A two-car collision occurred Sunday at about 10:30 p.m. on the Y on State Highway 70 and Farm Road 684 just south of Roaring Springs. The accident occurred when a car driven by Ronnie Richards collided with a pick up driven by John H. Gibson of Afton.

Bonnie Richards, five year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richards was the only one injured in the wreck. She was treated at Motley General Hospital and transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, where she was treated for a fractured cheekbone and forehead. She is in Room 522 and will probably remain there for several days. She is reported to be improving.

The Howard Rogers home which is four miles northeast of Flomot suffered extensive fire damage early Sunday morning. Mrs. Rogers discovered the butane kitchen stove aflame at 6:00 a.m. and when the family was unable to extinguish the fire because of frozen outside water lines, they summoned the Flomot, Quitaque and Turkey Volunteer Fire Departments.

The north side of the three bedroom home where the den, kitchen, living, dining and utility rooms are located was declared a total loss. The freezing of the regulator on the butane storage tank was said to be the cause of the fire.

Investigators reported that a search of the trunk of the vehicle revealed two large boxes containing approximately five pounds of a substance believed to be marijuana.

A pair of scales and a sack containing a substance believed to be marijuana also was found, investigators said.

1977 Moisture

One can best describe 1977 as a dry year in Motley County, but least we forget, there were times when it was very wet.

There are three official weather stations in Motley County; Flomot, Matador and Roaring Springs, with unofficial reports collected at Roaring Springs. For the year, Flomot received 18.70 inches; Matador, 16.72; Northfield, 16.68 and Roaring Springs, 17.44.

In the order of stations listed, monthly amounts were: Jan., 12.41, 41 and .50; Feb. 1.45, 1.50, 1.71 and 1.47; March, .60, .53, and .82; April, 1.94, 2.11, 2.62, and 2.47; May, 3.79, 2.69, 2.63, and 3.68; June, 3.24, 4.12, 1.48 and .91; July, .07, 1.03, .91 and 1.22; August, 5.15, 3.11, 4.80 and 5.03; Sept., .16, .02, 13 and 0.; October, 2.11, 1.07, 1.35 and 1.32; November, .07, .01, .07 and 0. December, Trace, Trace, .04 and .02.

The growing season was 219 days, with the last frost in the spring being on April 4, and the first general frost in the fall being Nov. 9.

There was a trace of snow on Jan. 6, and 5 inches of snow on Jan. 9. A trace of snow fell on Jan. 15 and 2 inches were received on Feb. 26.

Weather record keeping started in Matador in 1924, and the 50 year average rainfall is 20.55 inches per year. As a breakdown, Jan. - .686; Feb. - .631; March - .952; April - 1.542; May - 3.385; June - 2.700; July - 2.071; August - 2.125; September - 2.654; October - 2.211; November - .748 and December - .846.

Church And Society

Club Has Program On Girlstown USA

Girlstown U.S.A. was the subject of a program presented Thursday, Feb. 9 for members of El Progreso Club. Speaker was Mrs. W. C. Pallmeyer. Mrs. W. F. Jacobs was hostess for the meeting, which was held in the Methodist Church parlor.

A quotation by Chauncey Depew, "Benefactor: one who makes two smiles grow where one grew before," was read from the yearbook as an introduction to the program.

"Girlstown U.S.A. is composed of three campuses in Texas," Mrs. Pallmeyer informed the club. "The first home for girls was at Buffalo Gap (near Abilene) which was started by Miss Amelia Anthony in 1949 and provided homes for nine girls. In July of the same year, the headquarters was moved to Whiteface, when Tom Duggan, a Lubbock attorney donated 1420 acres of land for this purpose."

The other two homes are at Borger and Austin. Each school, or home serves a different purpose, Mrs. Pallmeyer said. "The Whiteface campus currently has 66 girls enrolled and can support as many as 74. The home was founded to give girls from infancy to maturity who through neglect, abandonment, abuse or other circumstances, need a group living situation. Here, they are given a good memory of childhood, through a pleasant, loving environment."

The Borger campus houses 25 girls, Mrs. Pallmeyer said, and is maintained for those with learning disabilities. Thirty-two are enrolled on the Austin campus, where the emotionally disturbed are given sanctuary. The girls come from Child

Welfare units, juvenile courts, school counselors, psychologists, and private referrals from throughout the United States.

All of the girls attend public schools, including elementary, junior high, high school, special education, vocational and college. When a girl reaches the age of 18, or graduates from high school, she is encouraged to attend college, vocational training or find suitable employment.

Girlstown can provide for 135 girls in the three locations, and the ages range from six months to 16½ years, the age limit for admittance. Church attendance is required on Sunday morning, and the girls are allowed to choose which church they attend.

