Under his instruction and guidance, the Matadors have won five district championships, four bi-district championships and three regional championships.

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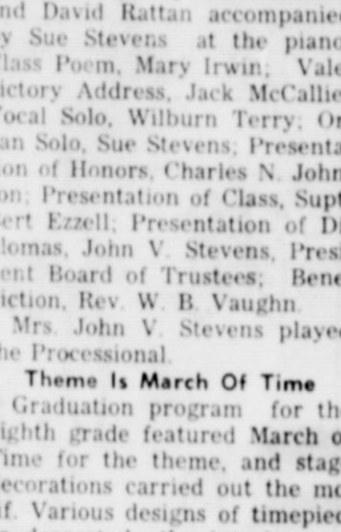
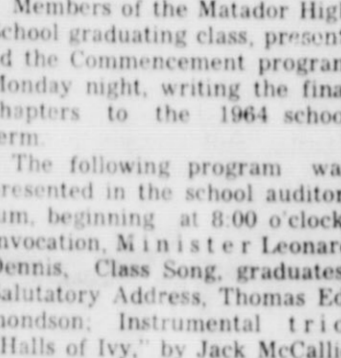

FIRST WHEAT TO ELEVATOR

First 1964 Motley County wheat was delivered Tuesday to the Braselton Elevator in Roaring Springs. The wheat was grown by Earl Thompson east of Matador and moisture content was 14.66, testing 60 lbs to the bushel.

S. J. Braselton, manager of the elevator, said the Tuesday wheat market was \$1.45 per bushel, but that Mr. Thompson received \$1.80 per bu. as a bonus for the first 1964 crop.

Braselton said the county's wheat crop was extremely short because of the dry weather and would yield approximately one-third of normal yields.

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ZIP Explained At Lions Meet

Explanation of the Post Office Department's new ZIP code system, by Matador Postmaster Charlie Scaff, was the principal feature of the regular Tuesday luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club held in the basement of the Methodist Church.
Mr. Scaff said ZIP method of mail dispatch will save millions of dollars and greatly speed up mail service. He said from three to five years may be required before the method is completely established. At present 45% to 50% of the mail bears ZIP numbers. Texas will have 35 sectional centers, with mail in this area handled through Childress. McCallis and Reader's Digest magazines will soon be addressed through the ZIP system, he said.

Mrs. Watt, a 1962 graduate of Matador High School, and her husband have attended South Plains Junior College, Levelland for the past two years.

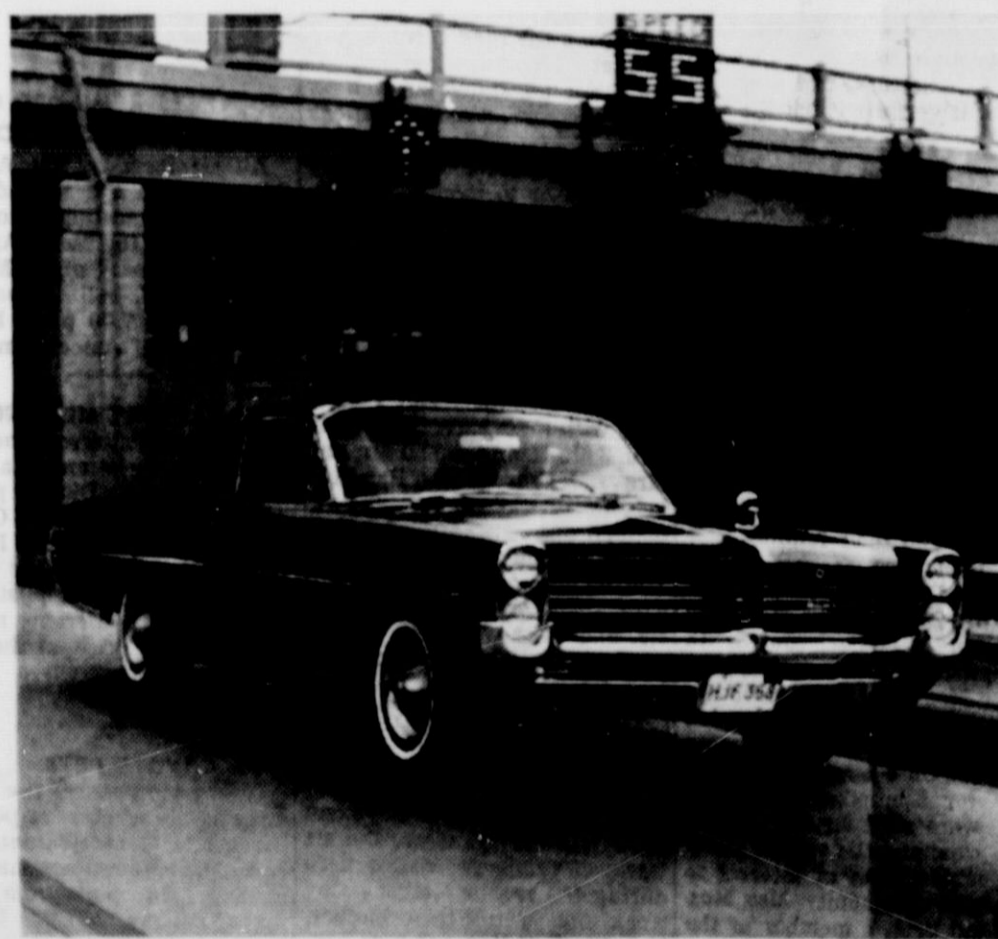

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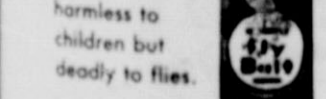
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Graduation Exercise For Patton Springs Eighth Grade Is Followed By Luncheon

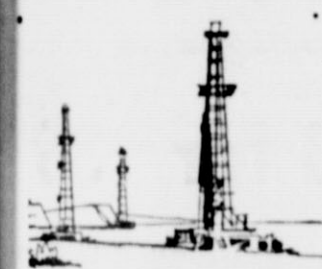
