## Services Held For Mrs. Nellie Hines

Funeral services for Mrs. Nellie (Brandon) Hines, 73, were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday at the First Baptist Church, with the Rev. James Hancock, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in East Mound Cemetery, with Lemons Funeral Home of Plainview directing arrangements. Mrs. Hines, a long-time resident of Matador, died in Plainview Hospital after a brief illness. She had been making her home in Plainview for almost a year, to receive medical care.

The former Nellie Williams was born September 4, 1893 in Crystal Falls, Texas. She was married in 1909 to John Phillip Brandon, who passed away in 1933. She moved to Matador from Graham, in 1940. She was married in 1949 to Frank Hines and she passed away in 1962.

She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Frenchie Desbire of Graham; three sons, Leo P. Brandon, El Paso, Johnnie Lee Brandon, Santa Fe, N.M., and R. L. Brandon, Plainview. Also surviving are three sisters, Mrs. D. J. Brandon of Snyder, Mrs. Johnnie Spears, Winnboro, and Mrs. Freddie Myrick of Graham; seven grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. Pallbearers were Algie Groves, Hub Swearingen, J. D. Craven, Charlie Meador, Roy Smith and John Briscoe.

A former Matador resident, Capt. Billy Cammack, 34, and eight other crewmen were killed Thursday night, Jan. 19 when the Air Force KC135 jet tanker which Cammack was piloting crashed into a mountain near Spokane, Wash.

The son of Mrs. Geneva Cammack of 3506 Janet, Amarillo, and the late Bryan Cammack, the young airman was the grandson of Mrs. T. E. Cammack of Matador. Other survivors include his wife and three children, of Spokane.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. today from Schooler and Gordon Funeral Chapel of Amarillo and burial will be in an Amarillo cemetery.

Cammack, a graduate of West Texas State University, and a former student at the University of Texas, graduated from Reese Air Force Base at Lubbock in December, 1954, and was retained as an instructor there until 1958.

The tanker was returning from a training flight to Hickman Field in Hawaii. It was making an approach to the crew's home field at Fairchild Air Force Base when it disappeared from the base radar screen at 6:09 p.m. Thursday.

The wreckage of the aircraft was located early Friday, about 15 hours after it crashed in a mountainous, snow-covered area 20 miles northeast of Spokane.

Ben T. (Thomas) Edwards, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Edwards, Matador, has been promoted to Army first lieutenant in Korea, where he is a member of the 9th Infantry. Lt. He was graduated from Matador High School and received his B. S. degree from Texas Tech in 1965. He was commissioned under the ROTC program.

His wife, Gaylan, and small son, Scott live at Levelland.

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

It's sad, but true. Conservation is one thing that too many people just talk about.

In an effort to impress the importance of conservation on the youth of Texas, the Ft. Worth Press annually sponsors an essay contest open to boys and girls in or out of school, 19 and younger who have not finished high school. Title of the 1967 essay is "Preservation of our Natural Resources", which should be original and under 300 words in length.

Local prizes are awarded by the

Upper Pease Soil Conservation District, and essays should be received by Feb. 4th. In 1966, over 30 essays were submitted from Motley County. 4-H and other youth are urged to enter the 1967 contest.

### FORAGE HYBRIDS LINKED TO HORSE DISEASE

There is some evidence that Sorghum-Sudangrass type forage hybrids may be linked to a little known horse disease, cystitis syndrome.

The Sorghum-Sudangrass type forage hybrids are widely used for cattle grazing and greenchop. Some horses also graze or are fed greenchop from them. Cystitis syndrome in horses is characterized by incoordination of the rear quarters, uncontrolled urination and possible abortions by mares. Death sometimes occurs in chronic cases. To date, there is no known cure for cystitis, but it is not contagious. In addition to the Sorghum-Sudangrass type hybrids, a few isolated cases of cystitis have been found in horses grazing Johnsongrass, Common Sudan grass and Sweet Sudangrass.

The cystitis syndrome and its possible dietary connections were first reported in 1966 by Dr. William M. Romane, DVM, Texas A&M University, and his team of researchers. The report said cystitis may be connected with feeding of the forages as greenchop, or by grazing the horses on the forage. Dr. Romane's research team said, "only when the plant is in the growing state does this syndrome develop. To our knowledge, cured hay will not produce the syndrome."

The cystitis syndrome of horses has been seen mostly in Texas and a few isolated areas of the Southwest, according to reports from veterinary colleges. It has been reported by veterinarians in Georgia, Alabama, Oklahoma, Washington and Iowa, but there appeared to be no association with any particular pasture in these areas. In Texas, Kansas, California and Arizona, the syndrome has been linked with use of the Sorghum-Sudangrass type forage hybrids.

Exact cause of the ailment has not been pinpointed, and thousands of horses have probably grazed these forage crops with no ill effects; but horsemen should know of the dangers involved in using the forages in their horse program. Horse owners should be cautious until more research can establish exact cause of the syndrome.

The seed industry is working with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at A&M to help support research attempt to isolate and avoid causes of the cystitis syndrome and to find a cure.

A&M Scientists Say there is no reason for Cattlemen to be alarmed as no injuries have been reported from grazing and feeding the forage sorghums to ruminants.

According to John McHaney, Extension Economist, the cost of farming and ranching will be higher in 1967, but at a slower rate than 1966.

The overall farm production expenses in 1966 was 8% more than 1965, costing about \$3 billion for overall production in 1966. The increase in expenses results partly

from higher prices for certain production inputs, particularly feeder livestock and feed. Prices paid by farmers moved up slightly for motor and other supplies, and building and fencing material. Also, more purchased inputs were used in 1966, contributing to the increase in total farm expense.

