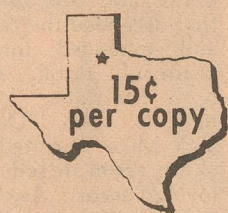
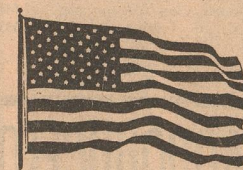

## Attempted Murder Suspect Arrested Near Matador

A man wanted in connection with an attempted murder in Elkhart, Kansas was arrested Monday one

mile north of Matador, after being stopped for speeding by Department of Public Safety Trooper Dude Speed.

The suspect, Trinidad Aranda, was reported to have shot Luis Resendez in Elkhart, then, with another man, head south. When stopped in Motley County, Trinidad Aranda was riding with a Dumas man, Omar Martin Aranda, who claimed to be Trinidad Aranda's nephew. The man who was supposedly with Trinidad in Kansas was not found.

At gunpoint Speed ordered the men out of their car, then enlisted the aid of Banty Brandon, a local farmer, to help him handcuff the pair. Trinidad was reportedly armed with a .22 pistol while in Kansas but the weapon was not found Monday. Both men were jailed at Matador to await extradition by other authorities.

While on routine patrol near Whiteflat, Speed pulled the 1974 Pontiac, registered to Omar Aranda, over for speeding, and issued Trinidad a citation for excessive speed. He let the pair continue on their

## Councilmen Discuss Water Bill and Dump

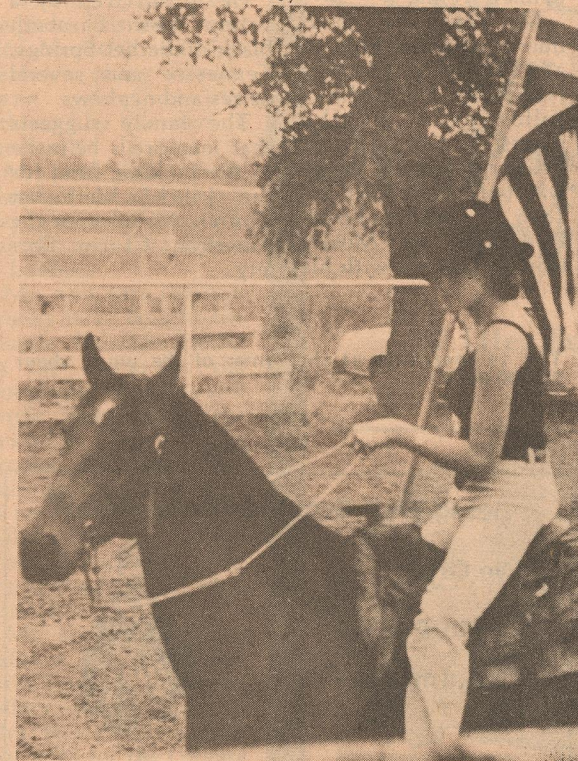
In regular session Thursday, June 14, the Matador City Council asked people not to leave dead animals at the city dump ground, as the area is inspected regularly by the State Health Department and it must meet certain standards to remain open to the public.

Councilmen raised the monthly sewer charge one dollar per month and the minimum charge for water service was also raised one dollar per month. This will raise the minimum bill for water, sewer, garbage, and fire protection from \$9.25 per month to \$11.25 per month. "The City Council regrets that this increase

