Shah of Iran Planned Trip Here?

The deposed shah of Iran's latest global wanderings have taken him to Contadora, a idyllic tropical isle near Panama, but plans were being made to send him to the Lasy S Ranch, 15 miles southwest of Matador, a ranch which lies in the southern part of Motley and northern part of Dickens counties.

Motley County Sheriff Alton Marshall released the startling news Monday, and said he and several area officials had known of the plans to bring the shah here since December 5, but he had been sworn to

"I first learned about it on the night of December 5, when several area sheriffs and I met on the McAdoo road." Marshall said. "No telephone conservations were allowed. Then I notified County Judge Billy Whitaker and together we drove to the Federal Building in Lubbock the next day to meet with sheriffs and judges from Crosby, Dickens, Motley and Floyd Counties. We met with Congressman Kent Hance and he informed us of the situation.

The situation was that the shah was to take up residence at the Lazy S. Ranch headquarters located about 13 miles southwest of Roaring Springs. The ranch is owned by C. L. Siewart. Siewart had been a construction contractor in Iran and had to flee, leaving several million dollars worth of equip-ment behind. He said he had never personally met the shah. Hance was also said to be a personal friend of Siewarts.

"They were to provide their own security," Marshall said. "We wouldn't have to provide security. But what worried me was that we couldn't plan ahead. We were not going to be told until the shah was already here. I had made a list of things I was going to do when I was notified

the shah was here."
What Marshall was going to do was call a meeting of the County Commissioners Court and have a curfew passed, among other things. He was going to contact Texas Ranger Leo Hickman in Childress and obtain ranger support. He was going to alert all Motley County officials and officers, all ranchers who's land joined the Lazy S, notify the Fire Department and maybe have part of the county equipment moved to Roaring Springs (in case, Marshall said, someone tried to burn off the pastures or start a range fire toward the headquar-

"There was a 10 per cent chance of the shah

coming to this area," Marshall said. "That was their idea when they brought him to Texas. The worst thing about it was we wouldn't find out about it until the whole world found out about it. Can you imagine the reporters, sightseers, and other people we would have around

Marshall said there were no area sheriffs or judges who favored the move, and he bitterly opposed it himself.

On Contadora, the shah is surrounded by Panamanian gunboats, and aviation authorities and armed guards have laid down tight security around the island. The island, once a tourist spot, has been closed to foreign reporters.

"You can imagine how the Iranians would feel if he (the shah) was given residence here," Marshall said. "I think they want him dead, and I'm afraid they would try to get

"I believe this area was considered because it is a small population area," Judge Whitaker said. "People could more or less be screened here."

Whitaker said what concerned him was that militants could grab hostages off the streets in Crosbyton, Spur or even Roaring Springs or Matador and demand the release of the shah. In this area, he said, people didn't think twice about letting their children walk home from school, leave doors unlocked or even keys in cars.

"I'm sure as far as the shah or his men was concerned we wouldn't have any trouble, but I'm afraid we would get some local people hurt by outsiders."

Marshall said he didn't like having Hance, instead of Congressman Jack Hightower, handle the briefings; stating this was Hightower's area and not Hance's. But the sheriff also said there could have been reasons Hance was in charge of notification instead of

Hightower.
The shah arrived in Contadora last Saturday after leaving an Air Force hospital in Texas, where he had been recovering for two weeks after undergoing gallbladder and cancer treatment at a New York hospital.

The knowledge of this situation brought home the realization of the Iran crisis and although many local people feel sorry for the shah and wish he could find a home, no one seemed to want him or his guards around Motley County.

Leftists have demonstrated in Panama for several days and violence has grown there. Local officials did not want that to happen here.


Cross Country Kids Reach California Safely



in the capacity of nursing supervisor for the agency for the past year and has recently been assigned this area and Cottle County area. Mrs. Mills' office is in Childress but she spends her time in Motley and Cottle County and the surrounding areas, supervising the nursing staff and nursing services.

Mrs. Mills is familiar with the area having worked at Richard's Memorial Hospital in Paducah prior to joining the home health agency in the Plainview, Texas office in 1975. How Our Christmas Traditions Began

Christmas commands a month of our attention. It's complex with a host of delights, customs, and traditions to be observed, planned, and prepared for. Just look--gift-giving, caroling, Santa Claus, Christmas trees, belly wreather michleton holly wreaths, mistletoe, stockings by the chimney, Christmas cards, and Twas the Night Before

Little wonder that it covers one-twelfth of a year, It could scarcely be accomplished in less.

How did the celebration of the anniversary of the birth of Jesus become ornamented with such a variegated spectrum of added attractions and traditions?

Each was added as the centuries passed. Some were incongruously inherited from philoso-phies, cults, and times which never knew Jesus. Some were deliberate or inadvertent gifts from talented individuals. Whoever the donors were, wherever, whenever, and for whatever reasons, they gave us our Christmas traditions or the fertile seeds which grew into traditions.

For example, the name "Christmas" comes to us via the English and their medieval Feast of the Nativity called "Cristes masse" (Christ's mass). We also know that

early Christians were so preococupied with the hazardous duty of spreading the word that it was three and a half centuries before they conceived of a birthday celebration. By then, they were uncertain of the date. They knew the season - midwinter - but the exact day has been lost in antiquity if, indeed, it had ever been recorded

So how did Christmas come to be commemorated on December 25? Enter Constantine I, Emperor of Rome, who in 336 assigned the fete which would become Christmas to December

The embellishments of Christmas came from all over the world. From Germany we got the Christmas tree where Black Forest tribes in the 1600s began the indoor use of evergreens to celebrate the winter solstice. The idea spread through fir-clad Scandinavia, eventually to England, and was popularized in America during our Revolution-War. Reportedly, German Pennsylvania settlers had Christmas trees as early as 1746.

