Leon Watson Named New Tribune Editor

Leon Watson, 1971 graduate of West Texas State University, has been named as editor of the Matador Tribune, Publisher Ray Freedman announced this week.

With a degree in journalism, Watson has served as editor of newspapers in Levelland and Friona, and has been a sports and police reporter, circulation manager and advertising manager. He also worked as a special feature writer for a weekly newspaper in Lubbock.

He is a 30-year-old Lazbuddie product, and comes here from Friona where he owned and operated a printing shop.

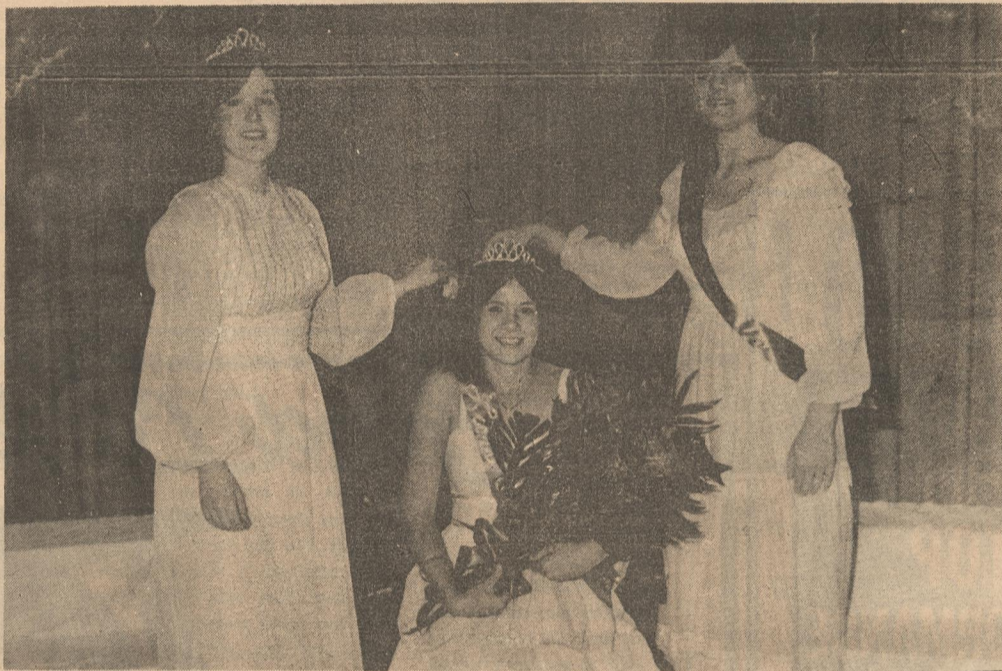
After graduation from WTSU, he spent three years as a private investigator for Pinkerton Detective Agency. He joined the National Guard and rose to the rank of first lieutenant, serving as an Infantry company commander at the Lubbock Armory.

Among Watson's awards is a first place plaque presented by the West Texas Press Association for news writing. The winning story was Watson's on the spot coverage of the Whitharral pipeline explosion which killed five people in Hockley County nearly three years ago.

"The only time I've been to Matador before now was when I played football for Lazbuddie," he said. "Boy we got clobbered."

Before settling down to newspaper work, Watson said he spent leisure time with his hobbies of flying and skydiving. Although he is still a bachelor, he said the last leap year gave him a scare.

He is a member of the Primitive Baptist Church, where he is active in song leading. He also writes religious articles to "The Banner Of Love", published at Ralls.

Mr. Garst also takes pictures of weddings. As a hobby he likes to take pictures of windmills, old houses, and people. He said, "I like taking pictures of people better than of things, because things remain the same and people, especially children, change from moment to moment." Mr. Garst's sister, who is an artist, uses many of his pictures as subjects for her paintings.

Mr. Garst became interested in all aspects of photography while attending Amarillo College, where he worked for the paper and annual staff and did free lance photography. When he graduated from AC, the only school in Texas that offered a major in photography withdrew the major that year. He then enrolled in West Texas State University, where he majored in elementary education, but he paid for his education by working as a photographer for Amarillo College.

