Leasing Prospects Bright For County

OIL LEASING prospects are bright for Motley County and adjoining areas included in the approximately half a million acres of land released December 1 by Humble Oil & Refining Co.

About 250,000 acres of area is located in Motley County and was a part of the vast Matador Land & Cattle Company ranch empire, which was sold about 15 years ago. Humble had held a lease on the property for 29 years and had drilled approximately 50 test wells.

Earl Westmoreland, President of Torador Royalty Corporation, Dallas, met with approximately 40 landowners here Saturday, and said the outlook for leasing is bright. Torador owns half of the mineral rights under all of the former Matador Ranch lands.

Westmoreland said he had made a study of the large area and that only the surface has been scratched with the test wells put down by Humble. He said he believed the vast area is due for increased leasing, now that Humble has withdrawn its claims.

Westmoreland explained the position of Torador in mineral rights and said the land owners were now free to make any leases they desire. He said, however, that Torador will receive half of any bonus or lease money paid. He designated the First National Bank of Dallas as the depository for Torador. He said only one prospect had evidenced interest in leasing 20,000 acres in a block.

While Torador will receive half of any money received, it has no leasing privileges. The land owner has full leasing rights. Westmoreland suggested however, that it would be better for landowners to contact his firm before signing a contract. He said this would possibly increase the amount of the royalty and the lease.

"Our interests are identical," Westmoreland said, "and we both want to get as much as possible out of any leasing contract."

County Employs Home Demo Agent

The Commissioners have also set up a water planning commission for the county through the Farmers Home Administration. The court has employed the engineering firm of Biggs and Matthews of Wichita Falls to make a topographical study involving surface and underground water in Motley County.

The FHA will finance the study with the exception of from \$100 to \$150 for incidentals such as office personnel, which will be handled by the county.

The engineering firm will begin the study as soon as the program is approved by FHA,

and is expected to be completed within 18 months. Motley County is also working closely with the Red River Water Compact Authority in the solution of water problems, according to County Judge Elbert Reeves.

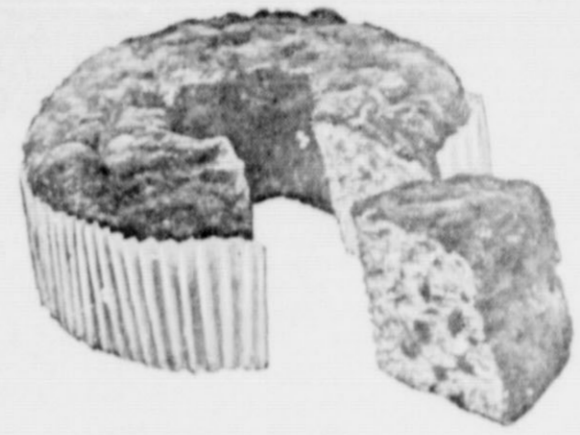

OYSTERS UNDAUNTED - Live oyster reefs in Galveston Bay have suffered practically no damage since shell dredgers were allowed to operate closer to them three years ago, according to J.R. Singleton, director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Singleton said dredging has remained stable during the last decade, while live oyster harvests have increased.

No changes in the controversial dredging regulations are contemplated, although P&W field procedures on oysters may be altered.

SCREWWORM PROBLEM - Screwworm flies which are infiltrating into Texas may force the Texas Animal Health Commission to pass a regulation to keep the insects South of the border.

Currently, infected cattle aren't allowed to be imported into Texas. But they are kept at the border where the insects hatch and fly across the Rio Grande anyway.

Commission is considering a rule prohibiting the import into Texas of any cattle from a herd in which diseased cattle are found.

This rule, it is reasoned, will force the importer to return his entire herd to the ranch, thus keeping the screwworm larvae away from the border. No action has been taken, and none will be necessary if ranchers take steps on their own.

PIT BAN ARGUED - Oil associations clashed at the Railroad Commission hearing over a proposed statewide ban on salt water disposal pits.

Some expressed fear that the federal government might enact such an order if the state doesn't. Others called the proposal arbitrary and of questionable legality.

Commission has banned salt water pits in oil fields in 43 counties on grounds they endanger underground fresh water supplies.

FORTY-SEVEN (47) WILL DIE - Predicted by the Department of Public Safety are 47 deaths in traffic accidents for the Christmas holidays weekend.

Says Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director, "We are going to undertake one of the most intensive safety efforts ever, in hopes of reducing this figure."

Several state agencies and organizations interested in safety

are working hand-in-hand with the department to help hold down the toll as much as possible.

"Operation Deathwatch" will be conducted from 6 p.m. December 23 until midnight, December 26, to focus attention on the dangers involved in holiday travel.

"Deathwatch" will be resumed at 6 p.m. December 30, and continue until midnight, January 2. It is predicted that 36 persons will die in traffic accidents during that period.

Some 150 additional patrolmen will be on duty in an effort to reduce the toll.

In terms of lives lost and property damage 1966 to date has been the most terrible in Texas history.

TEXAS BUSINESS DOWN - Texas business activity dropped in October for the second month in a row. Decrease was five per cent. Activity still was 10 per cent above the October 1965 figure, according to Dr. Francis B. May of UT's Bureau of Business Research.

An increase in business activity for the first ten months of this year was noted. Non-residential building permits led the field

running 20% over the first 10 months of last year.

FIGHTERS GET FLAGS - About 105 Texans now fighting in Vietnam are going to have at least one present from home for Christmas - a Texas flag.

Servicemen wrote in asking for Texas flags, so John Hill Secretary of State, answered each request with "on behalf of Governor Connally and the citizens of the State of Texas, I present you with the flag of the State of Texas."

LAND SALES GOOD - Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, Chairman of the Board for Lease of University Lands, has reported that the 53rd auction sales added \$917,000 to the Permanent University Fund.

A hundred tracts were leased at an average of \$35.60.

Bonuses of the sale will bring the fund to \$480,000,000 to provide better education for the youth of Texas.

SHORT SNORTS - Federal highway program cutback will cost Texas \$57,000,000, according to State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer.

Lenn Jones, personnel consultant of Dallas, has been retained on a parttime basis by the Texas

Hospital Association to meet the growing needs in the field of personnel and employer - employee relations in hospitals.

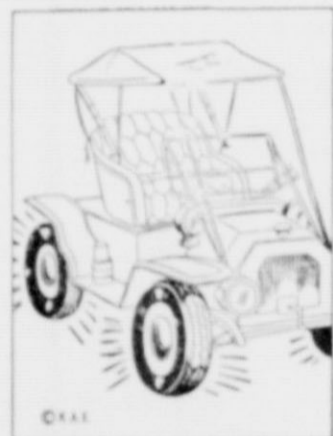
