NO-BAKE BROWNIES

Quick, and easy to make during the holiday rush are "no-bake" brownies, the recipe for which is submitted by Mrs. A. L. Fair, Matador High School home economics teacher.

Mix 6 cups fine graham cracker crumbs, 3/4 cup powdered sugar and 1 1/2 cups chopped nuts or flaked coconut. Heat 1 1/2 cups evaporated milk and 12 oz. pkg. chocolate chips in double boiler. Mix well after the chocolate has melted. Save one cup of this glaze and mix the dry and wet ingredients. Pack into a large, flat, foil lined container. Cover with glaze, and chill. Cut recipe in half if 6-oz. pkg. of chocolate chips is used.

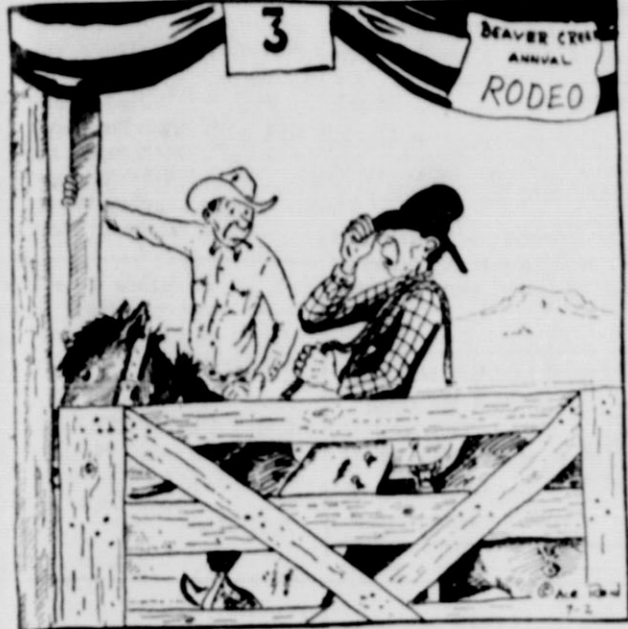
