Eleven Wells Now in Progress Increase Interest of Industry in Development

SIX WELLS ARE DRILLING and five more are staked for drilling in Motley County. Five wells are currently drilling in the Roaring Springs area and five additional wells are staked in the same vicinity. The two Roaring Springs Fields currently have 14 producing wells.

Two wildcats, one-half mile apart have been staked in South-central Motley County, currently the most active area in the South Plains and the Permian Basin.

The two new wildcats, which brings the total of active locations in the county to ten, seven of which are currently drilling, are 1 1/2 and 1 3/4 miles northeast of the West Roaring Springs, (Permo-Penn). Both locations were staked on Pan-American Pet. Corp., farm-outh leases by McKinney and Leonard, Midland operators and

Shot In The Arm

The discovery extension and lease expirations acted like a "shot in the arm" for the south central Motley area and Perkins-Prothro quickly staked three more locations, a north offset to the Hamilton, No. 1 Brooks and an east outpost to the Hamilton, No. 1 Martin, field as a wildcat, and the No. 1 Arthur the "hard luck hole."

Closely Watched

The No. 1 Arthur, closely watched and located in the center of several "about to expire" leases, has had about everything happen to it but lose the hole. Drilling went smoothly until it got below 4,000 feet, about 150 feet above pay zone, when the exploration twisted off its drillpipe and spent two weeks fishing it out. Then it lost circulation, regained it, and inched down to 4,053 feet, came out of the hole and found the hole bridged at 2,290 feet. At last report was still trying to get by to resume drilling.

Farm Loan Program Reduces Employees

Farmers Home Administration will operate its program in Texas this year with 117 fewer employees than it had a year ago at this time, it was announced last week. Since the break of the drought, the agency statewide, has reduced its force by more than 27 percent and has discontinued 7 of its field offices on a full-time basis.

Insofar as the employees who lost their jobs, the announcement said that in practically every case the training and experience they gained during their employment with Farmers Home Administration enabled them to step into jobs with banks, PCA's and other private and cooperative credit institutions—many of them at salaries better than they had with the Government.

In connection with the service available to farm families there will be no change. During the past three years more than 12,000 farmers and ranchers paid their loans in full to Farmers Home Administration, and for the most part reached or regained a position where private and cooperatives sources can now handle their credit needs.

Farmers Home Administration will continue to make loans to eligible applicants for farm and home operating expenses; for the purchase of livestock and equipment needed to put their farm programs on a sound basis and to finance farm real estate purchases and improvements.

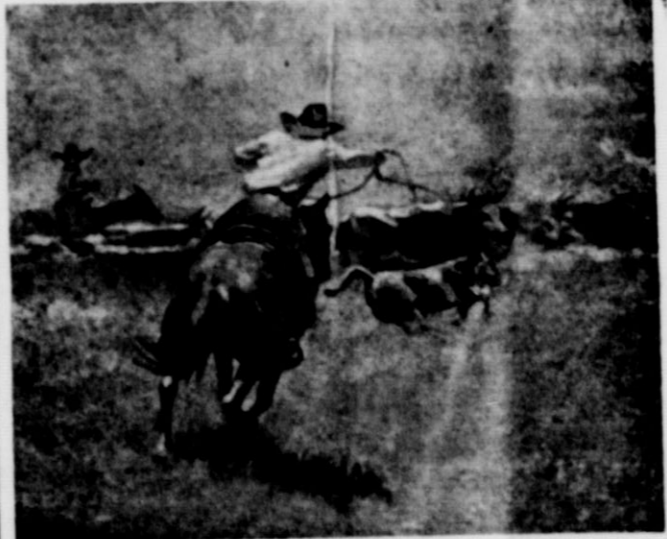
