Rain! Scattered showers sprinkle county

Small scattered thunderstorms dropped rain over isolated rural locations in Motley County in the month of July. However, much needed rain continued to elude the area. Clouds gathered, but never produced more than few sprinkles of rain. In the Whiteflat area, the Jennings ranchland had over two inches. Mrs. Tommie Cruse, NWSV of Flomot, officially reported a total of 0.13 of moisture for July. Buzz Thacker, NWSV of Roaring Springs reported .81 of moisture for the Roaring Springs area. Kelly Meyer, NWSV of Matador was not available for a report.

August has started out right with the first few days bringing some rain and cooler temperatures to Motley County. Mr. Thacker reported .72 as of Wednesday morning for Roaring Springs. The Tribune was unable to reach Mrs. Cruse and Mr. Meyer for their August reports.

The raging fires July 28-29-30 endangered homes along the northwest part of the county. The homes of L.B. Monk, Rex Yeary (former Bill Saul's place), Virgil George and Junior Payne escaped the fire only because the Forest Service helicopters dropped water around these locations. The scenic view when traveling up Cedar Hill, west of Flomot, is now a mass of black debris.

Entertaining evening planned for Chamber Banquet

The Fourth Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet on Thursday, August 6, at 7 p.m. in the Motley County High School Gymnasium promises to be an entertaining evening. Music from the 3M Company, great food from Virginia Salsbury Caterers, and door prizes in the amount of \$202 will be topped off by a humorous keynote speaker, Nancy Robinson Masters.

The award-winning author is not only a pilot, but also a teacher who has developed her "Top Gun" programs to motivate students to become better readers and writers. However, Masters modestly states that her most important work in life is teaching second graders in Sunday School.

With a warm, down-home style that prompts both laughter and tears, Masters has been described by Robert Flynn, author of *North to Yesterday and Wanderer Springs*, as "a Texas writer who weaves wind, wings, and words into stories you will think she wrote just for you."

The values, patriotism, and work ethic that have produced a successful combination for the writer were forged on a cotton farm in West Texas during the terrible drought of the early 1950's. "I had not told a soul that I had been watching the duster pilots from our turnrow and had decided if I could fly an airplane I could go somewhere - anywhere - just as long as it was so far away I never had to worry again about too much drought or too little money."

Today, she has come full circle, living on a farm near Abilene in the

Elmdale Community. As a licensed pilot she flies out of the Elmdale Airport, built and run by her former instructor and now husband, veteran aviator Bill Masters.

Come fly with Nancy Robinson Masters at the Chamber of Commerce Banquet. As Robert Flynn concluded,

"Nancy takes us to places we never heard of and places we pass everyday. She lets us put our feet on the rudders and our hands on the throttle. She makes us fly the airplane when it would be easier to stay on the ground. It isn't a smooth ride, but the landings are safe every time."

6,000 acres burn in area wildfires

Approximately 6,000 acres burned in wildfires last week, according to reports from Matador VFD Secretary, James Gillespie.

Firefighters from all over the area joined forces Wednesday to combat a fire that raged across several counties, threatening seven homes.

The Matador, Floydada, Lockney, Quitaque, Silverton, and Turkey volunteer fire departments joined aerial firefighters from Amarillo and the Department of Emergency Management from Lubbock in battling the blaze near Fairmont, 10 miles south of Quitaque.

Willie Begay, information officer for the Texas Forest Service, said seven homes were threatened by the fire but they were successfully defended. He said it has not been determined if any other homes were destroyed in the fire.

The fire's cause has not been determined. Begay said the Quitaque fire was down to 25 percent on Wednesday.

Fire also burned at the Hackberry pasture, located on the Tule Ranch near Silverton. That fire started last Tuesday, when lightning ignited a grass fire.

A Sikorsky Skycrane helicopter supported both fire fighting efforts

FSA Accepting Emergency Loan Applications

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought temperatures are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Memphis, Mollie F. Moffitt said today.

Hall and Motley Counties are part of the entire state of Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought disaster.

Ms. Moffitt said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Ms. Moffitt said. Farmers participating in the Federal

Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until March 23, 1999, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Ms. Moffitt said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or co-operators in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in Memphis is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

July sales tax rebates delivered Returns 11.3% ahead for the year

(Austin) — State Comptroller John Sharp delivered Friday, July 10, a total of \$174.5 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,091 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 13.5 percent increase over the \$153.7 million allocated in July 1997.

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in May and reported by businesses filing monthly tax returns in June.

"A robust economy, driven in large part by high employment in the Texas job market and a steady demand for construction of housing and apartments, continues across the state," Sharp said. "Year-to-date, rebates to cities and counties are up 11.3 percent over last year."

Sharp delivered monthly sales tax rebates totaling \$159.6 million to Texas cities, 13.9 percent higher than

last July's payments of \$140 million. Rebates of \$14.9 million to Texas counties were 9.45 percent higher than allocations of \$13.6 million in July 1997. Another \$5 million went to 33 special purpose districts around the state.

