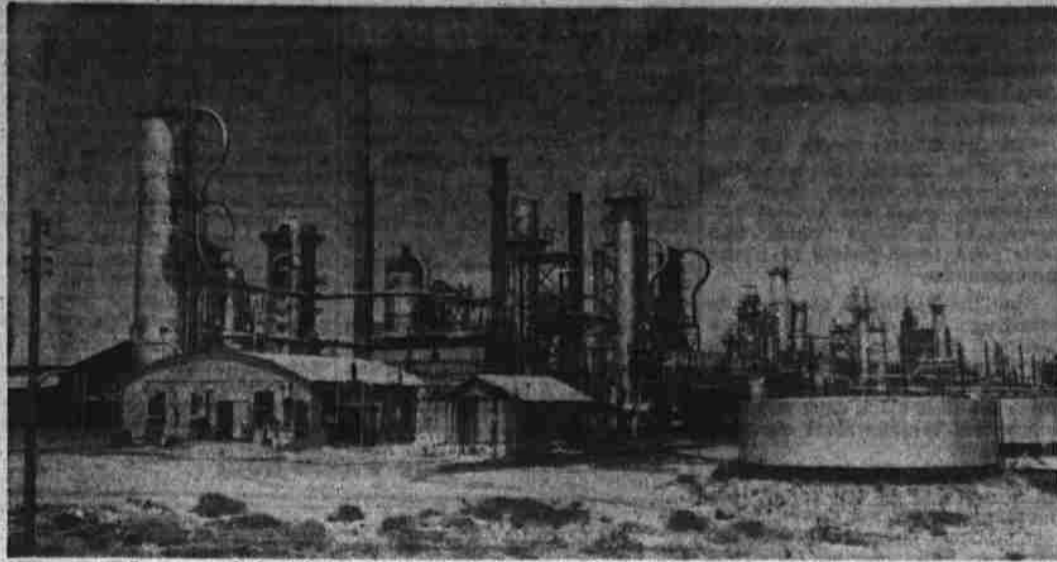

Doug McKinneys To Be In Charge Of Bugg Packing Co.

Bugg Packing Co., operating today under a new managerial arrangement, is preparing to serve farmers this year in processing their hogs either for market or for storage.

Today, Mr. and Mrs. Doug McKinney, who formerly operated a grocery on E. 3rd street, which they sold recently to Joe Davis, are taking over operation of the plant, releasing A. H. Bugg, owner, to devote more time to the purchase of livestock.

McKinney will concentrate his efforts on operation of the packing end of the business, while Mrs. McKinney (nee Jessie Bugg) will do the bookkeeping and managing.

The plant is being rigged to specialize in hog killing for farmers, although it will continue its same service in wholesale fresh meat sales.

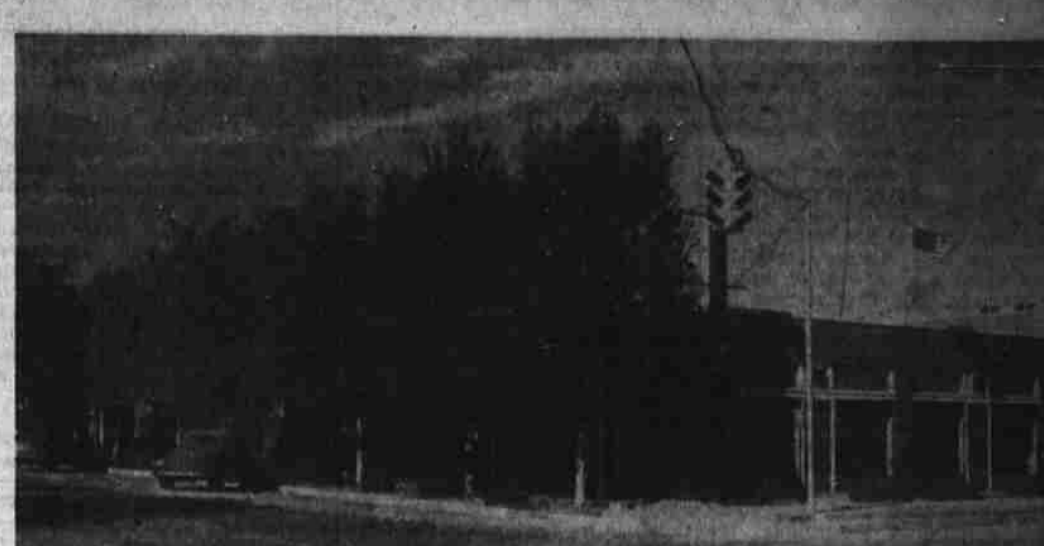
In addition to butchering hogs and stock for farmers, the plant will be equipped to cut carcasses and to assist farmers in curing the meat.

