pastor of the Slaton First Baptist Church. Rev. Moore praised Conner for his dedication in pursuing and attaining his goal, and congratulated this church for having secured him as pastor.

The meaning of "ordination" was detailed by Stuart Dixon, former chairman of deacons who said, "We are doing here today what has been done by the (New Testament) church almost from the beginning, when the disciples of Jesus Christ asked for help in their 'ministry of the word,' as recorded in the sixth chapter of Acts." He quoted further from the 13th chapter in which Barnabas and Saul were sent forth for special work, and from Titus 1:5 telling of Paul's charge to Titus to "ordain elders in every city."

In his testimony and statement of doctrinal beliefs, Rev. Conner told of his acceptance of Jesus Christ as his personal Saviour at the age of nine, and that he was baptized in the First Baptist Church in Ropesville. "I felt a sense of calling into the ministry when I was in the sixth grade

and have continued to pursue this calling," he said, adding that he preached his first sermon while in high school in Slaton.

"I believe in the infallibility of the bible, and I have received nothing but affirmation in this calling to the pastorate," he said. "The Lord has endowed me with a wonderful wife who also shares in my calling for Pastoral Ministry," he said, referring to his wife, Debbie, and thanked the deacons, church staff and others who have supported them in their ministry here. The Conners have two children Charissa DiAnn, almost 3 years old, and Timothy, 14 months old.

A report of the Ordaining Council was given by Don Ewing, Chairman of the Board of Deacons, who said, "When we became aware that Stacy had not been ordained to the ministry, we decided that it was fitting that we should have this privilege." He also introduced the Ordination speakers, Dr. Meeks who gave the "Charge to the Candidate," and Dr. Bradley, who gave the "Charge to Church." Both speakers stressed the responsibilities involved.

"The Apostle Paul gave a charge to the church at Ephesus which is appropriate today," Dr. Meeks said, quoting from Ephesians 4:11, "And He gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers." He emphasized the charge to preach God's word as found in 2 Timothy, 4:2, "Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season, reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine." He stressed faithfulness in proclaiming the word of God; a calling to moral responsibility in reformation and service to a community; supervision of the church as overseers and a charge to be a good administrator; and motivation to serve, as Paul wrote in Acts 20:35, "I have shewed you all things, how that so labouring ye ought to support the weak, and to remem-

ber the words of the Lord Jesus, how he said, it is more blessed to give than to receive."

In his "Charge to the Church," Dr. Bradley pointed out that even though there is mutual confidence and trust between a pastor and church, the one ordained is not a perfect pastor and neither will the church live up to what he expects. "The air is full of Messianic expectations," he said. "The church is a family affair with a tremendous responsibility to be supportive. As a Family of God, we should be loving and caring, close-knit, calling on one another and praying for one another.

"There will always be mistakes, but as church and pastor you should each be willing to look at these mistakes and still love the other. How you, as a church, love, serve and care for them will remain with the Conners the rest of their lives. I charge this church that you lovingly, kindly and prayerfully serve and grow together."

Ordination Prayer by Kenny Barton was followed by laying on of hands by the membership, led by Chairman Don Ewing; and presentation of a certificate of ordination to the pastor, and a family Bible to his wife. Benediction was by E.A. Day. A hand of fellowship by the congregation concluded the service.

Special music was a solo by Mrs. Don (Carolyn) Ewing, who sang, "Surely the Presence of the Lord is in this Place." Congregation singing was led by Mrs. Larry (Donna) Hoyle, with church organist Mrs. Vann (Sondra) Francis and church pianist Mrs. Stuart (Frances) Dixon at the instruments.

A covered dish luncheon was served in the basement fellowship hall with an invitation to everyone to attend.

In the congregation were the parents of Rev. Conner, Mr. and Mrs. Don Conner of Slaton; Mr. and Mrs. Roger Malone of Dimmitt, parents of Debbie Conner and other visitors from Turkey, Flomot, Floydada, Lubbock and Amarillo.

## Landfil Problems and Solutions

A meeting recently held in Lubbock at the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) building consisted of a panel of professionals speaking on the different aspects of the new landfill regulations and possible solutions.

