## Minister Says UN Stronger

"We have proof that the United Nations is making progress and growing stronger because of the many mistakes it is making," Rev. W. V. O'Kelly told the Matador Lions membership at the club's regular luncheon meeting held in the Methodist church basement Tuesday.

Lion O'Kelly, a member of the program committee, said the previously arranged program, had "fallen down" and at the last moment he had been "elected" as a substitute. His brief, concise address received spirited applause.

"Mistakes do not indicate the UN is not making progress," Rev. O'Kelly declared, "because failure merely illustrates God's laws. I am glad religion is changed, for without change we perish."

He listed three common heresies, including the absence of early training for children, the trend to receive without earning and "sin without impunity."

"Man is supposed to live above the level of the negative life," he concluded. Boss Lion Bill Moss announced that the annual Father-Son banquet scheduled for next week (sponsored by the Lions) would be held in lieu of the second scheduled February meeting. He said, however, the directors breakfast would be held as scheduled. He told members that attendance to the union church services Sunday evening would be credited on attendance records.

## Post Office Here Seeks Proposals On Building Lease

Proposals are sought by the post office department for quarters lease, which means the lease on the present building is approaching expiration, and not necessarily that the department is seeking a new location in Matador. Bids are sought through advertisements posted in the post office lobby for terms of five or ten years.

Excerpts from the advertisement read as follows: "Proposals are hereby solicited, to be received in the office of Post Office Inspector J. E. Cauley (Rt. 225, P. O. Bldg., Tel. FOrtune 0371, Ex. 52, Ft. Worth) up to and including March 4, 1954, to furnish quarters suitable for post office purposes at Matador, Texas, under a lease subject to the provisions of the standard form of lease used by the Post Office Department, at a stated price per annum, including heat, water, light, power, toilet facilities, plumbing, heating and lighting fixtures, safe and/or vault, and all necessary furniture and equipment, for a term of five or ten years from December 9, 1954. Floor space of about 1500 square feet is desired.

## Location Is Important

"Important considerations are a reasonably central location, good daylight, and accessibility to rear or side entrance for mails. . . . "The Post Office Department reserves the right to reject any or all proposals, to negotiate further with proponents for better terms, or to endeavor either before or after closing date above indicated to secure offers on suitable properties, in addition to those submitted in response to this advertisement. "Alternate proposals both with and without safe equipment are desired. Proposals without fuel, light and power will be considered."

Present post office building was built in 1934 especially for the office purpose by the late Oscar Hall of Paducah, who died in 1953. Two ten-year leases on the building will expire December 9, 1954. The post office was moved to its present location from the First State Bank building, December 9, 1934.

## Plenty Of Shadow On Ground Hog Day

There was plenty of sunshine in West Texas Tuesday and if the ground hog did not see his shadow, the little rodent is in a coma, or has gone to Florida for the winter.

Candlemas Day or groundhog day (February 2) left no doubt about sunshine. Except for a few high clouds, warm sunlight shone throughout the day and extended into yesterday to bring about spring-like weather. Long range weather forecasters declare, however, that the groundhog is correct in predicting more winter. (Tradition says that if the groundhog sees his shadow we may expect six more weeks of winter.)

With the area still staggering under the effects of last year's drought, farmers and ranchers are seriously interested in the weather prediction, especially if the promised cold is accompanied by rain and snow.

## Player Injured In Game With Turkey

Victory of the Matador Girls basketball team over Turkey, with a score of 62-41 in a game Friday night at Turkey, was overshadowed by an accident which occurred in the last few minutes of the last quarter, sending a Matador player to the hospital.

Lois Blevins Hughes was brought to Stanley Hospital where examination disclosed a fractured nose, shock and slight concussion, which she received when she collided with a player on the Turkey team, minutes before the game ended. The Turkey girl suffered only a "bump" on her head.

Winning Friday's game placed Matador in the district bracket for the fourth straight year. The district tournament is scheduled for February 16, at Lakeview. Final game of the season for the Matador girls will be played here with Quitaque next week.

## Matador Golfer Sets Record On Course At Temple

A Matador, Texas, golfer scored the near-impossible Saturday on the Temple Country club course, an eagle two on No. 5. L. C. Harp, furniture and hardware dealer from Matador, dropped a 190-yard four-iron shot onto the rain-softened green and the ball dribbled in for the first eagle on that hole in the history of the course.

No. 5, originally designed for a par five but later changed to par four, is 417 yards long and the green is blocked from the front by two traps. Harp's drive carried about 225 yards and his second shot was true.

The visiting golfer was playing with the Drs. Brindley, G. V. Sr., G. V. Jr., and Hanes, and C. A. Schulz. An ardent amateur who travels from 50 to 80 miles from his home to get in as many as five rounds weekly, Harp said that the last time he scored an eagle he lost the hole, but not Saturday.—Temple Daily Telegram.