On a very reasonable basis, Bugg Packing Co. will apply curing materials, wrap and store the meat until it has had time to absorb and until farmers are ready to take it home.

Similarly, the company is set to cut up sausage meat and to grind and sack it for producers.

Many local meat market operators who like to buy butcher stock direct from farmers and ranchers have found Bugg's plant the logical answer for having the meat custom slaughtered. Animals are delivered to Bugg's place on the oil mill road just northwest of town and are then butchered, chilled and stored in cold vaults until ready to be delivered.

Farmers and meat market operators alike will find the company able to care for their needs, for the chilling room, where all meat is left overnight, will hold the equivalent of 20 beef carcasses and the store rooms more than twice that amount.

Over 100 Placed In Jobs From B'Spring Business College

Man About Manhattan - - We're Poking Fun At A. Hitler

NEW YORK—For quite a few months after we got into the war, there was a marked avoidance on the part of comedians, songwriters and scriptwriters to any tropical references to A. Hitler, on the sound premise that A. Hitler was not funny. The pendulum swung so far that Eddie Cantor, in launching his successful "Banjo Eyes" on Broadway, wrote out several references to A. Hitler which had been good laugh-getters in tryout performances. Now the pendulum seems to be swinging the other way. Once again A. Hitler is being lampooned. I suspect that it is our national sense of humor reasserting itself after the first black days in which anger and revenge alone occupied our minds. I would call it a healthy sign. A. Hitler still is not funny, but he is an easy target for ridicule—and ridicule is hard to take. It must be disconcerting to Nazi propagandists that our answer to threats and swagger and promises of Utopia is the Bronx cheer.

has been such an instantaneous hit. It was written by Oliver Wallace of the Walt Disney musical staff for a Donald Duck short entitled "Donald In Nut-Land." Wallace's orders were to turn out something funny, and he, too, went through the questioning process: "What's funny about Hitler?" Wallace decided the answer was in "Der Fuehrer's Face" and turned out the words and music in an hour and half. It has the swing (and some of the notes) of "The Jolly Choppersmith" and the Wienerschnitzel drinking song—but more than anything else, the Bronx cheer! Consequences of the song were several. Disney promptly renamed the Donald Duck short after the Wallace tune. A recording by Spike Jones (for Bluebird) caught on so swiftly that the recording company was 350,000 orders behind in no time, and Martin Block of WNEW, one of the local stations, began auctioning off the few available recordings for war bonds. In two days, Block and "Der Fuehrer's Face" sold \$60,000 worth of bonds. It all seems a fitting reward for Disney, who has more than gone all-out in making shorts and featurettes for the war effort. War work seems to inspire him, too, for his upcoming "Saludos, Amigos," a cartoon and pictorial record of South America, is for my money the most imaginative and entertaining feature he has turned out. I thought Disney's "Bambi" missed fire in several directions, but "Saludos, Amigos" is something you shouldn't miss.

Washington Daybook - - If You're Craving Action Try The Merchant Marine

WASHINGTON—If you want to get into the thick of things, there is one service that shouldn't be overlooked—the Merchant Marine. If you want to make the sea your life, with the postwar job of captain of your own ship at a top salary of \$7,500 a year or more as your life's goal, then the Merchant Marine is your dish. Never in the history of any nation have ships rolled down the ways with such speed as they are in the United States today. Stories of the shipbuilding feats of Henry J. Kaiser and others read like fiction but the stories would end on a sorry note if we couldn't supply the men to sail them. And that's the job of the Merchant Marine. Nor will any sailor of the line have to hang his head about not doing his part in the war. Some of the greatest tales of heroism yet to come out of this war have come from the Merchant Marine. With some 500 ships torpedoed off our shores, it's not hard to see where our front line has been to date. To enlist in the Merchant Marine isn't hard.
