## Injured Farmer Drives 4 Miles To Secure Aid

F. M. Casey, 75, farmer in the Whiteflat community since 1917, probably owes his life to his ability to think and act in an extreme emergency. Early Saturday he was run down by a disc plow while working alone on his farm 4 miles east and north of the Whiteflat community.

Bleeding profusely from a right hand seriously mangled, a lacerated left hand and suffering a painful hip injury, Mr. Casey managed to stop the motor on his tractor and reach his automobile. He drove the four miles to Whiteflat and was brought to Stanley hospital by T. M. Dixon. At times he declared he would "black-out" from pain and loss of blood. He would stop his car to regain sufficient acumen to resume the journey upon which his life depended. His condition yesterday was declared excellent.

At his bedside following the accident were his two sons, Raymond Casey of Wichita Falls; W. N. Casey of Abilene, and two daughters, Mrs. Grady Acker of Stamford and Mrs. A. T. Bruce of Sweetwater.

## German Girl Impressed By West Texas Farming

Dr. Sigrid Gschwind, 22, of Frankfurt, Germany, who has a Doctor's Degree in agronomy, was impressed with farming and methods in West Texas when she visited there two weeks ago.

Miss Gschwind, who is an exchange student at Purdue University on a Fulbright scholarship, was a guest in the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Barkley. She accompanied Mr. and Mrs. Joe Baumgardner of Wellington, and their daughter, from home where they were enroute to Lubbock, where the latter attends Texas Tech.

Mr. and Mrs. Baumgardner, accompanied by their daughter, had been to Lafayette, Indiana visiting their son, Marion, who is a student in Purdue. Miss Gschwind accompanied them home on a tour of this area which included a visit to Texas Technological College. She is scheduled to return to Germany in August.

The German girl is doing research work in Purdue. She said no travel money was provided for her to visit farming country south and west of the Indiana university. She had been told that most of the vast area was desert and waste. Instead she said the country showed outstanding agricultural advancement employing the most modern farming methods.

Miss Gschwind confided in her Texas friends that she had a sweetheart (also holding a Doctor's Degree in agronomy) waiting in Germany. His people's farmland had been confiscated by the Communists. When she was offered the opportunity of attending a university here on the scholarship, they hoped it might be possible for both of them to come to the United States. Currently Miss Gschwind is attempting to earn \$500 before August when she must return. She said the money would make it possible for both of them to come to this country.

Bob Stinson Home Destroyed In Storm

The recent storm which hit Paducah and outlying communities, destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Stinson of the Hackberry community, and they barely escaped with their lives. They are parents of Miss Viola Stinson of the Stanley Hospital staff of nurses.

## Killed Rattlesnake

The accident resulted when Mr. Casey stopped his tractor on the road and saw a large rattlesnake under the plow. He decided he could kill the snake by running over it with the disc plow. He said that he must have stepped off the tractor clutch thinking the engine was disengaged. The tractor lunged about the time he stepped to the ground and the disc plow knocked him down. The tractor went through a five-wire fence on the Fish farm, broke down a number of trees and circled back toward the road coming to a stop in a bar ditch when it slanted sufficiently to take a wheel from the ground. It was at this point that Mr. Casey managed to turn off the ignition switch.

## Decline Shown In Matador Schools

### Lunchroom Shows Profit Through Aid of Commodities; 1,334 Free Meals to Needy

SCHOLASTIC DECLINE in Matador schools is announced after a final summary of the average daily attendance last term by the school board. Scholastic census indicates a loss of 65 (decline from 396 to 331) between 1953 and 1954. Average daily attendance loss was from 293.72 to 271.32 during the same period. Severe drought conditions prevailing during the past year were blamed for the loss.

The student loss will not materially affect the school next season, altho it will reduce classroom units from 12 to 11, according to the opinions of school officials. Members of the school board see little prospect of any emergency resulting from the district's loss of one classroom unit. Possibility exists only in a large influx of transient workers coming here, or the return of many of the families who moved away because of drought conditions. Only change anticipated is that due to the small enrollment (18) only one 1st grade will be maintained.

## Rep. Elbert Reeves Lions Club Speaker

Rep. Elbert Reeves Tuesday was principal speaker at the regular luncheon meeting of the Turkey Lions club. He has accepted a number of speaking engagements in his four-county representative district of Hall, Donley, Childress and Motley counties.