It is definite these new EPA Rules must be followed within the time limits set up. These laws were passed 10 years ago and we should have been preparing to follow them before now, instead of hoping they would be forgotten. New York and Pennsylvania already have a major solid waste problem and the EPA is trying to keep this from happening in all other states.

Some of the suggested solutions were: Plainview and the Red River Authority are looking into regional landfills, if this is the solution for small communities. They will pay so much a ton for their solid waste to be processed at the landfill. If this is the case, the small communities will have to start a recycling campaign to cut down on tonage.

The market for recyclable material will have to expand, which some material already has a market. Recyclable material is aluminum, tin, glass, heavy metals, plastic, newspaper and tires.

"This is everyones problem and can't be swept under the carpet any longer," was one statement made.

## Top Cooks Named In 4-H Food Show

New ways to prepare and serve some old favorites joined traditional recipes as 191 boys and girls from 21 counties exhibited their nutritional knowledge and cooking skills at the Rolling Plains District 4-H Food Show held in Vernon Saturday, November 4 at the Wilbarger Memorial Auditorium. Four seniors will advance to the State competition next year. Each received a plaque and ribbon in addition to advancing to the State contest. Second place senior winners will participate in the State event if the first place winners can't take part. Intermediate and Junior Division winners also received ribbons and plaques, but do not compete beyond the District level.

Special cash awards, sponsored by the Wichita Falls Area Cattlewomen were also presented to first, second and third place winners in Main Dish, Breads & Cereals and Nutritious Snacks & Des-

serts in which beef was an ingredient.

Participants representing Motley County were: Robin & Rebecca Long, Christie Pierce, Heather Turner, Cathey Perryman, Darryn Perryman, Dusty Whitaker, Tanya Barkley, Josh Palmer and Billy Lefevre.

Each contestant had earned championships in their county to advance to the daylong competition at the District meet. The dishes were judged by panels of professional home economists and 4-H leaders. Contestants were quizzed on nutritional values, preparation methods and costs of preparation.

This show is one aspect of the year-round foods and nutrition project in 4-H.

The project helps youth learn the relationship between science, foods and nutrition, and food preparation, as well as food buying, managing time, use of energy, and food storage and safety.

## Former Vernon Savings and Loan President draws 5-Year Sentence

Former Vernon Savings and Loan president Patrick G. King has been sentenced to five years in prison for using depositors' money to pay prostitutes and cover illegal political contributions.

U.S. District Judge Robert Maloney on Thursday also ordered King to pay \$65,771.44 in restitution to federal thrift regulators.

King, 49, was convicted on 13 counts of 37-count indictment following a three-week trial in August. He is the fourth top thrift executive convicted by a jury as a result of investigations by the Dallas-based Bank Fraud Task Force.

U.S. attorneys, who had recommended a "substantial" sentence, had no comment after the hearing. King faced a maximum 65 years in prison and a \$500,000 fine.

Defense attorney Emmett Colvin said a decision would be made soon on whether to appeal the case. King does not have to report to prison until Nov. 30 and remains free on appeal bond.

Throughout the trial, King's attorneys contended he was unaware of the abuse until after he left in 1987.

After a stint as a trooper, King became the state's No. 2 thrift regulator before joining Vernon Savings in 1984.

The thrift already was in trouble then but remained open until 1987 when federal regulators closed the doors in a \$1.3 billion bailout that at the time was the largest in history.

Vernon Savings frequently is cited as

an example of the worst abuses in the industry, expanding its assets 10-fold through speculative development and construction loans. Depositors' money also was spent on European antique buying sprees.

King is the first Vernon Savings official to be convicted of crimes, although others have entered guilty pleas and testified against him.

Meanwhile, former Vernon Chairman Woody Lemons is scheduled to go on trial Monday on a 13-count indictment stemming from alleged kickbacks from a \$46 million loan. Owner Don Dixon is the target of a federal investigation and a defendant in a \$540 million federal civil fraud lawsuit.

