Death early Sunday (at 3 A.M.) claimed the life of Mrs. A. B. Groves, at her home in north Matador. She had been ill the past three months. Funeral services were held Monday at 10 A.M. at the Church of Christ.

Minister Leonard Dennis of McAdoo, conducted the service, assisted by local minister, J. B. Tidmore, and Rev. Bruce Oliver, pastor of First Baptist church.

Burial was in East Mound cemetery, under direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home. Pallbearers were: Alvin Stearns, Gus Bird, Calvin Nimmo, Edgar Lee and Bill McCaghren of Matador and David Guest of Turkey.

Myrtle Taylor was born at Anson, Texas, Dec. 22, 1882, and died September 5, 1954, at the age of 71 years, 8 months, 13 days. She was married at Anson, Jan. 22, 1902, to A. B. Groves, who preceded her in death, on May 17, 1951. They moved to Matley County about 38 years ago from Aspermont, where they lived for several years following their marriage.

Tribute was paid Mrs. Groves for her life in this community, by those in charge of the service and in the presence of her many friends. A member of the Church of Christ, she was a devout Christian and a staunch and loyal member of Matador Chapter 66, Order of the Eastern Star of which she was a Past Matron. She was this year named Chapter Mother and deeply cherished the honor.

Local Child Polio Victim

Another Matador child has been pronounced a victim of dread polio. She is Deborah Clifton, 13-months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Travis Clifton, who is being treated at Methodist Hospital, Lubbock. Word received Wednesday morning stated the baby is paralyzed in her right leg.

She was conveyed to Lubbock early Monday by her parents and Mrs. Clifton's father, Mark Hall and uncle, Wesley Hall.

The baby had been ailing most of the summer, and had been examined at the Methodist Hospital, last week. It is not believed at this time, however, that she will have to be moved to the polio center at Plainview.

Following report of the polio outbreak, the cleanup campaign sponsored jointly by the city council and Lions Club has been intensified. Mayor W. L. McWilliams said every possible resource of the city would be exercised to maintain cleanliness.

Working in cooperation with the Lions Club, the city is aiding in placing waste barrels at convenient locations in the business section of town. Lion Ned Shanks, civic improvement chairman, is working with Mayor McWilliams.

Members of Boy Scout Troop 60 are painting the barrels and aiding in the plan. Most of the barrels are being furnished by Mr. Shanks. Work of cutting out tops is being done by Ted Elliott's Welding shop.

Ginning, wrapping and handling the bale was done without charge. Mr. Shanks said he would also pay above market price for the cotton. The first bale here produced 830 pounds of cottonseed.

Soil Group Asks For Watersheds

Application for two watersheds in this area have been submitted to the state water board by the Upper Pease Soil Conservation District (Motley and Cottle counties).

James E. Taylor, chairman of the soil group said the application will need the full cooperation of the people and the county government if the application is approved. Mr. Taylor declared, "in order that we may participate in this essential program."

Asked to define the term "watershed", Mr. Taylor said his understanding was that after a site is approved, the work begins with a series of small dams. Each small dam checks the runoff and prevents the silt from being carried down stream.

DE LUXE DRIVE-IN at Roaring Springs

DE LUXE DRIVE-IN at Roaring Springs, was formerly the private car of Chas. Sommer when he was President of the O. A. & P. Railway. It was originally built for S. B. Burnett of the 6666 Ranch in 1917. The car was built by the Pullman company and cost \$34,000 without furnishings. The car weighs 90,000 pounds and is 76 feet in length. The de luxe drive-in cafe is located at Roaring Springs intersection of business route and Highway 70. Purchased about three years ago by S. J. Braselton, the car was recently bought by Earl Osborn and opened as a drive-in diner. Mr. and Mrs. Osborn make their home in the luxuriously-appointed car. The interior finish is mahogany. Much of the silver, linen and glassware has been kept. Because of its extreme weight it was impossible to secure a permit to move the car on the highways. The side-door entrance was cut by Mr. Osborn with a cold chisel since wood between the steel walls would burn each time he applied a cutting torch.