"The Whiteface campus is the largest of the three," Mrs. Pallmeyer said. "The Executive Director, Marshall W. Cooper, resides at Whiteface, and each school has a superintendent. A board of directors serves with Mr. Cooper in the administration of the three units of Girlstown."

"Girlstown is supported by contributions, farm income, and income from securities, with 76 per cent coming from donations."

Girlstown is a project of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs and receives support through donations from the clubs, including El Progreso, which are federated. Inspirational Thought was by Mrs. W. N. Pipkin. Following the program, Mrs. Franklin Price, president, conducted a business session. Others present were Mesdames E. A. Day, W. F. McCaghen, J. L. Woodruff, Douglas Meador, Robert Darsey, and Mmes. Jacobs and Pallmeyer.

Quannah, Acme and Pacific Railway Company hereby gives notice that on or about March 10, 1978, it intends to file with the Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D. C. 20423, an application for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity, permitting the abandonment of a line of railroad extending from Railroad Mile Post G-728, plus 10 poles plus 700 feet, near Acme, Texas, to Railroad Mile Post G-833.2 near Floydada, Texas, a distance of approximately 104 miles, in Hardeman, Cottle, Motley, and Floyd Counties, Texas. The line for which the abandonment application will be filed includes the stations of Paducah, Texas at Mile Post G-766.1 and Floydada, Texas at Mile Post G-833.2.

The petition to investigate shall be in the form of a verified statement, and at minimum, contain:

- (a) identification of petitioner including its name, address and business;
- (b) statement of petitioner's interest in the abandonment or discontinuance proceeding; whether petitioner uses the involved service; and if it does not, information with respect to the group or public interest it represents;
- (c) specific reason(s) for requesting the institution of an investigation, including information with respect to petitioner's reliance on the involved service, with allegations of fact supported by an affidavit of personal knowledge of the facts;
- (d) any rebuttal of information or material submitted by applicant; and
- (e) request for oral hearing and reasons therefor if desired.

Upon receipt of a petition to investigate, the Commission shall determine the extent of the investigation to be instituted. Those parties filing petitions to investigate should be prepared to participate actively in either oral hearings or via the submission of additional material in the form of verified statements. 

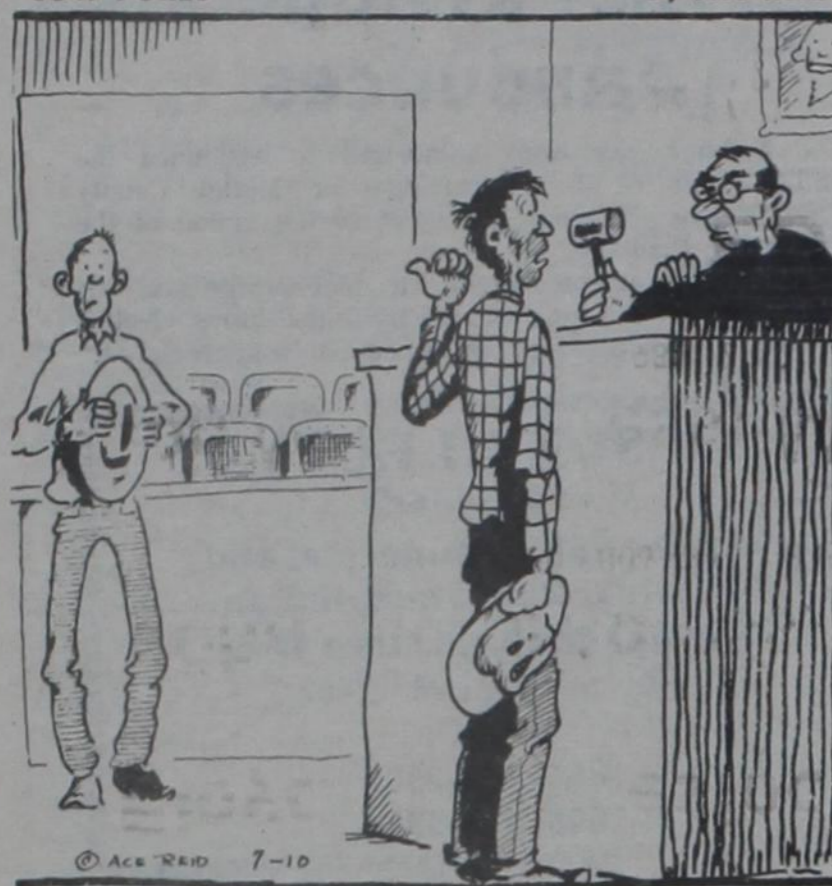
