Meeting Is Held To Discuss School

On Thursday evening, March 23, a group of concerned Motley County citizens met with Dr. James Kitchen of Texas Tech University and his assistant, Carolyn Adams, to explore the possible uses and restoration financing of the old High School Building. The meeting was held in the Motley County Courthouse.

The unanimous decision of this group was to respectfully request that Charles N. Johnson, Superintendent, and the members of Motley County ISD Board delay a decision on demolition of the building for at least six months to permit studies of:

1. Possible uses of the building for the community.
2. Financial sources for restoration and maintenance of the building.
3. Professional architectural determination of the structural soundness of the building.

A letter to this effect was mailed to Charles N. Johnson, superintendent and to Motley County ISD Board members. It was signed by Kirby Campbell, Mayor of Matador, and Forrest Campbell, County Judge of Motley County.

The letter also stated that the group already has funds to begin emergency repairs to the roof to prevent further water damage, and requested permission to make such repairs, and to prevent further vandalism with locks etc.

Dr. Kitchen, whose specialty is interdisciplinary research relating to park development, cultural resources, and planning throughout the southwest United States, toured the building and reported to the group that the building was of sound, quality construction. He stated that at today's prices, the old high school building could not be rebuilt for less than \$400,000, (Four hundred thousand dollars). He has offered his help in obtaining government money to save the structure, which, hopefully, will be the beginning of a project to aid in the restoration of each community in Motley County.

A "Walter Jones" barbecue will be held in downtown Matador on Saturday, April 15, from 4 to 8 p.m. at the American Legion Building as a "kick-off" in raising additional funds.

Brief information about the school trustee candidates are being printed in this week's issue of the Tribune.

Billy Hand, 53, an incumbent, is engaged in stock farming in Motley County. Mr. Hand graduated from Patton Springs High School in 1941 and has been a resident of this county for the past twenty-eight years. He is married to the former Pauline Gage and they have four children, Mrs. Trudy Stevens and Kelly Hand of Lubbock, Mrs. Randy (Bonita) Barton of Little Rock, Ark., and Kimberly of the home.

Mr. Hand is active in Lions Club, Masonic Lodge, and served as director on the Motley County Livestock Show, 4-H Rodeo and Old Settlers Reunion. In seeking re-election to the one year term he stated, "I feel since this is Motley County school district that Roaring Springs should be represented and I will support this end of the county. However, I will support the county as a whole, and will represent Matador, Flomot, Northfield and Roaring Springs to the best of my ability."

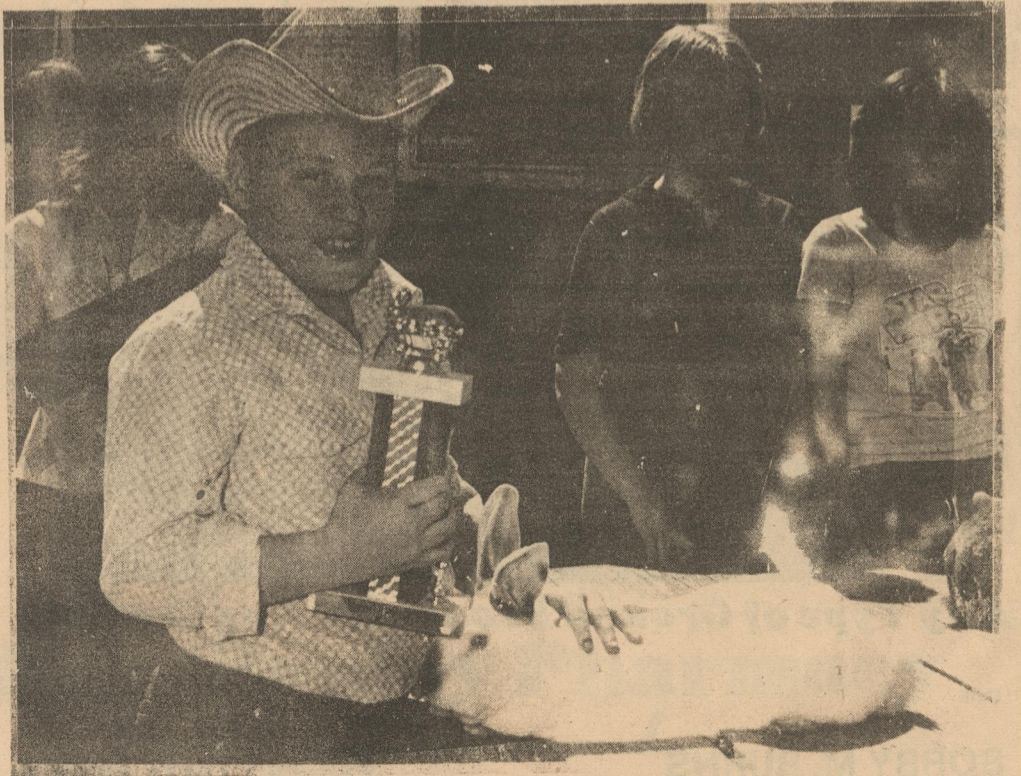

"I support a quality education that will promote the dignity and self-worth of every student in Motley County," she says. "I feel as if there needs to be a diversity of interest, abilities, and views on the school board in order to keep a healthy balance. Don Warren, 40, is a Maintenance Technician III for the Department of Highways and Transportation. Having graduated from Roaring Springs High School in 1956, Don has been a resident of Motley County for the past 38 years. He and his wife, the former Pat Briscoe, have two children, Joe Don, 15, and Donna Kay, 11.