After graduation, he taught one year at Dimmitt. Then he returned to WTSU for certification in Special Education and taught in Dumas for four years. He, again, returned to WTSU, this time for certification in Counseling, and then taught four years in Amarillo State Center and Human Development. He then began his present job as diagnostician for the Coop.

As diagnostician, Mr. Garst is responsible for giving intelligence tests and diagnosing learning disabilities for students who are enrolled in Special Education.

Workers' Wants

Most good business people have found it a big help, if they want to succeed, to have a good understanding of the needs of their employees, including their attitudes towards unions.

The National Labor Relations Act specifically states that employees have as much right to oppose a union as they have to join one, and many workers are doing just that. Throughout the country only a fifth of the labor force is unionized.

At J. P. Stevens, for instance, employees have rejected the union in 11 out of 12 elections held. Several explanations have been given for the union's loss record. These include community opposition to union organization. There is opposition by the workers

RICKY TURNER

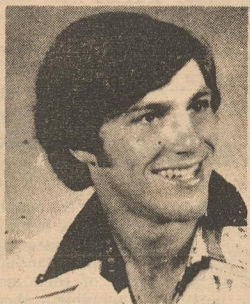
Richard Ray Turner (Ricky) is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Turner of Matador.

NEVER CUT GRASS WHEN it's wet. It could cause you to slip.

the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute for pushing your mower in the direction of safety.

1. Know what you're doing. Even an old hand can use a refresher course from his owner's manual when mowing season starts.
2. Dress for the occasion. Big bell bottoms are out—so are sandals. Snug-fitting pants and heavy duty shoes are best.
3. Make sure no one is in your path or in the mowing area—keep alert, especially when backing up.
4. Never cut grass when it's wet. It may clog up blades and discharge chute—or cause you to slip.
5. With a walk-behind mower cut in one direction—across slopes, never up and down.
6. Mowers aren't meant to be pulled, tilted or lifted when they're running—they could overturn.
7. Stop the engine before clearing the discharge chute or removing the grass catcher bag.

These tips and a bit of common sense will give you a lawn (and a safety record) to be proud of.

