Plans Made For Annual Poppy Sale

Plans for the annual Buddy Poppy sale were announced as complete yesterday by leaders in the VFW Ladies' Auxiliary. Made by disabled veterans the Buddy Poppies will be sold Saturday in Matador, Flomot and Roaring Springs.

Proceeds of the sale are divided in the following manner, according to Mrs. Ruby Webb, Auxiliary president: Based on a 25¢ contribution, 15¢ remains with the county VFW post. One cent and one-half cents go to the state VFW welfare program; one cent to the national rehabilitation service; one cent to the national VFW home for widows and orphaned children, and the remainder to cover cost of materials and to pay hospitalized veterans who assemble the Buddy Poppies.

Especially praise-worthy is the VFW National Home, located at Eaton Rapids, Michigan, where the veterans' organization has set up a model child village. The children live in regular homes erected by the VFW. Ranging from infants to high school children, each home has both boys and girls, with five to ten children in each home, supervised by a house mother. Each child is assigned regular household chores, attends public school.

Texas Commission Slates Game Meet

A meeting important to hunters, fishermen and landowners will be held here in the district court room at the county court house, Thursday, June 3, at 8:00 p. m. It was announced this week.

Representatives of the Texas Game and Fish Commission will hold a public hearing on proposed regulations to be recommended to the Commission for adoption at its July meeting. Biologists will review their findings and explain the current status of game species.

Public discussion will be invited, and resolutions from the floor will be transmitted to the Commission for consideration.

There will be a free showing of a wildlife motion picture, and the general public, including children, is invited to attend.

Farmers Smile At Reversed Problem

A YEAR AGO Motley county farmers could not plant their crops because the ground was so hard and dry that it could not be plowed. Today they can not plant their crops because the fields are so wet a tractor would bog out of sight. With the limited cotton-planting season approaching, farmers are worried but they continue to smile.

Since the last issue of the Tribune a total 2.41 inches of rainfall has been officially recorded in Matador, bringing the year's total far above the 30-year average and creating lakes of most fields. Most of the county has received soaking rains during the past week and some areas have been flooded.

Highway crews worked desperately late Saturday in keeping flooded Tongue River from destroying the State Highway 70 bridge south of Roaring Springs. Rainfall reported as between four and six inches in the Wolf Creek area west of Roaring Springs caused the river to go out of its banks.

Showers have fallen almost daily. Clouds from any direction can produce rain. Range conditions are the best here in 12 years according to ranchers. All earth tanks and water holes are full to overflowing. Grass and

pointed in the near future, will be called upon frequently to review agency operations and make sure they are efficiently serving local needs. County committees will be relied upon to an ever greater extent than in the past to help adapt national policies to local needs.

Services of other public and private organizations will be used to the maximum extent possible. County home demonstration agents will help Farmers Home Administration borrowers with their family living problems. Every possible step will be taken to make sure that no government funds are advanced when private or cooperative credit is available to meet the needs. Lenders will be urged to supply funds for insured farm ownership loans.

Measures already taken by the agency to render better service at less cost include the reorganization of the national, area finance, and state offices which resulted in a savings of more than \$1,500,000. A duplicate set of files on 600,000 real estate loans has been eliminated as well as all of the work formerly performed by state offices in reporting borrowers progress.

Improvements Discussed

A number of additional improvements were discussed at the meeting that will place more authority in the hands of county supervisors, make the programs easier to operate and enable the agency to serve more farmers than in the past. Most of the revisions are already in the hands of field employees and will soon be in full effect.

To expedite real estate loan making the engineering and appraisal services of the agency will be placed in county offices, closer to the farmers to be served. Engineer-appraisers were formerly stationed in state offices.

Plans Advanced To Improve Services Of FHA To Farmers

Measures to speed up and further improve Farmers Home Administration services to farmers have recently developed in Washington under the direction of Secretary Benson, T. T. Perkins. State Director at Dallas has announced.

Mr. Perkins returned recently from a meeting at Oklahoma City where the new steps to decentralize and streamline agency operations were explained by Washington officials. L. A. Mchemel, Jr., W. M. Burkes, and the State Field Representatives also attended the meeting.

In accordance with Secretary Benson's policy of placing more control on agricultural programs in local hands, many of the decisions formerly made in state office will now be made in the counties. County Supervisors, the employees who deal directly with the farmers, will have final approval on a larger number of loans and will have more authority in working with other creditors and in taking steps to help borrowers solve their financial and farming problems.

Committees To Serve

Greater use will be made of state and county committees. New state committees, to be ap-

Practically all property insurance matters have been transferred from state to county offices. The agency's emergency loan program was stressed at the meetings. State Directors and their staffs were told to move into an area whenever a drought or a flood strikes and when the crisis has passed to move out again as quickly as possible.

None of the basic policies under which the agency operates are being changed. The same amount of emphasis is placed on helping farmers obtain adequate land and equipment resources, develop good systems of farming, and adopt proper farm and home management practices.

Quitaque Loan Made

The local Farmers Home Ad-

ministration closed a direct farm ownership loan in the Quitaque area May 18, 1954, for \$16,000. The size of the farm was a 280 acre dryland farm. This is the first farm ownership loan made in this unit since 1947.

Before any applicant can qualify for any FHA services he must be considered by the local county committee. This includes debt settlement cases, disaster loans, special livestock loans, water facilities loans and farm ownership loans—either direct or insured mortgage.

The local county committee is composed of Edgar O. Lee, Melvin S. Thacker and Theodore M. Dixon. State committeeman for the West Texas Area is Orlin Stark, President of the First National Bank, Quitaque, Texas.

