Motley County Tribune in Medical Library Archives

Matador and the Motley County Tribune will become a part of Texas history in the Archives Department of the Texas Medical Library in Houston, according to Dr. Ruth Hartgraves, former science teacher in Matador High School.

In a letter in December to Mrs. R.E. Donovan (Hazel) Dr. Hartgraves writes: "Thank you for mailing me the copy of the Motley County Tribune. I appreciated very much the article you put in the Tribune. The paper will be taken to the Archives Dept. in The Texas Medical

Library. So you see, you made Matador a part of History. Matador has been a part of my life for many years. You are a legend in Matador. You do so much to keep it in the spotlight as a part of our Great Texas."

Dr. Hartgraves had reference to the Homecoming issue of October 26, 1989, in which an article told of the honor she had received in being cited for recognition by The Archives, an independent organization that selects one Physician every one hundred years for this honor.

The office is located in the Texas Medical Center Library.

Two factors were in Dr. Hartgraves' favor in her selection by the Archive Board: She was the first woman physician practicing only Obstetrics and Gynecology in Houston; and she had 30 years of world travel and went around the world three times, visiting foreign country hospitals. Now 88, Dr. Hartgraves retired in 1985 after delivering 3000 babies.

Dr. Hartgraves is perhaps the most

illustrious former faculty member of this school. She taught science in Matador High School in 1926 and 1927, and resigned her position here to enroll in medical school. After receiving her M.D. degree she opened her Houston office to practice medicine in obstetrics and gynecology.

Hoyle reported a letter had been written for the Ambulance service to run with one ECA and one driver if it was every necessary.

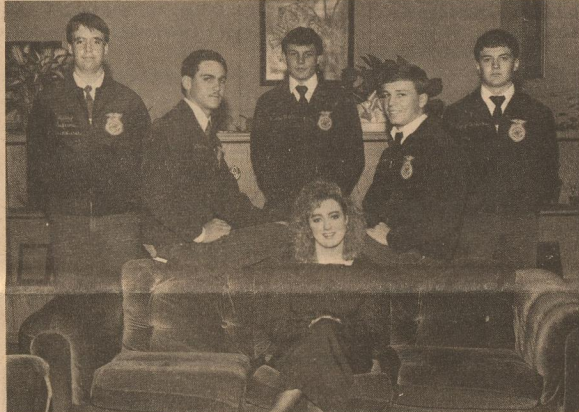
The 1990 election was discussed with places for Lillie Crouch and Darrel Cruse being open for election.

Commissioners Meet In Regular Monthly Meeting

Motley County Commissioners Court met with Judge Billy Joe Whitaker, County Commissioners J.M. Russell, Bill D. Washington, Franklin Jameson and Fraiser Watson. Invocation was given by Fraiser Watson. Clerk Lucretia Campbell read the minutes, which were approved as read.

Randy Gustafson, DPS Trooper, met with the Commissioners to inform them of a need for a FAX system in the DPS office. He stated the District Attorney's office would purchase the FAX system if the county would be willing to install the private line and pay the extra monthly fee. After hearing the specific reasons and need, the Court passed on the request.

Jackie Hill, representing Government Record Services of Dallas, was on hand to explain that his company was offering a service to Motley County to store the microfilm of all the records in the Clerk's office. Hill explained this film needed to be properly stored and they offered this service for \$1.15 per roll, with a written guarantee of this protection. At present this film was stored with Business Records Co. of Dallas. Jameson asked Hill why should they move this film and Hill explained due to a change in Business Records, he would advise the court the film was no longer properly stored. Clerk Campbell gave her complaints of Business Records Co. and also knew of other counties who were transferring their film. After discussion, the decision was tabled until further investigation.

Darla Gwinn, President of the Library Board, gave the Court the monthly report and asked the court to accept a new board member, Charlie Johnson. They accepted him. Note was made that the adults read more books in January than children.

(Adults, 395; Children, 290).

James Gillespie reported on the last 911 district meeting. The equipment is in Lubbock and Motley County will be hooked up to AT&T equipment because

that is what Floyd County will use.

