

Army Research Finds Potential Sources Of Destructive Powers

MIAMI, Fla., June 20—(P)—Harry T. Mikell, 21, ex-navy gunner, was freed yesterday when Peace Justice O. B. Sutton ruled that the youth committed "justifiable homicide" in the slaying of his 35-year-old father, Ovide, a rancher.

"In all my years," said Judge Sutton, "I have never listened to so many statements of cruelty by a father to his family."

Three daughters and a brother of the confessed slayer threw their arms around young Kikell, laughing and weeping, at the conclusion of Judge Sutton's verdict.

"Now we're going back to the ranch and make a decent living—and live a decent life," said the acquitted youth.

Twelve-year-old Ruby Lois Mikell, youngest of the five children, testified at the inquest that she heard her father arguing violently with her brother, Harry, and that the father shouted, "Dammit, I'll kill you both!"

The sandy-haired blue-eyed witness, who weighs under 100 pounds testified that her father made her ride the range and herd cattle on their 160-acre ranch as soon as she was big enough to get on a horse.

"He objected to my going to school. He said 'education just makes fools of people.'"

"He was mean all the time," she continued. "He cursed us, abused us, beat us and knocked us over the head."

Previously, a brother, Ovid, Jr., declared that "none of us ever understood what made our father so mean and so cruel to my mother and the children."

"When my mother was taken to the hospital at Kendall three weeks ago, my father pointed to a big box in the kitchen and told her: 'When you come back from the hospital, it'll be in a box like that—so take a good look at it!'"

Youth Not Charged With Slaying Father Too Cruel To His Family

WASHINGTON, June 20—(P)—Army research in chemical and related fields "indicate potentialities of destructive power that will dwarf the violence of any agents used in World War II," congress learned today.

AMG PROMISES DISCRETION IN DESTROYING NAZI BOOKS

BERLIN — American Military Government officials predict there will be "no book burnings and no witch hunts" in the American execution of the four-power Allied order to destroy German literature of a Fascist, militarist and anti-Democratic nature.

The same discretionary policy, they said, would be followed in execution of a companion directive handed down by the Allied Control Authority's coordinating committee to destroy Nazi memorials and German military monuments commemorating World Wars I and II.

Maj. Gen. C. I. Adcock, deputy to Lt. Gen. Lucius Clay, deputy

military governor, as well as other officials pointed out that the orders left much to discretion of the zone military commanders.

"And you can count on it," said one official, "that Gen. (Joseph) McNarney isn't going to persecute a German for owning and falling to surrender a history of World War I."

The Americans said that, at their own and British insistence, private libraries were exempted from the search for banned books. In the matter of monuments they pointed to a clause which states that "removal of objectionable parts will constitute effective eradication." This measure is expected to be substituted for total

destruction in many cases.

"What's all this talk about book burnings?" said one high official. "We expect a lot of copies of 'Mein Kampf' and other objectionable volumes to be surrendered. What's wrong with tossing them into the chemical vat and converting them into good clean paper to help cure the present shortage?"

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

stock sales here, according to recent records of regular auctions. Large numbers of cattle sold in the local sales are moving directly by rail to the mid-western states in car-load lots.

Almost as big a meat supply this year as last is expected by USDA officials. They look for moderately more pork but little less beef, veal and lamb. With feed grains short and prices high, hog slaughter is expected to continue large compared to last year all through December. But beginning early in 1947, with a smaller proportion of this past spring's pig crop left to market, farmers will have fewer hogs for slaughter than in the same months this year, the USDA predicts.

Any hen laying less than a dozen eggs a month is losing money for her owner, considering prevailing prices of feed and eggs. These inefficient hens should be culled from laying flocks, the extension service advises farm families and backyard poultry raisers. A hen consumes about five pounds of feed per month regardless of whether she is laying, so further reduction of laying flocks is being sought by the government in view of the feed shortage. For the nation as a whole, the reduction sought is one of every seven hens. According to Sam Morre, extension poultry specialist, most Texas flocks could lose one of every seven hens, and with proper culling profits would increase.

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Smart Housewives Cook Once To Make Multiple Meals

Cook once—Eat twice: It may sound a bit on the lazy side but it's a mighty good practice to cook once and eat twice. Or, going it one better, to mix once and bake three. For there's many a neat trick to be worked out whereby one mixing will do the work of two or three as far as eating goes, thus saving on the beastly washing-up as well.

Cooking Streak: Some day when a cooking mood descends (you're like that too, aren't you?), start in with an angel cake and, while all the cake making tools are out, whip up a gold cake from some of the yolks. Or a batch of cookies, custard or double-the-recipe for lemon pie filling. Serve it with the angel cake as pudding, etc.