The 13 counts King was convicted of include one charge of conspiracy and two charges such as stemming from six separate instances that he allowed the illegal use of thrift funds, then approved false entries to cover up the true reason for the expenditures.

In two of the instances, King received a total of \$12,000 in false bonuses as reimbursement for his campaign contributions and approved the payment of \$3,000 to another executive. He also allowed a Vernon officer to submit the cost of \$260 limousine rental to cover the officer's donation.

King also was convicted of approving \$1,500 in reimbursement for another Vernon officer for hiring four dancers from Dallas's Million Dollar Saloon to go on a hunting trip with Vernon Savings executives and L. Linton Bowman III, former Texas Savings and Loan Commissioner.

## The Great Plains Conservation Program

The Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) provides landowners a means by which to apply complete conservation systems on the land while obtaining cost-share assistance provided by the USDA Soil Conservation Service (SCS) Funds allocated for the develop-

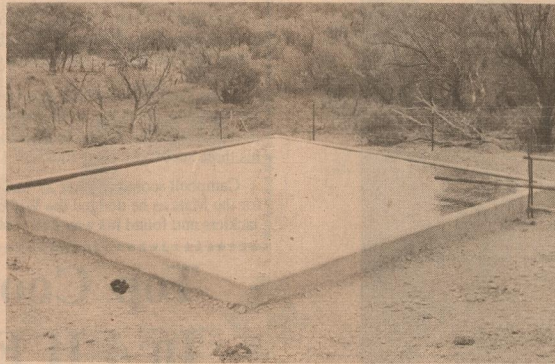
ment of GPCP Contracts are currently available. Landowners interested in more information concerning the GPCP can contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Matador located adjacent to the ASCS office. Landowners should look into this program as a possible means by which to implement conservation plans required by the Food Security Act of 1985 (Farm Bill).

The primary purpose of the Great Plains Conservation Program is to assist landowners with the application and implementation of complete soil and water conservation systems specifically suited

to their own needs and objectives. The length of a GPCP contract may vary from 3 to 10 years. The USDA assists the landowner by paying from 50 or 75 percent of the cost. The landowner then is responsible for paying the remaining 25 to 50 percent of the cost for each practice completed.

Some of the practices most often applied and cost shared are the following: Terraces, Diversions, Stripcropping, Fencing, Livestock Water Storage Facilities, Range Seeding, Pasture Planting, and Brush Control.

To date Motley County currently has twenty landowners and over 12,000 acres participating in the Great Plains Conservation Program. Funding is currently available for the development of new contracts through the USDA SCS. Landowners interested in GPCP should feel free to call or come by and visit with any member of the Matador Field Office Staff. Our phone number is 347-2263. Office hours are from 7:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

## Local 4-H'ers Attend National Safety Congress and Exposition

Rusty Willmon of Afton and Tricia Palmer of Levelland were 4-H delegates to the Youth Sessions of the 1989 National Safety Congress and Exposition, October 28-31 in Chicago, Illinois. Accompanying the 4-H'ers were Billie Willmon, a 4-H adult leader, and Tommy Valco, the farm and ranch safety specialist from Texas A&M University. The event attracted more than 250 youth and their sponsors from 20 states. The feature event was the presentation of awards for excellence in safety programs to youth representing 4-H and other groups.

Rusty and Tricia were selected as delegates from the Texas 4-H organization through their state-winning illustrated talk entitled "Rape Escape," presented in June at the Texas 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University at College Station. In addition to a cash prize, first-place pin and certificate for being the winners in the safety category, the pair also won the partially-funded trip to the National Safety Youth Conference.

The National Safety Congress is designed to broaden safety knowledge, enhance safety techniques and skills, share safety program ideas and train teen and adult leaders to conduct effective safety programs. During the event participants attended workshops on traffic safety, vision safety, off-road vehicle safety, farm, bicycle, and water safety, and burn prevention.

