Conrad Candidate For Representative

Glen Conrad of Claude recently made the announcement that he is a candidate for State Representative, 66th Legislative District of Texas, subject to the action of the Democratic Primary in May, 1978.

Born in Amarillo August 13, 1943, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Conrad of Claude. He is married to the former Anne Lenore Canon of Midland. They have three daughters, Shannon, age eight, Chris, age seven and Cory, who is three months old.

Training Program Graduates Six From Motley County

LUBBOCK - The South Plains Homemaker Service in affiliation with the Texas Tech University College of Home Economics has concluded its homemaker training program at the South Plains Electric Cooperative.

Homemakers completing 60 hours of training received certificates of confirmation, including training manuals and homemaker service aide pins.

The South Plains Homemaker Service provides employment and training for mature homemakers who perform in-home care services for elderly and disabled persons desiring to remain in their own homes and able to do so with limited assistance.

Services performed by homemakers include menu planning and meal preparation, escort to the doctor or beauty shop, personal grooming and care of individual needs, visitation and companionship. They help also with laundry and light housekeeping.

Services, available at a nominal fee based on monthly income, provide an alternative to institutional or nursing home care.

Notices Mailed

AUSTIN - License plate renewal notices for almost 11 million motor vehicles were in U.S. post offices throughout Texas for delivery to owners beginning the day after Christmas.

R. W. Townsley, director of the Motor Vehicle Division, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, said the renewal notices were stuffed into envelopes, pre-sorted by zip code, boxed and delivered to post offices to expedite delivery. Work to get the renewal notices ready for delivery started in early October.

"The plate renewals for passenger cars and light trucks (such as pickups) will be different from last year. A new law requires that renewal dates be spread as equally as possible over 12 months, rather than have all expire at one time (April) each year," Townsley said.

Since the Motor Vehicle Division does not maintain records by owner's name or birth date, the license number of the vehicle has been used to determine the month of registration renewal in the future.

Renewal notices have been issued to reflect the number of months and the prorated fee to be paid to register each vehicle under the new system.

A complete explanation of the new system is enclosed with each renewal notice for passenger cars and light trucks (one ton or less). It is imperative that vehicle owners not lose the registration notice as it must be presented at the county tax collection office to obtain new license plates.

Because of the new system, registration may take longer this first year than ever before. The new law authorizes county tax assessors-collectors to start processing the renewals a month early.

Your county tax assessor-collector is ready when you are - any time starting with the county's first-work day in 1978.

"Look for your friendly postman to bring your license plate renewal notice shortly after Christmas," Townsley said. "Do yourself a favor - take your renewal notice to your county tax office and register early. You'll be sorry if you don't."

The Texas Department of Health will hold a Multiphasic Screening Clinic for adults in Motley County on January 31, from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

The location of the clinic will be in the Motley County Courthouse in Matador, with screening services available to adults at no charge.

Whaley Seeks Post Of Representative

Foster Whaley of Pampa, recently announced his candidacy for the position of State Representative of the 66th District of Texas subject to the Democratic Primary scheduled for May 2, 1978. This district comprises nine rural counties - Armstrong, Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley, Floyd, Hall, Motley, and Wheeler - and one highly industrialized county - Gray.

Whaley, a native of St. Jo, Texas was born March 23, 1929. He and his wife Lois, have three children. Christie, a graduate of Pampa High School and a 1977 spring graduate of Texas A&M is presently employed as a high school English teacher in the Bryan Public Schools. Wayne Jay is a graduate of Pampa High School and a junior student at Texas A&M University, majoring in finance. Karlette Kay, a senior at Pampa High School will enter college in the fall of 1978.

At present Whaley owns and operates farm and ranch land in Armstrong, Carson and Gray counties. This along with work in the Extension Service, Whaley says, will be a great help to him in carrying out responsibilities as State Representative.

In serving as Agricultural Agent in Armstrong County from 1953 to 1960, Whaley helped to organize a thirty-six-man committee that resulted in that county having the most complete rural dial telephone system in Texas. In a joint effort with the people of the Fairview Community, a community improvement program was organized west of Claude and the community was named first in the state in community improvement in 1955.

During his tenure as county agent in Gray County, 1960-1976, Whaley assisted the 4-H leaders in a fund-raising project for the purpose of building a state 4-H Center. Gray County was the first county in the state to deposit their quota of \$5500 in the state 4-H Foundation.

Also featured was an address by U.S.S.R. party leader Leonid Brezhnev, and scenes of various sea, land and aircraft which the Soviet Union is preparing for use in possible nuclear or missile warfare.

"A Soviet ICB missile can reach the United States 30 minutes after launch . . . we have no defense against a missile invasion," summed up the film's message.

In visiting with the leaders in both industry and agriculture of this district, Whaley has found that their greatest concern is the problem of too much government. "They are more concerned with what the government is doing to them instead of for them," Whaley said.

"Regulation by our environmental agencies without regard to economic impact is of tremendous concern to both industry and agriculture," said Whaley. "In these areas I have fought pitch-battles with government agencies who advocated compulsory soil and water conservation and excessive regulations on the operation of the McLean, Texas cotton gin. Good examples of what government has done to the agricultural interests are: (1) the price freeze on beef that collapsed the beef market in 1973 and caused thousands of bankruptcies in the cattle business; and (2) the embargo on grain exports that sent grain prices into a tail-spin. This came after the government had encouraged planting fence row to fence row," Whaley said.

In making his announcement, Whaley said that if elected as State Representative he plans to write a weekly news article to all newspapers in this district. He would also provide tapes or other means of communication to our radio stations. "I would like to see expanded research efforts in the field of

solar and wind energy by our experiment stations. Results in this area could be of tremendous benefit to industry, agriculture and the home," he said.

Whaley has recently disposed of his interest in a fertilizer and chemical business and he has also reduced his farming operations by leasing out land that he owns in the Claude and Pampa areas. "I would have the time to devote my full attention to the duties as State Representative. A state representative needs to have as his primary concern the wants and needs of the people of his district," Whaley says. Whaley graduated from St. Jo High School in 1937. He

served in World War II under General George S. Patton and received the Bronze Star and Purple Heart. He finished Texas A&M University as a distinguished student in 1949. He has received the Distinguished Service Award from National Association of County Agents at Atlantic City, New Jersey in 1968 and the Superior Service Award from Texas A&M University in 1976.

Whaley was named by a national conservation magazine, "Farm Technology," in 1967 as one of the top ten county extension agents in the nation. His writings have been published in many national publications and one of his publications on hedging of live beef cattle has been reprinted numerous times. "Farm Journal" featured a story of how he hedged 350 steers on his own in 1970.