In filing for trustee for a three year term, Mr. Warren says, "I will try to fill this position with the best of my ability and work for all the people of Motley County. I hope to achieve a better understanding for all students, faculty, and parents."

CONSUMER FOOD NEWS..

COLLEGE STATION -- Adverse weather is shoving meat prices higher and affecting tender-vegetable quality, so careful shopping is a "must" at Texas grocery markets this week, says Gwendolyn Clyatt, a consumer marketing information specialist.

"Highlight" items for economy and quality are eggs, grapefruit, root vegetables and several canned items, she says.

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Grocery economy buys this week will be as follows:

FRESH FRUIT -- Budget items are oranges, bananas and grapefruit.

FRESH VEGETABLES -- Root vegetables, including carrots, turnips and rutabagas, have attractive prices -- while potato prices are stable to slightly higher than last week.

Specials on dry onions generally are economical values. Also consider cabbage, broccoli, eggplant and sweet potatoes.

BEEF -- Slightly higher prices are the result of adverse weather, which has caused a trading slow-down. Although chuck cuts have higher prices, look for a few budget-minded buys on sirloin, T-bone and rib steaks, ground beef and liver.

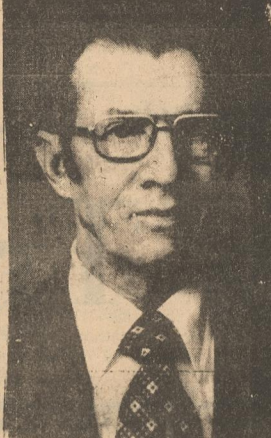
PORK -- Prices are taking an upward trend -- especially those on loin cuts. Any specials generally appear or Boston butt roasts, end chops, quarter-loins cut into chops, rib and loin-end roasts.

LAMB -- Some stores offer features on leg of lamb.

POULTRY -- Egg prices are much lower than a year ago making them an economical protein choice. Some features appear on fryers, parts and chicken hens.

ALONG Grocery Market Aisles -- Specials include canned peaches, fruit cocktail, pears and tuna fish.

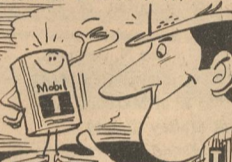

He believes that action on the state level can help develop profitable markets for our farm products and pledges to do his dead level best to bring this about.

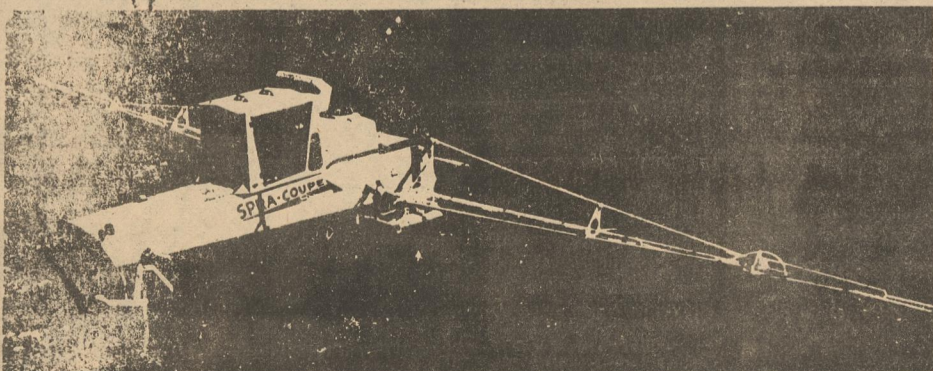

Church And Society

Program Features Crafts and Hobbies

Program for El Progreso Club, meeting March 23 at the Campbell Ranch with Mrs. Harold Campbell as hostess, featured crafts and hobbies.

Mrs. Franklin Price, club president, served as leader and introduced the program with the quotation from the yearbook: "The delight of creative work lies in self-discovery; you are mining nuggets of power out of your own cosmos, and the find comes as a great and glad surprise."

Mrs. W. F. Jacobs reviewed a paper on "Clay Mining Cap" explaining pottery techniques in Pennsylvania. "Clay is cheap," she pointed out. "Although it is formless, it is responsive, and has served mankind for centuries."

She displayed a small plate and a book on Tulip Ware sent her by Miss Susan Jones of York, Pa., Mrs. Jacobs' guest last summer. The book, by Edwin Atlee Barber, an authority on this art form, describes Tulip Ware of the Pennsylvania - German Potters and includes illustrations and historical sketch of the art of slip-decoration. It tells of the settlement of Eastern Pennsylvania by German emigrants as early as 1683, and their part in developing potteries there.

Most of the early pottery pieces are lavishly decorated with animals, birds and plants. They also contain the name of the potter and the year the article was made, and in a number of instances are embellished with couplets such as, "He who would have something secret - dare not tell it to his wife." Oils and other forms of art, together with handwork, including several quilts were brought by Mrs. A. B. Simpson for her talk on "My Favorite Crafts."

Mrs. Simpson, who has been studying art for only five years, has won blue ribbons at several area fairs on landscapes and still life, as well as for her quilts. Her quilts are reflective of her artistic ability, through the

floral and art designs created through use of crayolas and pouffing.

She began her study of art under Mrs. Pat Green local instructor and the former Francine Craven. In addition to oils, Mrs. Simpson does tole painting, decoupage and decorative painting on small objects, plaques, etc. She also does distinctive work in class painting, using layered glass for dimensional effect.

Mrs. Simpson has just finished a painting of quail in flight for her son, Bennie Jack Simpson of Dallas, soil scientist with A&M University. She is currently doing roses and brought several of her latest paintings to illustrate the various effects with regard to color, grouping and framing.