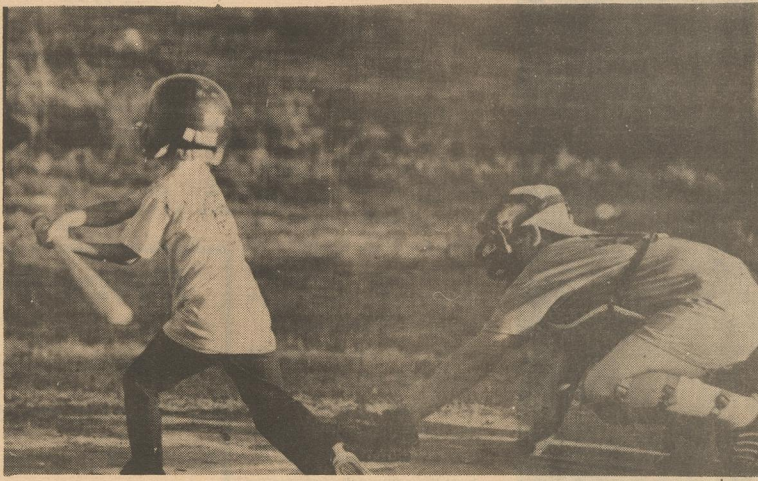

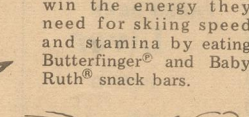

Shop Team Wins First Place

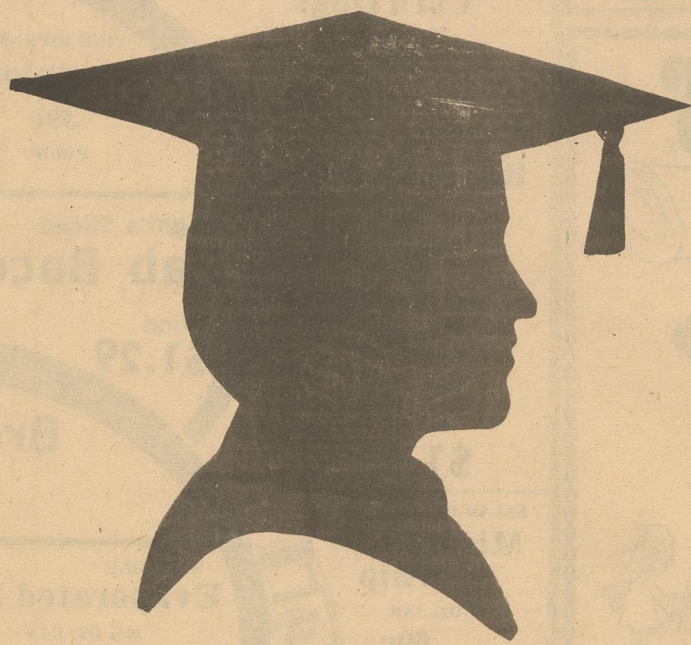

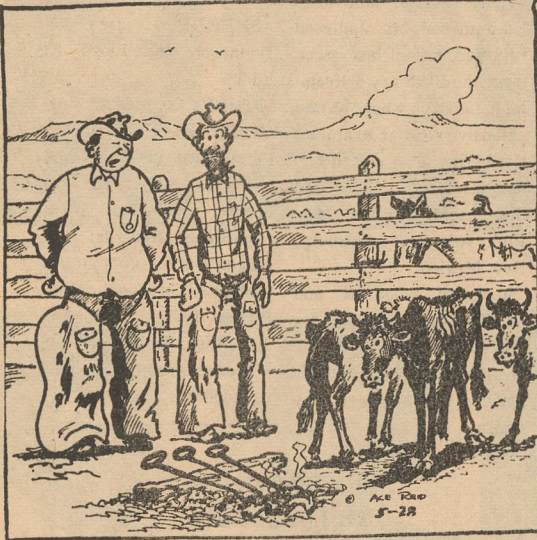

Lloyd Cline of Lamesa May 3 was re-elected for a second one-year term as President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at a meeting of Directors in Lubbock. Incumbents Joe D. Unfred of New Home, Vice President, and Gary Ivey of Ralls, Secretary-Treasurer, were also re-elected. The Board meeting and election followed the 25-county cotton producer organization's annual meeting where an estimated 400 farmers and cotton-related business people heard international cotton marketing specialist John McNutt and Dawson County farmer Donnell Echols speak on the potential for increasing exports of High Plains cotton. McNutt, Vice President of International Marketing for

Cotton Incorporated, told the group that significantly more cotton can be sold to open-end spinning plants in Western Europe if the High Plains will produce more of the high strength varieties required by the open-end spinning system.

He said producers might do well to consider planting 20 percent of their 1978 acreage to cotton types that normally produce lint with at least 90,000 pounds per square inch pressley strength.

Echols, a PCG past president who took part in a Western European Export Seminar in January, confirmed that open-end spinners are interested in high strength cottons from the Plains and cited an example of one such mill which was highly pleased with its first trial run of High Plains cotton this year. However he cautioned producers against planting varieties without full knowledge of their yield potential on specific soils and under specific climatic conditions.

President Cline, in his annual report, reviewed PCG activities for the past year including the continuation of open-end spinning research at the Texas Tech Textile Research Center. Concerning this work he blamed a lack of adequate funding for "moving too slow" to take maximum advantage of the opportunities "to enhance both volume and profitability of our sales of cotton to be used on the open-end spinning system." He emphasized this point by saying "PCG is your vehicle, so to speak, and it will take you where you want to go at whatever speed you and your elected Directors have the skill to drive it. But it can't take you anywhere unless you keep gas in the tank."

Executive Vice President Donald Johnson echoed Cline's call for a broader base of PCG support, telling members "If we do the necessary research; if we get the results of our research in the hands of the right people; if we prevail upon these people to try our product, as you have just heard that one mill in West Germany has done, then we can exploit these new markets to the fullest."

The meeting was concluded with a humorous and inspirational address by Millard Townsend of Lubbock, professional lecturer.
