A Second Glance

NOTE: The following is a reprint of a column by M. I. Hall, editor of the Greater Lubbock Retailer News. It is lengthy, but well worth reading.

For two years almost every day people have asked me: "How much longer, Hall, will our Country stand FREE? When will the day come that this Country will be taken over by the Communists, or we go Communist?"

Things have gotten so bad in Congress with the giving of the Panama Canal away, selling Russia half our wheat reserve for less than cost; the Bankers lending Russia more than \$50 billion, and allowing the Russians to come to the United States and pirate or steal 75 per cent of the technical know-how to industrialize Russia. Not to mention the steadily declining value of our dollar. I have had men in Lubbock, Texas tell me, some of them read the "Spotlight", that they have advised their children to get ready for a complete collapse of the American Dollar, and expect a 100 per cent Communist Bureau managed Government.

The latest SHOCK to the NATION is that the IRS is planning to cancel out all the TAX EXEMPT PRIVILEGES of private and Christian schools to meet numerous demands that would place them under the supervision of the Government as the Public Schools now are with the consequent elimination of the Christian moral teachings, intensified integration of both pupils and teachers, no doubt Government approved textbooks, and other restrictions that would lower the standards now upheld by the Christian Schools.

When the Federal Judge ruling that the busing of children for racial balance took effect, the opening of Private Schools has been blossoming for the past eight years. A new Private and Christian School opens up every seven hours somewhere in the United States.

These Schools teach the principles of American Christian Culture based upon Judeo-Christian ETHICS, CHARACTER, MORALS, INTEGRITY -- believe in the Almighty GOD as our creator, love thy Father and Mother, don't lie, steal, cheat, covet not your neighbor's wife, do unto others as you would have them do unto you, be loyal to your Country and obey the laws of the land.

In the Public Schools today there is no prayer, children are exposed to and taught standards that tear down all former moral and ethical concepts - that GOD IS DEAD, pre-sex before marriage is OK - covet your neighbor's wife is a new life style, drugs are a new experience, take a trip, the school teacher admonish the children to stand up to their parents as you have your rights. The Progressive Education by John Dewey as has been fostered in our schools by the Communist controlled Educational Bureaus is a permissive philosophy for children to find their own way. For years no grades have been handed out to children as not important.

After writing this column for years, I have been bombarded with questions as to how can the Government fight a NO-WIN WAR in North Korea, South Vietnam, and under the United Nations flag in North Korea. Why can't Congress stop such foolishness?

During the Korean War, when the former President Johnson was a Senator, he granted me a private interview, set up by the now deceased John Lee Smith of Lubbock, former Lieutenant Governor of Texas. As a young man John Lee Smith served as a professor in Madrid, Spain, teaching metaphysics and Spanish law.

My interview with Senator Johnson was held in the Hotel Lubbock, and I was to get secrets-censored information.