Farm production expenses will likely rise again in 1967 though not quite as much as the 1966 increase. Increases are highly probable in 1967 for taxes, interest, and insurance. Higher expenditure for several production items, including fertilizer and pesticides are likely because of increased use of these items.

Part of the increase in the cost of farm inputs in recent years can be attributed to increasing use of services that were formerly done by the farmer or were not even available. Farmers now may have feed delivered directly into their beef, poultry or hog feeders; have buildings constructed, fences built or fertilizer applied rather than doing the work themselves.

These extra services, as well as the supplies themselves, are often financed by the supplier, who will normally add a financing charge, all contributing to higher input costs.

### Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex.— Texas House of Representatives is operating under far-reaching new rules. And a cooling-off period has been called in a controversy over whether both houses should revise joint procedures.

House of Representatives voted 145-0 for a modernized rulebook. Key changes reduce the number of House committees from 43 to 25, after this session; inaugurate a modified seniority system; and set up a calendar system to determine the priority rights of bills ready for consideration.

Three days deep in the 60th Legislative session the House also approved 145-0 a proposed set of joint rules to govern matters involving both houses. This included Speaker Ben Barnes' proposal to limit conference committees to adjusting differences in bills passed by the two houses, rather than writing new legislation.

Another major provision calls for joint committees to hear budget requests and perform some house-keeping functions.

Still another would require that conference committee meetings be open to the press and the public.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith turned a cold shoulder to the conference committee restriction, long advocated by Barnes. Smith said the Legislature has too many more important things to do than squabble over rules.

According to some House lead-

tenants, Barnes feels that a majority of the Senators favor his proposals. Smith pointed out that rules can be approved or amended only by a two-thirds vote.

So, the House version on joint rules is expected to spend an extended cooling-off period in a Senate committee.

If the House recommendations are not accepted, Barnes made it clear that he will regard his own conference committee appointees as duty bound to adjust differences only if Senate conferees are not so restricted, he readily admitted

an impasse may be reached when the first controversial piece of legislation goes to a conference committee.

He pointed out that bills are unconstitutional if the Legislature does not give a clear statement in the title indicating what the bill does rule and this also applies to constitutional amendments.

Opponents of the amendment, the AFL-CIO, wanted to replace the poll tax with permanent voter registration. Jones' ruling will be appealed to a higher court, says Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

"The Human Comedy," by William Saroyan is a tender epic of the American people at a time when men's souls longed for laughter; World War II. In theme, it closely resembles Homer's *Iliad*, as both books are concerned with a war-torn nation. The writers' point of view is the only difference. Whereas Homer concentrates on the achievements of his warriors, Saroyan uses the war as a stage and presents the happy moments in the lives of his characters for an uplifting drama.

Although Saroyan shuns the noble language of the epic writer, his characters have Greek names, illustrating the influence of Homer, Aeschylus, and others upon his style.

Ulysses, one of the central characters, is comparable to Odysseus of the *Iliad*, in that he views life with great insight. Indeed, youth is the pinnacle from whence he is able to survey the world and all its tragic inhabitants like a critic at a play.

Homer Macauley, his brother, is always in a hurry to find out the wonders of the world about him with all the inquisitiveness of a sixteen year old. Though he is older than his brother Ulysses he still cannot understand death.

Unlike his four year old brother, Homer knows that he who passes beyond the grave will not return, yet he has no answer for a mother who, shocked over the telegram announcing the death of her son, asks him the inevitable, why? These are only a few of the paradoxes presented in the book. Even the title, *The Human Comedy*, is a paradox, the theme is tragedy, not comedy.

The answer to the myriad unanswerable questions of the world comes when Ara Gottlieb, an Armenian groceryman speaks to his son. 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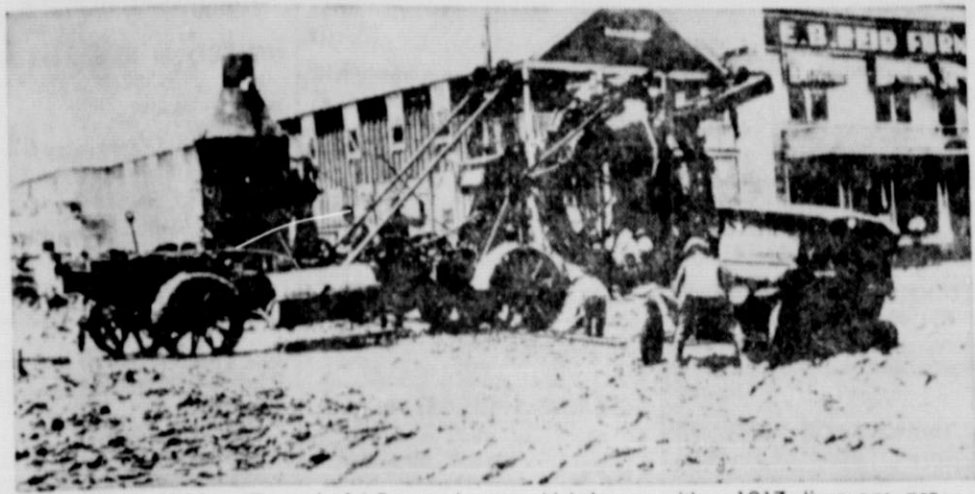

**INSPECTION DEADLINE** — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety, has warned Texas motorists that the 1967 vehicle inspection period is two thirds over and only about one-third of the vehicles have been inspected.

"This means that during the 12 weeks remaining before the April 15 deadline for inspections, more than twice as many persons each week must have their car inspected to avoid long lines forming at the end of the period," Garrison said.