WORST SINCE 1879 CITY HAS DRIEST AUGUST ON RECORD

Withered grass, drooping flowers, soybean crops dying up to the tune of thousands of dollars a day all told Escambia Countians that August was an unusually dry month for this area. Weatherman Cecil Mahaffey made that opinion official Tuesday when he reported that August 1954 was the driest August since the local weather bureau was established in 1879. Rainfall measured less than an inch. Official records show .63 for August 1954, with the next driest record for the same period being .70 in 1941, and the third driest being .72 for August of 1891. Pensacola didn't break any heat records in August, but the average temperature equalled a heat record set in August of 1951—84.7 degrees, exactly three and one-half degrees above normal, and that was the average temperature throughout the entire month.

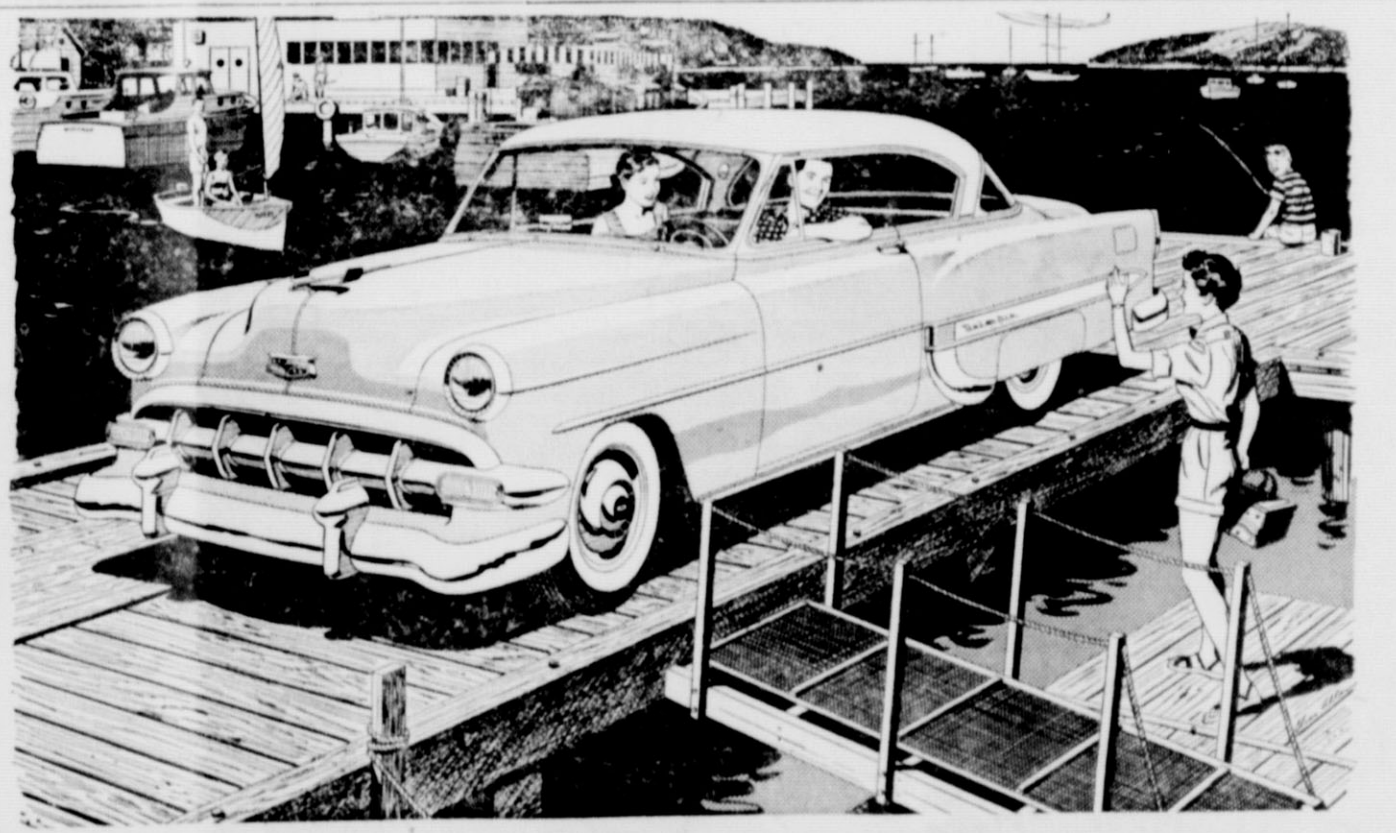



Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Texas—Texas' conservatives with a champion in Governor Allan Shivers, are now looking confidently toward the September 14 state Democratic convention at Mineral Wells.

Control of the convention is already assured the Governor by July precinct and county conventions which were largely captured by the state's conservative element.

In the Mineral Wells move to set up a solid conservative state organization for the next two years, Shivers is expected to:

1. Name a successor to Wright Morrow, conservative Democratic National Committeeman who has been denied a seat by the national committee. Morrow has agreed to step aside, but the state organization refused his resignation.

2. Lead impetus to the move by conservative elements to replace liberal Democratic National Chairman A. Mitchell with someone acceptable to Dixie and Southwestern conservatives. Mitchell has agreed to resign after the November 2 election.

With primary emphasis on healing the split in the national Democratic Party, one question has come to the fore.

That is whether Texas conservatives will fight the renomination of Adlai Stevenson, who appears to be the only top Democratic contender for the presidency, in 1956.

Stevenson lost the Texas vote in 1952, largely because of his views on state rights and the Texas tidelands.

New Judges
Shivers will appoint, sometime after September 14, an associate justice of the Texas Supreme Court and 10 new district judges.