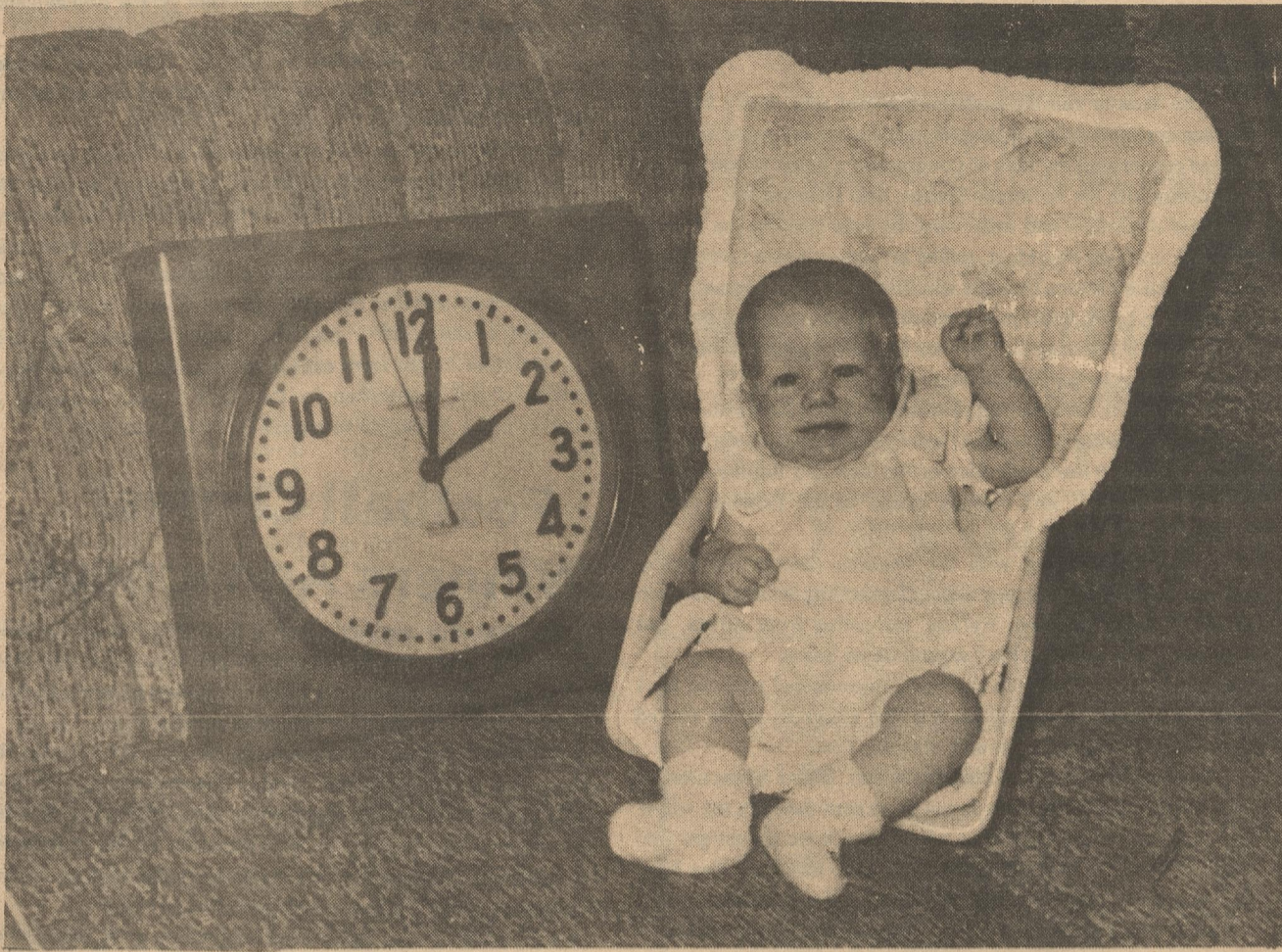

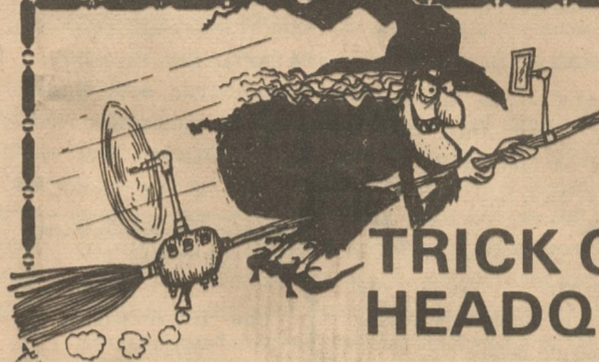

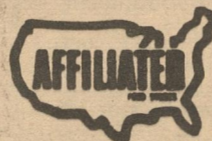

demoralized over the conduct of the Korean War, with our boys fighting under the United Nations, with a Russian General that is wired in on all military activities from day to day!

I wish to propose, Senator, that 25 per cent of the Senators and Congressmen, do a three month hitch in the trenches with the young American boys fighting this NO-WIN WAR, rotating every three months until the War is over.

Senator, the reason for this is that Lubbock Citizens who have sons fighting in Korea feel that with Congressmen at the front with the boys that Congress will get the American spirit to win on the Battle Field, and really let the Chinese Gooks have the American boot.

The national goal for Sunday School High Attendance Day 1978 in Southern Baptist churches is five million.

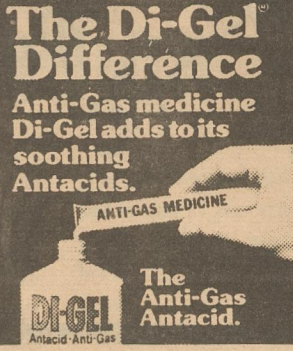

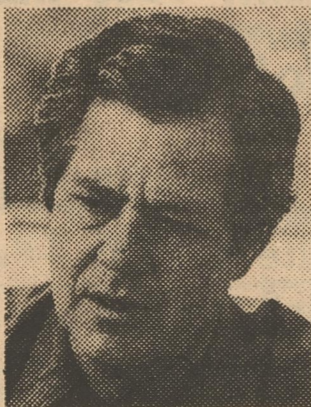

It will not be a free capitalist government. It will either be communist or a dictatorship controlled by the Trilateral Commission. The Trilateral Commission says that a one world government will be a socialist type government, but is socialism really a free government?