Matador received \$1,254.60, compared to \$1,355.53 last year, a percent change of -7.44%. 1998 payments to date are \$13,319.77, compared to payments for 1997 of \$12,022.70, a percent change of 10.78%

Roaring Springs received a payment of \$1,458.14, compared to \$1,149.14 last year, a percent change of 26.88%. 1998 payments to date are \$8,900.90, compared to 1997's payments of \$10,799.21, a -17.57% change.

You should always go to church on Sunday because it makes God happy, and if there's anybody you want to make happy, it's God.

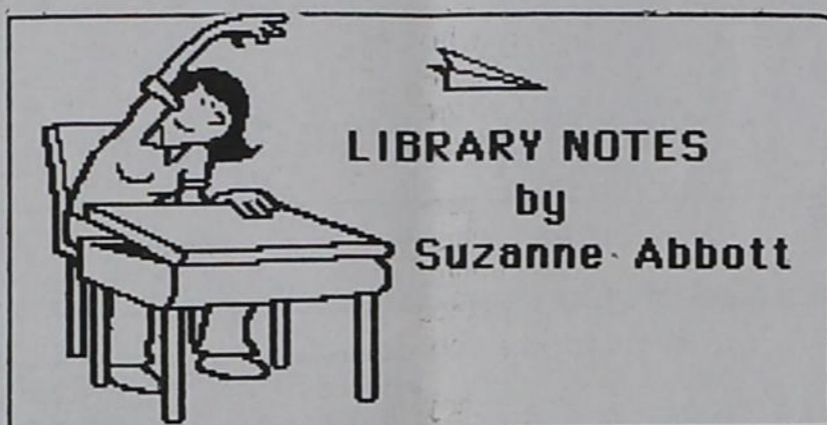
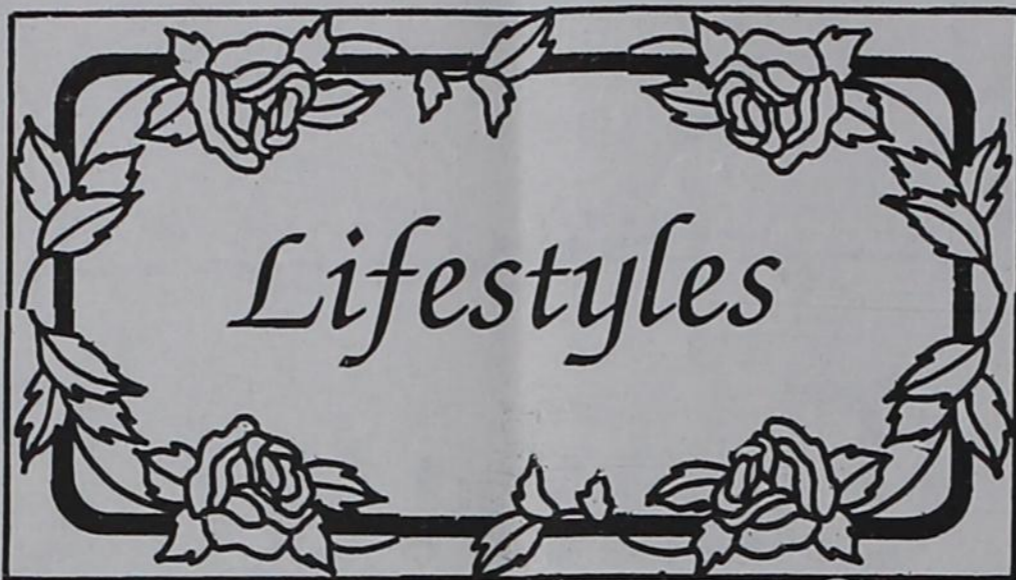
Don't skip church to do something you think will be more fun like going to the beach. This is wrong! And, besides, the sun doesn't come out at the beach until noon anyway.

School Cafeteria rules outlined

Motley County ISD Cafeteria will begin operation for the 1998-99 school year at 8:00 a.m., August 13, 1998. We are looking forward to providing your child with tasty, nutritional meals prepared by both state and federal guidelines. The cafeteria staff attends workshops each year to help in preparing the meals to comply with the regulations mandated by the Government agencies but also to prepare the best tasting meal so the student will eat them.

In the past we have had a problem with students using the coke and candy machines to supplement their meals. This is not allowed, prohibited by Federal Mandates, not a local policy! A student is not allowed to drink a soft drink with a meal prepared by our staff. Federal mandates what is served on a student's tray. The meals served in grades PK through 6 must include a half pint of milk (they do not have to drink it, but they must have it on their tray). Plus specific portions of certain food groups. The Federal

guidelines for meals in grades 7-12 are more lenient as far as portion and choice are concerned.

Lunch prices will remain the same as last year: PK-6, \$1.00; 7-12, \$1.25; Guests, \$4.00.