## Ticket Demand Gets Out Of Control

### 'Law West Of' Forced Into 2nd Performance

"Law West of the Pecos" to be presented at the Legion building tomorrow night by a group of local talent players, has sold more tickets than anticipated. In fact the sale of tickets went out of control yesterday when orders from neighboring towns were held in abeyance.

More orders had piled up yesterday afternoon when Director Marian Woodruff called a hasty conference with sponsors of the play. The only solution for the unexpected emergency required a second performance. The first show will start at 7:30 (admittance for sandwiches and pop at 7). The second show will start at 9:45. Second show tickets are now on sale and reservations are being made for tables during the 9-45 performances. The prices for either show is the same, \$1 for adults and 60c for children.

Mrs. Woodruff said tickets already delivered are for the first show. The 2nd show tickets are printed "Late Performance". Additional sandwiches are being prepared to serve the 2nd show crowd. The building will be cleared immediately after the end of the first performance and table reservations placed in order for the 9-45 crowd. Patrons who may desire to see both shows will be required to have both tickets in advance, and to vacate the building after the first performance in order that tables may again be put in order. They will then return after the 15-minute interlude, with the late-comers.

Crooner Hits Stride Ticket sales skyrocketed when information was made public that "Has Ben" Edwards would sing a solo. Director Woodruff spent half a day in an attempt to harmonize the crooner's voice with a piano, and is now trying to harmonize a piano with his voice. The outlook is not too promising. ## Methodists Accept Memorial Hospital

Northwest Texas Conference Methodists meeting at First Methodist Church, Lubbock, Friday voted to accept ownership and operation of Lubbock Memorial Hospital and the Kruger, Hutchinson, Overton Clinic by a vote of 190-45. Total assets are valued at \$4,490,943.21.

Action followed informal discussion of several years and negotiations which began last September. Lubbock Memorial Hospital and the clinic are new plants opened in August, 1953. Hospital founders were Dr. J. T. Krueger, Dr. W. T. Hutchinson and Dr. M. C. Overton. Started in 1918 as Lubbock Sanitarium, the hospital became Lubbock General Hospital in 1942 and Lubbock Memorial in 1945. In recent years, the hospital has been operated on a non-profit basis. Present facilities include a 230 bed hospital (230 beds and 50 bassinets) and is nine stories. Originally operated in downtown Lubbock, it is now located in Southwest Lubbock. ### Polio Funds Rocket To Top Earlier Estimates

GENEROSITY of the people of Motley county was reflected last week in the voluntary contributions to the national drive to fight infantile paralysis. Earlier estimates that the economic position of the county because of drought conditions might render the drive futile, were rejected through the willing response of the citizenship.

No quota was set for the county, yet the response to the appeal made by mothers of Roaring Springs and Matador in the Friday night "Porchlight" campaign brought between \$400 and \$500 in contributions. County Judge Vance Gilbreath, chairman of the drive, announced Tuesday at the Matador Lions club meeting that he had a total of \$776.46 reported.

Topping the list of contributions on the per capita basis was the Northfield community which reported over \$100. Pioneer Ben F. Simpson subscribed an amount sufficient to place the community's drive over its self-assigned quota of \$100.

## Leon Ice Company Adds Plains Town To Customer List

Another Plains town will look to Matador for its ice supply. A contract has recently been completed between a retailer in Tulsa and the Leon Ice Company which will purchase between 25 and 30 tons of ice weekly during the summer months.

E. W. Blackburn, manager in charge of the ice manufacturing plant here for the past five years made the announcement this week. The agreement is for the purchase of approximately three truck loads weekly. Leon ice company truck carries 9 tons. Tulsa formerly obtained ice from Plainview.

## Decrease Shown In County Vote Power

Motley county has lost some of its former voting power according to final tabulations on poll tax receipts issued before the Saturday closing hour. Total poll tax and exemption receipts issued was 989, according to Miss Rachel Patton, deputy clerk in the office of Sheriff and Tax Collector John Stotts. The number showed a decrease of 293 as compared with 1282 issued on the same date in 1952.

It is pointed out that the loss in voting power may be caused by a loss in county population, rather than the economic condition, since property tax collections both in the county and city offices, are close to normal. The total crop failure in much of the county last year has forced many residents to seek employment elsewhere. Indications are, however, that most of the remaining qualified voters have paid their poll taxes or are exempt.

## Cottle County Gets Explorer

General Crude Oil Co., has scheduled to drill an exploratory tester in the southwestern portion of Cottle county. The company's No. 33-1-C Swenson Development is slated for a depth of 6,500 feet. Rotary drilling operations will commence at once.

Exact location is 1,980 ft from north and east line of Section 33, Block B, John H. Stephens Survey, 13 miles southwest of Paducah, on a lease of 15,199 acres.

**GAS DISCOVERED IN HALL WILDCAT**

Natural gas of unknown quantity, was discovered in a wildcat test about a mile southwest of Hulver in Hall county Friday afternoon.

The test, being drilled by a mast pole rig or deep core drilling machine, is located on the W. B. Davidson place.

