# A Second Glance

National columnist Julian Bond said last week that Ronald Reagan has discovered the Trilateral Commission.

Like a sizeable number of Americans, Reagan believes "there's something sinister about this association that links 19 present and former members of the Carter administration, including President Carter and Vice President Mondale.

The Trilateral Commission, founded at banker David Rockefeller's urging in 1973, is composed of 250 private citizens from North America, Japan and Europe. Its public purpose: to insure closer political and economic ties between these regions.

But the coincidential -or purposeful -- linkage between the Trilateral Commission and the administration Carter upsets Reagan, Bond said.

It upsets many others who don't share Reagan's politics.

In addition to Carter and Mondale, the Trilateral Commission's membership list has included: Cyrus Vance, secretary of state; Harold Brown, secretary of defense; Zbigniew Brzezinski, chief adviser on national security; Andrew Young, former U.S. ambassador to the United Nations; Gerald SEE GLANCE PAGE 5

# 84th Year of Newspaper **Begins with this Issue**

\* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \* \*

This issue of the Matador Tribune marks the beginning of the 84th year of newspapers and local news coverage in Motley County, according to research by Mrs. Lila Meador, previous owner of the paper. The Tribune is the

successor of the Motley County News, Matador Maverick, Motley Coun-ty Journal, Texas Maverick, Matador Messenger and the Matador Gusher.

Present publisher of the weekly publication is Leon Watson, who purchased the paper Jan. 1, 1979. Ray Freedman owned the paper from 1977 to 1979, Lila Meador from 1974-1977, Douglas Meador from 1935-1974, Douglas Meador and Howard Hamilton from 1934-1935, Douglas Meador 1933-1934, and from G.C Mitchell who published the Motley County News from 1925-1934.

Meador's Matador Tribune was in competition to Mitchell's County News during 1933, and in 1934 Meador-Hamilton partnership purchased the Motley County News from Mitchell and the following year Meador purchased his partner's interest and again became sole owner. H.O. Ward published the News from 1921-1925, W.D. Starcher and

C.A. Lamb published the News from 1920-1921,

An earlier newspaper was the Texas Maverick printed by H.A. Mullenix from 1902-1908. (Issue dated May 15, 1908 lists the masthead as the Matador Maverick The Texas Maverick


was published by Clyde Kendall from 1901-1902 R.P. Moore started the Motley County Journal in 1897. Two daughters

of Mr. Moore still live in Matador but they do not know how long their father published the newspaper, as that was before they were born. Lee S. Smith and J.N. Smith printed the Matador Maverick beginning in 1894, but again the length of publication has been lost in time.

The earliest newspaper which can be traced in record in Motley County was the Motley County News published by Clarence Nugent from 1891 to 1894. First offset issue of the Matador Tribune was in 1966 when a page form for an insert was thrown in before the paper was printed. Publisher Douglas Meador took the proof and with page proofs of the remainder of the issue, drove to Friona to have it printed. In August of 1966, a special edition on the 75th anniversary of the county was printed offset at Hereford. The Tribune has been printed

and the pages made up as for letterpress, then full page proofs were made on the shop's Miehle press. These were then taken to Floydada, camera-ready.


Then linotype, Miehle and other letterpress equipment are still stored in the Tribune building. The present publisher has tried to find a museum or other location for the equipment but has of yet failed to find a home for it. Because of the need of room for more modern equipment it is feared the history making presses must soon be disposed of. Douglas Meador won his first state-wide award, a silver loving cup, in 1934 for his column, Trail Dust. He subsequently won numerous awards for column writing. In addition, the newspaper was awarded many first place plaques and trophies, including two sweepstakes awards, for news writing, advertising and photography. These included regional as well as state awards, and were in addition to many second and third place certificates. In 1952 Meador was chosen Newspaperman of the Year by the Dallas Professional Chapter of Sigma Delta Chi. În 1972 he was presented a plaque by the Cimarron

and Lamb and George W Ellis had the Matador Gusher from 1918-1920. Bob Johnson and John Perkins put out the News from 1915-1918. Homer Knowles printed the Matador Messenger from 1911-1915 and before that T.L. Allison published the Messenger from 1908-1911

Trail Dust has been published in book form and in January, 1979, Frank Hildebrand of the Texas Tourist Development Agency took a dozen copies of the book to England and Scotland, where he presented a copy to each of the mayors of the towns visited.

Front page of the Matador Tribune dates September 29, 1938 is among other newspapers placed in a metal chest in the base of a monument to the founders of the State Fair of Texas, to remain for 50 years from Oct. 8, 1938.

Also a signal honor for the Tribune: this newspaper was among those selected for its coverage of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. The papers were on display in swinging frames at a meeting of the Texas Press, the following year, probably at the midwinter meeting. These were to be sent to archives in Washington,