Appointed to fill the position of the late Associate Justice Graham B. Smedley during the remainder of 1954 will probably be the same person nominated by the state executive committee September 13 for the job.

The name will then go on the November 2 ballot, as the Democratic nominee for the post, which is a 1955-59 term.

Highway Award
Highest safety award presented by the National Safety Council has gone to the Texas Highway Department.

The Award of Honor is given for accident prevention achievement. Of 905 eligible organizations, only 12 received the pat-on-the-back.

Drought Help
Four more Texas counties have been recommended for the state-federal drought program by Governor Allan Shivers.

Drought relief was asked to be extended to ranchers and farmers of Brazos, Dickens, Kent and

Montague counties. Seventy-five have previously been approved for the aid.

Broadfoot To Retire

Called from retirement five months ago to replace District Judge C. Woodrow Laughlin in George Parr's South Texas Kingdom, Judge A. S. Broadfoot has again announced his retirement. Judge Broadfoot, of Bonham, was chosen by the Supreme Court after Judge Laughlin was removed. His 79th District Court includes Starr, Brooks and Duval counties.

Indications are, however, that Judge Laughlin may soon be back at his old bench. He has successfully campaigned for Democratic renomination for the two years remaining on his term.

Until his assumed return to the bench January 1, Governor Allan Shivers or the Supreme Court Chief Justice will appoint a successor to Judge Broadfoot.

Business Record

Texas business may break all previous records this year.

Dr. John R. Stockton, director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research, says his prediction will be true if the remainder of 1954 looks like the first seven months.

Stockton reported that Texas' business for the first seven months was the highest of any year's similar period.

School Increase
A 22.5 increase in state public school attendance is forecast by a school survey, just completed.

The 308,000 daily jump in numbers of students was predicted by the Texas Research League, now preparing research reports of the Gilmer-Aiken financing program for the State Board of Education. Enrollment in the school year ended last June was 1,569,000, the league reported.

Liquor Revenue
July revenue of the Texas Liquor Control Board climbed \$35,000 over the July, 1953 mark the Board's report shows.