You feel like making a pie. Don't stop with the counterpane for tonight's meat pie. Make up enough that you can turn out some cheese straws; line a pie dish to be wrapped in a bread paper, and slipped into the refrigerator, ready for use even a week from now.

Double Talk: Doubling the recipe for little Johnnie's "boiled" custard means a nice chilled sauce for orange cake slices topped with strawberries or bananas. Or fold in equal parts of whipped cream or evaporated milk, whipped; freeze it quickly in your refrigerator's freezing zone. A jellied fruit salad mixture may double as salad today, or, served with cream, appear with cake as dessert at another meal. Two cans of brown bread slices with the baked beans; chilled and thinly sliced, the bread becomes sandwiches for tomorrow's musical tea.

When Folks Drop In, it's so nice to know that yesterday's extra potatoes in the pot means a chance for potato salad to serve with the remainder of the meat loaf. Or, with that double batch of noodles you cooked, there will be enough for a noodle ring, to be filled with creamed something-or-other from your emergency shelf. POWDERED ORANGE JUICE MADE IN PENICILLIN-USED RETORTS

ORLANDO, Fla. — This juicy story is all about oranges.

It started when the government needed penicillin in powder form, and needed it fast. Research scientists went to work to find a way to dry the drug without losing its miracle properties. The answer was a high and heatless vacuum because heat destroyed the value of penicillin. A vacuum sufficient to produce the drug on a commercial scale was developed, a maze of tubes and retorts looking very much like an oil refinery.

About that time, Uncle Sam decided he needed fresh orange juice for soldiers in foxholes. Since foxholes weren't equipped with refrigerators, the problem again was to concentrate the juice into powder.

Penicillin and orange juice are in the same boat when it comes to their dislike for heat. Orange juice loses its flavor and its all important vitamin C when heated.

If a vacuum process worked for penicillin, scientists asked, why wouldn't it do the same for orange juice?

The National Research Corporation of Boston, which developed the vacuum apparatus, thought it would. It put up a pilot plant in the heart of Florida's citrus belt near Orlando. The canning plant of the Plymouth Citrus Growers Association furnished the juice and the penicillin "machine" turned out the powder.

Clark Took Secessionist Oath After Houston Refused, Resigned

(Editor's Note: This is the seventh of a series on governors of Texas. Others will appear from time to time.)

AUSTIN — Edward Clark became governor of Texas at a moment of high drama; he left the chief executive's post by an equally dramatic route.

Clark succeeded Sam Houston because Houston refused to swear allegiance to the secessionist government in 1861. Lieutenant governor, Clark would and did take the oath. And the secessionist convention had made it imperative to take the oath or forsake the office.

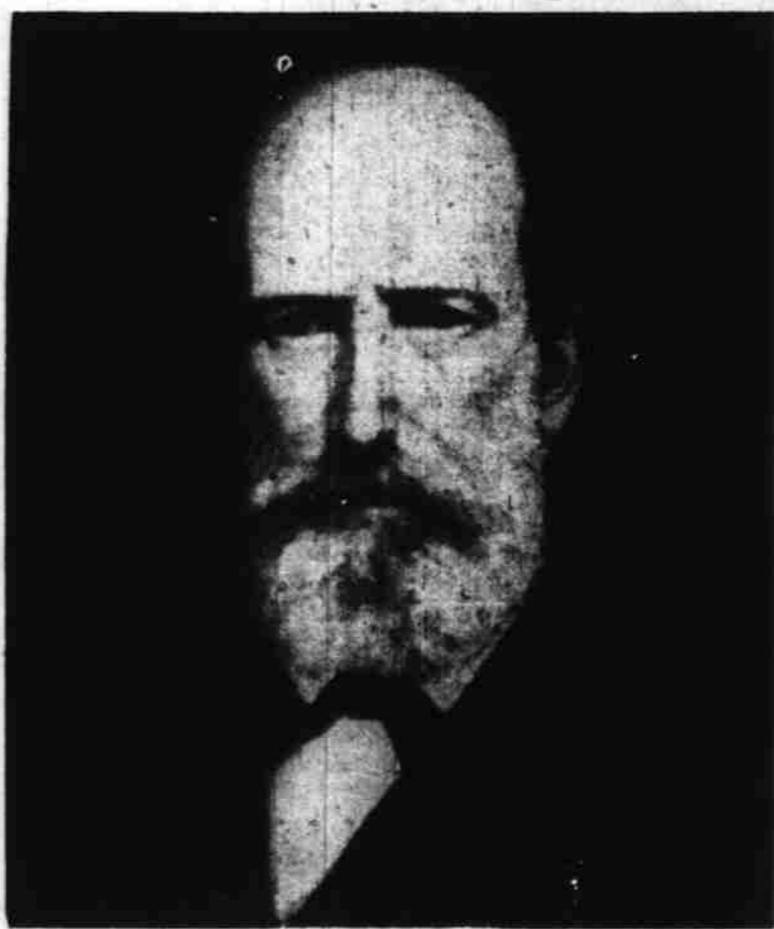
Historian Amelia E. Barr wrote: "... the lieutenant governor, a certain Edward Clark, was eager to subscribe to the oath. He was an insignificant creature whose airy conceit was a direct insult to Houston's sad countenance and dignified manner; and I remember well how contemptible he appeared, as spry and pert, he stepped up to the bar of the house to take the oath."