Other Christmas greenery? Legend says that when Joseph of Arimathaea brought Christianity to Britain, he arrived on Christmas Eve. Fatigued, he jabbed his hawthorne staff into the ground whereupon it miraculously broke into leaf and flower. Christian thoughts harked back to Christ's crown of throns. Thorny leaves became an expression of faith, eventually evolving as holly wreaths.

Pliny, in the first century, wrote of whiterobed Druids clipping parasitic mistletoe from the branches of oak trees.

The sprigs were superstitiously used as charms against evil. In time, kissing beneath mistletoe was said to bode good for lovers and newlyweds, and it was inevitable added to sprays of

Christmas greenery. For about a century and a half, no Christmas has passed, nor could one pass today, without Nativity pageants which are invariably adapted from the Book of

Matthew. Equally important to Nativity pageants, the lawns of churches, and shop-window decorators, is the Nativity scene. For this tradition we owe none other than St. Francis of Assisi.

In the town of Greccio, Italy, at Christmastime, in the year 1224, the young priest constructed a manger, tied to it an ox and an ass, and assembled fellow clergy and townspeople to pray. A retired soldier declared that he "saw" the infant Jesus in the manger, and another tradition had

begun.

Nativity plays and creches are always accompanied by Christmas carols, and none is more universally beloved than the luminescent Silent Night. In 1818, in the Austrian village of Oberndorf, church organist Franz Gruber was planning Christmas Eve mass when he made a horrifying discovery the organ would not play. A mouse had gnawed a hole in the bellows. No Christmas Eve music? Unthinkable!

The youthful priest, seeph Mohr, seemed strangely unperturbed. He was more interested in showing Gruber a poem he had just written. Gruber exploded. "The organ fails and you show me a poem? "It is a simple poem and you could set it to music. You are a fine guitarist. With my voice, and yours, and a few of

That night the celebrants heard soft guitar chords, children's sweet harmony, an unpretentious melody, and the

Stille Nacht! Heilige Nacht! Alles schlaft. Einsam wacht. Accustomed to weigh-

tier music, the congregation was unimpressed. But, in time, the naive purity of Silent Night prevailed. It came to be loved throughout the world, and many preship. By the time the true composers were recognized, Joseph Mohr and Franz Gruber were dead, and so forgotten that their graves could not be positively identified. Their music became immortal. Silent Night is Christmas' highest musical tradition.

Christmas would be incomplete without at least one TV presenta-tion of Dickens' A Christmas Carol. Scrooge, Marley's ghost, and Tiny Tim are part and parcel of the season. But what brought them to life? Well, as many do today, Charles Dickens abhorred the rampant commercialization which, to his thinking, diluted the true Christmas spirit. So in 1843, he penned A

Have you mailed your Christmas cards yet? Sir Henry Cole, a British entrepreneur, mailed his early - in 1843 to be exact. When the idea for such a greeting light-bulbed in his mind, he commissioned artist John Horsley to design them. The run of about a thousand was litho-graphed, hand-colored, and sold for one shilling each. They were the first, and the start of something colossal.

Now, whom have we omitted? Oh yes, Santa Claus, of course.

Santa Claus is also St. Nicholas and, yes, there was a St. Nicholas. was a St. Nicholas. Nicholas of Patara was Bishop of Myra in Asia Minor (Turkey) during the fourth century. That much is fact: the rest is much is fact; the rest is legend. He restored the lives of three murdered youths, linking him forever with children. Anonymously, he presented the three daughters of a poor man with ters of a poor man with doweries of gold, and so became an unseen giver

As the centuries passed, Nicholas slowly blended into the North European folk-figure, Father Christmas, wearing flowing robes and nocturnally delivering gifts to deserving children everywhere. Shoes or stockings were placed outside the door to receive gifts and to ensure that he would forget no one St. Nicholas came to the United States with Dutch settlers in the

The stockings were to be moved inside. Listen: Twas the night before

Christmas, when all through the house Not a creature was stirring,

Clement C. Moore was man of astonishing imagination. When he composed those lines in 1822, he abruptly, permanently redesigned Santa Claus. Never before had he landed on rooftops or dropped down fireplace chinmeys. Never before had

To Prevent Blindness

"These and other projectiles such as blow guns, darts, bows and arrows and sling shots are not toys but weapons with a built-in hazard to sight," warns Malcolm Maxow, M.D., one of the Society3s Medical Advisors.

"Giving any of these to a child is giving that child a license to blind, or -- at the very least -- impair the vision of another child," said Dr. Mazow, citing his own ophthal-mological practice in which "every Christmas" holiday I see a couple of eyes ruptured by one of these so-called toys."
"Nor are these isolated

cases," he added. "According to a recent survey reported to


year 1,288 cases of eye injuries caused by projectile toys were treated in hospital emergency rooms across the country. This total, moreover, does not include cases treated outside the hospital in

offices like mine."
The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness stresses that the major responsibility for such toy-related accidents rests with parents and urges those who are 'Santa's Shoppers" not to let the jolly bearded man in red bring gifts that can turn the joy of the holiday season into tragedy.

The Society also points out that in addition to projectiles, other in-appropriately selected toys cause many of the estimated 9,600 eye injuries to Texas school children each year.