Totals for the month showed, \$1,375,582.53 in revenue, filing of 254 criminal complaints by enforcement officers, and the seizure of one moonshine still by inspectors.

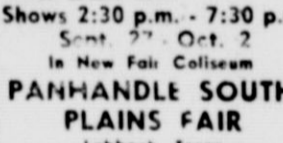

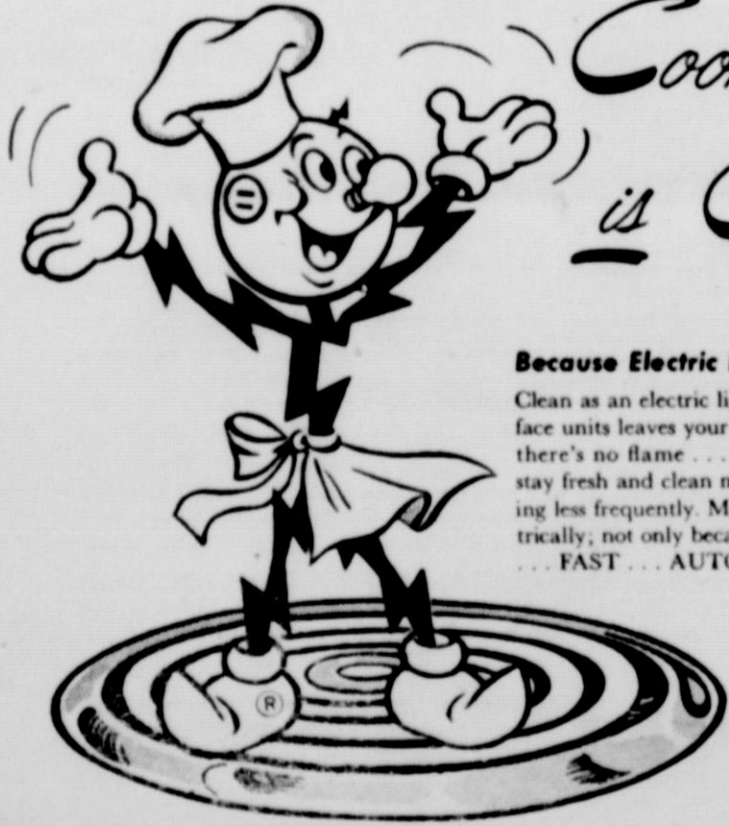

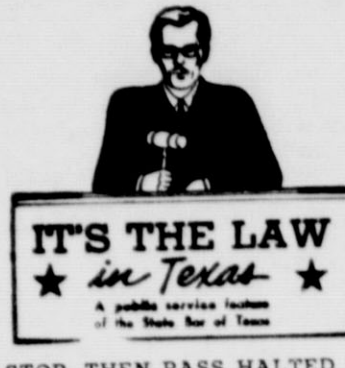

IT'S THE LAW in Texas
A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

STOP, THEN PASS HALTED SCHOOL BUS AT 10 MPH. LAW SAYS

School busses over the state have now begun the task of carrying thousands of children to and from their studies. Soon to be expected are the inevitable tragic reports of deaths and injuries occurring when impatient youngsters dash across busy highways to greet their waiting parents or to board the bus. Most of such accidents could be avoided if motorists would adhere strictly to the letter of the law pertaining to the passing of school busses.

Most Texans are aware of the law which requires a driver to come to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to receive or discharge school children.

ren. After stopping immediately behind the bus, he is then allowed to proceed past same at a speed "which is prudent, not exceeding ten (10) miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

What many persons do not realize is that the very same rule applies when MEETING a stopped school bus. While everyone is interested in protecting our children, unthinking violators of this simple safety rule greatly outnumber those who comply.

Failure to follow the law in this case can lead to fines up to \$200, even when no accident occurs. Following an accident in which some child is injured or killed, the penalties are naturally much more serious.

Although the above rule does not apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious.
