





Connally noted that the Senate 'apparently wants to study very carefully" the emergency appropriations for which he has asked. He said that plans for San Antonio's HemisFair '68 may have to be "seriously altered" if the Senate takes much longer. Governor asks \$5,500,000 in emergency funds for the state's exhibit, the Institute of Texan Cultures.

Legislature could pass an emergency appropriation to finance immediate pay raises for state employees only if Connally asked them to. However, he declined and stood by his original recommendations for increases, effective September 1.

Connally also answered some of the oppoistion which has livened up since he asked the Legislature to legalize the sale of liquor by the drink. "Opponents on an issue like





Most commercially purchased planting seed will be treated and this will be noted on the container tag. Growers who save their own planting seed can purchase seed treatment chemicals at most agricultural supply houses. If seed are treated on the farm, the important thing to get is a uniform covering of the protective fungicide over the seed coat. This can be done by a homemade device which will tumble the seed and mix the fungicide thoroughly with the seed being treated.

Be sure to use the proper dos age. Lower than recommended dosage may cause the treatment to be ineffective while excessive rates may damage the seed. If the disease is borne inside the seed, they must be treated by a ifferent method, but detailed inormation on chemical seed treatment is available at my office for the asking.

Results of low rates of treatment will be shown in a cotton test by Roy Grundy that I will present later.