Gas was discovered at around 1,630 feet. The gas has been shut off and the test is being deepened and drilling is now at 1,680 feet. The Fox Drilling Company of Dallas is drilling the test and 10,000 acres are under lease in the area.

The gas was discovered in a soft lime formation, according to C. L. Sloan who lives nearby.

They just don't take time to think that they are sixty percent to blame instead of laying the entire blame on the teachers and children.

The teachers are always encouraging students to bring their parents to school and let them talk to the teachers. But do they? No, they say their parents have other interests. Parents should be more interested in the children and the activities they participate in instead of their own and the things they enjoy.

Just put yourself in a child's place who has played his heart out in a ball game at school and comes home to hear his parents' reaction as follows: He is shoved into the background as his parents plan for an evening out. "That's nice Johnny, now, run out side and play." This gives a child the feeling of not being appreciated or wanted. He will seek friendship and companionship elsewhere. It may be a local pool hall, a delinquent gang, or a dope ring. Here, he feels wanted because he belongs and is a part of the gang. Where this will lead, who knows? Life in a penitentiary, perhaps, or even be killed by the police.

Lots of people's children get into trouble and the teacher is blamed every time. The teachers are always blamed for the things for which the parents are responsible. Too many people leave their children for the teachers to look after instead of taking an interest in the child's activities and school work. Parents should work with and not against the teachers.

There is little activity in a town as small as Matador for the teen-agers. People don't even try to provide outside interest for children because they say it's the school's responsibility. When the school does provide parties for the students, no one seems interested. They say "I'll go if there isn't anything else happening." Another example of this is where the school provides athletic contests, parents always have something else to do. A recent example of this was at a basket-

ball game this fall. There were thirty students playing basketball and there were only four parents to watch this game.

There would be sufficient entertainment for the students if each student's parents would devote one evening a year to entertaining their children and their classmates. Some say they aren't financially able to give parties, but you don't have to have refreshments. All the students need is a place to congregate and someone to supervise.

There are three organizations that can save the youth of America. They are the church, the school, and most important, the home.

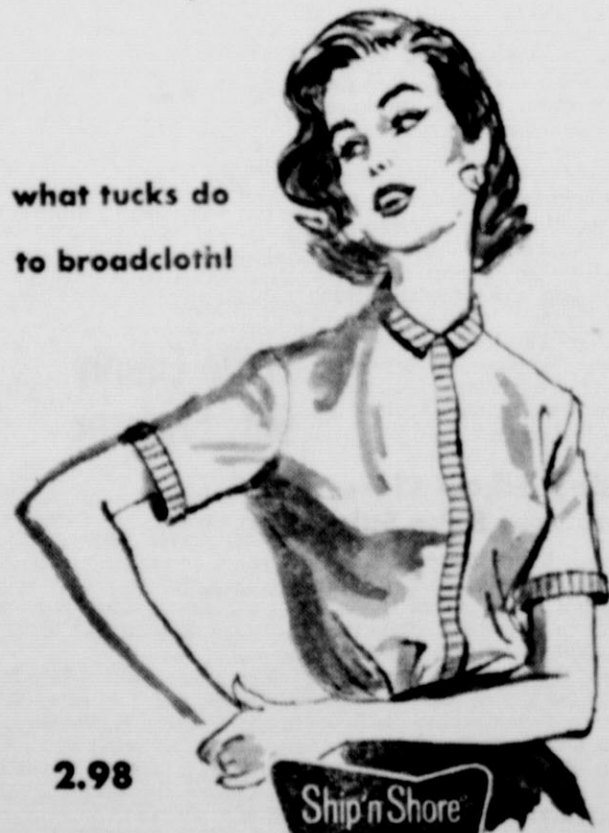

Prepare Beds Now For Spring Flowers Says County Agent

Spring flowers will be harder and earlier if you prepare beds now with soil conservation techniques accepted by those who know. Whether you live on a corner lot or a 100-acre farm, you can be a good soil conservationist," Bill Palmeyer, Motley county agent, advises gardeners. Spade the soil now, leaving it rough to absorb more winter rain or snow. This is another means of making the flower bed soil more productive. Add super phosphate or acid phosphate fertilizer for they will not wash into the soil. Phosphate is necessary for a good crop of blooms or spring flowers.

An easy way to do fall preparation, is to cover the flower bed with several inches of leaves straw or other decayed vegetable mulch, add acid phosphate or super phosphate at the rate of a half to one cup per 25 square feet and spade the area to a depth of eight to 12 inches, leaving the surface rough.

While planning to simplify your work, arrange to have one or two large flower beds rather than several scattered plantings. This, according to the county agent, will save many hours of water, spray, dust or gather flowers.

A winter cover crop of legumes, oats or other green manure will be as beneficial when turned under in a flower bed as a cotton or corn field. County agricultural agents can advise on the type of cover crop to use and when to plant and turn under for best results.

Additional suggestions are given in Farmers' Bulletin No. 1171 Growing Annual Flowering Plants. Ask your county agent for a copy.