By heredity, Clark should have had the stuff that governors are made of. On the night of the inaugural ball his mother is reputed to have said, "It is natural to have governors in my family. The dress I have on was worn at my father's inaugural ball in Georgia; later at my husband's inaugural ball in the same state, and now at my son's..."

Whether Clark was a capable governor would be hard to determine, as he only served nine months. But it is certain that he was popular—at the end of the nine months he ran for election and Francis R. Lubbock defeated him by only 124 votes.

During those nine months, Clark spent most of his time mobilizing the war resources of Texas. There was little else to do, and he's credited with doing a good job of draining the last ounce of strength from Texas for the Confederate cause.

Among other things, he raised 400,000 firearms, of every description, a pretty good indication of the state's firepower in those days, when the population was about 604,000. He forced merchants to turn their ammunition

to the state, and ordered the federal troops to clear out.

The first call from the Confederacy asked for 8,000 men. They answered. In July, 1861, the Confederacy asked 20 companies and 32 responded. Clark proudly reported, "Twenty thousand Texans are battling for the rights of our new-born government."

Fighting in Texas then largely was the familiar defense of the Mexican border, repelling Indian raids on the northwest, and defense of the coast.

The most exciting battle of this period involved the defense of Sabine Pass by Dick Dowling and his mighty few. With 37 men and 6 small cannons, Dowling captured two federal gunboats and 350 men, and sent the rest of a sizable fleet of federal warships back to New Orleans. Had the invasion succeeded, Texas might well have been the scene of a great campaign. Dowling was killed in the battle.

After two world wars, it's an old story; but then it was news that Texas, in proportion to population, furnished more soldiers and officers to the Confederacy than any other state.

Following his defeat by Lubbock, Clark himself entered the fighting. He raised a regiment and became part of Walker's division. Although not particularly distinguished as a governor, his war record gives him a place

alongside the first three fighting Texas governors.

Clark won his military fame at the bloody battle of Pleasant Hill, La. He was shot through the leg while leading a charge—some six feet in advance of the first wave. The story goes that when his brigade saw Clark fall, they let out with the rebel yell, rushed the Union parapets and fired a close-range volley of buck and ball that killed 800 soldiers.

After the Confederacy gave up the struggle, Clark feared vengeance from the unionists and fled to Mexico. He stayed only a short while, decided it was safe to return, and became a merchant and lawyer. He died in 1880 and was buried at Marshall.

Aged Woman Starts To Jump, Hangs On

HOUSTON, June 20—(AP)—A 70-year-old woman who had been under a doctor's care yesterday crawled out of a window of a ladies rest room on the 13th floor of the Medical Arts building and then changed her mind and hung on with her hands until pulled back.

"I don't know why I did it," she was quoted by police as saying, "but at the time I thought it was the best thing to do."

The woman was first seen by Mrs. Frances Norris, 23, a nurse in the office of the doctor. The doctor's office is so situated that one of the windows of his office faces the one in the rest room.

"I happened to glance out of the window and I saw the woman, completely out of the window and hanging on by her hands," Mrs. Norris told reporters. "I just simply could not believe it. But when I looked again I knew it was true; I was never so scared in my life."

In the meantime, Mrs. Anna Johnston, 61, a janitress happened to go into the rest room and saw the woman who by that time had pulled herself partially back through the window.

Mrs. Johnston screamed and two men went into the rest room and pulled the woman back.

have arranged to guard these precious "calories patches" with patrols of specially trained dogs. "What the industrious Berliner planted in the sweat of his brow that shall he also reap," stated the newspaper Der Morgen, pointing out that poachers were no doubt waiting covetously for the potato, tomato and lettuce crops to appear in such garden plots as those in the famed old Tiergarten.

Taking the suggestion, the short-handed Berlin police department started schooling 80 dogs for the job. The breeds are dobermans, great schnauzers, boxers, airedale terriers and shepherds. Some are ex-Wehrmacht wardogs. Head trainer at their school is Ernst Voss, 57, professional trainer who says that he once lost his most distinguished pupil, Adolf Hitler's dog, when the Fuehrer found out that Voss was not a Nazi party member.

The garden guards are trained to leap walls, sniff out trespassers and circle them, barking, until a policeman arrives. They will not attack unless their catch tries to escape.
