Cotton Program Figures Offered

The following article is prepared by County Agent Bill Pullmeier to aid cotton producers in making decisions regarding the 1966 cotton program:

Many cotton farmers are wondering which way to go in the 1966 program. There is no set rule to follow, as the outcome depends on production and production costs. For those who wish to figure which is their best way, the following figures can be used to arrive at expected income.

12.5% reduction in allotment. Multiply yield in lbs. per acre times 2581, and add cost of production per acre in dollars times 125.

25% reduction in allotment. Multiply yield in lbs. per acre times 245 and add cost of production per acre in dollars times 25.

35% reduction in allotment. Multiply yield in lbs. per acre times 2345 and add cost of production per acre in dollars times 35.

For total returns multiply the above figures times the total cotton allotment acres, and each will give the expected return in dollars.

Support price is based on middling 1 inch cotton, but this will have no effect on the ratio of returns of the three choices. A farmer should also keep in mind if he diverts cotton acreage, that it can't be grazed until after Nov. 1st, and that the least productive land can be diverted.

To compare the above figures with expected returns if the farmer does not go into the program, multiply 21 times the production in lbs. per acre times the total allotment.

IN AN ACCIDENT seven miles north of Paducah about 2 p.m. Monday, Mrs. John Irwin was seriously injured and her husband rendered in a state of shock. Reports declared the Irwin car struck a late model pickup which had turned across the right lane of travel. The pickup was driven by a Latin American youth.

The Matador couple was taken to Richards Memorial Hospital in Paducah, and Dr. J. S. Stanley was called from here.

Examination revealed that Mrs. Irwin suffered a fractured right wrist, fractured left elbow, multiple fractures in the left lower leg, two cracked ribs and several deep facial lacerations from shattered glass, in addition to bruises.

Mrs. Irwin was later transferred in a Seigler ambulance, to St. Mary's Hospital in Lubbock, where she was to undergo surgery. It was not learned late yesterday whether the surgery had yet been performed.

Mr. Irwin had recovered sufficiently early Tuesday to go to his wife's bedside. A son, John Houston Irwin of Waco, and his sister, Mary Margaret, ACC student in Abilene, came by Paducah and accompanied their father to Lubbock. Another son, Jimmy Irwin, lives in Lubbock.

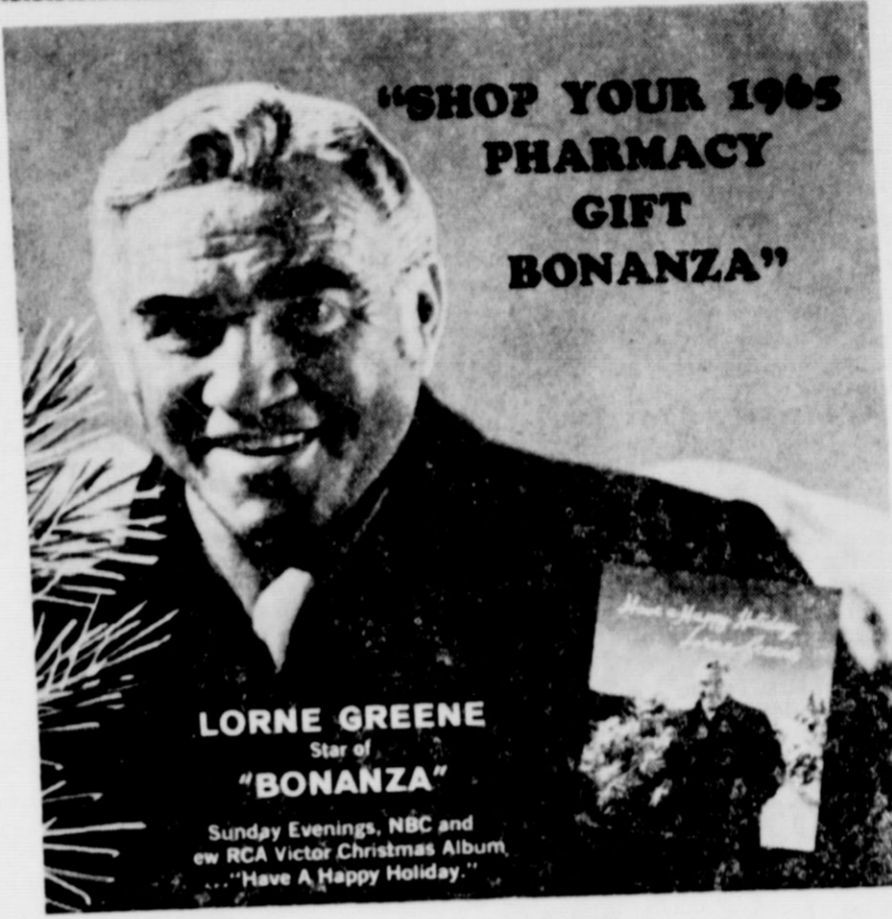

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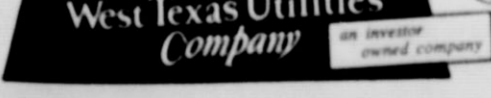

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2. If you want to buy the acreage outright on the same farm, it would be 200x\$25 or \$50 per acre—and this would be the total cost.
3. It will be necessary for you to sign a Power of Attorney Authorization, giving me the Power of Attorney to act and sign for you.
4. A copy of the contract of purchase or lease will be mailed to your bank with a draft on you for 10% of the purchase or lease price and will be put in the sellers' bank as Escrow Monies.
5. The seller will have to sign a contract of specific performance to bind him to deliver the pounds.
6. It will be necessary for the seller to sign the ASC Form 375 and get it approved by his local ASC Committee and his Committee will send it to the ASC Committee in the County that is to receive the cotton and they will have to approve it before any money changes hand, but when you contract, both you and the seller will be bound; so don't sign up unless you are 21 and can stay hitched.
7. The organization that I am associated with will charge a 5% service charge to the buyers for acting as Power of Attorney and the services rendered in securing the cotton. Example: If you leased 100 acres of cotton for \$10 per acre for four years, it would cost you \$4,000 for the cotton and \$200 for our services.
8. We are pretty sure the big purchases or leases can be secured for 29% down payment and the balance on four years at 6% on or before, but we can't guarantee this.
9. I have all the necessary forms and my bird dogs in East and Central Texas say they have the cotton.
10. Keep in mind that all this has to be done in less than 30 days or by December 31, 1965. Don't shop with our time or yours; talk to your Banker, your ASC Office and if you want in, we would like to have you. But, we don't have time to jockey and back out.
11. I have the necessary forms whereby you make me your Power of Attorney to sign for you and in connection with this, I will need:
 - A. The projected yield on your farm (lbs. per acre). We have sellers with projected yields from 143 lbs. per acre to 500 lbs. per acre; but we may not be able to fit all buyers' acres with the sellers'. However this doesn't make much difference since you are buying pounds—or lint.
 - B. It will be necessary for you to authorize me to draw a draft on your account at your local bank and attach a copy of the signed contract to same for the Escrow Money which will be 10% of the purchase or lease.
 If you are not willing to do this or can't get it OK'd at the bank, don't sign up, because I can't commute from East Texas to West Texas on each contract. The time and expense involved would be prohibitive.