Rep. Reeves has begun his active campaign for re-election to second term as representative of the 80th district. Lions clubs and other civic organizations, however, prohibit participation in any kind of politics.

## Rainfall Trebles That Of Last Year

Total rainfall for the first five months of 1953 was less than one third of the 11.06 inches registered here for the first five months of 1954, according to City Water Superintendent Lee Burns.

January 1953 the rainfall was 28-inch, this year 08-inch; February 48-inch, this year 14-inch; March 62-inch, this year 14-inch; April 1.18-inch, this year 2.60-inches; May 73-inch, this year 8.24-inches.

Total rainfall in 1953 was 16.58 inches, with 3.29 total in the first five months, 27-inch in June, 4.84 inches in July, 2.92-inches in August, 25-inch in September, 4.62 inches in October, 38-inch in November and none in December.

lines and telephone lines were damaged in all directions and it was several hours before the damage of the storm was known. Paducah's city hall and fire station was unroofed and drenching rain soaked both floors, including many city records and other property. Fire Chief and Mrs. Price Sandlin, who live at the fire hall, said their apartment was flooded. They set up a coffee and sandwich station behind the fire trucks for firemen, officers, telephone and electric linemen and others working through the night. Childress sent an emergency fire truck to stand by until the emergency was passed.

The J. F. Powell Butane and Appliance Company's storage building for trucks, was demolished within a block of the city hall. The brick structure was for many years the Ford agency in Paducah.

Tree limbs and signs littered the Paducah streets. Awnings were ripped away from many buildings and some trees were uprooted. There was no evidence of panic and most of the community's residents had retired by ten o'clock. Although water was three feet deep immediately after the storm at the intersection of US Highway 70 and US Highway 83 in Paducah, the total rainfall recorded there was only 1.30 inches.

The Valley View gymnasium looked as if it had been bombed or had exploded, with brick and debris thrown away from the building. Paducah residents said heavy dust and sand filled the air as the storm hit. None had witnessed a tornadoic cloud.

Mrs. Virgil Rattan called the Tribune early yesterday and reported that she had watched the cloud east of here and that she had seen a tornado dip to the earth two or three times in the direction of Paducah.

spoke of running his newspaper press from windmill power. Mr. Moore was a political figure in the early days of the county, serving as County Treasurer from 1904 to 1908, and was also County Democratic Chairman for a number of years. He was organizer and president of one of Matador's first banks, the Farmers and Merchants Bank, which later became the First National Bank.

After he sold the newspaper, Mr. Moore became a barber for a short time before entering the grocery business.

He was married to Miss Effie Criswell, September 1, 1898, at Matador, and they celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary here in 1948. Six children were born to this union. One son, Ray Peyton, drowned at the age of 11 years.

#### Survived By Family

Besides his wife, he is survived by 3 daughters: Mrs. John C. Russell and Mrs. John Hamilton of Matador, and Mrs. Merrell Harper of Lubbock; 2 sons: John C. of Washington, D. C. and William R. of Fort Worth; 11 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren. Among other survivors are a number of nieces and nephews who regarded "Uncle Rans" in the light of a parent.

Mr. Moore was converted and joined the Methodist Church at the age of 16, and lived his religion in faithfulness to his church for over 60 years, and in kindness to his fellowman.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 3 p. m. in the First Methodist Church. The pastor, Rev. W. V. O'Kelly, officiated, assisted by a former pastor, Rev. W. B. Vaughn.

### Mesquite Control Is Discussed At Soil Group Meet

Ideal conditions during June for the control of mesquite were discussed here Tuesday during the regular meeting of the Upper Pease Soil Conservation District. County Agent Bill Palmeyer announced that Spur Experiment Station Superintendent Charles Fisher had advised present conditions as ideal through June.

He said the recommended mixture includes one-half pound of 2-4-5T acid with one gallon of diesel fuel and three gallons of water (rain water is preferred). Mesquites on sand soil respond better to the control application. Fisher also pointed out that June spraying will produce satisfactory weed control. Weeds are a present problem in most pastures, he said. Mr. Palmeyer advised that bulletins on mesquite control are available from his office.

Other business of the meeting included approval of payment for grass seeders, now available through the Matador and Paducah FFA chapters.