One of the most effective sessions,

entitled "Are Your Friends Controlling Your Life?" addressed the issue of peer pressure and related to safety problems such as drunk driving and accidents related to drug intake. Other sessions related to being "streetwise" in avoiding muggings, rape, and child molestations. As a result of knowledge and skills gained through the conference, Rusty will be glad to share information with youth or adult organizations regarding a variety of safety programs, among which is a workshop on "Stranger Danger," teaching young children effective techniques to prevent abduction or molestation.

American Honda Motor Co., Inc. sponsored the opening banquet of Safety Congress; and Rick Johnson, TEAM HONDA's star Supercross/Motorcross race driver, gave the keynote address.

## County Agent's Comments

### FALL TEMPERATURES IDEAL FOR STOCKING FINGERLINGS

Cooler fall temperatures mark the season to begin stocking catfish fingerlings in farm ponds.

The fingerlings are in good supply this year. The early cool weather is ideal for stocking catfish fingerlings.

"They may be stocked at a rate of 100 to 1,000 per acre, depending on the management level planned. The pH of pond water should be checked, and if necessary corrected, with lime to give a pH above 6.

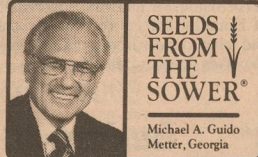
If possible, have the fingerlings delivered by the dealer. Small quantities may

be transported in plastic bags filled with water and oxygen. Avoid rapid changes in water temperature to prevent temperature shock to the fish.

Four-to-six-inch long fingerlings are the most economic to stock. However, eight-to-ten-inch fingerlings reach eating size quickly and are a must if bass are present in the pond.

A list of fish dealers is available from the County Extension office.

## Matador Garden Club Has Program On Navigation of Migrating Birds

The navigation of migrating birds provided interesting subject matter for a conservation program on "Migrating Birds" given by Mrs. Robert Darsey at regular meeting of Matador Garden Club on October 18, at the home of Mrs. W.N. Pipkin.

Mrs. Pipkin, president, called the meeting to order for reading of the minutes of the previous meeting by the secretary, Mrs. Douglas Meador, and a discussion of projects and activities for the month. For the "Yard of the month," the yard of Mr. and Mrs. Elvin Markham, where a profusion of flowers outline the premises, was chosen.

Mrs. W.D. Lipscomb, program leader, presented Mrs. Darsey for her paper on "Migrating Hawks and other birds." With a map of the United States, Mrs. Darsey outlined the flyways and told reasons for the choice of one flyway over another, based on studies by scientists.

"More recently biologists have used radar in observation and study," she said. "Their records indicate geese regularly clear the Himalayan mountains at 29,500 feet. Smaller birds have been observed at 5,000 to 10,000 feet. In our own country the state of Texas is like a great funnel for the migrating birds of the Central Flyways. In spring many will continue to the Northern borders of the continent, some having

flown from South America. As winter approaches, the pattern is reversed."

Migration is a strenuous experience for many species, Mrs. Darsey said, citing dangers posed by migrating raptors, or birds of prey along marshes or beaches inhabited by shore birds and various other riparian waterfowl. Among the migrating raptors she discussed were the European merlins or small hawks and peregrine falcons. "These plunderers have been known to migrate from as far north as Saskatchewan in a flight to Mexico during a period of four months. Many take two months to migrate thousands of miles," she said.

In a study of migratory birds it was also discovered that humming birds traveled as far as Argentina. Another revelation was that sparrows seem to point the way for the migrants, and other information gleaned was that seagulls and other waterfowls signal a rainy season; and the hawk got its name from the sound it makes.

"Birds have always fascinated people," Mrs. Darsey observed. "An unforgettable experience is to hear and see great strands of ducks, geese, sandhill cranes, and possibly a few whooping cranes, on their way north in early spring or moving south ahead of a coming storm in fall. They

stop, rest, eat and drink, and providing food and water for these migrants as they pass through is a great opportunity for homeowners to observe these migrants as they pass through is a great opportunity for homeowners to observe these exotic visitors and at the same time provide a refuge for them."

Mrs. Lipscomb gave a report from the Lone Star Gardener and concluded the program with the yearbook thought: "In the presence of trouble some people grow wings' others buy crutches."
