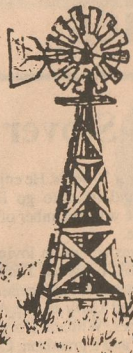

Paige Williams gave the Salutatory address in which she thanked the many people that had been a part of the success

of the Class of '90.

Special music was by Carolyn Ewing, Oran Hamilton and Kathy Shorter, accompanied by Gerald Pipkin on the piano. The trio sang "Friends."

Valedictorian, Jarrett Jameson, who was unable to attend, prepared a recorded speech as the Valedictory address. He wished everyone luck in the future and told his high school friends and teachers farewell.

Mr. Hamilton presented the Valedictorian and Salutatorian plaques. He also awarded Brand Cruse a scholarship from the First State Bank. Brand also was the

Local Talent to Participate in National Cowboy Symposium this Weekend in Lubbock

It's an unusual sight - a true, working cowboy, straight off the ranch, at a university symposium. But the phenomenon occurs each year about this time at Texas Tech University's National Cowboy Symposium and Celebration.

The one-of-a-kind event, scheduled for May 31 through June 3 in Lubbock, mixes ranchers and cowboys with poets, storytellers, musicians, historians and scholars in an effort to pay homage to cowboy culture and the western folk heroes of America.

The event, unlike others that feature only cowboy poetry, is comprehensive in its explorations of the traditions of the American frontier, said Alvin Davis, chairman of the symposium.

"The large number of participants and the wide range of disciplines represented in the symposium should appeal to anyone interested in the American West," he said.

In addition to poetry and music performances, sessions held throughout the day on June 1 and 2 (Friday and Saturday) will include topics such as "Cowgirls and Western Women," "Western Movies and Television," "Western Photography," "Hank the Cowdog: A Children's Session" and "Ranch Owners and Managers."

Evening performances scheduled for 7 and 9 p.m., June 1 and 2 (Friday and Saturday) in the University Center Allen Theater will feature performers such as musicians Red Stegall of Azle and Don Edwards of Weatherford, poets Gary Morton of Lincoln, N.M., and Kim Strong of Davenport, Calif., and storytellers Ace Reid of Kerrville and Monte Jones of Sonora.

Local performers will be Marisue Potts, presenting a paper at the 2:05-2:55 session in the Senate Room; John V. Stevens will be in the 2:05-2:55 Storytelling Session in the Coronado Room on Friday, June 1 and Dennis Gaines will be presenting his original poetry at 3:05-3:55 in Hemmle Reoital Hall on Saturday, June 2. Dennis will also be the emcee for the 10:05-11:00 Poetry session in the

Senate Room, also on Saturday. Dennis will also be participating in the Cutting and Roping events held at the Livestock Pavilion of the Panhandle South Plains Fairgrounds on Sunday.

Tickets to evening performances are \$5 for adults and \$2.50 for children under age 12.

The four-day event will begin at 7:30 p.m. Thursday (May 31) in Texas Tech University Center with a reception and the opening of an exhibit, which will feature cowboy arts, gear, crafts and trappings, and a book fair. A cowboy dance featuring Rick Sudduth and his Blue Denim Band will begin at 9 p.m. in the Coronado Room of the University Center. A single ticket fee of \$5 for adults and \$2.50 for children will gain admittance to the dance and to symposium day time sessions on June 1 and 2 (Friday and Saturday).

The opening session of the symposium will begin at 9 a.m. June 1 (Friday) in the University Center Allen Theater, Joe Frantz, author and historian at Corpus Christi State University, and Bill Hervey, former president of Wrangler, will be the keynote speakers. The session also will feature a memorial tribute to Tom Bla-

singame, who worked as a cowboy until he died at the age of 91 in December 1989.

Following the opening session, concurrent sessions will continue until 5 p.m. and will resume at 9 a.m. June 2 (Saturday).

The last day of the event, June 3 (Sunday) will begin with a breakfast at 9 a.m. at the Livestock Pavilion of the Panhandle South Plains Fairgrounds. Meal tickets are \$3. The meal will be followed by a cowboy non-denominational church service featuring gospel singer Susie McEntire Lucksinger of Atoka, Okla. Her husband, Paul Lucksinger, will deliver a motivational message.