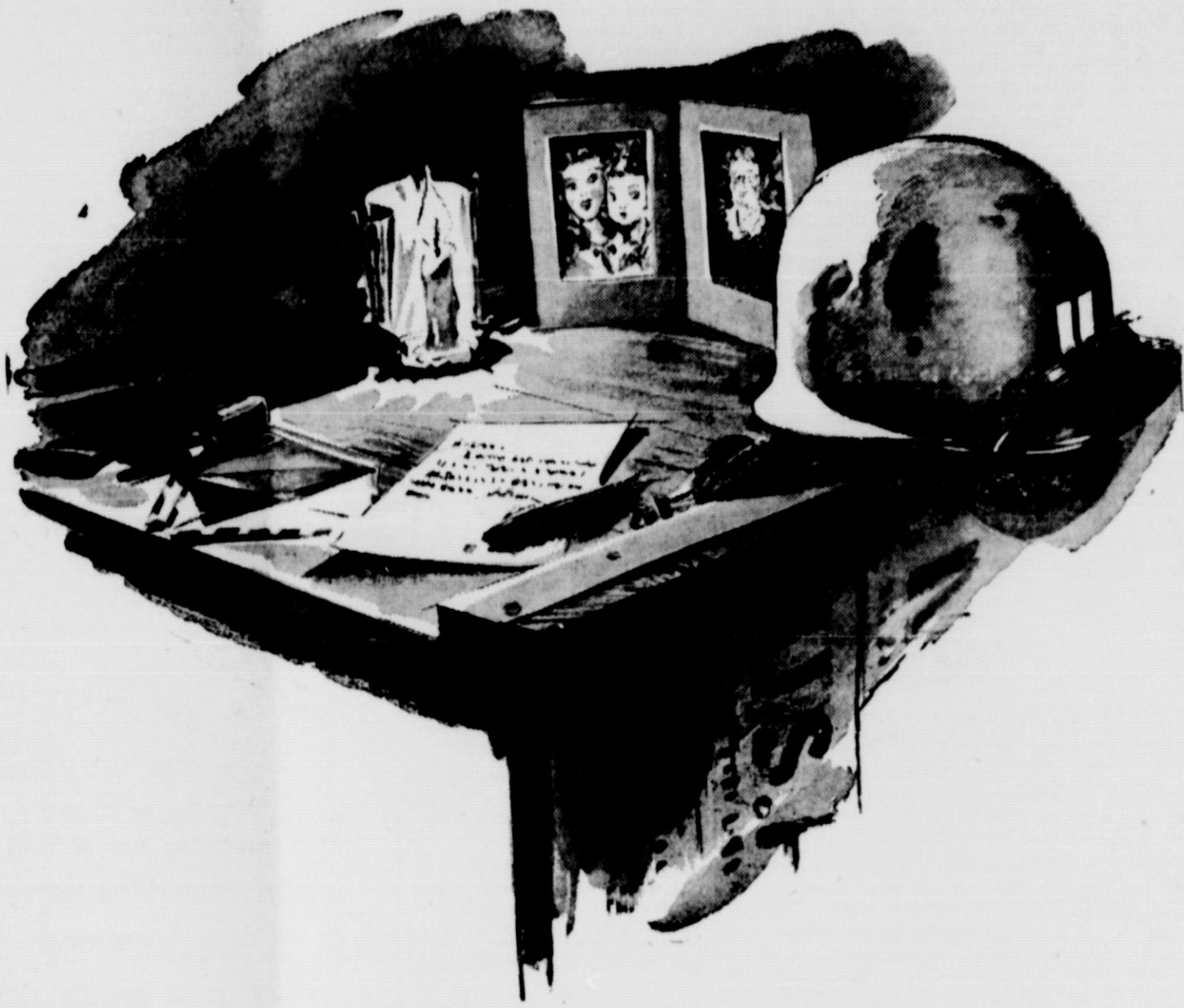

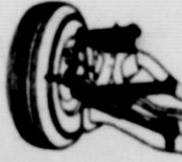

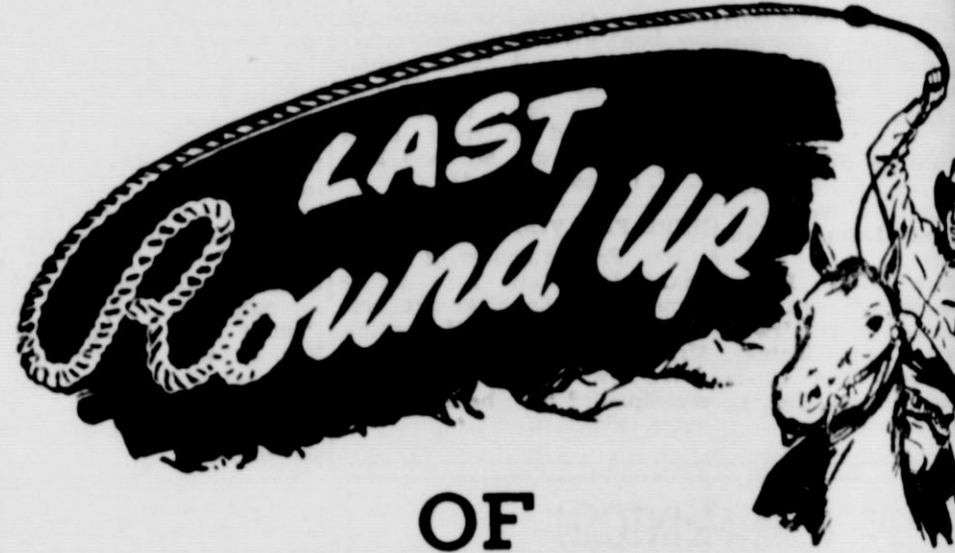
