About the time the Tribune printed its first issue in Matador in December, 1933, a frail, high school student began putting around the shop, which was owned by his brother-in-law. Some dark substance clung to his hands. It was printer's ink. Last week a 200-pound-plus Marine veteran set Vol. 1, No. 1 under the masthead of the Dayton News, and Burrell Tipton as editor. A new newspaper was spawned out of 21 years experience which had its beginning in the Tribune shop.

Tipton is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Tipton of Matador and a brother of Mrs. Douglas Meador, associate editor of the Tribune. He was the printer here

for eight years then followed the war with four rugged years in the South Pacific. He was married before his release from the Marine Corps and returned to the Tribune for two additional years, before he and his family moved to Sweetwater. He later worked on the Conroe Courier and until recently was employed as a printer by the Liberty Vindicator.

Dayton is about half way between Houston and Beaumont. The News is being printed by the Kountze News at Kountze, Texas, about 40 miles from Dayton. Tipton works four days weekly in the Kountze plant.

Mrs. Tipton, who is associate editor of the new enterprise, has an office in Dayton, where advertising, news and subscriptions are received.

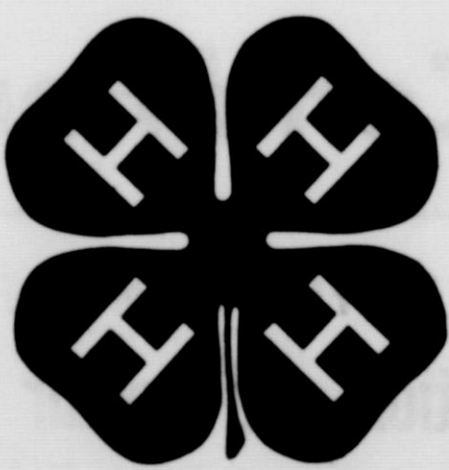