What is the Trilateral Commission? It is an organization consisting of the most powerful, richest, and influential people of North America, Japan, and Europe. Probably the most powerful single member is David Rockefeller, President of Chase-Manhattan Bank of New York. The Trilateralist goal is a one world government with a one world money. This also includes a one world religion or practically no more worship in churches. This also means that schools all over the world will be teaching nearly the same thing. An example of that is the metric system.

When their mission arrives, there will be a large group of rich world dictators. The Trilateral aim or hope for one world takeover is from 1984-1989. That is only 6 to 11 years from now.

For them to control all the government in the world, they have to control all the people of those governments. To do this they have to control the money; the economy, and the food! I believe they pretty well control most economics and they have all the money. How can they control the food? Easy, break the farmers or in other words the American farmer. That is why there is no longer 100 percent parity. There was 100 percent parity in the 1940's. In the years 1949, 1950, and 1951 parity was 100 percent, 101 percent and 107 percent. I always remember my daddy said that those years were his best as a farmer. Everyone in this area remembers 1973 as a good

year for the farmers. In 1973 parity was 91 percent. In 1977 parity was 64 percent, the lowest since the depression years.

This is where the American Agriculture Movement enters. We are trying to accomplish several things. We need 100 percent parity to help save us, our families, our farms, our communities, and our country. We want to keep America free. Do you? The American Agriculture Movement needs all the help we can get. If you can't help the movement in anyway, then don't ridicule or knock it. It is helping almost everyone I know. Everyone but the ones preaching for One World government.

Please don't ignore anything you read about One World Power, One World Government, World Order, or even Human Rights. Does any of this sound familiar?

Freedom rests, and always will, on individual responsibility, individual integrity, individual effort, individual courage, and individual religious faith.

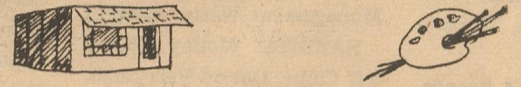

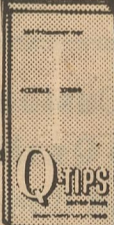

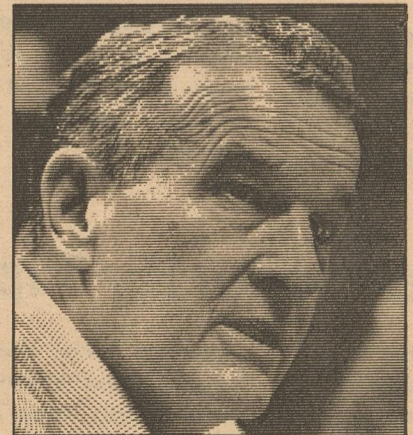

This authorization will be coded 0105. Please instruct the County Supervisors to notify other lenders in these counties of this authorization. Annual production loans to a borrower indebted under this disaster cannot be made after Decem-ber 31, 1984.

Veterans Administration Updating Information

Inasmuch as the Veterans Administration is updating income information and medical expenses, all Veterans Administration beneficiaries receiving a non service pension will receive an annual income questionnaire card with their October check, which they will receive November 1st.

This does include those pensioners who have not in previous years received a card. This will include veterans over 72 years of age and children receiving pension in their own behalf. It is imperative according to Bill Pallmeyer, Motley, County Service Officer, that Veterans Administration beneficiaries receiving a non service pension immediately contact the Social Security Administration and-or any agency from which they are receiving retirement benefits. According to the County Service Officer, it is imperative the right amounts be reported in order that the beneficiary can receive the correct amount of pension. It is also imperative

the beneficiary have with them when they bring the annual income questionnaire card to the County Service Officer, the total amount of medical expenses which have been apid during the year 1978, and which have not been reimbursed. Completion of the annual income questionnaire card will be mandatory by the recipients or benefits will be terminated effective January 1, 1979.

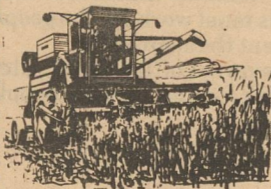

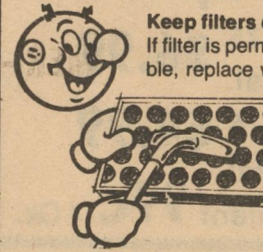

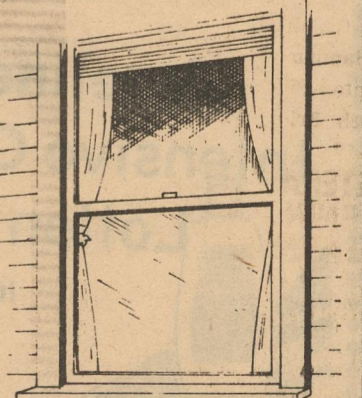

Shop Early for Shrubs and Trees

Those interested in buying trees or shrubs will find that the best selections are available for the early shoppers, so now is the time to start looking if you plan to purchase any of these plants.