A celebrity cutting and team roping event will begin at 1 p.m. June 3 (Sunday) in the Livestock Pavilion of the Panhandle South Plains Fairgrounds. The arena performance will include a cutting horse demonstration, sheep dog demonstration, trick roping and musical numbers. Ticket prices are \$5 for adults and \$2.50 for children.

Children's Choir Presents Spring Concert

The Children's Choir of First Baptist Church, Matador, presented its spring concert on Sunday evening, May 20. The concert, which was based on the study units for the year, featured hymns and Bible verses learned in the past year, as well as anthems and games from the study units. Narrators Jill Stanley, Samatha Osborn, and Kaci Risser introduced each section of the program, and each choir member quoted a Bible verse during the appropriate section.

Following "Our Song," a melody written by the choir, Elizabeth Ho-Gland recited Psalm 139:14a. The choir then sang the hymn "Take My Life, Lead Me Lord," followed by "Jesus, We Worship You" in sign language. Two anthems, "O Give Thanks Unto the Lord," and "I Can Sing My Praise," followed.

After the choir sang one verse of "God's World Today," Samatha directed the congregation in the remaining verses, and Kaci recited Romans 12:2. Next, Louann Salazar said I John 4:14b, and Samantha, Jill, Kaci, and Ashley Stevens sang "O Little Town of Bethlehem."

Following the anthem, "Sing Gloria," the choir played the Ghana stone game "Obwisana" ("O Gamma, I just hurt my finger on a rock."). The fun song "I Don't Know" included a verse written by younger choir members.

Following the concert, choir awards were presented. Choir leaders are Elaine Risser, director; Francis Dixon, teacher/accompanist; and Jenifer Davis, teacher.

Llan Barkley, Louann, Ashley, Rachelle Renfro, and Elizabeth played resonator bells on the hymn, "Come, Christians, Join to Sing." Rachelle quoted Psalm 100: 1-2, followed by the anthem, "A Psalm for Singing."

Next the groups sang four partner songs, "Just Singing Around," to illustrate the use of ostinato melody, harmony, and descent. Jill directed the congregation as they joined the choir to sing the last verses of "I Love Thee," followed by John 3:16 by Llan.

Jill, Samantha, and Kaci played bells for "Sing to God" and "Sing to the Lord a Beautiful Song." Between these songs Kaci directed the congregation in an anthem version of "Come, Thou Almighty King." Samantha quoted Romans 10:9.

The hymn "Tell the Good News" featured each choir member with a short solo. Then Ashley said Mark 16:15b and the choir sang "Go Ye!"

After Jill recited Genesis 1:1, 3:1a, the choir closed with an anthem version of the hymn "For the Beauty of the Earth," and the anthem, "Easter Joy!"

Farm and Ranch Business Management for Women Landowners

WANTED - Women landowners who are interested in learning about writing leases and saving taxes. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service will hold a workshop at the Holiday Inn Civic Center, 801 Avenue Q in Lubbock, July 10-12, 1990.

"Many Texas women find themselves thrust into land-owning situations for which they have very little training or background," said Wayne A. Hayenga, Economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Frequently a woman is 'in charge' of property upon the death of her husband or after inheriting land." The entire 3-day workshop will be an opportunity for women to explore income-generating and tax saving opportunities for their farms and ranches.

The first day of the seminar will be concerned with the outlook for agricultural land investments and how they compare to other investments. Also, since most women who inherit land don't want to operate it themselves, a special session

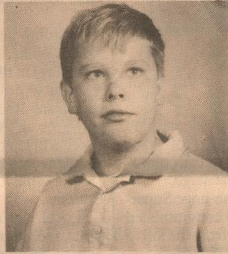
Area Piano Students Win State Honors

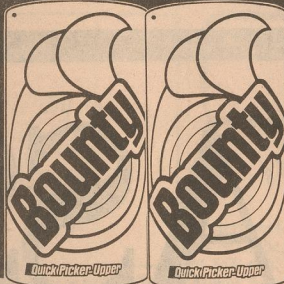

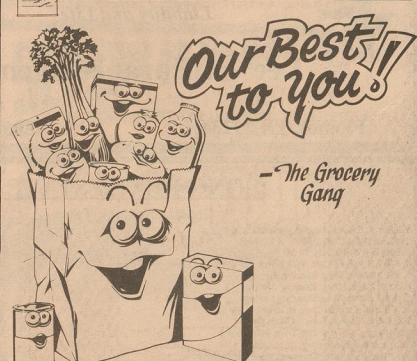