Breakfast - All students: .75¢, and guests, \$3.00.

Motley County ISD also offers free or reduced meals in our Cafete-

ria. Your student should bring home a form to complete and return to Mrs. Woolsey before they will be eligible to receive either free or reduced meals. All forms and information on the forms are confidential. No child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap.

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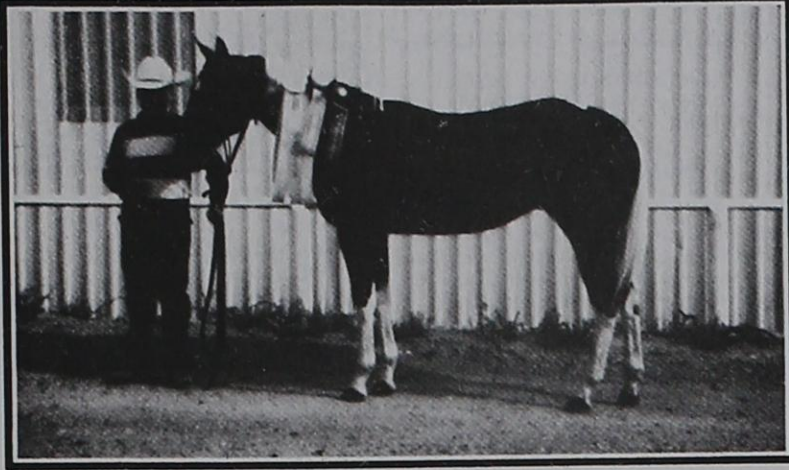
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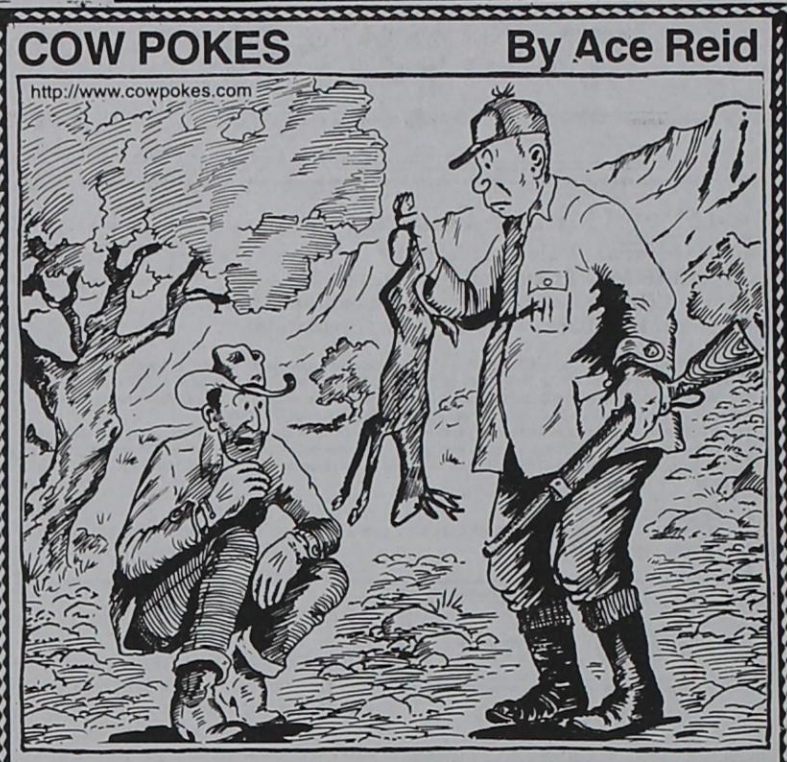
Motley County 4-H'ers are big winners at district, state 4-H Horse Show

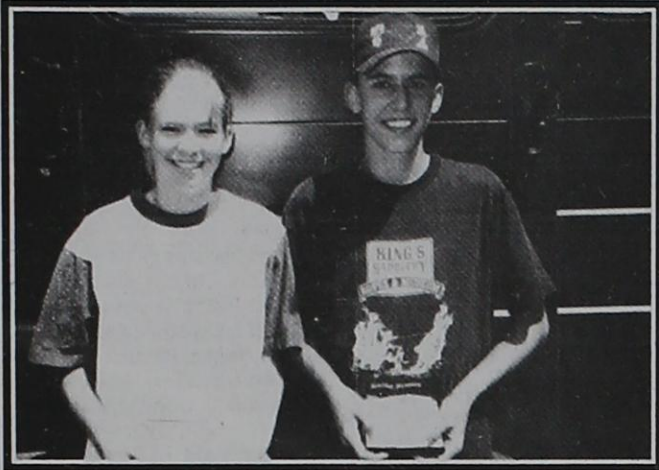

U.S. Census gears up for regional project

Scheduled to begin in September, the project will send out census field workers into every county in North Texas to physically list all household addresses and thereby update census bureau maps. The work will mainly be on week-ends and evenings, so we're looking