Shrubs and trees are usually found in three forms, so purchasers can consider the transplanting method that is best for them. Balled and burlapped plants (B&B) are usually larger than container-grown plants of the same price. A ball of soil is wrapped in burlap and pinned, so when handling this type, the plant

should not be lifted by the stem or trunk. The life of the plant can be endangered if the ball of soil is loosened.

Container-grown plants continue to gain popularity. The advantage is less shock when transplanting from the container to the planting area. Containers are usually designed for easy removal, and there is less chance for damage from rough handling. Plants should never be transplanted with the container left around the ball.

Nurseries also offer bare root plants. Many fruit and nut trees are handled in this form.

Transplanting bare root plants is more successful when they are dormant during late fall and winter, and is more risky once the plants leaf out. Never allow the root system to dry out or be completely submerged in water for a long time. Pruning before transplanting is essential, and generally one third to one half of the top growth should be removed.

Maximum growth during the establishment period can be aided by plenty of humus worked into the soil, and a good mulch on the surface.

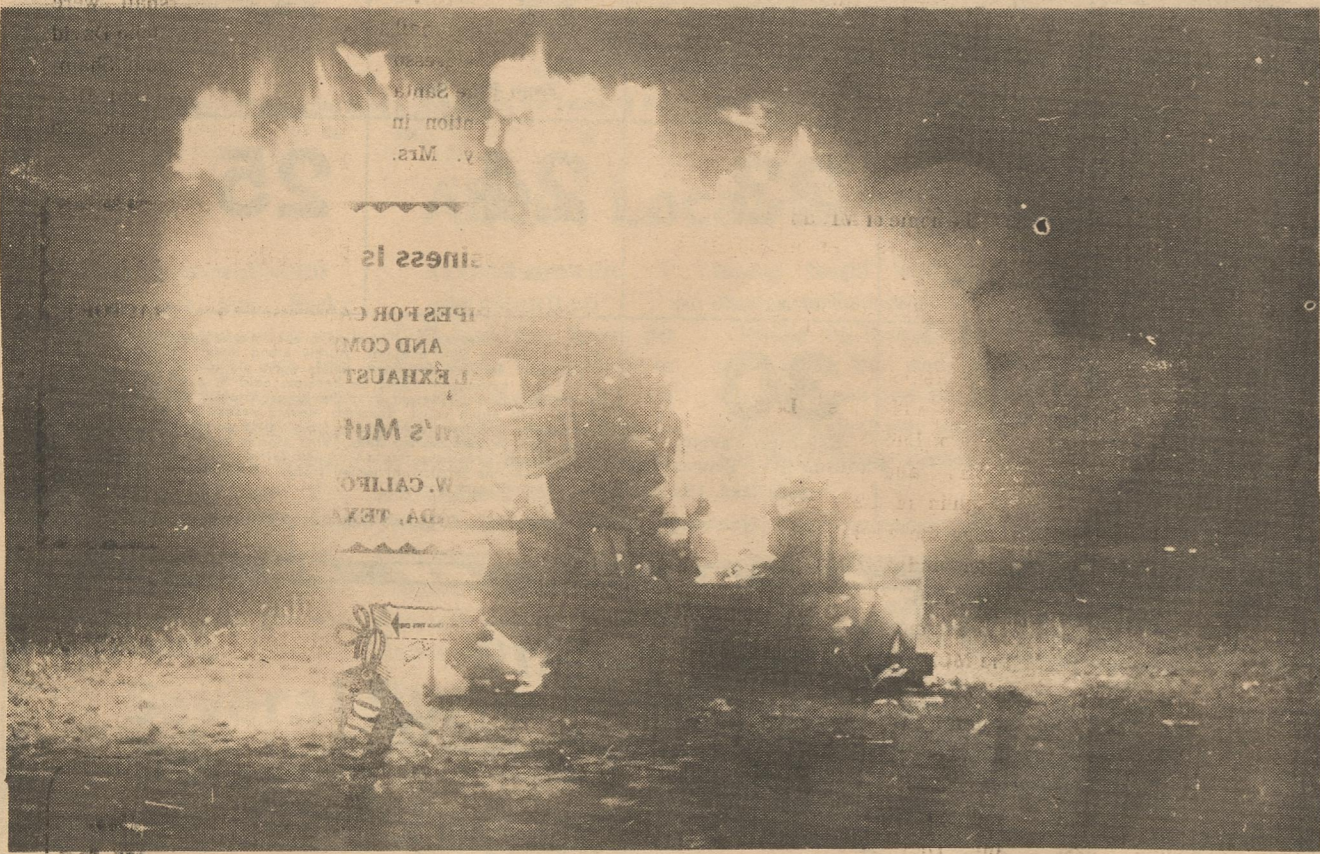
REGGAE

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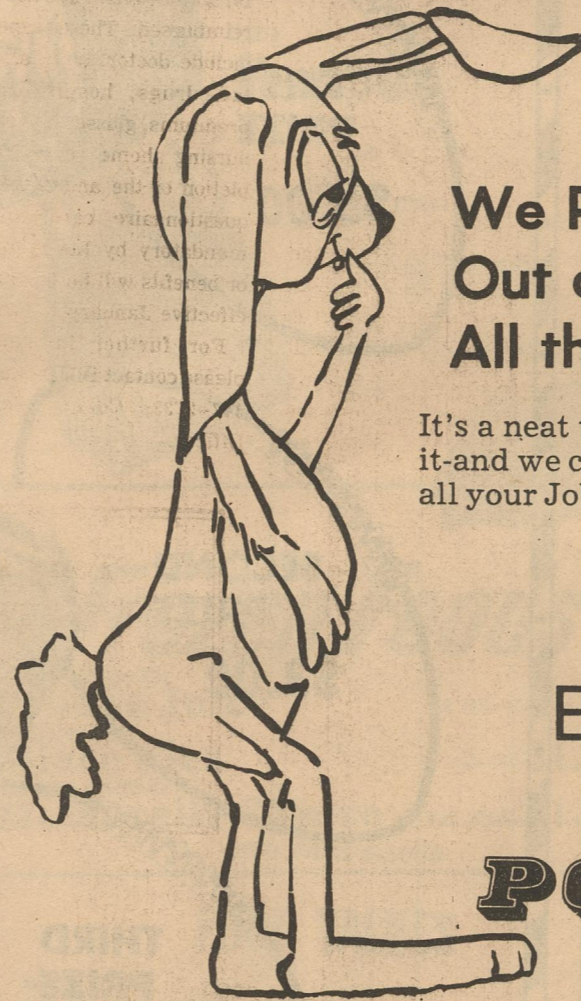

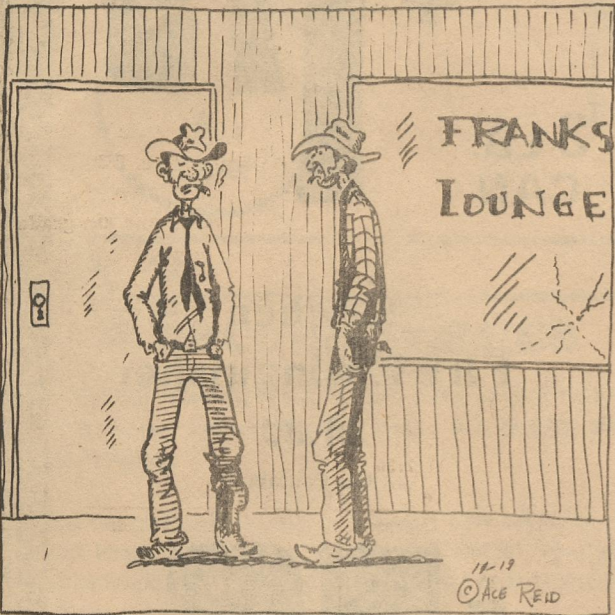

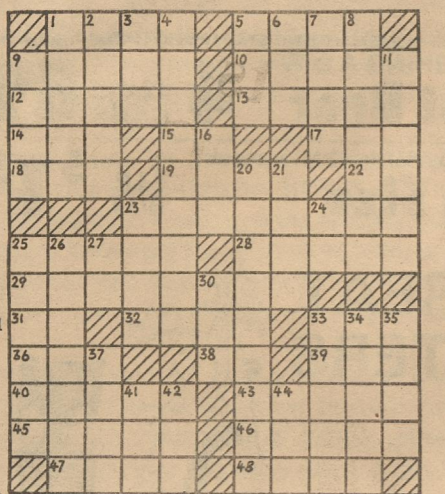
