The Motley County Farm Service Agency (FSA) has announced a new effort to match farmers and ranchers suffering from hay shortages with producers having hay surpluses.

Some areas have surpluses, and some have severe shortages. This is a new and exciting way to get produc-ers in both situations in touch with each other.

Hay net is a national clearinghouse for producers with shortages or sur-pluses of hay. Farmers and ranchers are encouraged to sign up and register their hay situation at the local FSA Office. FSA will use its nationwide computer network to share the information Producers in need of hay will be provided with lists of the closest producers with hay to spare, and vice versa, allowing them to contact each other and make arrangements.

Hay net will remain in operation for six months. Further information on Hay Net is available at the Motley County FSA Office in Matador,



To smile and to take the first step, And you will see happiness bloom On the face of your human brother or sister.





Motley County ISD has received notice from the Texas Education Agency that it has been named a Recognized District.

Each year schools are graded on three base indicators, passing percentage on the Spring administration of the TAAS, previous year's dropout rate, and the previous year's attendance rate. TEA then determines the accountability rating for each school campus or district in the state. There are four ratings that TEA uses, exemunacceptable/low-performing.

Motley County ISD received the rating of Recognized and had to meet the following criteria. The passing percentage on the TAAS must be at least 80% in each subject area (all students and each student group). Student groups are African American, Hispanic, White, and Economically Disadvantaged. 

Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. 