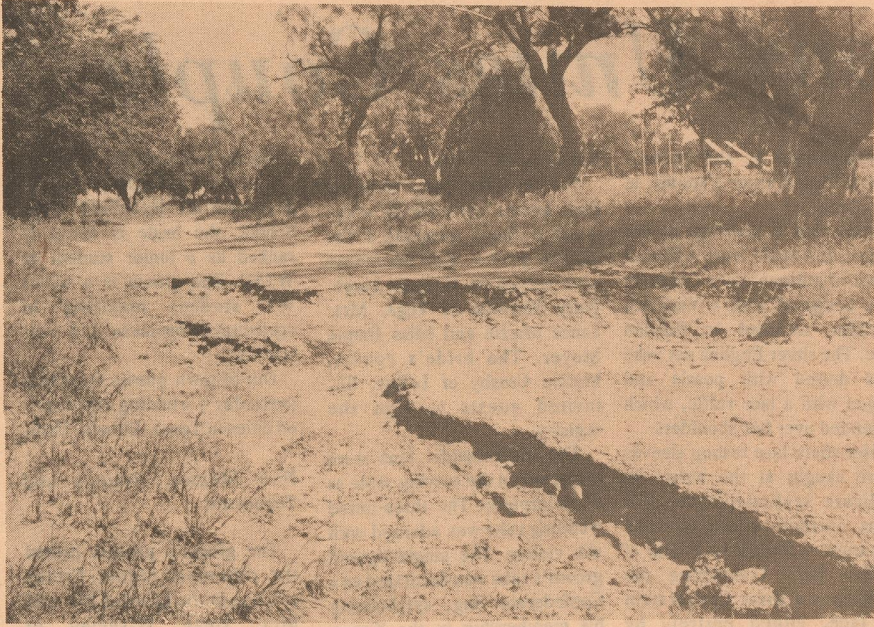

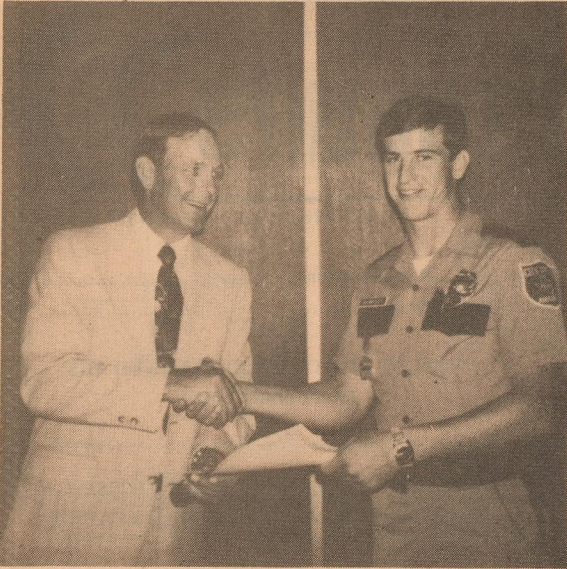

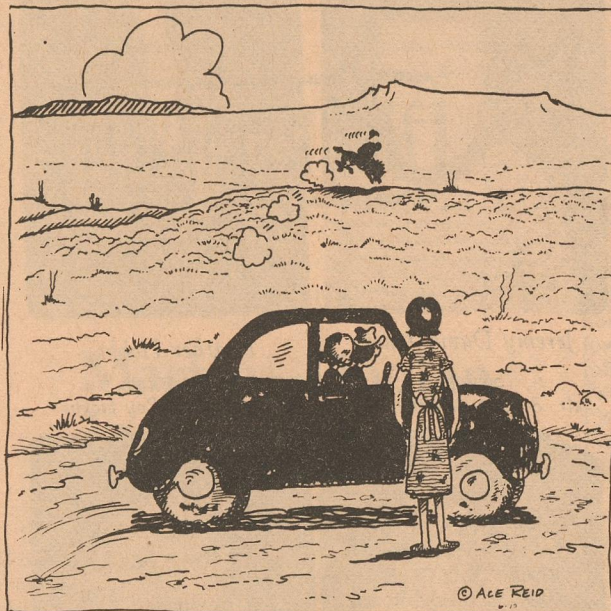

## CATTLE INDUSTRY

### MUST BE ENERGY EFFICIENT

The cattle industry's future must be planned within a "framework of energy," says Texas A & M University's veteran animal scientist John K. Riggs.  
"We hadn't been forced to do it. Now we must," Riggs said. "Although there's a whole hatful of ways it can already be done, we've only begun to explore ways to reduce energy use."  
Riggs, a veteran of 40 years in teaching and research, said that the first "shock" of an energy shortage in 1973 triggered some reality that the days of cheap energy were over, and that costs of operating pickups, feed molls and slaughter houses would cost more.  
"The second (and current) jolt is worse, and maybe more thought-provoking about conservation of energy," Riggs added, "but the outlook is that the energy squeeze will gain strength, before it weakens."  
Riggs credited the livestock industry for modifications toward use of less energy and labor, such as triple-decker trucks replacing double-
