Youth Education and Leadership Stressed by Club Guest Speaker

"Youth in America is our promise of a shining tomorrow. El Progreso Study Club members were told in an address here Thursday Speaker was Mrs. B. F. Seay of Andrews, President of Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

"Youth must carry on the torch of Liberty and accept burdens under enormous pressure, but we must give youth the chance for a good life that they may be able to assume these responsibilities in a demanding world," Mrs. Seay declared.

The afternoon meeting of the club, held at the home of Mrs. A. C. Traweck, was designated as Federation Day, and the president was using as her subject, her theme for the year, "Education — Adult and Youth — The Challenge of Tomorrow."

Mrs. Seay stressed the challenges of tomorrow and the need of providing education for all youth. She pointed out that young people need to feel that they are contributing to society. To give them this feeling would help stem the rising crime rate, especially of juveniles, she asserted.

"All qualified children should be given the chance for an education, although education can not change a person or create leaders — only God can do that," Mrs. Seay proclaimed.

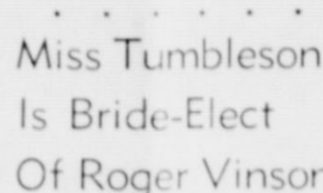
TFWC President and Secretary Are Guests at Eternas Meeting

County Shown As Cotton "Dropout"
 State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office at College Station has released base cotton acreage allotments and projected yields for the 23 High Plains counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers Inc.
 Total base allotment for the 23 counties in 1967 comes to 2,165,872, as compared to 2,122,770 in 1966. Excepting Motley County, all counties in the area

received slight increases in base acreage, and Motley County dropped only 129 acres. Most of the 43,102 acre increase is believed to have come from acres purchased by Plains producers in other parts of the state and brought to this area under the "sale and lease" provision of the Agricultural Act of 1955.

That provision was effective for the first time in 1966 and remains in effect in 1967. Producers may buy allotments, or lease them, from any of 77 Texas counties that voted either in 1965 or 1966 to permit out-of-county transfers.

Leased acres do not show up in base allotments on the plains. These remain a part of the base allotment in the counties from which they were leased, and there is no record of how many acres may have been leased to the Plains either in 1966 or 1967.

Sales or leases under the law must be completed between June 1 and January 1 of each year.

Projected yield for the 23 counties, on a weighted average basis, increased 29 pounds per acre, from 513 pounds in 1966 to 542 pounds in 1967. Projected yields are set by the U. S. Department of Agriculture on the basis of "average" production for the previous three years and other factors such as changes in cultural practices and trends in yields.

farmers because both price support payments and acreage diversion payments under the current cotton program are based on projected yield.

In 1966 producers were paid 9.42 cents per pound times their projected yield on each acre of their domestic allotment, which is 65 per cent of each farm's total allotment. In addition, a payment of 10.5 cents per pound times the projected yield from diverted acreage, up to 35 per cent of the total allotment, was made in 1966.

The domestic allotment for 1967 has again been set at 65 per cent. But the Department of Agriculture has yet to announce the rate of payments for price support or diverted acreage.

In 1966, farmers on the Plains signed up to plant only 1,451,407 acres of cotton. They were required by law to reduce allotments by 12.5 per cent, and had the option of diverting up to 35 per cent of their acreage. Average diversion for the 23 counties was 32.7 per cent.

And this picture is not expected to change greatly in 1967, since payment rates for diversion will likely be as high or higher than in 1966.

So, assuming the same average rate of acreage diversion, planted acreage in 1967 should approximate 1,457,600 acres on the Plains, plus whatever acreage may be leased or bought for the area.

 To give you some additional information on the scabies inspection, the following information was presented at the Plainview meeting on Oct. 3rd.
 Scabies in cattle is caused by parasitic mites, which live in groups on the surface of the skin producing lesions that spread in all directions. The first lesions usually occur on the withers, over the back and around the foot of the tail. Items that you should watch for are tail switching and licking, especially in the winter. As the mites increase, wrinkling of the hide and scratching is noted, with scabs appearing in the later stages.
 Even though cattle in the county were inspected in the spring of this year, another inspection is required before recommendations will be made to take the restrictions off interstate movements. Steps that you can take to make the inspection easier and more convenient were explained in the notice last week, and the cooperation of all will be appreciated.
 Tests on the Experimental Ranch at Throckmorton are indicating that the 4 pasture rotation system is paying off in the

pounds of calf marketed. By comparing the 4 pasture rotation with other systems, weaning weights for the 4 pasture system have averaged 518 lbs. over the past 6 years; 499 lbs. for the two pasture rotation; and 487 lbs. for continuous grazing.
 Another way of showing the advantage of the rotation system is the relation to supplemental feed. Where cows received 1 1/2 lbs. of supplement, 15 lbs. of additional calf weight was obtained, and where 3 lbs. supplement was provided, 18 lb heavier calves were realized. To pay for this supplement however, 22 and 44 lbs. of additional weight at 25c/lb were required, so ranges where no supplement was provided were the most profitable. It takes a good range to do this, and it is possible by proper range management.
 If you would like your pastures to be this good, why not give the rotation-deferred system a 4 pasture arrangement a try?
 Have you observed the cotton varieties planted by Ed Lee in the 5th year of the variety test? Each is identified, and results will be published as soon as harvest is complete, but now is the time to note growth habits.