Gillespie also reported to the Court that the 1949 Dodge Power Wagon 'laid down and died' going to the last fire. The Fire Department wanted to know if they wanted them to go on and finish rebuilding the Kiser or rebuild the Dodge first. After lengthy discussion the Court decided to finish the Kiser and then worry about the Dodge later.

The bills were read and discussed, especially one on prisoner upkeep. After discussion with Sheriff Alton Marshall, a decision was made how to cut cost while waiting for Grand Jury.

Bills were approved as were reports with the J.P. collecting \$8,919.50.

Kay Howard of Gary R. Traylor and Associates asked the Court to pass two items. One was an equal opportunity resolution. This needs to be in effect for future projects.

Howard also asked the court to pass on the final phase of the grant so the audit can be done and final payment made. These were approved.

The Court did inform Howard that they were disappointed in the handicap restroom facilities. They thought they should have put in handicap comodes instead of the additions, for sanitary reasons as well as others.

Howard said she would look into this matter.

Howard also asked the court to be considering what was needed for the 1990 grant applications to be prepared by July.

Commissioners Russell and Jameson went over certain issues they had learned at the Judge and Commissioners Seminar they attended last month. Jameson also asked questions concerning county business he was in question about. Jameson also stated in his going over the budget and doing some checking that the Road and Bridge cost was only 37% of the cost to the county, 67% is from all other departments.

Meeting adjourned.

INTO THE 90'S

As the 1980's wind down, we look to the 1990's with a predictive eye to determine where we are headed.

The 90's are being referred to as the neotraditional decade: a decade which will combine and integrate the focus of security and tradition of the 1950's with the individuality of the 1970's.

The demand of the 1990's consumer will be:

- * Substance products that perform as advertised.
- * Streamlining products with multiple uses.

- * Risk management product analysis to determine cost-benefit and trade-offs.
- * Accountability products that are backed up by produces.
- * Personal style products that respond to individual lifestyles.

During the 1990's, we will be targeting certain influential consumer groups. Working mothers will continue to be a major group whose needs must be addressed. However, divisions within that group will be important. The working mother's group divides into happy women workers, unwilling women workers, full time homemakers, women who wish to be working and full time homemakers

negatively influenced by working women. Men will emerge as the forgotten consumer.

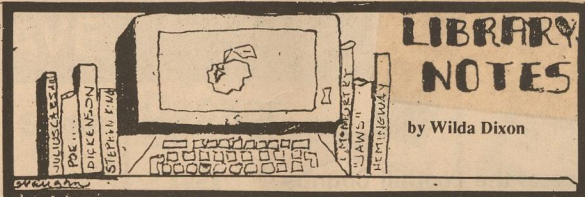

Texas Tech University to hold University Tour Day

LUBBOCK -- Future graduating high school students and junior college transfer students can have a first-hand look at Texas Tech University Feb. 23 during Texas Tech's annual University Day.

Campus tours, recreational activities, academic advising and student organization information will be available to all interested students and parents during the day-long event.

No advance sign-up is necessary. Registration for participants will begin at 8 a.m. in the Lubbock Municipal Auditorium east of Jones Stadium. A general assembly will follow at 9 a.m. in the auditorium.

Visitors are allowed to park in a specially reserved campus lot between the auditorium and the stadium, at the corner of Boston Avenue and Sixth Street, or in open commuter parking lots near the area. Inner-campus parking is available by visitor pass only in marked visitors' lots. Buses will be available at no charge for transportation on campus.

Following the assembly, individual colleges will conduct advisement sessions on career choices, academic majors

and college prerequisites beginning at 10:15 a.m. in the auditorium and in various rooms in the campus' University Center. A second half-hour advisement session will follow at 11:15 a.m.

Garden Club hears Extension Agent and Observes Arbor Day

Matador Garden Club had a twofold program when it met January 15 at the Motley County Library. A program on Area Conservation was given by Rocky Vinson, Motley County Agriculture Extension Agent, and afterwards club members observed Arbor Day by planting a tree at the Virginia Walton Willie Roadside Park south of town.

Mrs. W.N. Pipkin, president, called the meeting to order and conducted a short business session which included reading of the minutes of the December meeting by the secretary, Mrs. Douglas Meador. The president also stressed the activity for the month: To keep the bird feeder filled at Pioneer Memorial Park and provide other bird feed, such as suet.

Mrs. Edgar Lee introduced the authoritative speaker with the information that he transferred from Webb County in the same capacity as County Extension Agent and assumed duties here March 16 of last year. As Extension Agent, Vinson directs the agricultural phase of the Motley County Extension Program, both youth and adult, serving in the total agricultural program and in all areas of the 4-H program.

He explained that the extension service includes a branch in east state, of the National Extension Service funded through the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and that A&M University at College Station serves as headquarters for Texas. Since different areas of the state produce different crops, the agricultural guidelines vary according to location, he said. He cited January gardening at Laredo in south Texas where fruit is grown - ba-

nanas, grapefruit and oranges as compared with crops in this area.

"Motley County specializes in diversified agriculture such as cotton, livestock and nutrients," he said, the main role of the extension service is to extend education through group meetings and tours, as the tour of peanut crops in September, and meetings to discuss home owners' problems in gardening as well as problems of farmers and ranchers."

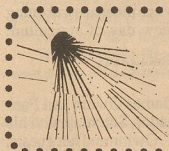
He distributed garden check lists for January and pamphlets on Texas Gardening Guidelines, a publication from Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The check list contained suggestions for preparing beds and garden areas for spring planting which stressed the importance of plenty of organic matters every year, such as compost, a natural nutrient of leaves and grass.

The list also advised checking evergreens for bagworm pouches, with the information that these insects start as moths and explained that "The insect eggs over-winter in the pouch and start the cycle again by emerging in the spring and begin feeding on the foliage. Hand removal and burning the pouches is an excellent means of reducing the potential damage next spring."

Refreshments of sausage pinwheels, cake, candy, nuts, coffee and hot punch were served by Mrs. Ted Elliott to the guest, Rocky Vinson and members, Mrs. Alvin Stearns, Mrs. J.D. Craven, Mrs. Edgar Lee, Mrs. Meador and Mrs. Pipkin. Immediately following, the women went to the roadside park, where they planted a native Hackberry tree.

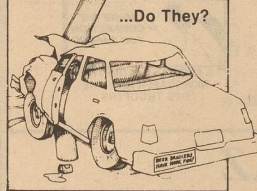

County Agent's Comments

FARMERS SHOULD MAINTAIN IRS, SOCIAL SECURITY RECORDS ON WORKERS

Farmers, starting on Jan. 1 of 1990, were required to start withholding federal income tax from wages of employees.

Employers must keep on file a completed W-4 form for each employee. This W-4 form determines the correct amount to withhold from each paycheck, based on how many exemptions an employee may claim, including dependents and disabilities.

Farmers also will have to provide W-2 forms for each employee. This W-4 form determines the correct amount to withhold from each paycheck, based on how many exemptions an employee may claim, including dependents and disabilities.

Farmers also will have to provide W-2 forms to workers each January, starting this year. These forms will provide details on how much the worker earned and the amount that was paid to Social Security and federal income tax accounts.

Regarding seasonal migrant workers who don't live in the area where the farmer resides, the employers will have to be able to show they have made a good-faith effort to locate the workers so that the W-2 forms could be sent to them.

This means that the employers should obtain and put the permanent addresses of their workers on file for reference. Workers who do not earn the minimum taxable wage base of \$4,400 will be eligible to recover all federal taxes that have been deducted. Farmers may want to offer assistance to their workers in obtaining

such refunds when warranted. Farmers should use the IRS Circular E to determine correct withholding rates. You can call IRS toll-free at 800-424-FORM to obtain necessary forms. I have a supply of W-4 and Circular E forms in the county Extension office. In addition farmers are reminded that the Social Security tax rate for 1990 has increased from 7.51 percent to 7.65 percent for employers and employees and to 15.3 percent for those who are self-employed.
